Reelect Elwyn Romaine County Board Chairman

Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, veteran of 26 years of service on the Washington county board, 21 of them as board chairman, was reelected for a two year term as chairman of the county board of supervisors at the organization session Tuesday. Joseph Schmitz, vice-chairman, was also unanimously reelected to a two year term.

Romaine represents the village of Kewaskum, now District 9 under the reapportionment plan while Schmitz represents Germantown's 28th district.

In addition to the election of Romaine and Schmitz, board members reelected the three members of the highway committee, Reuben Schmah, committee chairman, Dist. 19, village and town of Jackson; Adolph Lofy, Dist. 25, west half of the town of Richfield, and John Kratz, West Bend's 1st ward.

Highlight of the session was the selection of a successor to the late Lawrence Harty who died April 12, just a week after he was reelected supervisor of West Bend's 4th ward. Leslie R. Handke was appointed by Chairman Romaine after he won out over four other candidates for the post in an advisory secret ballot.

The board also elected Atty. Luke J. Kauth, West Bend, to fill the unexpired term of Carl Schneiss as a trustee of the county hospital and home. Kauth won out over William C. Knippel, Greg A. Matenaer and Mrs. Jack Tessar of Kewaskum. He will serve out the balance of Schneiss' term of about two years.

Other business was transacted by the board.

Board Takes Bids On School Addition

CONSTRUCTION TO START IN TWO TO THREE WEEKS

Bidding for the construction of an addition took place Monday, April 18, at the high school. Bid totals were 5% to 6% over cost estimates in certain areas. The general construction bid was slightly less than estimated. Inasmuch as bids in the area on school projects were running up to 20% over estimated costs and because the architects' estimates were a year old the board feels that the bids were very good.

The Board of Education has taken the bids under advisement pending architects recommendations. Although contracts have not been let construction is expected to start in two to three weeks.

Anyone interested in information about care and maintenance of small fruits is welcome to attend the meeting.

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


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John Koenen Dies Of Heart Attack After Shopping

John H. Koenen, 58, a lifelong resident of the town of Kewaskum, died unexpectedly at 4:45 p. m. Tuesday, April 19, of a heart attack in his car on the L. Rosenheimer store parking lot.

He had just returned to his car after being grocery shopping. As he started to drive off he suffered the fatal attack and slumped to the seat. His slow moving vehicle struck a concrete platform and came to a halt. The firemen's ambulance and a local physician were summoned. Koenen was pronounced dead shortly after and removed to Miller's Funeral home.

Mr. Koenen was a wood finisher at Mallard Coach Corp., West Bend, and also farmed part time on the Koenen homestead on Hwy. 28 just outside of the east village limits. Born Nov. 9, 1907, in the town of Kewaskum, a son of the late William and Mary Matenaer Koenen, he never married.

Surviving are three sisters, Frances (Mrs. Mark Vogelsang) and Elenore (Mrs. Henry Pastors), both of R. 3, West Bend, and Regina (Mrs. Roman Staehler) of R. 2, Kewaskum; one brother, Jacob A. Koenen, of R. 2, Fond du Lac; a sister-in-law, three brothers-in-law, two nieces, four nephews, and other relatives. One sister Angela (Mrs. Arnold Thill) preceded him in death.

Mr. Koenen was a member of

the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity congregation.






