Vote June 14 Will Decide On Kewaskum K-12 District

ORDER REFERENDUM ON REORGANIZATION OF SCHOOL DISTRICT

A special referendum election on the establishment of a K-12 system (kindergarten through 12th grade) in the Kewaskum school area has been ordered for Tuesday, June 14. If approved, the plan would dissolve the present union high school district and the four separate elementary districts and establish a new common district to be known as Kewaskum Community School, Joint School Dist. No. 2.

If approved, the order will take effect on July 1, with the first district meeting slated at the Kewaskum Community High school at 8 p. m. on July 25.

The area in question is comprised of the village of Kewaskum, Farmington and Wayne and a portion of the town of Barton in Washington county and parts of the towns of Ashford and Auburn in Fond du Lac county and Scott and Mitchell in Sheboygan county.

The K-12 plan would establish a seven member school board as provided by state statutes to govern the newly created common school district, eliminating separate boards in each elementary school district and for the high school.

Under the K-12 plan the separate Kewaskum, Farmington, Wayne and Beechwood elementary districts as well as the present Union High school district would be combined into a common school district governed by the seven member school board. It is pointed out that the plan will make the district eligible for greater state school aids and up-grade instruction and administration throughout the area as well as cut costs.

At a public hearing on the reorganization held in May only some 75 of the 3,500 electors attended. At that time only the advantages were discussed as the audience was unresponsive and no disadvantages were mentioned.

The referendum was ordered by the Waukesha-Washington county school committee in keeping with the state-wide plan of consolidating such school districts.

Balloting is scheduled from 9 a. m. to 7 p. m. in the normal polling places in the area unless otherwise specified. For the sake of convenience, electors in small areas affected where only a few electors will be casting ballots will be requested to cast ballots in neighboring districts. Announcement of the official polling places, a facsimile ballot and notice of the referendum election will be found on pages 6 and 7 of this issue.

Referendum notices, in conformity with state statutes, are being published by County Clerk Anton P. Staral.

20th Anniversary Of Scouting in Kewaskum Noted

COURT OF HONOR HELD FOR PRESENTATION OF AWARDS

Last week's meeting of Troop 44, Boy Scouts of America, held double significance. A court of honor was held for presentation of awards and it also marked the completion of 20 years of boy scouting in Kewaskum. Assistant scoutmaster Robert Sparks termed the year just concluded "the most successful of all from a standpoint of achievement."

Scoutmaster E. "Mike" Gnacinski is also assisted by Harry Cundy and Robert Gross. Sparks is a former scout of Troop 44, the first to return in a leadership role, and 32 boys are enrolled.

Five tenderfoot awards were made, five second class awards, 10 star awards, as well as two life awards and 66 merit badges. The awards were presented for achievements during the past three months in public health, home repairs, soil and water conservation, art, reading, painting and citizenship in the home, community and nation.

Power Mower Safety Rules

1. Study the instruction manual which came with the mower. This manual gives basic information on safety and maintenance.

2. Inspect the lawn for stone, wire, and other debris before you start to mow. The blade can pick up such objects and throw them with enough force to kill. It is important to keep all persons away from the opening where grass is ejected.

3. In starting the mower, stand firm and be sure the mower will not move over your foot as the starter rope is pulled. Be sure the engine is cold and shut off when filling the gasoline tank.

4. Always be sure of your footing, especially when mowing inclines. It is very easy to pull the mower back over your foot unless you are aware of the danger and keep your mind on the job at hand.

5. Stop the mower whenever you are called away or leave the job temporarily. An unattended running mower plus a small child sometimes equals disaster.

6. Keep all small children and pets away from the machine. They

could stumble or fall into the mower path or onto the mower itself and become casualties.

7. Always stop the engine when you are unclogging, adjusting, or oiling the mower. As an added precaution, disconnect the spark plug wire while you are working on bottom of mower. Never reach under the guard. Keep your hands, feet, and clothing away from all moving parts.

8. Keep gasoline stored in a plainly marked red can. This can should be spill-proof in case it is bumped or upset. Storing gasoline in a glass jar is asking for a fire.

9. Train all operators before letting them use or even start the mower. Permit only competent operators to use the mower. Before allowing anyone to mow, be sure he is physically able to handle the machine and capable of making the right decision instantly, if something goes wrong.

REMEMBER: The hand may be quicker'n the eye, but the foot can be slower'n the mower.

Dr. O. F. Guenther, 76, a former Campbellsport physician and a brother of William Guenther of Kewaskum, died about 10 a. m. Saturday, May 28, at his home in Oshkosh, where he resided for the last eight years.

Dr. Guenther practiced in Campbellsport from 1926 to 1958 when he moved to Oshkosh and worked part-time on the staff of Winnebago County hospital. In January of 1965, Dr. Guenther was elected to the board of directors of the First State Bank of Campbellsport for the 34th consecutive year. He also served as clerk of the school board in Campbellsport for 15 years. He was formerly principal of the Lomira High school for eight years.



WESTERN EUROPE KIWANIS CLUBS MEET IN VIENNA

Four Local Students Donate Blood at UW

Four students from Kewaskum were among 2,195 students, faculty and staff members of the University of Wisconsin at Madison who gave a pint of blood during the spring all-campus blood donation on the university's Madison campus.

The gifts of life were collected by the Red Cross Blood Center in Madison for distribution to 87 hospitals in 37 southern Wisconsin counties, including all Madison and university hospitals, and to the nation's armed forces wherever needed.

By the large donation of 2,195 pints the university in Madison set a new blood donation record and continues to hold the blood donation championship of the state of Wisconsin.


Since 1950 when the blood donations were started on the university's Madison campus, two all-campus donations have been held each year—one in the late fall and one in the early spring—and over the past 15 years students, faculty and staff members of the university have donated more than 45,000 pints of blood to the hospitals and armed forces.



Five minutes' time is allowed in booth to mark ballot. Unofficial ballots or memorandum to assist the voter in marking his ballot can be taken into the booth, and may be used to copy from. The ballot must not be shown so that any person can see how it has been marked by the voter.

After it is marked it should be folded so that the inside cannot be seen, but so that the printed indorsements and signatures of the ballot clerks on the outside may be seen. Then the voter should pass out of the booth or compartment, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him his ballot to be placed in the box, and pass out of the voting place.

CHANGES LISTED IN FISHING REGULATIONS

Listed below are the changes in the 1966 fishing regulations. Trout, daily bag limit, 10-in the aggregate. Individuals wishing to fish for lake trout in Lake Superior must have a permit to do so. Permits may be obtained from WCD personnel at Ashland, Bayfield, Brule, Iron River, Mellen, Pattison, Solon Springs, Spooner and Washburn.

There is a size limit on northern snappers, walleyes and sauger in Ashland, Barron, Bayfield, Burnett, Chippewa, Douglas, Polk, Price, Rusk, Sawyer, Taylor and Washburn counties. (Eighteen inches for northern snappers and thirteen for walleyes).

Marquette has been added to the list of counties that have a 25-bag limit on catfish.

The daily bag limit on sucker and red horse is 50-in the aggregate on inland and boundary waters.

It is unlawful to take frogs with firearms, or to take for sale as bait any of the larvae of aquatic insects from any stream or spring inhabited by trout, or to release unused minnows into any lake or stream.

The use of suckers or chubs for bait or the use of gaff hooks, firearms or fish spikes in taking or landing fish is prohibited in the Caldron Falls reservoir.

Ice fishing hours are from 6:00 a. m. until 9:00 p. m.
