Five Contracts for Improvement Additions to High School Awarded

Strike on Building Project Continues

Five contracts for improvement additions to Kewaskum Community High school were let at a meeting, of Joint School District No. 2 Monday night at the school. The contracts are as follows:

The Wisconsin Division of Corrections, Madison, was awarded a contract of \$1,720.50 for the construction of shelving in the new library addition. Thirty-seven units will be installed at a cost of \$46.50 each. They will be made in state institutions by inmates.

The R. N. Nelson Co. is to install Kewaunee technical furniture in the science laboratory at an estimated cost of \$10,100. Referendums on the language laboratory and a floor machine were tabled pending further study. Five bids were received on the language laboratory facilities.

Jack's Appliance of Kewaskum was awarded a contract for \$480 to install wiring in the manual arts department.

Kannenberg Accounting of West Bend was retained to audit the books for the 1966-67 school year.

Members of the board passed a resolution to discontinue all present insurance policies and contract for a single over-all policy with the Kettle Moraine Agency, Kewaskum, headed by Eugene Bohn. The board voted to pay the agency 50 per cent of the commissions and the remainder to be paid the other previous agencies until present policies expire.

The board also accepted the resignation of Harold Mosher, science and chemistry teacher, who plans to teach in Germany at an army dependent base.

Workmen on construction at the high school addition have been idle for over two weeks due to a strike called by their Milwaukee office. Principal Marshall Boyd said that if work is resumed within the next week or so, the improvement project could be completed in time for the fall semester. Otherwise, outside classroom facilities may have to be located.

Former Resident Is Outstanding Senior of Class

CONNIE MILLER SPEAKER AT CALIFORNIA SCHOOL

Constance Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred J. Miller, 16212 St. Timothy Road, Apple Valley, Calif., former residents of Kewaskum, was one of two outstanding seniors chosen by their class of 408 seniors of Victor Valley Senior High school, Calif. to speak on their behalf at commencement exercises.

Fred Miller is a brother of Edw. E. "Pat" Miller and Joe Miller of Kewaskum. Mrs. Miller is the former Pearl Hron of this village. Their daughter Connie started her elementary school education in Holy Trinity school, Kewaskum, and moved to California while in third grade. She continued at St. Mary's Catholic school in Victor Valley.

This year's class of 408 seniors at Victor Valley Senior High school was the largest ever to graduate. The school had an enrollment of 1,600 students with a teaching staff of 65 and next year the enrollment is expected to top 2,000.

Of the two outstanding seniors chosen to speak for their class, Miss Miller used "Here Lies the Timber" as her title, while Richard Heitzig used the class motto "Our Knowledge is the Hope of Tomorrow" as his theme.

Miss Miller learned that good listening is an art during her years at school. Attesting to her mastery of that is her academic standing, 10th among a senior class of 408. It's not entirely by choice. She has total loss of sight in one eye and 25 per cent vision in the other. She delivered her address strictly from memory. "I sometimes read large print . . . but most of my work at school is just built around careful listening — and retaining what I've heard," she said.

Miss Miller has been outstanding in public speaking. She won a \$100 scholarship from the local chapter of the National Forensics League, plus a \$25 Thespian Club award. She expects to enter Pomona college at Claremont, Calif. in the fall majoring in English—"but maybe in philosophy . . . I'd like to teach, then to enter writing or lecturing."

Fireworks, Water Fight Here July 3

UPTOWN VS. DOWNTOWN TO CLASH IN GRUDGE MATCH

The annual spectacular Fourth of July holiday fireworks display sponsored by the village of Kewaskum under the supervision of the Kewaskum fire department will be held in the village park on Sunday night, July 3.

An extra, special attraction this year will be a water fight between two fire department teams, the Uptown Obbergoots and the Downtown Canadas. The Milwaukee river is the dividing line. The "Canada" team will be composed of the firemen's former regular water fighting team which was undefeated in three years of competition with other surrounding fire departments. The "Obbergoots" team will be made up of the department's present regular team which won first and the trophy in the water fighting tournament held last year at Theresa. This grudge match has been brewing ever since last winter and Chief Armin Oppermann decided to let them have it out on the night of the fireworks. The "Canadas" think they can still squirt the pants off of the "Obbergoots". The prize for the winners is all the river water they can drink free.

The water fight, a best two out of three match, will begin at 7:30 p. m. and will be followed by the fireworks right after dark. Hundreds of dollars worth of fireworks have been purchased and this year's display will be bigger, better and longer lasting than ever. There will be the usual thunderous fireworks as well as many beautiful air and ground displays of a variety. Live music and entertainment will be provided in the park by The Julida Boys and refreshment stands will be open all evening. Bratwurst, hamburgers, popcorn, beer and soda will be available.

The fireworks will be touched off directly across the river from the park, providing an excellent view from the park hill and other vantage points along the river.

Come early for the water fight and cheer for your favorite team, then see the fireworks, and stay for free entertainment and have a brat, burger and beer. The firemen are out to entertain you and everyone is invited to attend for a good time.

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Clara Jaehnig Honored at Red Cross Meeting

ANNUAL DINNER HELD AT ST. MICHAELS THURSDAY

Appreciation of dedicated service and dynamic plans for an expanding program keynoted the annual meeting of the Red Cross held Thursday, June 23, at St. Michael's parish house in St. Michael's. Clara Jaehnig, the organization's executive secretary for 25 years, received a handsome plaque inscribed with a tribute and a corsage presented to her by Red Cross chairman Larry Chase on behalf of the group. Chaise praised Miss Jaehnig as "one who knows the value of people, a keeper of the Golden Rule." Accepting the award, Miss Jaehnig thanked all the volunteers who have aided the organization over the years and reminded the audience of the Red Cross slogan, "The Red Cross needs you, and you need your Red Cross." She received a standing ovation.

The program and business meeting followed a delicious turkey dinner served by the ladies of the church. Master of ceremonies, Alois Bremser, planned the meeting which included music by Janet Volm and Joseph Staehler, a special prayer by Rev. Staskunas, and a solemn moment of silence in memory of Red Cross members who had passed away during the year. Certificates of merit were awarded to members who have contributed much to the Red Cross program in many areas. Those who were honored were: Mrs. Lillian Fischer, Miss Gladys Muehl, Mrs. Cora Manthei, Robert Schroeder, last year's director of the United Fund, and Albert Schroeder of the rural Red Cross drive. The West Bend chapter itself received special recognition from national headquarters for its quick response to emergency and disaster appeals.

"Combined Services Territory" was the topic of the guest speaker, Fred Luckenbill, Red Cross national field representative. According to the speaker, Red Cross leaders from 1917 to 1964 were obliged to be "jacks of all trades." The new combined services territory set-up will improve field service to the benefit of all people regardless of where they live and will expedite cooperation between the Red Cross, United Funds and government organizations. "What will this mean to areas like West Bend?" Mr. Luckenbill emphasized that local chapters must accept the use of the newly reorganized resources and examine its programs to insure prompt meeting of additional and future needs. "All groups must be willing to share with other chapters. Service to people is the business of the Red Cross."

Elected to positions on the Red Cross board of directors were: Rev. Victor Hackbarth, Thomas Koenig, Mrs. Mike Cavanaugh, and Edwin Junk, Jr. of the city of West Bend. Other areas will be represented by Mrs.

"Clara Jaehnig Night" was marked by the presence of a host of friends of the devoted executive secretary, all of whom had spent many years at her side as Red Cross volunteers. Chairman Chase recounted that during Miss Jaehnig's 25 years of dedicated service that 240 persons had served on the board of directors, 2,600 pints of blood were donated (before the project was undertaken by the Blood Bank), 2,000 swimming certificates were issued, in addition to certificates for first aid and home nursing, 5,000 and 2,000 respectively. As one long-time Red Cross worker and board member said with admiration and affection, "To me,

Clara IS the Red Cross." This opinion was shared by the large gathering which displayed its enthusiasm with frequent applause.

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
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Local Bankers Attend State Convention

3 Teenagers Hurt When Car Hits Tree

Three Kewaskum teenagers were injured, one of them quite seriously, in a one-car accident which occurred at approximately 11:07 p. m. Saturday on Hwy. 28, about 1.2 miles west of Kewaskum.

The injured included Stephanie C. Landmann, 16, of 1438 Parkview dr., the driver, who sustained cuts and bruises; James W. Manthei, 16, of 306 Third st., cuts and bruises, and Richard Schmidt, 17, 309 First st., the car owner, head injuries and multiple cuts and bruises. All of the injured were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. Miss Landmann and Manthei were released later but Schmidt, the most seriously injured, is still a patient there.

According to authorities, the driver said she was heading east on Hwy. 28 when she lost control of the car after its right wheels

ran off the pavement on the south side of the road. The car continued into a field. Schmidt, who was a passenger in the front seat of his car, attempted to help the driver get back on the road. The vehicle then went across the road, ran into one tree and sheared it off, and then spun and struck a second tree. The right front door was wrapped around the tree and the vehicle was damaged beyond repair.

Eugene Schaefer of rural Kewaskum was injured when the car

he was driving left the highway, crossed a ditch and struck an embankment on Hwy. 45 in front of the Ray Klein farm about a mile south of Kewaskum late Saturday night. He was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital in the firemen's ambulance. The auto was damaged.

Firemen Win \$31 Prize Money at Badger Tourney

In conjunction with its centennial celebration, the Cedarburg fire department hosted the Badger Firemen's association annual tournament and Cedarburg's annual Festival of Music over the weekend. The Badger association is an organization of volunteer fire departments from 22 southeastern Wisconsin communities, including Kewaskum.

The tournament contests were held Saturday evening and the centennial celebration was climaxed Sunday with the Cedarburg department's annual Festival of Music. Marching band and drum and bugle corps competitions were conducted all day, with a mammoth 2½ hour parade held at 12:30 p. m. Approximately 40 of the finest bands and drum and bugle corps from several states, including Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin, participated in the colorful parade, which is the best annually that can be seen anywhere in this state.

Member fire departments of the Badger organization also marched in the parade and prize money went to those with the most firemen entered. Due to the intense heat, band and drum corps participants "passed out like flies" after the long parade and three ambulances were kept busy continuously transporting them to relief sta-

tions. The Kewaskum fire department had 10 men participating in the parade but announcement had not been received as yet whether they won any prize money in this event.

In the tournament contests Saturday evening Kewaskum won a total of \$31 in prize money. The local team placed first in the relay coupling event (\$20), fourth in the gas mask rescue event (\$5.00) and took a fifth (\$4.00) and seventh (\$2.00) in the individual bucket relay contest. 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
