## Qualifications of Candidates for Members of School Board Listed

### Seven Member Board Of New District to Be Elected Monday

#### FOURTEEN CANDIDATES RUNNING FOR POSITION

Fourteen candidates are running for positions on a seven member board of education in the newly created K-12 Kewaskum Community School District. Electors will vote at the Kewaskum High school from 1:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m. on Monday, July 25, 1966. All members are at large and a voter may vote for seven candidates.

For the information of the electors the following is a list of the candidates and their qualifications.

**Leo Bingen:** Married, 2 sons, David in high school and Allen, a sophomore at Platteville State university. Bingen has worked as a foreman at the West Bend Company and has, for the past 25 years, farmed in the town of Auburn. He has been honored by the Future Farmers of America and by the Farm War Service Bureau.

Bingen has served on the high school board of education for 13 years and has been its director and is presently the treasurer. He is also president of the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity parish.

Of his candidacy Bingen says: "I feel that my election will give the board a 'touch of experience' when they have to face and deal with the problems which they will encounter, and it is my 13 years of experience on the Kewaskum High school board which will benefit the district most, because I have learned to deal with and solve problems pertaining to school affairs."

**Richard L. Edwards:** Village of Kewaskum. Married. has four children. Edwards has attended the University of Wisconsin, Concordia and Ripon colleges. He is an agent for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

Active in community affairs, Edwards is a member of Kiwanis, is a past president of the Kewaskum Business association, the Northern Kettle Moraine Recreation association, a member of St. Lucas Lutheran church, and presently serves as director of the high school board of education.

Of his candidacy Edwards says: "During the past year considerable progress has been made toward establishing first class education facilities and faculty for the district high school students. Now with K-12 this same progress can be expanded to all students. The electors' past acceptance and cooperation with this program has been most gratifying. Your vote toward continued progress will be appreciated."

**Jack Jadro:** Town of Scott. Married and has 2 children.

Jadro is the owner-operator of Jack's Appliance in the village of Kewaskum. He has served as the clerk of the Beechwood school board for 4 years and is serving as a member of the Cooperative Educational Service Agency Board of

## Registration for Kindergarten Students July 25

Based upon the July 1, 1966 order creating a K-12 school district and the temporary board's decision to attempt to hold kindergarten for all eligible children in all parts of the district, parents in the Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne areas wishing to have their children enrolled in kindergarten must register their children on July 25 from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m. at the Kewaskum High school. Registration at this time is a must.

To be eligible for kindergarten, a child must be 5 years old on or before August 31, 1966. Parents must bring either the child's birth certificate or baptismal record with them when registering.

If it is at all possible, dependent on the availability of teachers, etc., kindergarten will be offered throughout the district and those parents involved will be notified when the final determination is made.

## Strike Settled, Work on School Addition Resumes

Work was resumed on Tuesday on the construction of an addition to Kewaskum Community High school with the settlement of the strike of Bricklayers' Local 8. Progress on the \$646,000 project was interrupted June 1 by the strike.

Only one or two men returned to work on Tuesday but it is a start, school officials said. Previous commitments by the contractors are taking priority.

The new contract accepted by the union and ratified by directors of the Allied Construction Employers association over the weekend calls for a wage increase of \$1.05 an hour with 13 cents an hour fringe benefits, spread over a two-year period.

The pact, which affects the union's 1,200 members sets rates for wages and benefits in Milwaukee, Waukesha, Ozaukee and Washington counties and covers bricklayers, sewer and stone masons, concrete block layers and related crafts.

## Barns on Candee Farm Burn Down

### SUSPECT ARSON; FIREMEN CALLED TO KOHLER HOME

The Kewaskum firemen answered a call at 5:45 p. m. Tuesday to a serious fire at the farm owned by Richard Candee of Milwaukee at the intersection of Co. Trk. Y and Hwy. 45 in the town of Auburn, about five miles north of Kewaskum.

Three fire departments were summoned to the scene. First called was the Campbellsport department and when the flames, fanned by a high wind, got out of control and threatened to burn all of the other buildings on the farm the Kewaskum department was also called. Later the Eden department also arrived at the fire and assisted the Campbellsport and Kewaskum tankers in hauling water.

The blaze burned two large barns to the ground. The roof and one corner of another large barn also caught fire but the building was saved by firemen. Several nearby sheds on the farm also caught fire and they, too, were saved by the battling firemen whose water supply was limited at times. An amount of hay was also lost with the barns and the third barn and sheds were considerably damaged. Kewaskum firemen fought the blaze for about two hours and then returned to the station with the Campbellsport firemen standing by.

An abandoned house on another farm owned by Candee was partially burned Wednesday at 5:40 p. m. on the Auburn Lake road. Fond du Lac county sheriff's office is investigating possible arson in connection with the two fires in two days.

Local firemen also answered a call at 5:30 p. m. Saturday to the Earl Kohler home on Stark st. A window fan in an upstairs bedroom apparently shorted out or caught fire and burned the entire window frame, melted the glass

**LT. GOV. LUCEY SPEAKS AT COUNTY LUNCHEON**

Lt. Governor Patrick J. Lucey proposed Saturday that Wisconsin establish an Air Pollution Control division under the State Board of Health.

Lucey spoke at a luncheon in West Bend at the Mernac hotel. The luncheon was sponsored by supporters of Lucey's candidacy for governor, and was part of the Lucey family's 72 county tour.

Drivers who smoke are involved in four times as many accidents as nonsmokers, a recent Columbia University study showed. No explanation of the increased rate was given, but James L. Malfetti, Ph. D., director of the school's safety education project, said that smoke fumes can impair vision, and that trying to light a cigarette, cigar, or pipe while steering a car "is an invitation to disaster."



### Annual County Fair Opens at Slinger July 28

The Washington County Fair will be held at Slinger fairgrounds, July 28-31, according to county agent Maurice Hovland, who serves as manager of the event.

According to Hovland, "all systems are go" for the county fair. Men are working getting exhibit spaces ready, barns cleaned and sprayed, grass cut, tents up, wiring in place, so that on July 28 the fair will open for the 108th time in Washington county.

The 1966 fair will have some new features. An arts and crafts show will take place in a large tent, in which a group of artists and craftsmen, under the direction of Ron Sachse, West Bend art teacher, will place their exhibits.

There will be a "farm babies" show, which will have offspring of many animals that are found around a farm.

The bandstand entertainment will feature the usual girls' style revue and 4-H talent night on Saturday. Friday night there will be a rock 'n' roll program featuring the hard-driving beat of "The Accidentals" of West Bend. Sunday night "Badger Ballads" will be presented by the Wisconsin Idea Theatre of the University of Wisconsin. This "historical hootenanny" of folksongs and ballads out of Wisconsin's past is sung by a group of university students, who are now touring the state with this program.

Hovland also reports more tent space sold than ever before. Cattle numbers seem to be about the same, even though there are far less cattle in Washington county than in other years.

The Washington County Fair is owned and operated by the County Board of Supervisors, under the jurisdiction of a committee consisting of Guido Schroeder, chairman; Hovland as secretary, with two other county board members, Frank Falter and William Kuhn. The fair committee, with the

county board, the extension agents, and the many volunteer workers, hope that this will be one of the outstanding fairs that have been held in Washington county.

The fair is free—there is no charge for admission or parking. Thursday, July 28, is entry day, and according to Hovland, "probably the greatest degree of confusion that ever exists in Washington county." However, he pointed out that by Thursday night the confusion will be organized, the entries will be in place, and Friday morning the judging will begin.

The dairy cattle will be judged on Saturday and Sunday, and a horse show will take place in the ring in front of the bleachers near the barns on Saturday afternoon. This show is conducted by boys and girls under the direction of their 4-H club leaders.

Hovland reminds the public that the county fair is an effort on the part of the county to give young men and women in 4-H clubs, FFA, FHA and other groups an opportunity to show the results of their work and projects. The public is cordially invited to attend the fair.





## West Bend Badgers Nip Indians in Regional Tournament Finals, 2-0

**KEWASKUM TIPS SLINGER OWLS IN MEET OPENER, 4-1**

After bringing the regular Scenic Moraine summer season to a close Thursday the Kewaskum Indians entered WIAA regional baseball tournament action at Regency city park in West Bend Saturday afternoon. 

#### ORDINANCE NO. 66-1 AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY TO THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

**SECTION 1. Territory annexed.** In accordance with s. 66.021 of the Wisconsin statutes of 1963, and the petition for direct annexation filed with the village clerk on the 10th day of April, 1966, signed by all of the owners of land in the territory hereinafter described in the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, is annexed to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin:

All that part of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 16, Township 12 North, Range 19 East of the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the East line of said section which is 1.158' North 1°27' West of the East 1/4 corner of said Section 16; thence South 87°13' West 720.12'; thence South 1°27' East 15'; thence South 87°13' West 636.58'; thence South 1°27' East 19.39'; thence South 87°13' West 140'; thence South 1°27' East 200'; thence North 87°13' West 28.04'; thence South 1°27' East 266.02'; thence North 87°13' West to the East line of the Southwest 1/4 of the Northeast 1/4 of said Section 16; thence Southerly to the Southeast corner of the Southwest 1/4 of the Northeast 1/4 of said Section 16; thence Westerly to the center of said Section 16; thence Northerly to the North 1/4 corner of said Section 16; thence Easterly along the North line of said Section 16 to the reference line of U.S.H. No. 45; thence Southeasterly along said reference line to the East line of said Section 16; thence South 1°27' East along said East section line to the point of beginning. Excepting therefrom that portion heretofore conveyed for highway purposes.

**SECTION 2. Effect of Annexation.** From and after the date of this ordinance the territory described in section 1 shall be a part of the Village of Kewaskum for any and all purposes provided by law and all persons coming or residing within such territory shall be subject to all ordinances, rules and regulations governing the village of Kewaskum.

**SECTION 3. Severability.** If any provision of this ordinance is invalid or unconstitutional, or if the application of this ordinance to any person or circumstances is invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this ordi-

nance which can be given effect without the invalid or unconstitutional provision or application.

**SECTION 4 Effective Date.** This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.
