'Twister' Hits Village, Area, Causes Considerable Damage

At Least 25 Trees Twisted Off Here; Grandstand Moved

SHEDS, ANTENNAS, CHIMNEYS, ROOFS, AWNINGS, WINDOWS, POLES DAMAGED; POWER OFF

Tornados, large hail, damaging winds and pouring rain swept through a large portion of central and southeastern Wisconsin about 4:30 p. m. Monday afternoon and Kewaskum was one of the areas hard hit by the severe storm. The "twister" passed from west to east and also did extensive damage in the St. Kilian area. Funnel clouds touched down in several sections west of here, one of them being sighted as close as Rosendale.

The "twister" was the second one to hit this area within a week. Just a week ago Monday a storm of less intensity caused damage about two miles north of the village and developed into a tornado in Sheboygan county.

Monday's storm left a path of devastation in Kewaskum. At least 25 or 30 trees, most of them large ones, were downed in the village. The trees were not uprooted but were twisted off, the majority of them in the center or near the top of the tree. Some of the trees fell on houses, damaging the buildings, roofs, siding, windows, shrubs and flowers. Hundreds of smaller limbs and branches were ripped off of trees and there was scarcely a yard or street in the entire village that was not littered with branches, twigs, leaves and other debris. It was a sight to behold with branches and debris laying all over. Village crews have had all available trucks busy steadily all week cleaning up the trees and branches and hauling them away but have nowhere near completed their task as yet. Many property owners and volunteers helped in the cleaning up work.

The large baseball grandstand on the school grounds was shifted from its concrete block foundation by the terrific wind. The north side of the grandstand was moved several inches off its foundation, ripping off a section of the top row of concrete blocks with it and tossing them to the ground. A fence has been placed around that section of the grandstand to keep people out as it is dangerous.

Dozens of television antennas all over town were snapped off or bent by the wind of tornado-like velocity. Chimneys were damaged and one was blown off at the Clayton Stautz home. Portions of roofs and roofing were ripped off and roofing was lifted on some buildings. Awnings were ripped loose or damaged and windows were broken. At the Eugene Muench home on E. Main st. a window was literally "sucked out" of its frame by the suction of the wind and fell to the ground below. Some sheds suffered damage. Electric and telephone poles

A few buglers from the high school band, who still have strong lips, will help them out Sunday.

The drums and bugles are still intact and they hope to see you at Allenton Sunday.

These firm, fixed price contract awards were made after competitive negotiation. Under both contracts 101 concerns were requested to submit proposals and 12 concerns submitted bids.

LUNCH PROGRAM LATER DUE TO CONSTRUCTION

All Kewaskum area schools, which now include Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne, will open on Friday, Aug. 26, at 9:00 o'clock with a record enrollment expected. Beginning Monday, Aug. 29, the regular starting time of 8:30 a. m. at elementary schools and 8:15 a. m. at the Kewaskum High school will go into effect for the remainder of the year.

Due to construction at the high school, the hot lunch program will probably start at a later date, but if the kitchen is ready at the high school lunches will be starting Aug. 29. The Beechwood school will begin its lunch program on Aug. 29. Milk, however, will be available for those wishing to purchase it at 1c per half pint prior to the re-opening of the hot lunch program.

A milk break for elementary students will also be provided in the morning. Elementary students should bring 90c to cover the cost of milk for the first semester.

It is the hope of the administration that parents will insist that their children be in regular attendance throughout the year. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance usually reflects a higher degree of performance as well. A reminder also that any child who misses three or more consecutive days of school must have a doctor's permit to return to school. No child will be readmitted without one.

Parents of children who have not yet registered them for kindergarten, as well as new residents in the area, are asked to register their children as soon as possible in the Kewaskum High school office.

were downed or bent at an angle and some wires were down. Among other damage cornfields were flattened and other crops damaged.

The village was without power and light for about an hour because of downed poles and wires. Warnings of severe storms, damaging hail and winds and a possible tornado had been given over the radio and television throughout the afternoon. People were told to prepare for it and when the squall hit many residents fled to basements and other places of shelter when they saw the severity of the approaching storm. Older residents said it was one of the worst storms in their memory and they could not recall a time when there was as much damage done.

After the storm the fire department was called out about 6:15 p. m. to the home of Dr. F. E. Nolting in the village when there was an odor like something burning and smoke in the basement. After probing in the darkness with flashlights firemen found the source to be in the motor of a fan in the basement. It was reported that the power had been off and when it came on there was sufficient "juice" to feed the motor but not to turn the fan and the motor burned out, causing the smoke and smell.

After leaving the Nolting home, firemen went to the home of Mrs. Bernard Seil where they cut up and removed a tree that had fallen against the house and damaged it. It also fell across the driveway and wires leading into

the home. The tops of several other trees on the Seil property also were blown off and the yard was littered with branches. A window in the house was broken and roofing, siding, shrubbery and flowers damaged. One limb fell across washlines, loosening them and a bird bath was toppled. From there firemen went to the home of Dr. R. G. Edwards where they removed another tree that had fallen against the building.

Other areas north and south of Kewaskum escaped the brunt of the storm but there was also widespread damage southeast of St. Kilian and in the town of Wayne, where several farms were hit by the twister. There trees were felled, blew over a chimney and TV antenna, lifted shingles from roofs, turned over chopper boxes, moved farm wagons and equipment and causing other damage. The Clarence Sauer and Don Rightsell farms in the St. Kilian area were in the path of the high winds and suffered much damage.

Mrs. Rightsell said that the storm dipped down in funnel shape and left a path of devastation on their property. About nine or ten trees were downed, a windmill was blown over, the gar-

age roof was torn off, a bathhouse at a stock watering pond was blown to bits, the house chimney was blown down and doors were ripped off the barn and roofs damaged. She stated the twister only took seconds to pass the farm located on a high tract of ground.

At the Sauer farm to the north at least two trees were felled and a chopper box blown over, while at the Calvin Schaub farm to the west a silo was reported damaged.

The Wisconsin Electric Power Co. reported scattered damage confined primarily to the Kewaskum, Hartford and Oostburg areas where service interruptions were caused by felled lines resulting from lightning, falling trees and branches.

Traffic on Hwy. H near Kewaskum was reported tied up for a time by a fallen tree across the road.





Three Local Youths, Four Others Hurt in Crash Near Dundee

Seven young persons from Campbellsport and Kewaskum were injured early Saturday night in a rear-end collision on Hwy. 67, about two miles southwest of Dundee.

Taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, were Kevin Hron, Richard Wietor and James Sparks, all of Kewaskum, and all passengers in a car driven by Gary Reigle of Kewaskum, which crashed into the rear of an auto operated by Joan Bauer of Campbellsport. She and three children in her car, Amy Bauer, 4, Kalleen Bauer, 2, and Randall Bauer, 7, all sustained minor injuries. The injuries of the Kewaskum youths also were minor.

Fond du Lac County Traffic Officer Miles Rahn, who investigated the 8:45 p. m. mishap, related that the Bauer car had struck a deer and was stopped in the road when the Reigle auto came up from behind and was unable to avoid the collision. The Bauer car was spun around by the impact and sent into a ditch where it overturned. The left front of the Reigle vehicle and rear of the Bauer auto were damaged.
