## Woman Is Charged With Arson After Starting 4 Fires

SET FIRES IN APARTMENT; BOND \$3,000; TRIAL FRIDAY

Mrs. Ida Schumacher of 131 Main st., Kewaskum, is being held in the custody of the Washington county sheriff's department at West Bend on a charge of arson after admitting starting four separate fires in her upstairs apartment Wednesday afternoon.

Because of the nature of the fires, Chief Armin Oppermann and other members of the fire department immediately became suspicious of arson. Chief Oppermann notified the police department and Mrs. Schumacher was taken to Chief of Police Roland Pledl's office for questioning by the fire chief and local police officers. She denied having any connection with the cause of the blazes.

She was taken to the county sheriff's office Wednesday night and after being interrogated further there Thursday morning by Chief Pledl and Assistant District Attorney Robert Kauffman, Mrs. Schumacher admitted starting the fires, according to Pledl. A warrant was issued for her arrest on a charge of arson. Bond was set at \$3,000, which was not furnished, and she was held for trial at 9 a. m. today (Friday) by Judge Robert Stoltz in Branch 2 of County Court.

The firemen were first summoned to the Schumacher apartment about 4:10 p. m. When they arrived they discovered two fires at the same time in separate clothes closets at opposite ends of the building. The owner of the building, Roger Jacobs, who operates a barber shop on the first floor of the structure, had the front closet fire under control with the aid of a hand extinguisher. Firemen completed the job and also extinguished the blaze in the rear closet. After making sure both fires were out firemen returned to the station.

Only minutes later, about 4:30, as firemen were just backing their trucks back into the station a phone call was received that there was another blaze in the apartment. This fire was in the same closet in which they had just extinguished the first one a short time before. Again firemen put out the blaze but became suspicious of arson. They checked all rooms, attic space, walls, wires and other possible sources of fire before once more returning to the station.

However, Chief Oppermann remained in the apartment to question Mrs. Schumacher and her husband Mac and to prevent the possibility of more fires occurring. The chief said he remained at the apartment for more than a half hour before leaving. Moments later while he was still standing across the street from the building talking to another fireman, they glanced up to see smoke coming out of a front window and the front closet on fire again. Without placing another alarm the firemen at the scene put out this blaze, also.

had been one more fire earlier in the afternoon, making four in all. In this first blaze the foot-end of a mattress on a bed was ignited. Mr. Schumacher dragged the mattress outside without necessitating a fire call.

In the series of fires a mattress, much wearing apparel, door sills, woodwork, walls, curtains, and other items were damaged and there was also smoke and water damage.

The fire department barricaded the apartment for the night to prevent any further fires and to keep anyone from entering until State Fire Marshall Joe Farrer of Waukesha arrived Thursday afternoon to investigate the fires. The marshal was notified by Chief Oppermann. Photos were also taken in the apartment. Insurance investigators were also at the scene Thursday.

## Youth Trapped As Fox Hole Caves in Saved by Friends

BOY COMPLETELY COVERED DUG OUT; NARROW ESCAPE

A rural Kewaskum boy had a narrow escape from death when he was trapped in a cave-in while digging a tunnel to investigate a fox hole at the Arnold Schladweiler property at St. Michaels about four miles east of Kewaskum Monday afternoon at about 2 p. m.

Kerry Fay, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Fay, R. 1, Kewaskum crawled into a three-foot tunnel he and a companion, Robert Schladweiler, also 13, had dug in a sandy area when the ground caved in on top of him.

Young Fay was completely covered by the sand and ground. Quick action by James Ramthun, Robert and Nancy Schladweiler, who immediately started digging him out, saved the youth's life. He was removed from the hole in a state of shock.

His rescuers administered artificial respiration to revive Kerry and the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad who were summoned transported the boy to St. Joseph's Community hospital at West Bend, where he was reported recovering Wednesday morning.

"Take one crochet hook, add 26 skeins of yarn, blend in a goodly amount of patience, mix well with ability and skill and you have one afghan," the smiling Mrs. Dworschack related.

She worked at it "off and on" in her spare time last winter. It was an excited young lady who telephoned her grandmother last Friday to inform her of the award. When Miss Babcock entered the afghan in the fair, she affectionately attached a label to it "Made by Grandma."

The background of the 72-inch long, 56-inch wide afghan is ivory and in each 35 blocks, which were made individually, is a snowflake design crocheted in a soft shade of gold. Earlier Mrs. Dworschack made one for her daughter, Mrs. Reuben Drewitz, who reside at Long lake, R. 2, Campbellsport.

She said the 16 skeins of ivory and 10 skeins of gold virgin wool amounted to \$19. Mrs. Dworschack lives alone. Her husband died in 1963.

## Lakes Team Loses To West Bend's Champions, 9-4

**HOFMAIER, ACE PITCHER, IS HIT FREELY, HOWEVER**

As could be expected, West Bend's Land o' Lakes league Northern Division champions downed Kewaskum in their home final under the lights here Saturday night, 9-4, but not without a tattle. The setback dropped Kewaskum (9-6) into fourth place. The game attracted the largest attendance of the season.

**FOUR-TIME CHAMPION AT SOUTH HILLS DEFEATED**

Young Wally Tack is the 1966 club champion at South Hills Country club, Fond du Lac, succeeding Carl Wertz of Kewaskum.

Tack won the honor Sunday with a 36-hole, one-up victory over Bob Hornung in the finals. On Saturday the St. Mary's Springs academy senior-to-be had scored the biggest victory of his career when he eliminated four-time champion Carl Wertz, 3-2.

Wertz' defeat ruined his bid to earn a fourth straight championship. He also won the title in 1957. Wertz had been a heavy favorite to take the crown again this year.
