## Groundbreaking Ceremonies at New Kewaskum Post Office Site Oct. 1

CONG. RACE, POST OFFICE OFFICIALS WILL ATTEND

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced this week that groundbreaking ceremonies at Kewaskum's new post office site on Main st. will be held Saturday, Oct. 1, at 2:30 p. m.

Congressman John Race and post office officials will attend the ceremonies and there will be other participants in the program.

The Sturm Building Corp. of Manawa, Wis. has been awarded the contract to build the new post office and lease it to the post office department. The building, to be located on the A. G. Koch property at 341-347 Main st., will have an interior space of 3,433 square feet and an area of 6,024 square feet for parking and movement of vehicles. The post office is expected to be completed by March 1, 1967.

The complete program for the groundbreaking ceremonies will be announced in next week's issue.

## Walter Meilahn Dies on Friday

RETIRED CHEESEMAKER AND FARMER SUCCUMBS

Walter J. Meilahn, 67, a retired cheesemaker and farmer, and a resident of Kewaskum for the past 42 years, passed away on Friday, Sept. 16, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, after a lingering illness of several years.

Mr. Meilahn was born Sept. 8, 1899, at Cascade, a son of the late John and Augusta Otto Meilahn. He attended the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and was a resident of Cascade until coming to Kewaskum as a cheesemaker 42 years ago. At that time he was employed at the Kewaskum Dairy and also managed their plant at Tomah, Wis. for some time. A member of St. Lucas Lutheran church, Kewaskum, he was a former member of the cemetery board of the parish.

Mr. Meilahn married the former Ada Schulz of Kewaskum at Fifth Ave. Methodist church, West Bend, on June 15, 1935. She survives, together with three sons and a daughter, Theodore W. and Kenneth of Kewaskum, Yvonne Margaret of Milwaukee and Daniel C., a student at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Oliver Suemnick and Mrs. Harvey Habeck, of Cascade; three brothers, Carl, William and John Meilahn, Jr., all of Cascade; five sisters-in-law, two brothers-in-law, nieces, nephews and other relatives. One brother, Eric, predeceased him.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Tuesday at St. Lucas Lutheran church with the Rev. Wayne Bartelt officiating. Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park. Visitation at Miller's Funeral home was from 2 p. m. Monday and at the church from noon to the hour of services Tuesday.

## Degrees at UW Received by 2 Local Students

Two students from Kewaskum were among the 1,341 students who received their undergraduate and graduate degrees this fall as the result of their final scholastic work during the 1966 summer sessions of the University of Wisconsin at Madison, it was announced Thursday by the university registrar's office.

The Kewaskum students and the degrees they received are: Richard N. Groh, 1254 Roseland dr., bachelor of business administration, and Leon A. Guntley, R. 2, bachelor of science.

The list of summer degree recipients was announced as all students' scholastic records for the summer and the early autumn were completed and compiled.

This brings the total number of degrees awarded by the university at Madison during 1966 to 6,319 and the total number of degrees awarded by UW here during its 117-year history to 161,232. A total of 3,600 degrees were conferred at the university's annual spring commencement last June.

Of the total 1,341 degrees awarded this fall, 498 were bachelor degrees and 843 were higher degrees. Of the higher degrees, 172 were doctorates, maintaining Wisconsin's high place among the nation's universities in the number of doctor of philosophy degrees conferred.

SAYS NIXON WILL 'ASK FOR REPEAL OF 20TH CENTURY'

Speaking in Kewaskum, Congressman John A. Race said Thursday evening that former Vice President Richard Nixon will "probably ask for the repeal of the 20th century" when he visits Wisconsin next week.

"I want to serve notice on Mr. Nixon," said Race, "that our senior citizens are not interested in hearing him attack Medicare as he has done in the past."

"Our parents and teachers are not interested in hearing him expound on his theories as to why we can't afford first class schools in the richest country on earth."

"And our farmers are not interested in hearing more praise from Mr. Nixon of the dismal Benson farm programs."

"In fact," continued Race, "our citizens are not interested in hearing Mr. Nixon call for the repeal of the 20th century as he has frequently done in the past."

Race's remarks came at a testimonial dinner honoring him at the Wigwam Supper club. The dinner was largely attended.

## Kiwanis Turkey Shoot Is Most Successful Held

622 TURKEYS GIVEN OUT SET RECORD; THOUSANDS ATTEND

The 14th annual Live Turkey Shoot sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at the Bar-N-Dude Ranch Sunday was the most successful ever held and set a new record in gross income, turkeys given out and food sold. Thousands of persons attended the event throughout the beautiful day, which was warm and sunny.

Although there were fewer shooters on the rifle range than last year, the percentage of turkeys shot was higher. A total of 412 turkeys were bagged on the range for a new high. Last year 345 turkeys were shot, 67 less than this year. A total of 210 turkeys were also given out in the other events including the pistol, trap, bow and arrow and deer rifle ranges. Adding this amount to the number of birds shot on the rifle range makes a total of 622 turkeys given out.

## Carl Wertz Loses Club Championship Title at Hon-E-Kor to Bill Fabian

### Four-Time Champion Defeated Saturday In Meet Semi-Finals

#### STAUTZ, BUTTS AND ZELL CHAMPS IN OTHER FLIGHTS

Hon-E-Kor Country club hails new champions in at least three of the five club championship flights this year as the result of the tournament finals completed Sunday.

Bill Fabian of West Bend is the new club champion, succeeding Carl Wertz of Kewaskum, who was dethroned after holding the title four straight years, ever since the Hon-E-Kor course opened. This has not been Carl's year, as he also lost the club championship of South Hills Country club at Fond du Lac to Wally Tack earlier. Wertz had also held the championship of that club for the past four years.

Fabian defeated Wertz in the 18-hole semi-finals Saturday, 3-2, and then barely won over Len Carroll by one hole over the 36-hole stretch in the finals Sunday for the title. The club championship flight is the only one in which 36 holes are played in the finals, all others going 18. Carroll reached the finals by defeating Art Sepsersky Saturday.

Fabian had Carroll four down after the first 18 holes played in the morning but Len made a remarkable comeback in the afternoon round to almost overtake Fabian and snare the title. Carroll gained back three holes until he was only one down going into the 36th hole. The two finalists halved the last hole and the Championship went to Fabian. Had Carroll taken the final hole they would have gone into "sudden death" play. Fabian copied the title by defeating Earl Conley in the opening round of the tournament, downing Tom Larsen in the quarter-finals, beating Wertz in the semi-finals and then sheding Carroll in the finals.

In the President's flight Clayton Stautz won over Larry Wickert handily in the finals Sunday by a 5-4 margin. Stautz succeeds Leroy Kohl as champion.

In the Vice-President's flight Bill Butts retained his title for the second year by downing Paul Matenaar in the finals, also 5-4.

In the Director's flight Augie Zell won from Dale Carlson by just a one-up margin in a tight match. Zell succeeds Paul Winkler as champion in this flight.
