## Town of Wayne Woman Killed When Hit by Car While Crossing Hwy. 41

MRS. ALBERT KUEHL, 77, VICTIM NEAR HER HOME

A town of Wayne woman became the 29th traffic fatality in Washington county Monday evening when she was struck by a car on Hwy. 41 about 1,000 feet south of the Hwy. 28 intersection. Killed in the mishap was Mrs. Albert Kuehl, 77, of R. 1, Allenton.

Mrs. Kuehl was struck by an auto driven by James T. Pagac, 51, of R. 1, Washburn, as she crossed the highway from east to west from her farm home to a field on the northeast side of the highway. She was pronounced dead at the scene at 7:27 p. m. The Pagac auto was traveling north.

Coroner Robert Boltz of Washington county said the victim suffered a skull fracture and multiple injuries. She was reported to have been thrown some distance by the impact.

Mrs. Kuehl, the former Rosina Hassinger, was born Aug. 21, 1889, in the town of Auburn, Fond du Lac county, a daughter of the late Jacob and Kathryn Schmidt Hassinger. She had been a resident of the town of Wayne for the past 46 years. Her marriage to Albert J. Kuehl took place in St. Lucas Lutheran church in Kewaskum on Nov. 12, 1913.

Survivors include her husband, three sons, Jacob L. of Kewaskum, Wesley H. of West Bend and Roger A. of R. 1, Allenton; two daughters-in-law, 11 grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Rudy Kuehl, of Minneapolis, Minn., and other relatives. Three sisters preceded her in death.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday at Salem United Church of Christ, Wayne, with the Rev. Herbert Feierabend officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery. Friends called at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 2 p. m. Wednesday and at the church from noon until the time of services on Thursday.

sure hope for rain," he said adding that hunters and hikers should be careful because of the extreme fire hazards caused by tinder dry grass and leaves.

Dennis Konkel of Kewaskum, forest manager of the Kettle Moraine State Forest area, called the Statesman office urging hunters and others to be careful when smoking and use receptacles in cars for their cigarettes, cigars and pipes. He also said the forest fire hazard was extremely high at the present time.

Since the above warnings were issued, however, light rains on Wednesday and Thursday eased the fire hazard danger.

## Kettle Moraine Area Has 2 Fires

Two fires in the Kettle Moraine State Forest area started Monday and Tuesday with one being extinguished the same day and the other put under control Tuesday.

Clyde Smith, area supervisor, said that about three acres of land in the town of Auburn about one mile north of New Prospect were burned in a blaze that started at 3 p. m. Monday. Men worked through the night fighting the fire, which was mostly a surface fire, Smith said, but the blaze was still burning at noon Tuesday although it was under control. Winds of about 30 miles per hour fanned the blaze and caused some problem.

The other fire which started at 9 p. m. Tuesday in the town of Mitchell near the Kelling Lake area burned about an acre of grassland before being extinguished. Crews wetted down the area around the fire scenes Monday and Tuesday.

Smith said the entire east-central Wisconsin area is extremely dangerous because of lack of rainfall in the last five weeks. "We





### China Is Topic Of Interest at Club's Meeting

A graduate student in political science at Madison and the son of Mrs. Edith Landmann provided the Kewaskum Woman's club with an outstanding program on Saturday, Oct. 8. He is Paul Clark Landmann and his topic concerned the history of China and its association with the western world.

Chinese civilization dates back about 4,000 years and at one time was considered the center of the cultural world. Its early history saw the rise and fall of many dynasties and exchange of power from the strong dynasty to the outlying regions.

In the 1920's there was a grow-

ing power of the nationalist movement in which Chiang Kai-shek was an important figure. Around 1934 the communists under Mao Tse-tung began to establish a foothold in China through a gorilla movement and eventually defeated the nationalist forces for control of China and drove them from the mainland to the island of Taiwan.

The first trade arrangements between China and the west came in the late 1700's but until 1830 China had little need of any western products. It was at this time that the opium trade became important and as the Chinese opium

demand grew the balance of trade became adverse to China, and this, says Mr. Landmann, was the beginning of the Chinese resentment for the west. U. S. sympathy for the nationalist movement and opposition to the Mao Tse-tung communist regime finally caused all relations between the two countries to be virtually nonexistent.

# Pewaukee Downs Indians, 30 to 12

**FUMBLE, INTERCEPTIONS GIVE PIRATES THE GAME**

Bill Backhaus threw touchdown passes of 21 and 75 yards to Mark Heise and Jerry Marx in a losing effort last Friday afternoon at Pewaukee. He also threw one interception and fumbled once, and the Pirates turned these 2 opportunities into easy scores. Another Kewaskum fumble was also turned into a Pewaukee touchdown.

The Pirates took the opening kickoff and proceeded to drive 68 yards in 13 plays for the first tally of the game. Try for extra point failed and now it was Kewaskum's turn. After three plays they were forced to punt, pinning Pewaukee deep in its own territory. With 4th and long yardage, they too were forced to punt but Pat McCarty blocked the effort and Kewaskum recovered on the 23. Four plays later the Indians got on the scoreboard via a 21-yard aerial from Backhaus to Heise. So the score was 6-6 as the first quarter ended.

Then with a strong wind against them in the second quarter, the roof caved in for the Indians. After a Backhaus fumble, Pewaukee unleashed a 60-yard bomb to take the lead. Following a Kewaskum punt, Pewaukee scored again on a 26-yard screen pass. The Indians had 2 good drives stopped in the second quarter. One ended on the Pewaukee 20-yard line. Thus at halftime the score was 18-6.

In the second half Kewaskum started rolling on ground plays until a Jim Korth fumble was picked off in the air and run for a TD. Following the kickoff, Backhaus threw an interception to Guard Chris Graham and he scored his

first TD of the year. With the score 30-6, the Indians still had not given up. Marx scored on a beautiful 75-yard pass play that left the Pirates flatfooted. Kewaskum came back with an interception by Mike Miller and a blocked punt by Erickson but couldn't capitalize on either opportunity.

Bright spot in the game was the defensive line play of the Indians, Erickson, Erdmann and McCarty gave little ground up the middle and this was commendable considering the 255 lb. guard Pewaukee had playing. Heise added 4 more pass receptions to this total, which stands at 19 covering 344 yards in 4 conference games. Mark was double-teamed on most plays but still managed to get open. He missed a few others, one of which would have been another easy TD.

It would have been a real tight game without the Indians' miscues, as evidenced by the statistics. This week (Friday) they face a rough North Fondy outfit there. It could prove to be quite a game.
