## Honeck Garage Burglarized 3 Nights in Row

**FIFTEEN YEAR OLD YOUTH CONFESSES TO BREAK-INS**

After burglarizing the Honeck Chevrolet garage on Fond du Lac ave. Sunday and Monday nights, a 15-year-old youth was caught in the act and apprehended Tuesday night when he attempted a burglary at the station for the third night in succession.

Sometime after the garage was closed at 9:15 p. m. Sunday the young burglar entered the building through a window of the body shop at the rear of the garage. A total of \$66.41 was taken from the cash register in the front office. The theft was discovered when the garage was opened at 7 a. m. Monday and was reported to Chief of Police Roland Pledl.

The garage was again entered in the same manner after closing at 9 p. m. Monday. This time \$33.66 was missing from the cash register consisting of one \$10 bill, two \$5 bills, eight \$1 bills and the rest in coins. This second burglary was again reported to police Tuesday morning.

In the event of a possible third attempted burglary and to apprehend the burglar or burglars, Chief Pledl had Patrolman Marriener Frank station himself inside the garage after it closed at about 9:15 p. m. Tuesday. Officer Frank staked himself in a small office off the main office of the garage, close to and in view of the cash register. At the same time another officer, Ken Neldner, remained on regular patrol duty to serve as a decoy.

Officer Frank was at his station only slightly more than a half hour when at about 9:50 p. m. he heard someone entering a rear window of the building. He heard the burglar approach the office and waited in concealment until he entered the room. Crouching behind a counter as he walked so as not to be seen from the street, the burglar reached to put his hands into the register when Officer Frank jumped him and told him to put up his hands. The officer then removed a screw driver from the youth's jacket pocket, which he had used to gain entrance to the building by forcing the latch of the window, and placed the burglar under arrest.

At first the youth stated that he had heard of the thefts the two nights before and that he intended to see if he could discover who the party was by concealing himself inside the building. But after further questioning and realizing that he had been caught in the act, the youth confessed that he had burglarized the garage the two previous nights of a total of \$100.07.

All of the stolen money was recovered inside of an empty flashlight in a dresser drawer in the bedroom of the boy's home, where he had hidden it. The youth was taken into custody and placed into the hands of the county juvenile officer.

## Truck Tips on Railroad Tracks, Train Is Delayed

A large truck owned by the Kloke Ready Mix company of R. 3, Campbellsport, was damaged on Wednesday morning and a south-bound passenger train from Fond du Lac was delayed about 1½ hours when the truck tipped onto the railroad tracks at CTH H on the east side of Hwy. 45 about one mile south of Kewaskum. The accident occurred at 7:15 a. m.

The mishap happened when the truck was delivering ready mix concrete to the new Dairyland Seed Co. building being constructed at the site by Orville Strachota of St. Kilian, and apparently got over too close to an embankment next to the railroad tracks and tipped onto the rails.

Two wreckers from Kewaskum and a caterpillar tractor were used to right the heavily loaded truck and remove it from the tracks. The truck tank and the railroad tracks were slightly damaged but the driver of the truck was uninjured.

## Kewaskum Upsets North Fondy 20-13, 1st Time Since '58

**KORTH, MARX RUN WILD TO HAND ORIOLES FIRST LOSS**

North Fond du Lac suffered its first defeat of the season (after winning 2 and tying 2) Friday night at the hands of an inspired Kewaskum club there. It was the Indians' second conference victory and the first time since 1958 that a Kewaskum team defeated a North Fondy football team.

Things looked bad in the first quarter as the Orioles marched down to Kewaskum's one yard line. N. Fondy fans anticipated a sure touchdown but the Indian defense jarred the ball loose from 190 lb. fullback Steve Groeschel and Marvin Tanck recovered on the one. Kewaskum moved the ball out to the 22 but was forced to punt following a 15 yd. penalty. Fondy proceeded to get on the scoreboard first on a 38 yd. run by Jim Dombascas. Try for extra point failed.

Now it was the Indians' turn to roll. Following the kickoff, Jim Korth charged 20 yds. on the first play for a Kewaskum first down. Jerry Marx followed with a 32 yd. sprint to the N. Fondy 9. Korth scored 2 plays later from the 11 and Kewaskum took the lead on Marx's extra point.

North Fondy came back with a score by Groeschel on a 3 yd. run after a 60 yd. pass play caught the Indians napping. Groeschel also scored the extra point. Kewaskum wasn't about to give up at this point and just 7 plays after the kickoff Bill Backhaus scored from the 2. The big play in this drive was a beautiful 37 yd. run by Korth.

In the second half the Orioles took to the air without much success. They completed only 2 passes while Kewaskum intercepted 2 of their aerials. Jim Manthei made a diving catch of one on the N. Fondy 22 and on the next play Marx sprinted around end for the winning TD. Backhaus carried the ball and 2 N. Fondy defenders across the goal line for the extra point, so the score was 20-12.

After the Kewaskum defense took over, N. Fondy had a 4th down and ½ yd. situation on about the 50 yd. line and called on their big back, Groeschel, to go for it. Jim Gutjahr looked like Ray Nischke as he stormed through the line and dropped Groeschel for a yard loss and the Indians took over the ball. At this point Kewaskum had another scoring opportunity after Korth literally "tore" through the defenders for a 28 yd. run down to the Fondy 16 yd. line. Here the Orioles tightened and stopped the Indians on the 11.

N. Fondy had the ball 3 more times in the 4th quarter. Once they were forced to punt, another time they tried a fake punt but the Indians didn't fall for it and on their last try Tanck picked off a Kurt Urban pass. Then Backhaus just ran out the clock, ruining the Orioles' bid for an undefeated season and the conference championship.

Coach Harlow was well pleased with the defense, especially newcomer to the starting lineup, Dennis Terlinden, who recovered a fumble and aided on many tackles. Karl Brath looked good at guard and kickoff man Mark Schaefer sent 2 kicks deep into the end zone so that N. Fondy couldn't return them.

The Fond du Lac paper was a bit partial toward Groeschel, high scoring Oriole fullback. However, most observers would agree that the best back on the field in this game was Korth of the Indians. Korth gained 123 yds. in 16 carries, including runs of 37, 28 and 28 yds., in which he broke away from 2 and sometimes 3 defenders on pure second effort. Groeschel, who outweighs Korth by 40 lbs., had 128 yds.—but it took him 25 carries and he fumbled twice with Kewaskum recovering both times. Marx added 61 yds. to the Indians' ground game.

This week—homecoming and a rugged Germantown team with 200 lb. Harold Gettleman, all-conference fullback, coming to town. This will be a Saturday afternoon game.


