Pig on Highway Causes Mishap, Injuries to 3

Three persons were injured at 10:01 p. m. Sunday, Nov. 13, when a car driven by Esau A. Prescott, 59, of R. 1, Kewaskum, swerved to avoid a large pig which ran onto the highway. The auto skidded sideways into the opposite ditch and rolled over into a plowed field. Injured were Minnie Prescott, back and head injuries; Prescott, who incurred a hand injury and lacerations of the face, and Duane Prescott, 12, who suffered jaw injuries. The pig, reported to be a large 300 pound animal, belonged to Earl Etta, R. 1, Kewaskum. The mishap occurred at the Etta farm on CTH S about one mile north of the village. Mrs. Prescott was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

In a mishap which occurred at 3:30 a. m. Wednesday, Nov. 9, at 1118 Fond du Lac ave., a car driven by Duane A. Duenkel, 19, R. 3, West Bend, struck a parked car owned by Robert Hoch, 1118 Fond du Lac ave., Kewaskum. Duenkel was southbound on Fond du Lac when he fell asleep and his car veered across the highway and struck the Hoch vehicle which was parked at the curb on the opposite side of the street. Duenkel suffered lacerations to his face. The front ends of both vehicles were damaged.

In another village accident which happened at 12:20 a. m. on Saturday, Nov. 12, at the corner of Main st. and Parkview dr., cars driven by Tony C. Shulka, 61, 219 Main st., Kewaskum, and Clifford L. Mielke, 18, R. 3, Campbellsport, were damaged. Shulka, driving west on Main st., stated that he wanted to make a left turn onto Paakview, Mielke, eastbound on Main, said he saw the Shulka car coming and slowed down his vehicle. When the Shulka auto continued toward him he slowed down some more but was struck by Shulka's car. Shulka suffered lacerations in the mishap.

Louis J. Heisler, Tavern Owner 42 Years Here Dies

Louis J. Heisler, Sr., 79, who owned and operated a tavern business in Kewaskum for the past 42 years, passed away at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at 9:10 p. m. on Wednesday, Nov. 16, following a two-day illness with a heart attack which he suffered at his home at 137 Main st. on Monday night.

He was born May 9, 1887 in the town of Ashford, a son of the late James and Margaret Heisler. His marriage to the former Agnes Brodzeller of Lomira took place at St. Michael's church in Milwaukee on Sept. 10, 1912. The couple made their home in Milwaukee until coming to Kewaskum and entering the tavern business 42 years ago. His wife preceded him in death on Nov. 14, 1959.

Five children were born to the couple, the oldest of whom, a son Ralph, lost his life in an automobile accident in 1935 at the age of 21 years. Surviving are three sons and a daughter, Russell of 711 Bender rd., West Bend, Frank of 276 S. Military rd., Fond du Lac, Marcella (Mrs. William J. Harbeck) of 1275 Brooklane dr., Kewaskum, and Louis, Jr., at home. He also leaves 10 grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, four sisters, Mary (Mrs. Clem Funke) and Elizabeth (Mrs. Michael Schmerda) of Milwaukee, Margaret (Mrs. Ervin Bonlender, Sr.) of St. Kilian and Miss Phyllis Heisler of Fond du Lac; two brothers, Leo and Peter Heisler of West Bend, and many other relatives and friends.

Mr. Heisler was a member of Modern Woodmen of America Camp No. 2233 of Kewaskum and Lodge No. 1398, Loyal Order of Moose, West Bend.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 19, at Holy Trinity church Kewaskum, with the Rev. Robert Brodzeller, S.J. of Campion High school, Prairie du Chien, Wis., a nephew of the deceased, officiating. Interment was in the family lot in St. Mary's parish cemetery at Lomira. Visitation at Miller's Funeral home was from 3 p. m. Friday. Pallbearers were Elmer Rafenstein of Milwaukee, Gilbert Brodzeller of Allenton, Roman Brodzeller and Leo Heisler, Jr. of West Bend, Ervin Bonlender, Jr. and Walter Schmidt of Kewaskum.

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

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

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'Birds in Relation To Conservation' Is Woman's Club Topic

Arno Wipperman delighted the Kewaskum Woman's club on Saturday, Nov. 12, with his knowledgeable and at times amusing narration concerning birds and their relation to conservation and natural resources. Wipperman is retired after 40 years of work in school administration and now resides in Elkhart Lake where he enjoys observation and study of birds near his home.

"Free as a bird!" is a misnomer according to the speaker, because birds are not free to roam as they

please. They have a limited nesting area and must stay within certain confines so as not to intrude upon the territory of neighbor birds. Most birds must also migrate in order to have access to a warmer climate and longer days to feed their young. Approximately 10 billion birds fly to the north temperate zone yearly and in Ecuador alone about 1,800 species winter. The barn swallow will travel as much as seven thousand miles round trip.

Young birds eat about their own weight in food daily and the parent bird spends nearly all the light hours searching for food. A robin can eat as much as 15 worms an hour and an owl will eat 10 mice during one night. The haz-

ards are many for birds, especially snow, hunters, TV towers and high buildings, lack of food and oil on water. About 200,000 ducks die yearly from lead poisoning and nearly 25 per cent of the ducks and geese shot by hunters are not found.

Birds can travel 20 to 60 miles per-hour and live from five years for small birds to as much as 40 to 50 years for geese. Wipperman's narration was supplemented with colored slides and a recording of bird calls. His enthusiasm for his topic made everyone a little more thoughtful and concerned about his "fine feathered friends."

It was announced that the three batches of cookies for the annual Christmas cookie sale are to be delivered to Mrs. L. N. Defending champion Grafton and North Fondy should be the top contenders in the conference this year, according to Coach DeNamur. The Indian squad consists of six seniors and six juniors.




