Mother of Local Resident Killed In Car Accident

MRS. FRANK BINGEN, 74, VICTIM OF CRASH SUNDAY

Mrs. Frank Bingen, 74, of 2123 Salisbury rd., West Bend, mother of Mrs. Arnold Bier of Kewaskum, was killed Sunday evening in a Washington county auto crash.

Mrs. Bingen was fatally injured at 6:16 p. m. on Hwy. 33 about two miles west of West Bend in a three car collision when the car driven by her husband Frank, 76, traveling west on Hwy. 33, was struck in the rear by an auto driven by Homer Bennett, 24, of Slinger, pushing the Bingen vehicle into an approaching car operated by David Asmus, 55, of Milwaukee.

Mrs. Bingen died at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. Her husband, who was also badly injured in the mishap, was reported in serious condition earlier this week at the hospital.

In a separate accident a short time later Sunday evening, at about 7 p. m. another West Bend resident was killed. He was Robert E. Schultz, 19, of 1038 Roosevelt dr. Schultz was killed when his auto struck a tree on a gravel road north of CTH D in the town of Barton. He was pinned in his car when it was wrapped around the tree. While at the scene of the first collision on Hwy. 33, traffic patrolmen were notified of the second fatal mishap.

Mrs. Bingen, nee Elsa Luecke, was born Nov. 24, 1892, in the town of Addison. After her marriage to Frank Bingen Feb. 20, 1912, they lived in Milwaukee, Alton and Town of Farmington before moving to West Bend in 1946.

Surviving is one daughter Bernice (Mrs. Arnold Bier), Kewaskum, three sons, Delbert and Eugene, West Bend, and Donald, Baltimore, Md.; two daughters-in-law, one son-in-law, two sisters, Mrs. Esther Kibbel, Wayne, and Neva (Mrs. Louis Miller), Milwaukee. A daughter, Josephine, and three brothers predeceased her.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at St. Lucas Lutheran church, Kewaskum, with the Rev. Paul H. Hoenecke officiating. Burial was in Immaculate Conception cemetery, West Bend.

Woman's Club Is Entertained by Psychologist

KAREN KOHN IS NAMED ART CONTEST WINNER

Mrs. Terry Maternowski, Germantown school psychologist, and representative of the Washington County Mental Health association, was the guest speaker Saturday, March 12, at the meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club. Her delightful manner and keen sense of humor permeated her talk on mental health and delighted the members and their guests.

The Mental Health association is composed primarily of lay people who are interested in establishing a mentally healthy climate for adults and children. A mentally healthy person by definition, said the speaker, is a "pliable person." Someone who can give or bend when there is pressure. We are all neurotic to a degree at times but the way we solve our problems is what is important.

A woman can "set a climate" for mental health through the mother roll of someone needing her. Parents should take time to reflect on their various rolls of husband, father and wife and mother. Children should respect father as the "bread winner, head of family and defender of the faith and morals." Too often on TV father is portrayed as being unusual and the child loses the real identity of his roll. Parents through consistent discipline and guidance as a team will help their child become more confident.

Older boys who act "tough" are actually very insecure when alone and usually have not had a good father-son relationship at ten and eleven. Boys need to have contact with men to become dependent upon themselves. A boy who is raised by a woman later becomes a "lousy" husband quipped the speaker.

Girls also need a healthy relationship with their father to develop proper boy-girl attitudes later. A young girl wants her father to say she is pretty and notice her or she may have to seek her femininity on other men.

It is important to be realistic. Let the child know what is happening, because they can often sense when things are different or problems arise. In society today the child is becoming independent sooner and he has a greater social feeling and group concern than ever before.

Cash awards are given.

The regular monthly meeting of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, Board of Education was held at 8:00 p. m. on Monday, February 27, 1967, at the high school with all members in attendance. Allen Tessar moved and Mrs. Anne Panzer seconded to approve the minutes of the January 27th meeting. Carried.

James D. Reigle moved and Harry Oelhafen seconded that the bid of \$1,950.00 for the appraisal of all buildings and a property in-

ventory for the district by the Industrial Appraisal Company of Milwaukee be accepted. Motion carried.

The Board approved the retaining of Attorney Steven O'Meara to advise the Board and to prepare necessary resolutions for the distribution of State Trust Fund Loan payments upon the motion of James Reigle and second by Harry Oelhafen.

James D. Reigle moved and Harry Oelhafen seconded to accept the Kewaskum Education Agency as bargaining agent for teachers

in the district. Motion carried.

Allen Tessar moved and John A. Jadro seconded to approve payment of payroll and general fund operational expenses in the amount of \$106,081.22. Motion carried.





Bill Backhaus, Kewaskum High school's scoring ace, last week was selected to the coaches' Scenic Moraine all-conference basketball first team. The 6-0 senior finished his varsity career with a total of 854 points, which established a new scoring record for the school. Backhaus wound up third high in Scenic Moraine scoring this year with 290 points.

Named to the all-conference team along with Backhaus were two North Fondy players and one each from Grafton and Pewaukee. Another Kewaskum player, Mike Miller, received honorable mention when the all-conference team was announced.

The first and second team selections, along with those receiving honorable mention, are as follows:

Honorable mention—Dennis Yakites, Jim Dumbaskas and Jeff Semenas, North Fondy; Mike Miller, Kewaskum; Dave Emmer, John Johnson and John Stoffel, Campbellsport.

A deadly shot from the outside as well as a good driver, Backhaus finished third among conference scorers with 290 points and overall the Indian star scored

421 points this season. Added to his 288 points as a junior and 145 as a sophomore, this gave Backhaus his total of 854 points. His average this past season was a fine 21.1.

Bill followed only Tom Roy of Grafton, top scorer with 331 points and Steve Groeschel of North Fondy with 325. Although Kewaskum had only a 5-9 conference record, the Indians can hardly blame their decline on Backhaus, as his selection to the first S-M team suggests. Bill scored less than 20 points a game only three times in 14 contests.

North Fondy's Groeschel, who just missed a unanimous first team choice in his junior year, attracted all 14 first team votes this year. Besides being the leading scorer, Groeschel was picked as Associated Press "Player of the Week" and also was a first team Scenic Moraine choice in football as a fullback.

an basketball team. In conference play he averaged 20.6 points per game with a shooting percentage of 34 per cent from the floor and 73 per cent from the free throw line.

Mike Miller was named the most valuable player of the team. Miller averaged 12.4 points per game with a shooting percentage of 39 per cent from the floor and 63 per cent from the free throw line. He was also the team's leading rebounder, averaging 9.6 per game.

A. Urness of the winners was high scorer in the game with 29 points but was pressed by Kewaskum's Mike Coulter, who had his best game of the season and swished in 28 points. Don Meisenheimer added 20 points and Al Koepke 17 for Kewaskum, while

John DeMerit chipped in 16 points and McGaw and Carstensen 15 a piece for the victors.

Port's sinking of 17 free throws to only 10 for Kewaskum proved a big factor in the loss.


