Firemen to Hold Annual Picnic In Park July 8-9

PARADE TO FEATURE 11 BANDS, DRUM CORPS; MUCH ENTERTAINMENT IN PARK

The time has rolled around again for the annual Kewaskum firemen's picnic to be held in the village park on Saturday evening and Sunday, July 8 and 9. Plans are mostly completed to make this year's event the biggest and best ever held.

Kewaskum firemen are noted for their excellent parades at their picnic and this year's parade will again be the highlight of the event. The monstrous parade will begin at 12:30 p. m. sharp on Sunday. The parade will form on the high school parking lot and athletic fields (entrants to proceed there by 12 noon) and will proceed along the village's streets to the park.

The parade will feature 11 bands and drum and bugle corps, outstanding among them being the famous Blatz American Legion band and internationally famous Continental Cadet band, both of Milwaukee. The nine other musical organizations will include the Buccaneers drum and bugle corps,

Martin Elected President of State Association

William Martin, village commissioner of Kewaskum, was elected president of the Clerks and Finance Officers Association, a division of the League of Wisconsin Municipalities, at the group's meeting held at the Pioneer, Oshkosh. He was elected at the closing session of the three-day meet that ended last Friday.

Martin was panel moderator Thursday during a discussion of the election law revisions bill which Gov. Warren Knowles signed into law. It was an all-day session, Martin said, to clarify "the language of the law and to bring the sections into chronological order."

Col. Rosenheimer Retires As Air Force Commander

RELINQUISHES COMMAND AFTER 27 YEARS OF DUTY

Colonel Lehman L. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum, Commander of the 9662nd Air Reserve Squadron since 1962 with headquarters in Sheboygan, after almost 27 years of combined active and reserve duty with the United States Air Force, is retiring as of July 1, 1967 and relinquishing his command to Lt. Col. Victor Conrardy of Sheboygan. The squadron, second largest in manpower in the United States, consists of 8 flights located in major cities from Beaver Dam to Sheboygan, and Green Bay to West Bend.

Colonel Rosenheimer entered the Army Air Force in October of 1940 as a flying cadet, was commissioned a second lieutenant in May of 1941, and served throughout the duration of World War II as a pilot and bombardier instructor, director of training of a bombardier school in the western training command, and at war's end, as a major, was lead crew command pilot of a B-29 wing. He is one of a handful of Air Force pilots holding four ratings—pilot, bombardier, navigator and gunner.

In 1952 Col. Rosenheimer helped organize a reserve flight of Air Force officers basically from the Washington county area and commanded this flight until his elevation to squadron commander in 1962. During this command period he gained promotions to lieutenant colonel in 1955 and colonel in 1961. This flight of reservists, still active, meets weekly at the Legion hall in Kewaskum at no expense to the government for classroom study of current military developments, and in a ready reserve status subject to 24 hour notice recall to active duty. Many of the original members during the past few years have reached retirement age, and the present flight roster has dwindled to six active members.

Col. Rosenheimer, since returning from World War II active duty, has been associated with the L. Rosenheimer Dept. store and feed mill in Kewaskum and is now a partner in the business. He currently resides at Big Cedar Lake.

MAUTHE, LONG LAKE WATERS ARE SAFE FOR SWIMMING

The waters of Mauthe lake and Long lake in the Kettle Moraine State Forest are safe for swimming according to the park manager, Dennis W. Konkol.

Water samples are taken at regular intervals by the state forest personnel and sent to the State Board of Health laboratories for analysis.

Reports returned by this agency indicate that the waters of Mauthe lake and Long lake are NOT polluted, and are SAFE for swimming.

Parcel Post Weight Increase Announced

Mailers will be able to send 25 pound parcels between first class post offices which are 150 miles or more apart starting July 1, Postmaster Harry E. Koch reminded patrons today. The present weight limit is 20 pounds, he said. This is the first of five increases scheduled to take effect annually until 1971, when a 40 pound, 84 inch maximum size will be authorized between all first class post offices. Size limitations are now 72 inches in combined girth and length.

The next increase, on July 1, 1968, will raise the weight limit to 30 pounds. On July 1, 1969, the weight limit will be increased from 30 to 40 pounds; on July 1, 1970, the size will be increased

to 78 inches; and on July 1, 1971, the size is scheduled to be increased to 84 inches.

Postmaster Koch also reminded mailers that parcels weighing up to 40 pounds can be mailed between first class post offices less than 150 miles apart. Packages addressed to and from 2nd, 3rd and 4th class post offices, Alaska and Hawaii are not affected by the increase in size and weight provisions of the Public Law 89-573, which became effective Jan. 15, he said. Parcel post mailings to and from these offices remain at 70 pounds and 100 inches. The Kewaskum post office is a first class office.

Indians Lose S-M Lead But Regain It in Upset Here

LOSE TO LOWLY N. FONDY, HAND WARHAWKS 1ST LOSS

The Kewaskum Indians, with a record of 3-0, were knocked off of their top perch in the Scenic Moraine conference when they were upset by last place North Fondy there last Thursday 8-7. It was the Orioles' first and only win of the season. But only four days later Kewaskum regained the top spot by in turn upsetting previously unbeaten Germantown here Monday night, 3-2.

Although out-hit by N. Fondy, 12-7, the Indians defeated themselves with errors and loose play and as a result the upstart Orioles spilled them from the summer baseball lead. The Orioles, who had been the victims of no-hitters in two previous games, came back from a 7-2 deficit to catch and pass Kewaskum, which apparently had a victory in the bag.

N. Fondy did it the hard way with three runs in the bottom of the 7th and last inning. A single by Jim Nelson and successive walks to Larry and Steve Jaeger and Steve Goldapske produced one run. Bill Averbeck singled in the tying and winning runs to hand Indian reliever Mark Heise the loss. Kurt Urban went all the way for the Orioles and picked up the win. Kewaskum scored five runs in the 4th frame to take a commanding 7-2 lead, only to give it away in the late innings.

In a good ball game here Tuesday night, the Indians moved back into the undisputed top spot by edging previously unbeaten Germantown, 3-2. As a result, the Indians sport a 4-1 record, while the Warhawks are 3-1 now.

Kewaskum broke a 2-2 tie by scoring the winning run in the bottom of the last inning. Al Theusch started things off with a single. Koth came in to pinch hit and did his job by getting Theusch to second base on an infield out. Theusch took third when a third strike was dropped and then Jim Schuster came through with a sharp, game-winning hit to score the clincher. Both teams had scored twice in the fourth inning, then there was no scoring until the decisive 7th.

Jerry Marx bested Phil Carroll of the Warhawks in a pitchers' battle although Carroll did slightly better statistically. Marx allowed seven hits while striking out five and walking two. Carroll gave up six hits, fanned 11 and walked three. Beck and Carroll each got two hits for the losers, while Al Bohn and Al Theusch collected two for the victors.

On Thursday night of this week at 6 p. m. the Indians were scheduled to play at Grafton; Monday, July 3, they will host North Fondy

at 8 p. m. and next Thursday, July 6, they are at home to Campbellsport at 8 p. m. in the final home game.

Panzers Surprised On 40th Wedding


