The name of the market will be the Chopping Block. An AM-FM radio will be given away for the grand opening week at the market. All customers can register for the radio, which will be awarded on Saturday evening, Oct. 7.

Store hours at the Chopping Block will be from 8 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. daily, including Saturday, and until 9 p. m. on Friday. The market will cut only one grade of beef—U.S.D.A. choice.





## Capuchin Brother Isidore Herriges 'Jack of All Trades' in Nicaragua



If they ever write the life story of Capuchin Brother Isidore Herriges, the title could well be the old cliché "Jack-of-all-Trades." Brother Isidore, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Herriges of rural Kewaskum, has just completed his first three years of service in the Capuchin Missions in Eastern Nicaragua.

In three years time, this Wisconsin farm boy helped build a church tower in the town of Was-pam, planned and built a 30 x 80 foot chapel in the village of Kum, did the wiring and plumbing for a mission center at Siuna and planned and built a nine room mission center from the ground up on the Rama Road. A year and a half ago, he began his big project—the planning and building of a 900 seat church in the coastal city of Puerto Cabezas.

Brother Isidore graduated from St. Michael's Parochial school at St. Michaels in 1941 and then worked on his father's farm until he became a candidate for the Capuchin Brothers in 1951. When you ask him where he learned about building construction, plumbing and electricity, he simply says, "Well, when any tradesmen were working around any of the monasteries where I was stationed, I would watch how they did things and I would ask questions. If these men saw you were really interested in their work, they would gladly teach you about their particular trade. Then, of course, there are always books or, sometimes, you just have to sit down and figure things out for yourself."

The Capuchin Brother explained that building in the missions was not like building here at home. He said that if you want a job done, you have to do it yourself because there aren't any 'Yellow Pages' where you can look for a plumber or an electrician.

Brother Isidore said that he was lucky to have another Capuchin Brother who is a veteran of many years in the missions to call on for help and supplies. "Brother Gaul has been in Nicaragua for 23 years and he can come up with a solution to meet just about any problem or with just the right invention to substitute for a tool you don't have," he said. "When the time came to build the chapel at Kum, I desperately needed a table saw. Bro-

ther Gaul supplied me with a shaft and a gas motor. With these two items, I was able to build a table saw and it has held up through a lot of hard use."

The church Brother Isidore is building at Puerto Cabezas is cement block construction and they made the cement blocks themselves. He says that when you can't afford to buy an item, you make it yourself. He claims that it is quite a simple project. "You have a little machine and then it is just a matter of mixing your cement, sand and gravel and pouring it into your forms," he said with a smile. "There is really nothing to it."

The church is of modern design and is bell shaped. According to Brother Isidore everything is rounding and angling. The inter-

ior is all huge wooden arches which they laminated right on the site.

The biggest arch is 110 feet wide and 45 feet high," Brother explained. "I contacted the lumber company about using their old crane to raise the arches. We calculated the weight and height of the largest beam and the company assured me their old crane could do the job. We just about didn't make it though and I'm sure that it was the prayers of a lot of people back home that really got that beam in place."

"The church is all under roof now," Brother went on, "and when I go back we have to get the flooring in. The Fathers want to have Mass in the new church for Christmas." In his spare time Brother Isidore has carved a six foot mahogany statue of St. Joseph the worker for the new church.

The Capuchin Brother talks about the need for more Brothers in the Missions. "We need Brothers to teach, to give instructions, to help the people with better health and sanitation methods, to do office work as well as Brothers for manual labor like I'm doing," he said. "If any young man is looking for a challenge, is looking for fulfillment in life and is not afraid of a little work, this is the life for him."

## Indians Roll Over Random Lake, 20 to 6

### TANCK TO SCHUSTER TD BOMBS HIGHLIGHT WIN

The Kewaskum Indians' passing combination of Quarterback Marv Tanck to End Jim Schuster accounted for 186 yards on four long receptions to highlight an easy 20-6 victory at Random Lake in Scenic Moraine conference play Friday night.

The Rams were lucky to escape with a 20-6 score. Except for a few bad breaks, the Indians could well have doubled their score. Among these, a Kewaskum receiver wide open in the end zone dropped a pass right in his hands shortly before the half; Chuck Muckerheide scooped up the ball on a Random Lake fumble and ran 90 yards for an apparent touchdown but the play was called back on a doubtful clipping penalty at about midfield; and the Indians were on the Rams' 2-yard line and on their way to another TD when time ran out at the end of the game.

All three Kewaskum touchdowns were scored on Tanck to Schuster passes, with these plays covering 86, 24 and 41 yards. Al Bohn and Mike Gutjahr added the extra points on runs after two of the TD's. Random Lake prevented a shutout in the last quarter when Bilj Yoho tallied on a 12-yard pass from Randy Stevens.

Coach Joe Harlow noted that Tanck has completed 56 per cent of his passes to date for 459 yards in only two games and was also pleased with Tanck's defensive play. Russ Gavin and Fred Krieser were also cited for their scrappy defensive performances. Also helping the Indians' cause was one interception by Tom Gundrum, who returned at 35 yards, and recovery of three Random Lake fumbles by the alert Indians. Kewaskum had no interceptions or fumbles.

In the fourth quarter Coach Harlow poured reserves into the game and Perry Koth took the Indians to the 2-yard line when time ran out before they could score another TD.

Tanck completed 7 of 13 passes for 231 yards. Having completed 56% of his passes, Tanck is leading in the conference in yardage with 341 in two games, in which he has tossed four touchdown passes.

Gutjahr, with 53 yards in 10 carries, was the leading rusher in the game. The Rams' two other fumbles were recovered by Ron Strupp and Dennis Terlinden. Kewaskum was penalized 40 yards and the Lakers only 5.

In other games Friday Pewaukee won its second straight, defeating North Fondy, 25-7, and Campbellsport ambushed Germantown, 21-6. In a contest played Saturday Grafton also copped its second in a row, besting Slinger, 34-18, to share the lead with Pe-

waukee.

The Indians have a big game coming up tonight (Friday) when they host a powerful Pewaukee 11 at 8 p. m. on the high school gridiron. Pewaukee has won two straight without a loss and shares the lead with Grafton. The Pirates are led by 200-pound Fullback Jim Babe and another one of their aces is Halfback Ron Anderson. Kewaskum has never beaten Pewaukee in football since the Scenic Moraine conference was organized about 10 or 11 years ago. There will be a lot of incentive in this battle and the Indians will be desperate to avenge these many losses through the years. But they will be faced with another Pewaukee juggernaut.
