Board Adopts 'No Burn' Rule, Youth Curfew

REASSESSING OF VILLAGE PROPERTY IS COMPLETED

The village board of Kewaskum adopted two ordinances at its regular monthly meeting Monday night and disposed of other business matters.

A "no burning" ordinance will go into effect Jan. 1, 1968, and will prohibit the burning of any type of refuse in out-of-door burners in the village. The ordinance has been under consideration for several months.

The other ordinance established curfew hours for persons 16 and under. The curfew hour will be 10 p. m. each night except Friday and Saturday, when it will be 11 p. m.

The Board members also gave their approval to installation of new baffles in the village incinerator by the Crichton Corp. of Milwaukee at a cost of \$2,390 to alleviate the problem of fly ash from the incinerator. Primary purpose of the baffles is to show the flow of draft. The reduced amount of draft will make for more complete burning of the materials being burned.

Discussed was the matter of erecting a garage to house village trucks and equipment. Superintendent of Public Works Armin Oppermann was instructed to itemize equipment to be housed and determine the number of square feet of storage needed.

A building permit for a home on Stark st. was granted to Lloyd Westerman. Operator's licenses were granted to Dennis Bingen, Myron Belger and Mrs. Jeanette Gnacinski.

A complete reassessment of all taxable property, begun here in early May, is scheduled to be completed by Friday, Oct. 6, and will be followed by open book hearings Oct. 9 and a postponed meeting of the local board of review Oct. 16, according to Village Commissioner William Martin. (See official notices on page six this issue).

Martin's office prepared post-cards which were mailed to all property owners this week, advising each taxpayer of the revised valuation of his property. On Oct. 9 taxpayers will have an opportunity to ask questions regarding the re-evaluation. The open book hearings will begin at 9 a. m. and continue throughout the day and early evening, and will be extended to successive days if more time is needed.


If a taxpayer wishes to register a complaint against his assessment, Martin pointed out, he must appear before the board of review. Hearings will be held between 10 a. m. and 4 p. m. Oct. 16 and each session will be adjourned on a day-to-day basis until all complaints are heard.

Larry Ellington of the Doane Appraisal Co., St. Louis, Mo., has made the reappraisals and will conduct the hearings.

Frater Campbell Is 3rd Year Student at Seminary

TELLS OF SEMINARIAN PROJECTS DURING SUMMER

In answer to the question, "What does a Catholic seminarian do during the summer months?" Frater Jerome Campbell said, "We work with people." Frater Campbell is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Miles Campbell of R. 2, Kewaskum, and is a third year student at the Capuchin Seminary of St. Mary, Crown Point, Ind.

Frater Campbell explained that a Capuchin seminarian's summer is spent getting actual experience working with people so that he can put his theory into practice. He, along with a number of his fellow seminarians, were involved in two VISTA like projects during this past summer.

The Capuchin seminarians conducted a free summer camp for the children of migrant workers under the auspices of the Inter Church Migrant Ministry of Gary, Ind. They lived with the children, taught them, disciplined them and played with them.

The seminarians found that these children craved affection and that they lacked discipline. They didn't know what bed sheets were for and just rolled up in their blankets. The seminarians found that the children responded well to individual attention.

The Capuchin seminarians also conducted a three week Bible School for grade school children at Black Oak, Ind. The children came to the Bible School for three hours a day five days a week.

Frater Campbell explained that the children received one hour of religious instruction, one hour of arts and crafts, and one hour of supervised playground activities. "We each planned our own activities," he said. "This gave us a real insight into the work that lies ahead of us when we are ordained."

Frater Campbell has returned to studies at the Capuchin Seminary of St. Mary. He said that he is looking forward to and preparing for more special projects for next summer.





RONALD AMERLING AWARDED COMBAT BADGE IN VIETNAM

The Combat Infantryman Badge, mark of distinction for the fighting soldier, was awarded to Private First Class Ronald L. Amerling, near Pleiku, Vietnam, Sept. 17.

Pvt. Amerling, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold S. Amerling, R. 2, Kewaskum, is assigned to Company E, 1st Battalion of the 4th Infantry Division's 22nd Infantry as a rifleman.

CIBs have been awarded since late in World War II for sustained contact against an enemy in ground action. The badge is a blue rectangle with a silver rifle mounted on it and a curved wreath at the top. Subsequent awards are represented by stars in the center of the wreath.

At least 30 days of contact with hostile forces in Vietnam are required to be eligible for the award.

Pvt. Amerling entered the army in February, 1967, and was last stationed at Ft. Polk, La.

The 20-year-old soldier was graduated from Kewaskum Community High school in 1965.



Postmaster Lists Mailing Deadlines For Christmas Mail

The suggested mailing deadlines for Christmas mail were announced today by Postmaster Harry E. Koch.

"It's not too early to begin planning for the holiday season," the postmaster said. "In fact, the post office department's plans to handle the rush of mail have already been completed. Now it is up to the public.

"If people mail early, the expected record-breaking volume of well over 9 billion pieces of mail to be delivered during the holiday season will arrive at its destination on time and without a serious hitch."

The postmaster noted that special attention will again be placed on the delivery of mail to servicemen in Vietnam and the surrounding area.

The deadlines for mail to all members of the armed forces abroad are:

Gifts weighing more than five pounds sent by surface postage rates—Nov. 11

Gifts five pounds or less, plus letters and greeting cards sent at surface rates (these go by air on a space available basis)—Dec. 1

Air mail gifts and greetings—Dec. 11

After the county committeemen are elected, the delegates determine which of the regular committeemen will serve as the committee chairman and vice chairman for the coming year.

ASC county and community farmer-committees are in charge of local administration of such national programs as the agricultural conservation program, the cropland adjustment program, the feed grain program, the voluntary

wheat program, the national wood program, acreage allotments and marketing quotas, commodity loans, and storage facility loans. Each year, local farmers earn thousands of dollars through participation in these farm-action programs.

Indians Blanked By Pewaukee in Downpour, 14-0

TACKLE NORTH FONDY IN HOMECOMING GAME TODAY

A powerful Pewaukee team, which is undefeated and tied for first place with Grafton, and a steady downpour of rain throughout the game proved too much for Kewaskum to cope with and the Indians were defeated by the Pirates here Friday night, 14-0.

The rain benefitted Pewaukee, which is almost strictly a running team with their big backs. On the other hand it really hurt Kewaskum, which is a 50% passing team. Most of the Indians' scores have come on long passes this season. The heavy rain made passing very difficult for Quarterback Marv Tanck and as a result he had three passes intercepted.

Although Pewaukee had all the best of it in the statistics, both of their touchdowns came on breaks. Both were scored in the first half and except for these the contest would have been a close one. The Indians held the Pirates scoreless in the second half.

Big Jim Babe, 200-pound Pewaukee fullback, intercepted a Tanck pass on the second play of the game and ran the ball back 40 yards for the Pirates' first score to trigger the win over air-minded Kewaskum. In the second quarter the Pirates got a big break. Pewaukee got to the Indians' 9-yard line and on the last play of the half Quarterback Brandt passed into the end zone.

The pass was intercepted by a Kewaskum defender but the wet ball squirted out of his hands and right into those of Pewaukee's Grant Alonge for a touchdown. Hamilton kicked both of the Pirates' extra points.

After the winners' first TD, Kewaskum came back with a 68-yard drive and on fourth down and goal to go, Jim Manthei went around end but slipped in the mud and fell. This was the Indians' deepest penetration in the game. Except for the interception, Pewaukee didn't have their hands on the ball in the first quarter as the Indians drove from their own 30 yard line to the Pirates' two before Manthei fell on the TD try. The rain held the game in the second half and left the playing field in a mess. Both teams sloshed around but neither could get a scoring drive going in the scoreless half.

Babe led both teams with 76 yards in 17 carries. Manthei

paced the Indians in rushing with 50 yards in 13 carries. On defense Tom Gundrum did a good job for Kewaskum as did Tanck from his defensive halfback position.

Pewaukee had 11 first downs to Kewaskum's 7. In total yards they bested the Indians, 213 to 95. They made 204 yards rushing to 88 for the losers and 9 yards passing to only 7 for the Indians. Brandt completed 1 of 3 passes, while the usually accurate Tanck completed only 1 of 7. The visitors were penalized 60 yards and Kewaskum 20.

This afternoon (Friday) at 4 o'clock the Indians face North Fondy (2-1) in their homecoming game. The Orioles have a fast runner in Greg Becker, a fast sprint man, and are led by Quarterback Kurt Urban, a 200 pounder, who has been their varsity quarterback for the past three years.

The feature game this Friday is that between Pewaukee, where the two unbeaten conference leaders clash for first place and this battle could well decide the championship. In other tilts Slinger travels to Germantown and Random Lake plays Campbellsport.




