Archbishop to Dedicate New Holy Trinity School Addition Sunday

WILL ALSO PREACH AT MASS; DINNER TO FOLLOW

The new second story addition to Holy Trinity Catholic school in Kewaskum will be dedicated on Sunday, Nov. 5, by Archbishop William C. Cousins of the Milwaukee Archdiocese.

Archbishop Cousins will attend and preach at the last Mass at Holy Trinity at 11 a. m. Sunday and will dedicate the new addition at ceremonies immediately following the Mass. This will be followed by a dinner served in the parish hall for a limited number of officials, guests and parishioners. The Rev. F. C. La Buwi of Paris, Wis., former pastor of Holy Trinity congregation many years, will be the speaker at the dinner.

The four-classroom, second story addition, built at a cost of approximately \$87,000, was completed last April. Edsil Construction of Milwaukee was the main contractor for the building.

The second story addition was built atop the original one story school building, erected in 1948 or 1949, and is the same size in length and width. The latest addition provides four extra classrooms for the pupils of the eight grades to have a separate room. Prior to this some classes had to be taught in the old school building on Main st. immediately north of the new school, which also houses the school sisters.

The major cost of the new addition was covered by funds available in a voluntary building fund to which members of the parish have been contributing for a number of years. The congregation voted in favor of the addition at the annual parish meeting on May 1, 1966, at which time it was also decided to purchase and install all new pews and padded kneelers in the church at a cost of about \$6,500, as well as to have the interior of the church cleaned.

SCHOOLS CLOSED

Kewaskum Community High school and elementary schools in the Kewaskum district were closed on Thursday and Friday of this week to allow faculty members to attend the annual Wisconsin Education Association convention in Milwaukee.

There were no classes at Holy Trinity Parochial school on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Wednesday was All Saints day, a holiday of obligation. A parent-teacher conference was held Thursday for parents who chose to meet the teachers.

Badger Firemen Elect Officers, Select Event Sites

The Badger Firemen's association 74th annual fall meeting was held Sunday at the new fire station in West Bend with 54 chiefs and delegates representing 20 of the 22 waukegan fire departments. Kewaskum firemen were represented at the session.

Business sessions were held in the morning and afternoon with selection of sites for the 1968 events and election of officers highlighting the conferences.

All three elective offices of the association were awarded to county firemen with two officials re-elected and one new one from the county named. Fire Chief Milton Wilkens of Newburg was re-elected president of the group and Chief Lyle Butzke of Jackson was re-elected vice-president. Brian Mayer, second assistant chief of the Jackson fire department and a state fire instructor, was named secretary-treasurer.

Mayer was elected to succeed Allen Bruederle of the Cedarburg fire department, who retired and was not a candidate for re-election. He had been secretary-treasurer of the organization for 13 years.

Belgium in Ozaukee county was selected as the site for the annual spring meeting and banquet of the association, which will mark the 75th anniversary of its founding in 1968. The summer tournament was awarded to Campbellsport with Rando Lake chosen for the annual 1968 fall meeting.

A noon dinner for the chiefs and delegates was served at the Mermac Hotel. Following completion of the day's business the Wisconsin Protective Systems, Inc. of Milwaukee explained a new fire and smoke detective system for homes to the assembled firemen.

Local Elementary Schools to Observe Education Week

PARENTS INVITED TO VISIT SCHOOLS NOV. 7-8

American Education Week will be celebrated in the elementary schools of the Kewaskum district on Tuesday, Nov. 7, and Wednesday, Nov. 8. Parents will have the opportunity to observe the classes in action, meet their child's teacher, and participate in the school lunch program if they so desire. They are also invited to come to the school's office where refreshments will be served.

The program for these two days only is as follows:

1. Pupils in grades 1-8 will attend school in the morning only on these two days.

2. Pupils in morning kindergarten sessions will not attend school Wednesday morning of that week.

3. Pupils in afternoon kindergarten sessions will not attend school Tuesday afternoon or Wednesday afternoon but will attend Wednesday morning.

4. Parents of children in special education may come either day.

5. Regular school hours and times will be observed on Monday, Thursday and Friday of that week.

6. Parents of pupils whose last names begin with A-L are asked to visit grades 1-6 on Tuesday, and grades 7 and 8 on Wednesday.

7. Parents of pupils whose last names begin with M-Z are asked to visit grades 7 and 8 on Tuesday, and grades 1-6 on Wednesday.

8. Kindergarten parents are to come on the morning their child's group is meeting.

The routine for either of the two days is as follows:

1. Parents observe their child's room between 8:30 and dismissal for lunch.

Adult Recreation Program to Begin

The Kewaskum Community Schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 8 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne, at the Kewaskum Elementary school gymnasium.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc.

Beginning on Nov. 8 and 9, Wednesdays from 8:00-10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00-10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women. Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

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

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Indians Defeat Bells in Finale, 12-9, Tie for 4th

GRAFTON, PEWAUKEE SHARE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Kewaskum Indians wound up their Scenic Moraine conference season Friday night at home by beating the Campbellsport Bells, 12-9. The win gave the Indians an overall 4-4 record and 3-4 in the conference, good for a three-way tie for fourth place with Campbellsport and Random Lake.

In other final contests, Grafton and Pewaukee both won to wind up with identical 6-1 records and share the conference championship. Grafton blasted Germantown, 33-7, and Pewaukee barely defeated stubborn Random Lake 7-0. In the remaining game North Fondy belted Slinger, 33-0, to take third place.

Quarterback Marv Tanck capped a Kewaskum drive, which took nine plays in the first quarter, as he ran the final three yards for the initial score for the Indians. A Tanck pass was juggled about in the second quarter before Del Wiegel finally intercepted to set up the Bells' only TD. Art Beck scampered 26 yards for the score and John Hahn booted the extra point.

Halfback Jim Manthei belted over from three yards out for the Indians' second quarter touchdown to make it 12-7. A beautiful 38-yard Tanck to Manthei aerial set up the score.

The Bells accounted for the only two points in the second half when Perry Koth was tackled in the end zone for a safety on an attempted kickoff return. The ball landed on about the two yard line and Koch attempted to pick it up and move it out of this hole. Instead he was tackled behind the goal line to give the Bells two points.

Campbellsport then staged its only other threat until Allen Theusch recovered a Campbellsport fumble. Defensive adjustments in the 2nd half helped stop the Bell offense cold. Campbellsport had gained yardage on trap plays in the first half but they made little headway after that.

Al Bohn was Kewaskum's leading rusher with 81 yards in 18 carries. Beck led the Bells with 61 yards, carrying the ball 11 times. Almost doubling Campbellsport in yardage, gained mostly on the ground, the Indians controlled the ball for 64 plays to the Bells' 38.

Offensive linemen cited by Coach Joe Harlow for their outstanding play were Dave Ramthun and Tom Gundrum. On defense, Senior Scott Waranius, Juniors Dan Marx and Ron Strupp and Sophomore Russ Gavin were lauded. End Waranius, who reportedly never played organized football before this season, served as captain in the final game.

Campbellsport, which had gained over 300 yards on the ground the week before against

strong North Fondy, found little running room against Kewaskum especially after the intermission. The Indians made 15 first downs while checking the Bells with only 6. The Bells gained only 92 yards on the ground while the Indians ground out 231.

CONFERENCE LEADER IS GRAFTON'S PESHEL

Bill Peshel put the finishing touches on a brilliant three-year varsity football career at Grafton High school by setting a Scenic Moraine conference individual scoring record for seven games.

The senior halfback piled up an even 100 points on 16 touchdowns and four extra points. For the Blackhawks' 8-game season he scored 106 points and rushed for 944 yards in 159 carries. Peshel scored 78 points as a junior and 12 as a sophomore to give him a career record of 196 points. He was second in conference scoring a year ago.

End Tom Schuster of Kewaskum tied for seventh place in scoring with Londstedt of Germantown, each totaling 30 points. Tom Schuster scored his 30 points on 5 touchdowns. Jim Manthei of the Indians was 15th in scoring with 18 points.


