## Village Tax Rate Set at \$31.57 Per Thousand; Decrease of \$4.95

### Drop Attributed to \$2.8 Million Raise in Village Evaluation

**APPROVE CROSSING GUARDS; ICE SKATING RINK REQUEST DENIED**

The village board Monday night approved a budget of \$557,471.18, calling for a tax levy of \$401,650.33 and a tax rate of \$31.57 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

From the \$31.57 rate will be deducted \$1.58, which represents the village's share of refunds from state sales taxes, making a net tax rate of \$29.99, which is \$4.95 less than last year's net rate.

Last year's budget was \$556,552, with a tax rate of \$36, minus a refund of \$1.06 for a net tax rate of \$34.94. The drop is attributed to a recent evaluation of all taxable properties which upped the village evaluation by \$2.8 million.

The tax levy is apportioned as follows: \$3,200.40 for state taxes, \$76,658.76 for county taxes, \$311,768.73 for school taxes, \$1,659.44 for vocational school tax, and \$8,363.36 for state loans to the school district.

R. W. McMahon, representing the engineering firm of McMahon Associates of Menasha, presented the findings of a recent study and re-evaluation of the village sewage treatment plant, as ordered by village officials to determine the cause and possible solution to odors from the plant.

McMahon reported the study revealed that the plant is overloaded. He said that between Sept. 11-14, samples were taken at local industries and at the plant to determine the loads coming from each industry. He said the sewage treatment plant is receiving periodic shock loads, which no sewage treatment plant is capable of handling. The treatment plant would be overloaded only by a small percentage if shock loads were eliminated. He stated that in spite of the overload the treatment plant is operating at 80 to 85 per cent efficiency. His recommendations for solutions to the problem are being studied by the board.

The board approved the applications of Mrs. Roy Esser, Mrs. Charles McClain and Edward P. Prost for crossing guards. They will be effective Jan. 3. One will be stationed at Fond du Lac ave. and Second st., one at the Holy Trinity school crossing and one will be an alternate. The matter was turned over to Chief of Police Roland Pledl, who will meet with the guards and establish a work schedule.

The board denied the recent request of the Kewaskum Elementary Parent Teachers association for an ice skating rink on the elementary school grounds because of the cost and amount of work involved. Instead, lights will be added to the skating area on the river and a larger skating area will be cleared of snow.

The board also approved the request of Fire Chief Armin Oppermann to increase the fire department's membership from 40 to 45.

## Accidents Cause Injuries to Four

Four accidents were reported over the weekend, three of them due to the extremely icy condition of area roads following a freezing rain Friday night.

In a mishap which occurred at 12:55 a. m. Saturday on Fond du Lac ave. at the intersection with Clinton st., the front end of a car driven by Thomas M. Luedtke, 16, 1320 Kewaskum st., was damaged when it struck a light pole. Luedtke reported to local police that he was driving north on Fond du Lac ave. and started to make a left turn onto Clinton st. when his vehicle skidded on the icy pavement and struck the pole. Neither Luedtke nor three young passengers in his auto were injured.

A car driven by Donald A. Knop, 16, of West Bend went out of control on wet pavement on Hwy. 28 about two miles east of Kewaskum at 10:14 p. m. Saturday on a curve and the car went down an embankment and into a field before coming to a halt. Injured were Knop, who incurred a bruised left leg and two companions, Steven M. Weinert, 16, of West Bend who suffered facial bruises, and Robert R. Ruhnke, 16, West Bend, who incurred arm and rib injuries. All of the injured youths were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

Raymond J. Herriges, 30, of R. 1, Kewaskum, suffered a cut on the hand and a sore neck early Saturday when the truck he was driving on CTH M slid off the icy road and ran into a fence and rolled over just south of CTH A.

An auto owned by Kenneth Garbisch, R. 1, Kewaskum, which the driver parked on the east side of N. Paradise rd., about a mile west of Boltonville at 7:35 a. m. Saturday when he was unable to make a grade due to icy conditions, was sideswiped by a car and land, 24, of Milwaukee who also failed to make the grade and skidded back down the hill, striking the Garbisch vehicle.

## KHS to Host WIAA Basketball District Tourney

**FOUR SCHOOLS TO COMPETE IN MEET HERE FEB. 23-24**

Kewaskum Community High school will host a district basketball tournament again this year, according to a WIAA news release received by Principal Ernest Mitchell.

Cedar Grove, Kewaskum, Random Lake and Ozaukee high schools will compete in the tournament, which will be held on Feb. 23-24. (Cedar Grove, which laced Kewaskum 55-28 in the opening non-conference game this season, already looms as a heavy tourney favorite).

## Call Firemen for Furnace Backfire

Kewaskum firemen answered a call about 7:30 p. m. last Friday when the oil furnace in the basement at the Glacier Inn backfired.

The furnace backfired with sufficient force to move a concrete block firewall slightly and the burner was also damaged. A shelf was tipped over and its contents spilled on the floor, a hood on an intake was knocked off outside and there was soot and smoke damage in the basement.

Two firemen who were in the building at the time of the incident put out what little fire there was around the burner with hand extinguishers and had the situation under control when the fire trucks arrived. Firemen checked the furnace unit and for possible spilled oil or other fire hazards.

## Second Exchange Student Arrives From Colombia

**HECTOR VARGAS TO LIVE WITH MARTINS**

Hector Vargas of Bogota, Colombia, arrived here Wednesday and will live with the Marvin Martin family for three months. This is the second part of the exchange program with International Fellowship, Inc. that placed the Martins' son, George, in Lima, Peru, for three months last summer. The Martins met the new student at O'Hare Airport in Chicago at midnight Wednesday.

Hector will be attending Kewaskum Community High school regularly during his stay here, thereby giving the school two foreign exchange students as part of its student body. Han Doorenbasch of the Netherlands has been here since school opened in fall.

Hector's father, a doctor, is medical director for International Petroleum Limited (Standard Oil) of Colombia.

Hector is a junior at an all boys school called Modern Gymnasium. They are now on their summer vacation. There are about 800 students in this school. His school offers various sports as soccer, tennis, baseball, basketball and swimming.

Being located in the foothills of the Andes, their average temperature is about 70 degrees. The only snow he has seen is up in the mountains.

Hector has a brother, Alberto, age 22, who is studying medicine in Colombia. After completing high school, Hector will go into the electrical engineering field at a university in the United States.

He says the teenagers are the same there as here in dress and musical interest. Only there they must be 18 before they can drive a car.

He attended the American-Colombian club two hours a day learning English and has a good command of the English language. He is adjusting very well to the school routine here. In Colombia the teachers come to the students when classes change.

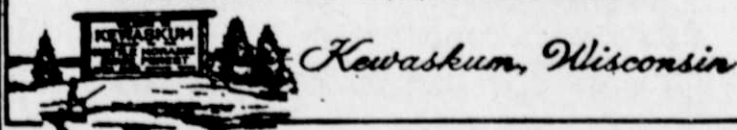

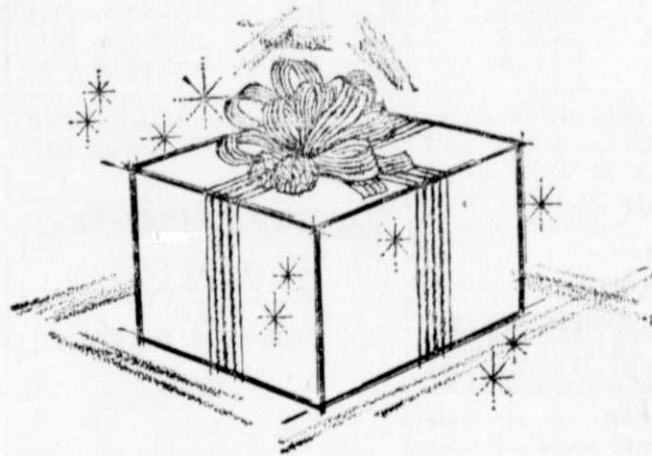

### Indians Shade Germantown in Scenic Opener

Kewaskum's Indians rallied for a close 57-55 win over host Germantown Friday night in the Scenic Moraine conference opener. The Indians had a 1-2 record in pre-season contests.

Mike Smith and Mark Eichstedt each scored six points in the last quarter to lead Kewaskum in a stirring come-from-behind victory over the Warhawks. The Indians had trailed, 12-8, at the quarter, 27-23 at halftime and 42-40 at the end of the third period before outscoring Germantown, 17-13, in the final quarter to pull out the win. Kewaskum outscored Germantown in the second half, 34-28.

The Indians' George Martin took scoring honors with 19 points, Smith added 14 and Eichstedt finished with 11. Pacing Germantown's scoring were Baudhuin with 12 points and Stover with 11.

The Indians outshot the Warhawks from the field, 23 to 18, but as has been the case in all of their games to date, they were bested from the free throw line, 19 to 11.

In other opening conference tilts, defending champion Grafton battered Random Lake, 61-45; North Fondy crushed Campbellsport, 90-69, and Pewaukee upset previously undefeated Slinger, 70-65. In North Fondy's decisive victory, Jeff Semenas broke a school individual game scoring record with 43 points. In Grafton's easy win over the Rams, their 6-5 center, Mike Peterson, saw only limited action because of a recent illness.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians entertain Pewaukee, which looked very good in handing Slinger its first loss after the Owls had won three in a row against strong opponents.

### Horicon Crushes Lakes Five, 115-79

Kewaskum opened the Land o' Lakes league basketball season at Horicon Saturday night and was decisively beaten, 115-79, by a greatly strengthened Horicon squad.

Kewaskum was outpointed in every quarter and never came close in the game. Leading 27-16 at the quarter, Horicon pulled to a 53-40 advantage at the intermission. They increased their lead to 22 points, 24-62, at the end of the third period and ran away in the final stanza to win by a margin of 36 points.

The names of the players in the Horicon lineup are enough to scare any opponent. One of their new stars, Stankiewicz, was the scoring ace of the game with 33 points. He was followed by Van Grinsven with 17, Albert with 16, Blankheim with 14 and Plageman with 12. 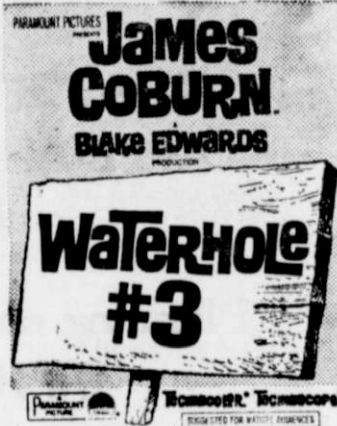

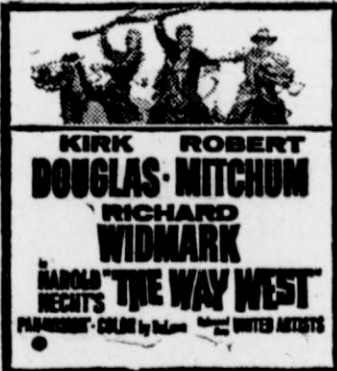

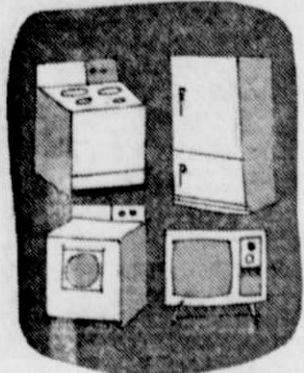
