Donald Theusch Family of Four Killed in Christmas Eve Crash

Former Resident, Wife and 2 Small Sons Are Victims

ALLENTON CRASH WIPES OUT FAMILY ENROUTE TO DELIVER PRESENTS FOR CHRISTMAS

What would have been a Christmas of gaiety and happiness brought one of tragedy and grief to the immediate families, relatives and friends of a young Allenton couple and their two small sons, all four of whom were killed in a Christmas Eve crash which was one of the most heart-rending ever to occur in this area.

The four member family wiped out in the two car crash included: Donald L. Theusch, 25, of Allenton.

Mary Theusch, 23, his wife. Jeffrey John Theusch, 27 months, and Timothy James Theusch, 10 months, their sons.

Theusch was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Theusch of R. 1, Kewaskum, where he made his home before his marriage. He graduated from Kewaskum High school, played baseball with the Kewaskum team in the Land o' Lakes league and currently served as manager of the team.

The fatal crash occurred on Hwy. 33 at the intersection with CTH WW about a mile east of Allenton and only a mile from the Theusch family's home in Allenton at 5:30 p. m. Christmas Eve. It was reported that the couple and their two children were enroute to deliver Christmas presents to Mrs. Theusch's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Spaeth, West Bend, at the time. Christmas presents were found in the car.

The sheriff's department said all of the Theuschs except the baby Timothy were thrown out of the car by the force of the impact, making it impossible to determine who was driving. Young Timothy was found on the floor in the front of the vehicle, it was stated. All apparently died at the scene and were pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital in West Bend.

Injured in the accident were the driver of the other vehicle, Douglas Savage, 19, of R. 1, Slinger, and a young male companion, Lynn Greenfield, 20, also of R. 1, Slinger. They reportedly suffered bruises and lacerations and Greenfield was also reported to have incurred a fractured collar bone. Their condition was termed good at the West Bend hospital.

The accident report indicated that Savage who was southbound on CTH WW, stated he saw the stop sign at the intersection with Hwy. 33 but did not remember if he stopped or not. The Theusch family was eastbound on Hwy. 33. The sheriff's department and district attorney's office were still investigating the circumstances of the collision Wednesday.

A short time before the fatal crash the toys beneath a small Christmas tree in the Theusch home had been played with by their two little boys. A short time later those who had played with

the toys were dead... so were their parents. Less than two hours before the accident, the Theusch family had opened presents and shared a pre-Christmas dinner with friends, Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert "Gib" Brodzeller, of Allenton before starting out to deliver presents and visit Mr. and Mrs. Theusch's parents for Christmas Eve, who waited and waited for them to arrive. Their families did not celebrate Christmas and gifts were left unopened under unlighted trees.

Theusch owned and operated a barbershop in Allenton and had just purchased the business from Brodzeller last January. Brodzeller, who continued to work in the shop after selling it, said that Theusch had worked for him for five years and was a very close friend, more like a son to him (the Brodzellers have no children). He added that Theusch had also just purchased a new home in Allenton less than two months ago. He and his wife Mary were married three years ago Nov. 7.

A card reading "May God Bless Your New Home" was found amidst Christmas decorations there.

The Allenton accident raised the county death toll for 1967 to 30, only two less than for all of 1966 when 32 persons were killed in accidents on county highways. The multiple fatality crash also pushed the state's 1967 highway death toll to 1,123, or 20 ahead of last year's record pace.

COMBINED FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR CRASH VICTIMS

Combined funeral services for Donald L. Theusch, his wife, Mary Ann, and the couple's two sons, Jeffrey John and Timothy James, were held from the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend, at 9:15 a. m. Thursday and at 10 a. m. at Sacred Heart church at Allenton with the Rev. Ralph Wagner, pastor, officiating. Interment was in the church cemetery. Visitation was from 2 p. m. Wednesday.

Mr. Theusch was born Oct. 29, 1942, in the town of Kewaskum. At an early age he moved to the town of Farmington with his parents. He grew up there, attending St. Michael's Parochial school and Kewaskum High school, graduating with the class of 1961. He then attended Peoria Barber college and was employed at Gib's Barber Shop in Allenton, purchasing the shop about a year ago.

He was married to Mary Ann Spaeth at St. Frances Cabrini church, West Bend, on Nov. 7, 1964. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Theusch, R. 1, Kewaskum; his maternal grandfather, John Hug, Sr., Allenton; three brothers, Terry of R. 3, Campbellsport, Kenneth and Allan of R. 1, Kewaskum, and two sisters, Phyllis and Jane, of R. 1, Kewaskum.

He was a member of the Holy Name society and Knights of Columbus, West Bend Council 1964.

Mary Ann Theusch, nee Spaeth, was born Aug. 16, 1944 in the town of Polk. At an early age she

Cousins Hurt in Crash Near Here

Two rural Allenton youths were injured, one seriously, early Sunday in a one-car accident when a car driven by Robert D. Coulter, 19, R. 1, Allenton, traveling west on County Trunk Hwy. H about 2½ miles west of Kewaskum, left the highway, struck a guard post and telephone post, and went through farm fences into a wooded and brush area. The mishap occurred about 4:15 a. m. Sunday, according to Washington county authorities.

Robert suffered a fractured jaw, severe chest injuries, injuries to his teeth and a concussion and his condition was still reported as serious earlier this week at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. A passenger in his auto, Larry L. Coulter, 19, also of R. 1, Allenton, his cousin, incurred left shoulder pains, bruises and lacerations.

Increased Rates For Mail Will Go Into Effect Jan. 7

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect Jan. 7. Postmaster Harry E. Koch reminded postal customers today.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," Postmaster Koch declared. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 states, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

Postmaster Koch pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

These heavier pieces of first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on matter weighing between one and five pounds will change at half-pound intervals rather than one pound intervals.

Postmaster Koch said that the new rate structure will mean a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will affect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate, Postmaster Koch said.

He emphasized that the new rate on unsealed greeting cards will not go into effect until Jan. 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

Postmaster Koch also noted that effective Jan. 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between eight and sixteen ounces were transferred from fourth to third-class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance, Postmaster Koch said.

"We have an ample supply of one-cent stamps on hand," Postmaster Harry said, "for those people who have five-cent stamps and need one-cent stamps to make up the postage required under the new rates."

Higher rates also will go into effect Jan. 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of fourth-class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact the local post office, Postmaster Koch said.

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

Regular Meeting
December 4, 1967

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Wietor, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the proposed budget for 1968. Since there were no objections to the budget as presented, the budget hearing was declared closed.

Mr. Eugene Bohn presented his recommendation of the corrections and additions that should be made in the renewal of the village's multi-peril policy. His recommendations were accepted.

Mr. Robert McMahon of McMahon Associates presented his recommendations for improvements to the sewage plant to relieve overloading and thereby prevent odors.

Sewage plant operator Mike Weiss reported that the new sewage lift pump, designed to service the southwest area of the village, was now in operation.

The board authorized the Police Department to engage two full time adult school crossing guards and one alternate at a salary of \$5.00 per day.

All full time members of the police department, including the chief, were allowed \$100.00 per year uniform allowance effective January 1, 1968.

The board discussed tentative plans for additional sewage facilities to Regal Ware. The board also discussed the possible addition of a new reservoir and booster pump for the water department.

The plan for constructing a skating rink on the school grounds was tabled and in its stead the board authorized the preparation of a larger area on the river to be used for skating.

The claim of F. N. Bohn in the amount of \$75.00 for grading work was tabled.

Upon motion by Trustee Yoost, seconded by Trustee Herriges and duly carried, the Fire Department was authorized in increasing their membership from 40 to 45.

Superintendent Oppermann was authorized to prepare specifications for a new dump truck chassis, hoist and box and to adver-

tise for bids to be opened on December 14th, 1967, at 4:30 p. m.
