Packer Game on Feb. 18 Here Is Complete Sell-Out

SPONSORS SWAMPED WITH REQUESTS FOR TICKETS

If you haven't obtained tickets for the Green Bay Packers vs. Kewaskum Educators basketball game, your best chance now would be to either bribe a ticket holder with a ten spot or hope a ticket holding buddy becomes ill on Feb. 18.

Although there still may be a few tickets floating around by the time you read this, the Kewaskum Junior Woman's club chairman has been swamped with phone calls to "please, get me some tickets." This doesn't get much housework done, but it does prove that the Kewaskum area is teeming with Packer backers.

The sudden sale of almost 1,200 tickets in less than two weeks' time has the Junior Woman's club breathing a sigh of relief as a capacity, overflow crowd is assured. It is regrettable that the seating capacity of the gymnasium is not larger as many hundreds of additional tickets could be sold. The sell-out has, however, caused quite an inconvenience to some merchants. Please do not call for tickets at the business places listed in last week's paper. The evident success of this game, although still more than three weeks away, is certainly a tribute to all Kewaskum area merchants and citizens for their support of the Kewaskum Junior Woman's club.

REGAL WARE'S GROWTH TO 600 EMPLOYEES HERE RELATED

Local 849 AIW held its annual meeting at the Labor Center, Kewaskum, Sunday Jan. 21. The meeting was called to order by President Joseph Gruber. Francis Gilboay gave the financial report and read the minutes of the previous meeting.

Local 849 President Joseph Gruber read a letter from the president of Regal Ware, James D. Reigle. Reigle expressed a "sincere thank you" to all the people who helped make 1967 a great year for all of us. He also reported during the past week, the company sales department management attended the Chicago Housewares Show—the first major tradeshow of the year. From all reports it was an outstanding success and Regal Ware is optimistic in looking forward to another fine year.

Guest speaker was Clifford Matchey, who until recently was director of Region 9. Matchey has now accepted the office of Administrator of Health, Welfare and Pensions for Region 9. Matchey gave an interesting talk of the growth and progress of Regal Ware since it was founded by J. O. Reigle in 1945. He stated that the growth in employment from 1945 of 45 employees to the present where there are over 600 employees in production at Kewaskum and another 600 at Wooster, Ohio, and Flora, Mississippi, was not by accident. This came about through the combined efforts of Regal Ware management and the union workers putting forth an effort that has been unexcelled by any other industry in Wisconsin.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:00 p. m. with the president encouraging the union members to continue working together to raise their standard of living which can only be done through the continuous growth of Regal Ware. A delicious dinner was served after the meeting.

55th Anniversary Is Observed at Club Banquet

The 55th anniversary of the founding of the Kewaskum Woman's club was observed on Saturday evening when the group held its annual Founder's Day dinner for members and husbands at the Wigwam Supper Club.

Mrs. Marshall Boyd and Mrs. Earl Buswell were in charge of arrangements and in recognition of the emerald anniversary, presented a corsage in emerald green to each member.

Clyde Schloemer, a West Bend attorney, was the speaker. Riots, dissension and what he termed "a strange phenomenon—this atmosphere of dissatisfaction" and which he characterized as "a growing cancer" were the subject of his remarks.

"Are we perhaps paying the price for not recognizing our responsibilities long ago? Have we perhaps waited too long to do things for persons who need protection?" the speaker asked.

"Our country is great and has progressed," he said, "because of our two political party system; because of our right to disagree in the American way through public debate. Once we admit someone can tell us all the answers, we are in trouble," Schloemer continued.

"The Bill of Rights has given us freedom of speech, press, worship and freedom to assemble, along with others," the speaker said. "On the far left are the Communists who would destroy those freedoms and on the far right are those persons who are wrapping themselves in the Constitution. They tell us it is 'their right' to sit-in or lay-in. Those persons should look on the other side of the page," Atty Schloemer charged.

"Then there are those who are spreading fear. All measures which have promoted social gains are wrong. If only we could turn back the clock," they say.

"Here in the center of the picture," the speaker said, "are you and I, standing by, letting those on the far left and those on the far right run the show. We, who are in the middle, must solve this dilemma. We must preserve the American way. We must live by the Golden Rule.

"I challenge each of you," he said, "to get in the middle ground, to take part in the center of our political activity to preserve America as a democracy and as a Christian nation."

Organized on Jan. 14, 1913 by a small group of women headed by the late Mrs. D. M. Rosenheimer, the Kewaskum Woman's club is federated with the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Only one of its charter members is included in its membership of 55. She is Mrs. Newton Rosenheimer, now a resident of Cedar Lake Home near West Bend.

Bonnie Kern 1968 Homemaker Of Tomorrow

Because she ranked first in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude test given senior girls in Kewaskum Community High school here Dec. 5, Bonnie Sue Kern becomes 1968 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for her school, it has been announced. Registered for the test, now in its 14th year, were 603,798 girls in 15,079 of the nation's high schools, a new record for the program sponsored by General Mills.

Bonnie remains in contention for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 and will be awarded a specially designed silver charm to mark her local achievement.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be selected from winners in high schools of the state in the program's next step. She will be awarded a \$1,500 scholarship with a \$500 award going to the runner-up. The school of the winner will be given a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

Following her selection, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, along with a school advisor, will join winners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D. C., Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Minneapolis, where the trip will climax with naming the 1968 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Chosen from the state winners on the basis of her original test score; plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, the winner will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second, third, and fourth ranking girls in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

Headquarters of Kiwanis Visited By Dr. Edwards

While returning from a vacation trip with his wife, Dr. R. G. Edwards, member of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, was a visitor to the headquarters of Kiwanis International this week where he conferred with Kiwanis officials. The headquarters is housed in the Kiwanis International Building, 101 E. Erie st., Chicago, a half block west of the city's famed Magnificent Mile.

He was one of approximately 3,000 Kiwanians from throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico and more than two dozen other Asiatic, Caribbean and European nations who visit the headquarters building each year.

The Kiwanis headquarters comprises a 120-member general office force. Its managing director is R. P. Merridew, Chicago, secre-

tary of Kiwanis International and ex-officio member of the international service organization's 20-man board of trustees.

Kiwanis, which was founded in 1915, has maintained its general offices in Chicago from the start. The organization occupied the Kiwanis International Building in March of 1959. The building, a three story structure of black marble, aluminum and sandstone, has been hailed as one of the most beautiful in the world.

Three Men Injured In Local Accident

Three young men were injured, two of them quite seriously, in a two-car crash at 1 a. m. last Saturday on Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45) near the south village limits.

Autos involved in the mishap were driven by Dennis P. Martel, 23, of the Glacier Inn, Kewaskum, and John E. Johannes, 19, of R. 1, Port Washington. According to the accident report, Johannes, who was southbound, crossed the center line of the roadway and his car was struck by the northbound Martel vehicle, which was in the proper lane and traveling at the proper speed. Johannes was charged with driving left of the center line.

Gerald Statza, 19, of 1947 N. 33rd st., Milwaukee, a passenger in the Johannes auto, and Martel

were the most seriously injured and both were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. Johannes suffered lesser injuries.

FLYNN HELPS RESCUE 37 CHINESE SAILORS

Marine Corporal David L. Flynn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert D. Flynn of 204 Main st., Kewaskum, participated in the rescue of 37 Hong Kong Chinese sailors from a grounded Liberian freighter while serving in the Western Pacific aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Coral Sea.

A foot-high silver trophy was presented the captain and crew of the Coral Sea on behalf of the master and crew of the "Loyal Fortunes" which ran aground on the Pratas Reef 170 miles south of Hong Kong.

On Nov. 6, 1967 the Coral Sea was enroute to Hong Kong when she received the distress signal from the freighter, and lifted the crew off the ship by helicopter the following morning.

Following the 24-hour ordeal the stricken freighter's crew spent the night aboard the carrier and returned to Hong Kong the following day.

The Coral Sea is now operating with the U. S. Seventh Fleet in the Gulf of Tonkin off the coast of North Vietnam.


