2-Year-Old Boy Injured When Struck by Car

TWO OTHER ACCIDENTS REPORTED DURING WEEK.

Brian D. Skrentny, 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Skrentny, R. 2, Campbellsport, was treated at St. Agnes hospital Fond du Lac, last Thursday afternoon for abrasions and possible internal injuries after he was struck by a car driven by Charles S. Young, Brown Deer, in Fond du Lac. Skrentny operates Dave's Music Center in Kwaskum.

Police said that Brian was in a South Main street store with his mother about 1:27 p. m. when he got under the "in" turnstile and out of the store. He darted between two parked autos and out into the street.

Young told police that he was driving south on South Main st. when he heard a thud and saw a child lying in the street. The child was crossing west to east across the street at the time of the mishap. Brian is still a patient at the hospital but is expected home this weekend.

A car driven by Yvonne M. Eckert, 19, of Campbellsport was damaged at 11:25 a. m. Monday when she made a left turn off Hwy. 45 at the Johnson Trailer Court at the south outskirts of Kewaskum. She lost control of the auto on loose gravel stepped on the gas instead of the brake and the auto struck a trailer and pole. The driver apparently was uninjured.

An auto driven by Lionel F. Remillard, 18, of R. 4, West Bend, southbound on N. Fond du Lac ave., (Hwy. 45) left the road on the right side and side-swiped an electric pole at 11 p. m. Tuesday, Apr. 9. Remillard drove his car away from the scene after the mishap and did not report it to local police until later. He stated he bent down to see the lettering and turn on the car heater when he lost control of his vehicle momentarily. The right rear fender of the auto was damaged. Neither Remillard nor a passenger, James Jacak, 19, R. 1, West Bend, were injured.

Tornado Alert Will Be Held Here Tuesday

TWISTER SEASON IS HERE AGAIN; LIST PRECAUTIONS

This is the season for tornados and no wind on earth is more violent than that spawned by the tornado. Wind speed within them has been estimated at upward of 500 miles an hour, the weather bureau says. This spasm of violence can turn a community to rubble.

Warm days ahead signal the advent of the outdoor season and the season for tornados. Twisters have been known to strike suddenly, causing much damage to life and property. While Wisconsin isn't on the tornado belt, it still ranks 17th among states in tornado frequency and knowing something about them will help you a great deal if one does strike. In the last decade we have been touched by an average of 15 of the storms a year.

When the tornado approaches, man's safety depends on speed. To give him warning, the weather bureau sounds a tornado "watch" whenever conditions are ripe for the breeding of such storms. This urges citizens to keep an eye out for the funnel shaped destroyer and be alert for radio warnings. When a tornado actually is sighted, or spotted on the weather bureau radar, a tornado "warning" is issued to radio and television stations that broadcast the message. In other words, there are two types of information issued. A tornado "watch" means that a tornado is expected to develop. A tornado "warning" means a tornado has actually been sighted and you should be on the alert.

The latter is the warning to seek shelter. If a tornado has been spotted, the first rule, as in most emergencies, is to keep calm. Panic can be disastrous. Instead, make certain you know exactly what steps to take.

The bureau urges people to take shelter preferably in a strongly reinforced building, the basement being the best refuge if you are at home (the corner toward the tornado, usually the southwest corner offers greatest safety). In houses without basements, take cover under heavy furniture—a table or heavy bench for instance—in the center of the house—but avoid places in the basement directly under heavy appliances on the floor above. Keep some windows open, curtains drawn and blinds lowered. In an office building, schoolhouse or factory, seek shelter at the nearest inner hallway on the first floor. Don't seek refuge in parked cars and don't stay in stores with a large, free-span roof. Hide under sturdy counters or against heavy interior walls. If you are outdoors or in open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine. Turn off fuel, water and electricity. Once the warning flashes, speed may save lives.






