Rep. Reuss' Annual Milwaukee River Anti-Pollution Survey Reveals Some Progress

KEWASKUM SUBMITS PLANS FOR PLANT IMPROVEMENT

Rep. Henry S. Reuss (D-Wis.) announced this week that some progress had been made during the past year in cleaning up the Milwaukee River, but that "the state and federal governments still seem bent upon pursuing their Alphonse and Gaston act while river pollution increases."

In his "1968 Progress Report on Milwaukee River Pollution," the third of a series which started in 1966, Reuss hailed the following anti-pollution achievements for 1968:

1. State Water Quality Standards Issued. Standards of water quality have been issued for the Milwaukee River based on the intrastate standards adopted by the Division of Resource Development on June 14, 1968. Reuss said that he was particularly pleased that high standards were established to support fish and recreational activities from upriver sources down to the North Avenue dam.

Reuss had strongly objected to earlier standards proposed in November, 1967, which would have permitted large-scale pollution on the ten mile stretch of the river from the dam to the Ozaukee county line.

In objecting to the state's original proposal to lower water standards at the Milwaukee county line, Reuss argued that the dam, rather than the county line, marks the change of the river's ecology from a dead stream to one that will support a fish population and recreational activities.

2. South Shore Treatment Plant Begins Operation. The long-awaited opening of the South Shore plant for primary treatment this (Continued on page 2)

Conservation Tour Won by Wayne 4-H Club

The Wayne Crusaders 4-H club of Washington county was one of seven clubs in Wisconsin selected for the Wisconsin Conservation Activities award tour. Five members from each of the clubs will be taken on a two day conservation education tour in central Wisconsin next summer. Selection of the clubs is based on the conservation activities the 4-H clubs have conducted during 1968.

The Wayne Crusaders 4-H club is in the Addison and Allenton area. They have 45 members and 16 adult leaders. Mrs. Edgar Miske of R. 1, Allenton, is the general leader of the club.

Many of the individual members took wildlife and conservation 4-H projects during the year. In this way they work on various projects of their own individually and usually in their own home area. In addition, the club has done many things as a group. After last Christmas, the club collected used Christmas trees to build a wildlife shelter. During the summer the group planted 250 trees to serve as windbreak for soil erosion control.

The club had several beautification projects. They planted trees at their town hall as a start of the beautification project there. They also planted flowers in a planter at the local public school. They have also made and distributed litter bags to remind people of the need for beautification.

In the summer they worked with the county park superintendent, Roger Kist, to make hiking trails through the park system. This helps provide all residents of the county an opportunity to see and enjoy more of the county park. The club also spent one afternoon picking stones from a field which is to be made into the lawn of the public school.


In attempting to bring the idea of conservation and beautification to others in the community, the members have made posters, given talks, and demonstrations.

Many of the members also planted trees and shrubs around their own home and put up bird houses and maintained bird feeders during the winter.

It is the hope of the club that they can bring the conservation message to many other people through their activities, and at the same time do their part to beautify the community. Conservation of our natural resources is one of the basic ingredients in the long term enjoyment of the things that we now have.

The conservation tour is sponsored by Midland Cooperative and University of Wisconsin Extension. The tour will provide many more opportunities for the members to see conservation in practice and give them other ideas of things that they can do in their own community.

There are thirty 4-H clubs with more than 1,100 4-H members in Washington county. Many of the clubs do some conservation activities during the course of the year so that there is much conservation education and actual conservation work being done through the efforts of the adult leaders and the 4-H members in Washington county.

Two Accidents in Village Tuesday

Adult High School Credit Courses to Be held in County

WILL BE CONDUCTED AT KEWASKUM HIGH SCHOOL

Vocational, Technical and Adult Education District 10 will conduct classes at selected high schools in Washington county, including Kewaskum, beginning the week of Jan. 27, 1969. The program is to provide an opportunity for adults to earn high school credits, that may be applied toward the earning of a high school diploma.

The classes are for any person who is twenty years of age and has satisfactorily completed at least an eighth grade education. Persons must be accepted into the program by the high school principal of the high school from which the individual wishes to receive the diploma.

Classes will meet for two hours an evening twice a week. Initially students pay a \$2 registration fee. This covers the cost of processing and the registration fee for the first course. Tests, books, and supplies will be purchased by the students.

Course of instruction will include those academic subjects required for graduation in the high school day classes and elective subjects to complete the twenty units required for four years of high school.

A person entering the program will have his past school work evaluated by the high school and will be notified concerning the courses he needs to meet the graduation requirements.

Classes will be taught by teachers holding certified licenses issued by the State Department of Public Instruction.

November helps clear the way for the addition of secondary treatment facilities and the much-needed link-up with the South Shore plant of the two prime sources of lake pollution — the Peter Cooper Corporation and South Milwaukee.

3. Combined Sewer Demonstration Underway. The city of Milwaukee's federally-assisted demonstration of the feasibility of using large retention tanks to capture combined sewer overflow had made good progress despite some construction delays. Although labor difficulties in the construction industry have delayed the start of the four million gallon concrete holding tank until next spring, the installation of the project's sewage monitoring devices is nearly completed.

The tank is designed to capture sewage overflows swelled during rainy periods by rain waters from the city's combined storm and sanitary sewers. These raw sewage

overflows, now discharged directly into the Milwaukee River and Lake Michigan without treatment, will be stored in the holding tank and fed through the Jones Island treatment plant at times when the plant capacity is not being fully utilized.

The total project will cost \$1,958,118, with federal government contributing \$1,468,589.

Turning to the darker side of the picture, Reuss categorized the federal government as the "biggest anti-pollution backslider of them all for reneging on promises to aid municipalities in the construction of municipal treatment facilities."

The Clean Waters Restoration Act of 1966, which was unanimously adopted by both houses of Congress, had originally authorized an appropriation of \$700 million for federal construction grants for the entire United States for fiscal year 1969. The actual appropriation now stands at \$214 million.

On the authorized basis, Wisconsin's share of the federal appropriation would have been \$14 million. Wisconsin's actual share of the federal appropriation for fiscal 1969 is \$4,391,100 — less than one-third the amount promised.

"In this case one-third of a loaf is almost worse than none at all," Reuss said. "The failure of the federal government to keep its promise gives the state and local governments a good excuse not to proceed with waste treatment construction on their own."

Reuss cited the following examples as the three greatest failures of state and local anti-pollution efforts during the past year:

1. Delay in Formulating a State Anti-Pollution Plan. Wisconsin's 1966 Water Resources Act calls for the Division of Resource Development to formulate a comprehensive state water resources plan for the Milwaukee River, including "plans and programs for the prevention and abatement of water pollution and for the maintenance and improvement of wa-

ter quality, no later than July 1, 1968."

Although a preliminary field study of the Milwaukee River above the Milwaukee county line was completed on Jan. 23, 1968, no action program has been formulated for any part of the Milwaukee River.

2. No Progress Made in Resolving Combined Sewer Problem. Beyond the holding tank demonstration project already underway, very little has been accomplished during the past year toward finding a solution to the combined storm and sanitary sewer problem of Milwaukee and the northern suburbs.

"We should be constantly exploring new methods for solving this problem such as the possibility of using rubber 'pillow tanks' as alternative to the costlier concrete holding tanks," Reuss said.

"What is needed is a cooperative effort. Neither Milwaukee nor the northern suburbs are doing much to solve the combined sewer problem. A Milwaukee Metropolitan Council of Governments could work out a joint action program — if we had a Milwaukee Metropolitan Council of Governments."

3. State Orders Disregarded by Seven Upriver Municipalities. On June 12, 1968, the Wisconsin Division of Resource Development issued orders to 16 upper Milwaukee River municipalities calling for each of them to "submit preliminary plans and schedules not later than October 1, 1968, for adequate treatment facilities in keeping with state water quality standards and the recommendations of the 1968 Lake Michigan Enforcement Conference," which calls for efficient waste removal, continual disinfection of treatment plant effluent, and removal of 80% of total phosphorous content.

Thus far, nine communities — Adell, Fredonia, Grafton, Kewaskum, Menomonee Falls, Mequon, Thiensville, West Bend, and Random Lake — have complied with the state directive.

Seven communities which failed

to meet the Oct. 1 deadline and have still not submitted preliminary plans and schedules in accordance with state orders include the villages of Butler, Campbellsport, Jackson, Germantown and Saukville, the city of Cedarburg, and the Newburg Sanitary District.

The June 12, 1968, orders were issued as a result of a recent Division of Resource Development (DRD) survey of pollution sources within the Milwaukee River Basin above the Milwaukee County line. A description of three of the 16 major municipal waste sources located in this area follows:

1. Village of Campbellsport (Fond du Lac County) has an activated sludge type sewage plant which was enlarged in 1963. This plant receives industrial wastes from a milk processing plant operated by Universal Food Corporation after pretreatment by means of a trickling filter operated by the industry. During a twenty-four hour survey it was found that the municipal sewage treatment plant removed only 43 percent of the BOD (Biochemical Oxygen Demand) from the raw wastes. Observation of the plant on several occasions revealed operating problems and variable efficiency. The Division of Resource Development concluded that the Campbellsport plant should be capable of providing 90 percent BOD removal or higher. No plans for improvement have yet been received by the state.

2. Village of Kewaskum (Washington County) had an activated sludge type sewage treatment plant. It was determined during a twenty-four hour survey that the plant removed only 69 percent of the BOD present in the raw wastes. This type of plant should provide a BOD removal of 90 per-

cent or more continuously. Kewaskum has submitted preliminary plans and schedules for plant improvement in accordance with state orders on Sept. 30, 1968.

3. City of West Bend (Washington County) has an activated sludge type sewage plant constructed in 1966 to replace its old trickling filter plant. Provision is now made for disinfection of effluent prior to discharging into the Milwaukee River. West Bend filed its plans on Sept. 23, 1968, and the new facilities are expected to be in operation by 1972. The Line Materials Industries plant of the McGraw-Edison Company at West Bend discharges excess white water containing paper fibers from the repulping of paper and some oil wastes from the pitch impregnation process and machining operations. The company is in the process of providing pretreatment prior to the discharge of their wastes to a new interceptor to be built by the city of West Bend. The completion of this interceptor is dependent on the availability of federal funds for the coming year.

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Slinger Defeats Indians on Fast Break, Keeps Lead

The unbeaten Slinger Owls won their fourth straight Scenic Moraine conference victory Friday night when they jolted Kewaskum there, 87-61, to retain their loop lead.

A dejected Kewaskum coach, Walt Bade, blamed his Indians' loss on their inability to control the fast break. Kewaskum had been working on maneuvers to halt the Owls' devastating fast break, but, as was the case with other opponents, were simply unable to do so. Coach Bade was quoted as saying that the Owls "simply chewed us up with their fast break. Their big men got the ball off the boards in a hurry and cleared it for the fast 'break and score.'" The Owls used these devices to pry loose the triumph and streak to their fourth straight victory.

Chuck Krentz (6-3 senior) a talented scorer from inside and out, topped Slinger with 26 points and Larry Gundrum, frequently the first man down court on the fast break, chipped in with 22. The Owls top scorer all season, Rick Scherr, rebounded well off the defensive board, but he managed only 16 points. In three previous conference games, Scherr had heaped up 86 points.

Center Jim Foerster played another steady game for Kewaskum and paced his team with 19 points, while guard Randy Koth played an excellent floor game, according to Bade. Perry Koth took second scoring honors with 12 points.

The Indians will now be idle for the holiday vacation until Jan. 3 when they play a non-confer-

ence contest at Lomira before hosting Campbellsport Jan. 7.

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



STEAMED CRANBERRY PUDDING PUFF (Makes 6 servings)

- 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/2 teaspoon mace
- 3/4 cup butter or margarine
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 2 cups fresh cranberries, coarsely chopped

Sift flour with baking powder, salt and sugar. Stir in bread crumbs and mace. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse cornmeal. Beat eggs with milk and add, all at once, to the dry ingredients. Stir until well blended. Fold in cranberries. Spoon mixture into a well-buttered 1 1/2-quart mold. Cover tightly with greased foil. Put filled mold into a kettle containing 2 inches of boiling water. Cover kettle and steam for 3 to 3 1/2 hours. Add more boiling water to keep the level at about 2 inches. Remove mold from water and let cool for 15 minutes. Unmold and serve warm with hard sauce.

To Make Changes in '69 License Plates

The Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles, Madison, will make several changes in 1969 license plates, according to Carl G. Johnson, director of the Bureau of Vehicle Registration and Licensing.

On Jan. 1, municipally-owned vehicles will be issued a new non-expiring license plate which is expected to save the state over \$10,000 a year and provide considerable savings to municipalities.

The new plates, which have black numerals on a blue background, cost \$3 originally and eliminate any annual renewal fee for the 30,000 municipally-owned vehicles in Wisconsin.

Late next spring, there will be a change in the lettering for privately-owned automobile plates. The current Wisconsin plates carry one letter and up to five numerals. With over 2 million vehicles registered in Wisconsin, the Division of Motor Vehicles is rapidly running out of letter-numeral combinations for new licenses.

A new letter-number system is currently being studied which will provide for registering over 7 million automobiles.

The new annual issue plates for vehicles such as dealer vehicles, trucks and semi-trailers, will show red numerals on a white background.

Privately-owned automobiles will continue to carry reflectorized yellow plates with black numerals, and will be issued black on orange renewal stickers which will be valid until the month of expiration in 1970.
