McKenna Named To Head Catholic Fund Drive Here

Thomas J. Kenny, West Bend, county chairman for the 1969 Archbishop's Fund Drive in Washington county, has announced the appointment of five associate chairmen to assist him in the annual Catholic fund campaign.

The volunteer leaders are John Brust, R. 1, Slinger; Michael J. Goring, Jr., 1129 N. 11th ave., West Bend; Richard Heppel, Allenton; Roger McKenna, 1195 Hillside dr., Kewaskum; and John J. Shinnars, 730 Center st., Hartford.

Kenny said the five men have been assigned responsibility of from four to eight parishes and/or missions each for the drive, which this year runs from May 4 to 18. The associate chairmen will work closely with parish chairmen before and during the drive in the solicitation of pledges. Brust, Goring, Heppel, McKenna and Shinnars are presently consulting with pastors of their assigned parishes on the naming of individual parish chairmen. There are 16 parishes and 5 missions in Washington county.

Catholics from the ten counties of the Milwaukee archdiocese are being asked to contribute a record \$2.75 million. "I'm confident that my fellow Catholics in Washington county will respond generously to this year's appeal in recognition of the serious financial condition of the archdiocese," Kenny said.

"These outstanding men who have agreed to serve as my associate chairmen reflect the dedication and concern we must all demonstrate if the goal, which represents the absolute minimum needed, is to be met."


JUNIOR AND CADETT GIRL SCOUTS TO MEET THURSDAY

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
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"SURPRISE"



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

Bank Participates In WHEC Program

The board of directors of the Wisconsin Higher Education Corporation, WHEC, have formed an advisory council made up of members from financial institutions from around the state of Wisconsin.

The advisory council was formed to make recommendations to the WHEC in regard to questions of general policy and procedure.

The Bank of Kewaskum has been an active participant in this program for the past year.

The WHEC administers the Guaranteed Student Loan program. Since the inception of the program, more than \$6 million have been loaned to students by lending institutions in Wisconsin. At this time more than 450 banks, credit unions and savings and loan associations are participating in the student loan program.

Students may borrow up to \$1,500 a year to a maximum of \$7,500. Repayment begins after the student has left school, with deferment from repayment while serving in the military, Peace Corps, or VISTA, or during periods of return to full-time study.

The federal government pays all interest charges (7 per cent a year) on behalf of a student whose adjusted family income is less than \$15,000 a year while the student is in school and during any deferment period, until repayment.

Washington county Republican chairman, Richard T. Becker, announced that the 1968 Washington County Republican Caucus will be held on Tuesday, March 25, at the city hall in Hartford. Following a procedure started several years ago the non-election year caucus will be held in Hartford.

Money thus collected has been invested in short term government securities and in Washington county banks until needed. In 1968, more than \$100,000.00 in interest was realized due to these investments.


Treasurer Klein also reported the following comparison in postponed and delinquent taxes:
