Barn Raising Bee Held on Etta Farm

A barn raising bee was held Saturday on the Lloyd Etta farm located one mile north of Kewaskum on County Trunk Hwy. S. Between 75 and 100 neighbors and friends gathered at the farm to help the Ettas build and enclose a 150-foot long barn in one day's time.

The new barn replaces one destroyed by fire on April 19, which resulted in a loss initially estimated at \$25,000 or more. All but the roofing and a few finishing touches were completed on the barn Saturday. Mrs. Etta, assisted by neighboring women, served dinner to the 75 or more men. Several milk cans full of water and other refreshments were also consumed.

The Ettas, who are the parents of five children, were also encouraged to hold a public barn dance tonight (Friday) in the new barn. Normie Dogs and his Melody Boys will provide the music. Lloyd Etta is an uncle of Mrs. Dogs.

2-Day Conservation Tour Awarded to Wayne 4-H Club

A two-day educational conservation tour through central Wisconsin was the award recently received by the Wayne Crusaders 4-H club for excellence in conservation and beautification projects. Wayne Crusaders was one of seven clubs in the state to receive this award which was sponsored by Midland Cooperatives of Minneapolis and Mutual Insurance of St. Paul.


The club has been active in providing wildlife shelters, has planted hundreds of trees, maintained a school planter and helped in beautification projects in the community. At club meetings, conservation has been studied through the use of slides, films, posters, talks and demonstrations. Members have taken individual conservation and wildlife projects as well. This is the second consecutive year that Wayne Crusaders have won this award.

Delegates attending from the Wayne Crusaders club were Laura Feierabend, R. 3, Campbellsport, Billy Schrauth, Steven Miske, Diane Resch, and their leader, Mrs. Edgar Miske, all of R. 1, Allenton.

Delegates were housed at the Sierra Motel in Wisconsin Dells and then traveled by chartered bus through the surrounding counties where many phases of conservation were observed and studied. Some of the places visited were Crandall Forest, Westfield Fish Hatchery, Friendship Ranger Station, Necedah National Wildlife Refuge, Castle Rock Dam, Devil's Lake State Park, Arlington Experimental University Farms and the Poyntette Game Farm.

Ted Peterson, extension forester from the University of Wisconsin, Robert Ellarson, extension wildlife ecologist, and Marvin Hanson, assistant state 4-H leader, traveled with the group and brought in-depth information at the many places visited. 4-H members and their leaders found the trip to be most enjoyable as well as educational. Annual Picnic Here Great Success



THOUSANDS ATTEND EVENT; PARADE WINNERS NAMED

The annual Kewaskum picnic, this year commemorating the 50th anniversary of the American Legion, held in the village park Sunday was another smashing success. Hot, sunny weather, ideal for a picnic, brought out thousands of persons who lined the streets for the parade, following which they streamed into the park for the affair in the afternoon. Another huge crowd, which appeared to be even larger than that in the afternoon, thronged into the park in the evening.

Although there were fewer bands and drum corps than in the past few years, the big parade which started off the event was another excellent one and very colorful. The parade lasted a good hour in sweltering heat. One of the outstanding musical units in the parade, the Chordaliers Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee, is shown in the photo above starting the turn from Main st. onto River-view dr., the street leading into the park.

Besides eight bands, drum and bugle corps and drill teams, the parade included numerous comic entries and commercial floats, children's floats and specialties, ancient cars, baton twirlers, visiting firemen and equipment, Legionnaires, color bearers, orchestras on trucks, bicycles, riding horses, comic cars, and other units. The parade was led by the Milwaukee Riders motorcycle group with their fancy cycles and uniforms.

Regal Ware, Inc. won the first prize of \$60 among the commercial float entries in the parade for overall excellence, followed by the Brownsville Community Club, second, \$50; Heldt Store of Campbellsport, third, \$40; Guenther Sentry of Campbellsport, fourth, \$25, and Kewaskum Floral, fifth, \$15. Entries were judged on the theme of "Americanism" and "Patriotism," to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Legion.

Among the non-commercial entries, the winners were: Addison Achievers 4-H club, "Steps to Suc-

cess," first, \$10; B-Mer-E 4-H club, Boltonville, second, \$8; 3 flag girls dressed in American flags, Debra Schmidt, R. 1, Allenton, and Janine and Bonnie Prost, R. 2, Kewaskum, third, \$5; children's group, "Americanism — 1919 to 1969," comprised of Susie and Chris Harlow, Shelly, Mike, Jodi and Kay Eichstedt, Debbie and Mary Vass, fourth, \$3. Honorable mentions went to "Happy Birthday," Wesley Haug children; "Flower Power," Margie McClain; "Shoemaker and Elves," Scannell children.

Following the parade, as people poured into the park, the Chordaliers drum and bugle corps performed in front of the stage. The Kewaskum Senior Citizens group also sang several selections from the stage. Live music by Bob Thorn's orchestra and Syl Volm and his Polka Dots was furnished in the beer garden in the afternoon and evening. There were numerous rides, concession and amusement stands in operation and the beer garden, hamburger and bratwurst, and refreshment stands were kept busy in the hot weather.

In the evening water fights, Boltonville firemen won the championship money. In the first fight Boltonville defeated Campbellsport by taking the first two falls. In the second fight, Random Lake defeated Kewaskum by taking two straight falls. In the third fight, Boltonville defeated Random Lake in two straight falls to emerge the winner. After the regular fights, a group of young lady volunteers calling their team "Grandma and Her Girls" took on the winning Boltonville men's team. The girls didn't want their names mentioned but we can say their leader was "Grandma" Schmidt. Naturally the girls' team won the fight, taking the first fall, losing the second to Boltonville, and then winning the third and deciding fall. This fight made a big hit.

Esser Attends UW Vo Ag Conference

Two panel discussions were scheduled. "Effective Occupational Experience Programs" moderated by Dr. H. Branson of the University of Wisconsin, and "Making Your Summer Count" moderated by Dr. Thompson of the state university at River Falls.

The conference is sponsored jointly by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and the University of Wisconsin.


