Re-Designed Pool Building to Be Presented at Information Meeting

ELECTORS OF DISTRICT TO MEET MONDAY, OCT. 20

An informational meeting for the electors of the Kewaskum Community School District will be held at 8:00 p. m. in the high school multi-purpose room on Monday, Oct. 20.

The new proposal will not change the size of the pool or pool deck facilities. The original pool called for all mechanical equipment, such as boilers, water heaters, filters, pumps, etc., to be housed in tunnels under the pool deck along with a 100% masonry building. The new plan differs from the original in that the upper two-thirds of the building will be steel with insulated steel wall panels instead of masonry and the pool equipment will be housed in an extension of the building instead of in tunnels as originally planned. This plan will need less heavy footings and will not require as much excavation. Although the exact savings which can be realized under the new plan are not available today it is felt that the amount will be substantial.

It is hoped that all electors will attend to learn the facts about both proposals.

Firemen Answer First Call in 6 Months for Record

The Kewaskum fire department was called out at 11:15 a. m. Monday for the first time in almost six months. This is believed to be a record in the time between fire calls. Late spring, the entire summer and early fall passed by without a single fire in this area, while some neighboring fire departments were kept on the run on occasions.

The last fire call for the Kewaskum department was on April 24 to the Tom Rodenkirch rural home in the town of Kewaskum where a silo roof burned. At that time the Rodenkirch fire was the sixth one in a week's time for the firemen, one of them including the Lloyd Etta barn burning to the ground. After six calls in a week's time the firemen had a long rest since. The fire siren sounded once during the summer for a drowning at Crooked lake but this was a rescue squad call, not a fire call.

Monday's call was to the Eugene La Marche home at 1338 Roseland dr. and wasn't really a fire either. A motor on the furnace in the basement burned out causing an odor and the home to become filled with smoke. There was no damage.

Sen. Schreiber Speaks to Labor Council Here

SAYS STUDENTS PROMOTING REVOLUTION ON CAMPUSES

State Senator Martin J. Schreiber (D-Milwaukee) stated Monday that, "the extremists on the Far Left and the Far Right present a grave challenge to our democracy and both are as dangerous as the other."

Speaking to the Washington County Labor Council members at the Kewaskum Labor Temple, Senator Schreiber said, "The S.D.S. (Students for a Democratic Society) in promoting open revolution on our campuses and recently in Chicago, is met by the Y.A.F. (Young Americans for Freedom), using the tactics of the Klu Klux Klan, bringing about the return of the spirit of Joe McCarthy."

"We must be aware of the fact that these groups seek to infiltrate not only our colleges, but also our high schools and that, unfortunately, in some instances they are succeeding," Schreiber said.

"The S.D.S. and the Y.A.F. both seek to destroy our government through disruption, destruction and violent demonstrations. It is these radical groups that are responsible for the student violence on the University of Wisconsin campus and throughout the country," Schreiber declared.

Senator Schreiber concluded "we must recognize the fact that these people mean business in bringing destruction to our democratic form of government. Complacency, inaction and lack of concern by the overwhelming majority of citizens only brings further success to these groups. Without question, the S.D.S. and the Y.A.F. are a cancerous plague on the American scene. We must recognize them as such."

DALE MOths OF RURAL KEWASKUM GETS AWARD

Dale Moths of rural Kewaskum received the highest degree of the Future Farmers of America at the national convention in Kansas City, Missouri on Oct. 15. Dale was one of 17 boys from the state of Wisconsin to receive this award. There are 480 candidates on the national level.

The award is based on leadership, cooperation, scholarship and supervised farming programs.

Dale's farming program started with a few rabbits as a freshman ag student at Kewaskum High school. The profits of this project purchased a gilt project that grew large enough to purchase registered Holstein calves at the Purina Beautina sales.

These animals now serve as the foundation of a 30 cow milking herd and a complete farming operation.

The list of leadership activities and awards grew as his farming program grew. The 1963 Chapter Star Greenhand soon became the Chapter Star Farmer recipient of Wisconsin Farmer degree. Dale also was Agriculture award winner, number one in the state dairy judging contest representing Kewaskum FFA, county Holstein award winner, won the Dairy Farmer award, Showmanship and Herdsmanship awards at the county fair, and a shortcourse scholarship to the University of Wisconsin presented by the Bank of Kewaskum.

Dale has demonstrated leadership as vice-president of the state association of Future Farmers, vice-president and president of his local chapter and treasurer of the university short course.

Dale Moths is the first American Farmer of the Kewaskum chapter.

19,000 Visit Lizard Mound State Park, Konkol Reports

Over 19,000 people visited Lizard Mound State Park through September, 1969, according to Dennis Konkol, Kewaskum, park manager. An added feature this year is that school and service groups may write to Park Headquarters, Box 426, Park Headquarters, to obtain reservations for a guided tour of the park. The area is open to the public until winter snows block the entrance road.

Should you wish to visit Lizard Mound follow State Highway 144 in Washington county northeast of West Bend to County Trunk Highway 'A' and then east on 'A' one-half mile to the park entrance. Facilities provided at the park include a small picnic area with tables, grills, toilets, and drinking water. There is no overnight camping, nor is a Wisconsin park sticker required on vehicles using this area.

This park was established in 1950 and is an important monument to Wisconsin's pre-historic Indian culture. It contains 26 fine examples of effigy mounds and is named for its outstanding mound. The original group probably consisted of at least sixty mounds, but many were destroyed by farming operations over a period of many years. Effigy mounds are low earthworks usually in the shapes of birds or animals and a part of the burial customs of this culture.

From the excavations of the mounds and campsites, archeologists have gained some knowledge

of the life of this pre-historic group of Wisconsin Indians. The builders of the effigy mounds of Wisconsin have left behind no evidence of permanent habitation. It is assumed they lived in small scattered bands and depended largely on hunting and fishing for food, although some gardening was practiced. Most of their tools and weapons were made of stone, some of wood and bone, and in rare instances, copper. Pottery vessels were used for cooking.

The mounds here at Lizard Mound State Park are in an excellent state of preservation. They are impressive both for their prominent height, most of them are between three and four feet above ground level, and for their careful construction. A vault showing an Indian maiden burial has been constructed in one of the linear mounds. A level trail has been constructed through the mound area where visitors may hike to view this pre-historic culture. A visit to this park is a rewarding experience.

SECONDARY THOUGHTS

By the Staff of Kewaskum Community High School

THE VALUE OF "EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES"

Many parents have wondered time and time again why Johnny or Susie spend so much time at school on those "extra-curricular activities." What goes on? Do they accomplish anything? Probably these questions often come up at the family dinner table.

In the minds of most educators the "extra-curricular" program is not additional to the regular school program. It is actually an integral part of the vital learning situation which makes up the whole school curriculum. In fact, many schools now refer to such activities as forensics, dramatic presentations, science club, and gymnastics as "Co-curricular."

The concept that activities are in any way extra or that they are appended to the regular school schedule is a misunderstanding of what a functional curriculum is in our present day schools. The design of these activity programs is to permit the students to come in contact with the learning experiences under the direct or indirect supervision of the schools.

Specifically, the "co-curricular" program is attempting to answer the needs of its community and its young. It concerns itself by developing activities which include the physical, emotional, and spiritual health of its students. This is true in organizations such as the Science Club where students gain a greater understanding of the world through investigation, or in the Future Teachers Association where students learn philosophies of ethics and morality.

Parents often ask who is in charge of the various activities. On the average, most schools have as many activities as the number of teachers on the staff. Staff members are utilized in the various activities according to their special interests or past experiences. For example, a teacher who played football in college might serve as a football coach or assistant, where as another teacher who has had experience in journalism will work with the school newspaper or annual.

Many times future careers are fostered out of constructive "co-curricular" programs and the development of latent talents in students. The student who served as a school photographer may decide to enter the field as a professional. On the other hand, a student who enjoyed working with projectors and audio-visual equipment might decide on a career in electronics.

For these reasons and many more the "co-curricular" program helps make the school active in principle and in fact. It creates greater interest in the student body by meeting the individual needs of students. From such activities as dramatic productions, art shows, and musical concerts

Indians Clobber Campbellsport at Homecoming, 40-6

Kewaskum's homecoming celebration over the weekend was made a complete success when the Indians swamped winless Campbellsport in the football game Friday night, 40-6. The win kept Kewaskum's title hopes alive.

Ron Theusch and Glen Weinreich each scored two touchdowns to spark the Indian offense in the game played in a light rain before a large crowd. The Bells were helpless against the Indians' stalwart defensive unit. The defense prevented them from moving the ball and caused the Bells to make errors. The only zip Campbellsport showed on offense was supplied by Tom Breitzman, who carried a Kewaskum kickoff back 65 yards for the Bells' only score.

Kewaskum's first of six touchdowns was scored on a 24 yard pass play from quarterback Mike Doherty to Tony Butschlick. A completed pass to Jim Tassar on the conversion made it 8-0. Campbellsport's only score on Breitzman's kickoff return followed and the run for extra point failed. On the first play of the second quarter Theusch ran 3 yards for a TD and the kick by Larry Bunkelman made it 15-6 at halftime.

In the third quarter Butschlick intercepted a Dennis Pieper pass and 3 plays later Weinreich ran 46 yards from scrimmage for a score. A pass for conversion failed. Ahead 21-6 at the end of the third period, the Indians broke the game wide open with 3 touchdowns and 19 points in the last quarter to make a rout of it.

For the first TD in the final period, Leo Gundrum blocked a Bell punt and 3 plays later Doherty ran 9 yards for the score. Again the kick failed. After another Campbellsport punt, the Indians worked the ball down and Theusch took it over on a 4 yard run. The kick for point was no good. Then on a Bell kicking situation the snap from center was bad and the ball bounced through the kicker's legs. Butschlick charged through, picked the ball up and ran it to the Bell 2. Clark Eichstedt, subbing at quarterback, handed off to Weinreich for the final score. Eichstedt also kicked the extra point to bring the final to 40-6.

Weinreich paced the team in rushing with 110 yards in 15 carries, followed by Doherty with 72 in 12 carries and Theusch with 62 in 13 tries. Weinreich is now third in individual scoring in the conference with 32 points, while Theusch is 4th with 28. Doherty is tied for 8th with 18. Hauser of Slinger leads the Scenic Moraine with 46 points.

On defense Russ Gavin played a bang-up game, making 13 tackles, 5 of them solos. Gundrum also made many tackles and blocked a

kick. Butschlick again did his usual good job. The offensive line did a fine blocking job, especially that side of the line with Dave Schacht, Bunkelman, Syl Schoofs and Butschlick, who opened big holes. Eichstedt did an excellent job in kicking, booming them high and far.

Gundrum, incidentally, was one of 3 players nominated as player of the week in area schools by the Fond du Lac Reporter.

Two of Kewaskum's players were injured and did not get in the game against the Bells, namely Dave Schaub and Glen Staehler. Besides these two, Lee Rammer is out for the season with a non-football injury.

The statistics, which show Kewaskum had far the better of it, follows: First downs—K 12, C 6; yards rushing—K 245, C 47; yards passing—K 45, C 30; total yards—K 290, C 77; passes—K 4-10, C 4-13; intercepted by K 1, C 0; fumbles—K 3, C 4; fumbles lost—K 1, C 2; penalties—K 25, C 70.

The Indians have two road games left. Today (Friday) they play a 4 p. m. contest at Slinger. Slinger had won 4 straight before they bumped into one of the stronger teams in North Fondy last Friday and were trounced, 20-0. The Owls also must still face Grafton, besides Kewaskum. The Owls are led by Hauser, leading scorer in the conference. Their all-conference quarterback last year, Monroe is also back after being out this season.

Ron Stensi of Menomonee Falls North won the 2.2 mile run in 11:19.8. Runners for Kewaskum were Larry Zehren 17, Steve Backhaus 20, Steve Bremser 47, John Backhaus 49, Gordon Darmody 54, Charles Battaglia 72 and Craig Carr 74.

The JV's didn't fare as well, since they placed 9th out of 9 schools, Allen Hellsell, who placed 42nd, was Kewaskum's first runner to finish.

The Indian harriers defeated Pewaukee 22-34 at Hon-e-Kor Oct. 7. Larry Zehren won in a record time of 11:29. John Backhaus was 3rd, Darmody 5th, Bremser 6th, Carr 7th, Battaglia 10th and Bob Gruber 14th. The JV's, on the other hand, lost 21-34, with Pewaukee winning the first three places. Dave Butzke was 4th, Aaron Jorgensen 5th, Jay Tassar 7th, Allen Hellsell 8th, Darwin Tackes 10th, Ed Sleger 13th and Rick Butz 14th.

With the five scoring runners finishing in the top 10, Kewaskum's cross country team won a triangular meet rather easily at Grafton Tuesday by garnering 26 points to Grafton's 37 and Slinger's 65. Larry Zehren led all runners, which is a perennial habit for him this fall, over the 2.2 mile course in a time of 12:13. Teammate Steve Backhaus was second. Other place runners were John Backhaus 6th, Darmody 7th, Bremser 10th, Carr 15th and Battaglia 19th. None of the schools had qualifying JV teams.

This Friday the Scenic Moraine conference meet will be held at Grafton and Kewaskum has a very excellent chance of repeating as champion. Only one Scenic school, Hartland, has defeated Kewaskum and that by the barest of margins, one point! Kewaskum runners have continually improved, despite a 14-19 record, of which most of the defeats suffered, 12 in fact, were by the larger schools from the Milwaukee area.

Kewaskum's harriers have been assigned to the Beaver Dam regional, one of 16 regionals, for the 1969 state tournament series. Other competing schools will be Campbellsport, Cedarburg, Grafton, Horicon, Lomira, Mayville, Random Lake, Slinger and Wau-pun. Cedarburg appears to be the favorite with Mayville runner-up on Tuesday, Oct. 21.

Schools which finish 1-2-3 from this group qualify for sectional participation at Kettle Moraine (near Wales) Saturday, Oct. 25. In addition, individuals who finish 1-2-3-4-5 at each regional, regardless of the finish of their teams, qualify for sectional participation.

On the sectional level, schools which finish 1-2-3 and also individuals who finish 1-2-3-4-5 qualify for the state run at Kettle Moraine. Traditionally, the state meet was held at Hartford, until this year when a change of site was designated.
