Reduced Tax Rate of \$36.69 Per \$1,000 Is Approved for Village

Lower County and State Tax Levies Permit Reduction

PASS NEW ORDINANCES ON CAT LICENSING, PARKING, ETC.; OK SKATING RINK

At their meeting Monday evening, the village board approved a 1970 budget totaling \$744,338.45 calling for a tax levy of \$534,879.77 and a tax rate of \$38.71 per \$1,000 of assessed property valuation. But the increased tax credit will amount to \$2.02 per \$1,000 valuation, dropping the net tax rate to \$36.69.

Village taxpayers got an unexpected "bonus" when it was revealed that county and state tax levies were lower than anticipated, permitting a \$6,331.29 reduction in the proposed budget of \$750,669.74 to \$744,338.45. The net levy for 1969 was \$36.24. This year's net levy will result in an over-all increase of 45 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation, according to Village Commissioner William Martin.

Of the total village budget, \$534,879.77 will be raised by tax levy. This levy, before the \$2.02 tax credit per \$1,000 assessed valuation is figured in, would have required a tax rate of \$38.71 or 94 cents higher than last year's assessment of \$37.77. Both figures are prior to the tax credits.

With the tax credits the overall tax rate increase will amount to 45 cents for this year in the village. The village tax credit for 1970 taxes is \$2.02 per \$1,000 assessed valuation compared with \$1.53 received a year ago. The 49 cents increase in credits from the state also considerably helped establish a more favorable tax rate and lowered the anticipated increase, Martin pointed out.

Property is assessed in the village at about 89 per cent of its equalized value.

The budget was adopted following a public hearing attended by six taxpayers who voiced no objections. Questions asked were how a planned municipal garage will be financed and what are the plans for the sewage treatment plant. Village President Cy Wietor replied that the village had no final figures but the cost of the steel garage is estimated at \$50,000. He said the board has included \$10,000 in the 1970 budget and it is planned to borrow the balance and pay it back over a five-year period. On the sewage question, Wietor answered that plans are to enlarge the disposal plant and work is expected to start in by 1971.

Much time during the long meeting was spent in discussing an adoption of village ordinances, some new and others revised. All will go into effect on Jan. 1, 1970.

Among these, cat owners will be required to obtain a license for such animals five months or older, and it will be unlawful for a cat to run at large. The present ordinance pertains to dogs only.

One new ordinance restricts vehicle parking on the village streets between Nov. 1 and April 1 and is aimed at more efficient snow removal. On odd-numbered days, ve-

hicles must be parked on the odd-numbered sides of the streets, and on even-numbered days they must be parked on even numbered sides of the streets.

Another new ordinance states that any vehicle, licensed or not, which has remained on any street, highway or road within the village limits for more than seven days without written permission of the police chief will be considered abandoned. If the owner is not found, the vehicle will be removed to a storage area for not more than 30 days, and the police department may direct removal and sale of the vehicle.

Also a new ordinance is one that states that it will be unlawful for a person to keep a junked vehicle, described as one that is unlicensed and inoperative, on his property if the vehicle is in public view.

Tom Larsen, local teacher, who also serves as summer recreation director, requested of the board that if there is a sufficient amount of snow to bank a skating rink, the area between the two baseball diamonds be used for skating for young children. He reported that he had permission from school officials and inquired if the village would furnish the water, five large bristled brooms and a garden hose for re-freezing purposes. Larsen said one existing floodlight will be needed, a 9:30 p. m. curfew will be set, it will be an ideal set-up and easily maintained. He has the promised help of youngsters and four adults. The request was granted.

Members of the board also voted to annually place \$50 in the auxiliary police treasury at the request of Police Chief Donald Hlavaty. He said the men help with the parking of cars at the annual picnic, the turkey shoot, and they assist at parades and other special events.

The sale provides in great part funds for its many club and civic projects.

Woman Breaks Leg in Snowmobile Mishap

Jean Smith, 22, of rural Kewaskum suffered a fractured leg in a snowmobile accident Saturday afternoon at approximately 4:40 p. m. at Fillmore. Members of the Newburg fire department rescue squad were called to the scene, gave the victim first aid and removed her to St. Joseph's Community hospital at West Bend.

The first real snowfall of the season on the night before Thanksgiving gave the ever-growing throng of snowmobile enthusiasts their first opportunity to make use of their machines over the weekend. The snow was barely deep enough and much of the snowmobiling was done on bare grass. Rising temperatures melted most of the snow by Sunday.

Much of the local snowmobiling is done at Hon-E-Kor Country club, which is becoming almost as popular in the winter as it is for golfing in the summer. However, many of the more experienced snowmobilers take the Kettle Moraine hiking trails and cross fields on regular trips to New Fane, New Prospect, Long lake and other surrounding places. Many of them form groups for night snowmobiling and it is becoming popular to go out dining weekends via snowmobile as a sport.

Saturday's accident was the first involving a snowmobile in the new season.

PETITIONS CIRCULATED HAVE 731 SIGNATURES

The fate of the proposed Kewaskum swimming pool will be decided by the people of the school district. At a special meeting of the board of education held Monday night, the date of Tuesday, Dec. 16, was set as the date for a special referendum election giving electors of the school district the opportunity to vote on the proposal that an additional \$75,000 be borrowed to finance a pool addition to the high school.

Petitions requesting a referendum on the proposal were circulated throughout the school district and a total of 731 signatures on the petitions were reported on Saturday, Nov. 29, the last day for signing them, according to Richard Theusch, one of those circulating the petitions. The signatures were examined at Monday night's meeting of the board which was open to the public. The petitions had been filed with Jack Jadro, school district clerk.

The petitions required the signatures of 500 electors of the district and had to be filed within 15 days of the board's notice of intent to borrow \$75,000. The notice was published Nov. 14 in the Kewaskum Statesman, the district's legal publication.

Official notice of the special referendum election (which must be published two times before the election) appears on another page of this issue of the Statesman. Voting will take place in the multipurpose room of the high school between 7 a. m. and 8 p. m. on Dec. 16.

The signatures were examined for certification at Monday's meeting of the board. As the necessary 500 signatures were verified, the earliest plausible date for the referendum was set for Tuesday, Dec. 16. This is because referendum notices are required for publication in the Dec. 5 and 12 editions of the Statesman, the official paper.

The borrowing of \$75,000 in additional funds for the project would be for "the purpose of permanent improvements of lands, specifically the construction of an enclosure attached to the existing high school building to house a swimming pool as donated by the Kewaskum Kiwanis Foundation, and related facilities, at Kewaskum Community High School."

The pool project would cost an estimated \$310,000 to \$316,000 (after the original construction costs of the \$390,000 plan were reduced from between \$74,000 to \$80,000). The additional funds are required to reach that total.

Delay will be even more costly to the district. The referendum will result in an increase in anticipated costs (between \$2,000 and \$5,000), figuring estimated increased construction costs and the cost of the referendum election.

John Schmitt Of Village Dies

John Schmitt, 74, of 1212 Fond du Lac ave., Kewaskum, passed away Sunday, Nov. 30, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, following an illness of several years.

Mr. Schmitt was born April 10, 1895, in the town of Wayne and resided in the Kewaskum area most of his life. He farmed in the town of Wayne 14 years before moving to Kewaskum in 1943. He was an employee of Regal Ware, Inc. many years before his retirement.

His marriage to Emma Wetzel took place in Illinois on Dec. 19, 1928. She survives, together with one son, Arlyn, and a daughter-in-law of 253 Maple Wynde rd., West Bend; two sisters-in-law, nieces, nephews and other relatives. His parents, Christian and Louise Hassinger Schmitt, one brother, Arthur, and one sister, Amelia Terlinden, preceded him in death.

Deceased was a lifelong member of Peace church in Kewaskum. He served his country in the army during World War I and was a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion, Kewaskum.

Indians Beat Horicon and Cedar Grove

OPEN SCENIC ACTION AT GRAFTON TONIGHT

The Kewaskum Indians won two games in non-conference action the past week, downing Horicon of the Northern Little Ten there last Tuesday night, 63-55, and defeating Cedar Grove at home this Tuesday, 70-60.

After turning the trick in football earlier, the Indians did it again in basketball over arch-rival Horicon. The Marshmen concentrated their defenses on stopping Kewaskum scoring ace Clark Eichstedt, who scored 34 points in his first outing at Plymouth, and succeeded in holding him to six. However, other Indians found the range.

Randy Koth, veteran guard, upset Horicon's strategy by exploding for 23 points and forward Dick Bartel, back on the team after a year's absence, scored 16. Eichstedt, although he had his troubles scoring, led rebounders with 16 recoveries, while Horicon's Jim Sternweis took top scoring honors with 30 points.

The Indians outscored Horicon in every quarter but the third and held a 29-21 advantage at half-time.

Playing at home for the first time Tuesday of this week, Kewaskum had to come from behind to defeat Cedar Grove, 70-60, and up their record in non-conference games to 2-1 (their only loss was at Plymouth in overtime).

Eichstedt, only a junior, led the Indians to victory by finishing up with 21 points and 19 rebounds. Right behind him was Bartel with 20 points and Koth chipped in 14. Cedar Grove, which had led at the half, 33-30, furnished the night's top scorer in Dean TeBeest, who scored 25 points, while Theune and Huenink scored 14 and 13 points respectively.

Thirty-eight personals were called in the contest and Cedar Grove lost two players on fouls. The visitors outpointed Kewaskum in the first two periods but the Indians bounced back to outscore them in the last two quarters. Kewaskum sewed up the win with 21 points in the final

period to only 10 for the losers. With three tune-up games under their belts, the Indians open Scenic Moraine conference play at Grafton tonight (Friday). Grafton, always tough, has been picked as another contender this season, although they lost to West Bend Saturday night.

TOTAL OF 274 DEER REGISTERED IN COUNTY

Many hunters who went up north to get deer during the season which closed Sunday returned empty handed, while hunters who stayed "around home" and hunted in the county area fared much better.

A total of 274 deer were registered in Washington county, an increase of 42 over the 232 taken last year. It appeared that a record proportion kill was in prospect in the county. The excellent results were particularly gratifying considering that the area season was limited to only five days compared to the nine day hunt in northern Wisconsin. Of course, the local season was open to "any deer."
