Kewaskum to Host WIAA Regional Wrestling Tournament and District Basketball Tourney

11 Schools in Classy Mat Meet Here This Weekend, One of Best in State

PORT WASHINGTON, FOND DU LAC, WEST BEND AND CAMPBELLSPORT FAVORED

Kewaskum will be the center of attraction for two of the biggest high school sports events in this section of the state for two coming weekends. This weekend, Feb. 13-14, Kewaskum Community High School will be host to a WIAA Regional wrestling tournament with 11 schools competing, including several of the larger ones in this area, and the weekend of Feb. 27-28, a WIAA District basketball tournament will be held here with four schools participating.

The wrestling regional this Friday evening and all day Saturday here will be one of the topnotch end most crowd-appealing tournaments in eastern Wisconsin. Some of the best teams and individual wrestlers in this area of the state, with Port Washington, Fond du Lac, West Bend and Campbellsport heading the list, will compete in the meet. Some of the local regional winners are expected to advance all the way to the state tournament. People are urged to turn out and see wrestling at its best on the high school level, as good as will be seen in the state meet.

The 11-school field at Kewaskum will likely be led by Port Washington's tough Braveland Conference champs; Fond du Lac's fine third place team in the Fox River Valley; Campbellsport's Scenic Moraine champions, and possibly West Bend, which has several boys with fine records. The 11 schools rounding out the field are: Campbellsport, Cedar Grove, Fond du Lac, Kewaskum, North Fondy, Oostburg, Ozaukee, Port Washington, Plymouth, Random Lake and West Bend.

Port bettered the second place team in the Braveland tourney by 8 to 447 points. The Pirates' three champs were Mark Poull at 123, Len Cucciardi at 145 and Phil Mueller at 155 who went to the state meet last year. Port is rated fourth in the state.

The Kewaskum Indians finished third in the SM conference. Leon Schultz at 185 is 13-1 and he may square off with West Bend's Steve Mertens, who is still undefeated with 22-0 overall, somewhere along the line. Kewaskum's other leaders are Leo Gundrum at 155 (16-1), a conference champ; Ron Theusch at 175, conference runner-up, and Lloyd Laatsch, outstanding heavyweight (14-2-1) who was shaded in the finals. Other possibilities are John Jadro and George Muckerheide. Gundrum was regional runner-up in his sophomore and junior years.

West Bend's chief hopes will rest with undefeated Steve Mertens; George Spaeth (18-3-1) at 175, and Steve Schneider (15-4-3) at 145.

Fond du Lac rated honorable mention in the state. Random Lake won the Central Lakeshore conference championship so there are three conference champs in the

local tournament — Port, Campbellsport and Random Lake.

The Regional schedule of events, as announced by Tournament Manager Ernest Mitchell, are as follows:

Friday, Feb. 13: 3:30 p. m.—First day weigh-in. 4:30 p. m.—Coaches' meeting. 5:30 p. m.—First round and quarterfinals.

Saturday, Feb. 14: 1 p. m.—Second day weigh-in. 2:30 p. m.—Semi-finals. 7 p. m.—Final round.

The first and second place winners in each weight class will advance to the Sectional tournament at Valders the next week, Feb. 20-21.

A record number of 343 schools will be participating in the 1970 wrestling tournament series.

Admission prices for the Regional meet here are: Student season \$1, adult season \$1.25, student single 50 cents, and adult single 75 cents. Tickets will be on sale at the door for all sessions.

MAYVILLE, KEWASKUM PICKED AS FAVORITES

Kewaskum Community High School this year will also host a WIAA District basketball tournament on Friday and Saturday evenings, Feb. 27 and 28. Schools selected to participate in the meet are Campbellsport, Kewaskum, Mayville and North Fond du Lac.

Mayville and Kewaskum are tabbed as pre-tournament favorites. Mayville is the undefeated champion of the Northern Little Ten conference. Kewaskum has clinched a share of the Scenic Moraine conference championship with a 11-1 record. The Indians will probably still be without the services of their top scorer and rebounder, Clark Eichstedt, out with a fractured wrist, for the tournament and this will really hurt their chances. Campbellsport is in sixth place in the Scenic Moraine with a 4-8 record and North Fondy is last in the same conference with 0-12.

Tickets for the tourney will go on sale from 7 to 8 p. m. on Tuesday, Feb. 17, at the high school office. Ticket prices will be: Student season \$1.25, adult season \$2.00, student single \$1.00, adult single \$1.25.

Congressman William A. Steiger informed the Kewaskum Statesman in a telegram that he was notified this week by the U. S. Post Office Department that additional postal service is scheduled for 54 Sixth District communities, including Kewaskum.

Under the new program, persons living more than a quarter mile and less than half a mile from post offices that do not have city delivery are now eligible to receive the delivery at home. Previously, they have been required to go to the post office for their mail.

PARENTS TO REGISTER CHILDREN AT SCHOOLS

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of either prospective kindergarten pupils or beginning first graders who have not attended kindergarten in the Kewaskum school district will be held during the day on Tuesday, Feb. 17, and Wednesday, Feb. 18, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon, and 1 to 3 p. m. in the Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school in your area. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1970, and for first grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1970. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to get the necessary health forms. If you know of any new families in this district, please pass this information on to them.





Both wins at home were comparatively easy ones over second division clubs. Last Friday Kewaskum defeated Campbellsport by 24 points, 66-42, and Tuesday the Indians trounced winless North Fondy by 23 points, 76-53. Both contests were won without the services of junior ace Clark Eichstedt, out for the season with a wrist fracture, and the team looked sharp without him in both games, although his help is greatly missed.

Coach Walt Bade credited his defense for the Indians' handy win over the Campbellsport Cougars (formerly known as the Bells). The Cougars scored only four points the first quarter and were starved out with only 16 baskets in the game. Kewaskum led at the quarter, 14-4, at halftime 30-19, and at the third quarter's end, 47-30.

Dick Bartelt, now one of the top scorers in the conference replacing the sidelined Eichstedt, and Tony Butschlick furnished the scoring punch for the winners with 20 and 18 points respectively. Steve Stern again was tough on the boards. Sophomore Dennis Pieper led the losers with 20 points.

In their win over North Fondy, in which the Indians planted one foot in the door, Tuesday they hit 28 of 65 for 43 per cent. Bartelt again led the way with 21 points and Butschlick was close behind again with 17. Stern contributed 12 points, while Randy Koth scored 9 points as did Clark Eichstedt's sophomore brother, Glen, who got into the game long enough to score 9. Koth played only part of the contest after a bout with the flu. Kewaskum was really crippled for the game with Clark Eichstedt out, Koth ill and junior Bob Mertz sidelined with an elbow injury. Still the Indians won big.

It was another long night for the Orioles, who were sub-par from both the field (22 of 80 for 27 per cent) and the free-throw line (9 of 20 for 45 per cent). Tim Nelson, a recent addition from the Oriole junior varsity, led the visitors with 18 points, while Dave Boelter chipped in with 12 and had a fine night on the boards.

Losing coach Virgil Noordyk of North Fondy had nothing but praise for the Indians saying, "They're a well-balanced team and showed some excellent shooting from the outside against us."

Tonight (Friday) Kewaskum travels to Germantown to face seventh place Washington High (2-10). The Warhawks gave the Indians some trouble in their first outing here and it is hoped the Indians

will be over their aches and pains enough to clinch the undisputed title.

New Rubella Vaccine Can Wipe Out A Major Cause of Birth Defects

If the new rubella vaccine is given widest use, it can eradicate German measles as a prime cause of birth defects within five years.

The National Foundation, whose goal is prevention of birth defects, has launched educational programs to increase public and professional understanding of the need for mass vaccination of children.

Inevitably the question arises: Why vaccinate youngsters if damage or death in the womb strike with devastating impact in early pregnancy? The answer is quite simple. Small children, between kindergarten and second grade, are the most likely carriers of the disease. They can transmit it easily to their mothers or the mothers of friends. If children are made immune to rubella, they will not be able to pass it on to women of child-bearing age.

Epidemic Predicted
Rubella can spread in epidemic proportions, as it did in 1964-65, with tragic results. Some 50,000 babies were handicapped or destroyed throughout the country. The figure includes about 30,000 fetal deaths and 20,000 live-born babies who must endure life-long birth defects.

Rubella epidemics usually strike in cycles of six to nine years. Many medical authorities fear another destructive wave next spring. Fortunately, in major metropolitan areas, about 90 per cent of women in childbearing years are immune because of early exposure to German measles. On the other hand, fewer women in rural areas catch the disease when they are children.

To prevent future waves of rubella-damaged babies, the March of Dimes has urged federal aid in supplying sufficient vaccine. A realistic initial program to immunize 75 per cent of the target group of children will require 42 million doses. Since only about half of these children are likely to be inoculated by private physicians, government financing of vaccine for the others is vital for effective protection.

Our educational efforts also take aim at two confusing points.

• The vaccine for rubeola (regular measles) will not protect against rubella (German measles).

• Boys catch rubella and carry it home. It is true that they will never be mothers, but if they spread the disease to women, the effects can be disastrous.

Danger to Women

The most severe damage generally occurs during the first three months of pregnancy. Because the symptoms can be so mild, a woman may never be aware that she has been infected.

Furthermore, for at least the first month, a woman rarely suspects she is pregnant. No one knows whether the live virus in the vaccine can cross the placenta as does the natural rubella virus, and endanger the embryo. For this reason, medical authorities warn against inoculation of women or girls beyond the age of 11.

Educational Campaign

There is a great need for public awareness about the life-saving benefits of the rubella vaccine, and for public action. We would like to see

premarital blood tests also used for checking immunity against rubella and Rh blood types. To encourage maximum use of the vaccine, 3,000 March of Dimes chapters are working closely on educational projects with local health departments and medical societies.

The day the vaccine was licensed by the federal government, we sent copies of a definitive article by National Foundation grantee, Dr. Louis Z. Cooper, entitled: "Rubella: A Preventable Cause of Birth Defects," to 145,000 physicians and other medical professionals. We also are distributing millions of educational flyers.

Since 1958, the year we launched our fight to prevent birth defects, we have supported research into ways of overcoming the rubella menace.

Much of what is known about the persistence of rubella virus in newborns and their mothers is the result of a research project undertaken by Dr. Cooper and his associate, Dr. Saul Krugman, at the New York University Medical Center. Dr. Krugman also is advisor to the U.S. Public Health Service on rubella vaccination.

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
