## Donors Needed For Blood Bank Here on May 6

GOAL OF 150 PINTS HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED

Officials of the Kewaskum Community Blood Bank report several former donors have not as yet called for their reservation for the blood bank to be held at the Kewaskum High School on Wednesday, May 6.

Since donor records are needed the day of the clinic, names of potential donors must be obtained in advance.

First time donors are especially needed and urged to call for appointments. Anyone over 18 and under 61 years of age is eligible to donate.

A Milwaukee Blood Center unit will take donations at the school between 1 and 6:30 p. m. Donors with appointments are asked to come in at the time given them.

Refreshments will be served by members of the St. Lucas Lutheran Church.

Area residents are urged to make their appointments as soon as possible to assure the success of the blood bank. A goal of 150 pints has been established.

## Fire Chiefs Hold Quarterly Meeting

The Washington County Fire Chiefs Association held their regular quarterly meeting at the West Bend Fire Station Thursday night April 23.

The County Chiefs Association strongly urges all citizens of the county to properly display their assigned house numbers. This means that, when visible from the road, numbers should be attached in a prominent position on the house. If the house is over 100 feet from the roadway then the number should be displayed at the driveway near the road. This number together with the name of the road or street, will simplify the arrival of emergency equipment when called to the home.

This number is also a permanent part of your street address and should be used with the name of your postal station when mailing letters or parcels.

The Washington County Fire Chiefs Association urges all county residents to be especially careful in this dry period when burning dry grass or rubbish.

## Ficklers to Pay Tribute to War Prisoners at D. C.

Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Fickler and son Gary of Kewaskum left for Washington, D. C. for a special tribute on Friday, May 1, in Constitution Hall in honor of the American prisoners of war and Americans missing in action in Vietnam.

Capt. E. James Fickler, USMC, oldest son of the Ficklers, disappeared 15 months ago on a nighttime mission over North Vietnam. The Ficklers have not heard word since from the Hanoi government.

In addition to the special tribute at Washington, D. C., Americans are being asked to pray for the missing men on Sunday, May 3, Mrs. Fickler reported.

She said that while names of some prisoners had been released by Hanoi through anti-war groups in this country, very little new information had been obtained because the released names had already been known to the prisoners.

The special tributes was announced on the Senate floor last week by Sen. Robert Dole (R-Kan.)

## Open Drive for \$69,700 Boy Scout Camp Near Wautoma

Culminating three years of planning, the Badger Council of Boy Scouts, which serves youths in three counties, has opened a drive to raise \$69,700 for a wilderness campsite near Wautoma.

In the coming weeks a select committee of Scouting leaders in each community in Dodge, Fond du Lac, and Washinton counties will contact industries, businesses, parents of Cubs, Boy Scouts, Explorers, and Sea Scouts and other possible donors for contributions.

The campsite, now owned by the Chicago Area Council of Boy Scouts, has 200 acres, an eight acre lake, thousands of trees, several large buildings and 17 cabins. What is known as Camp Merriam is 7.5 miles west of Wautoma.

Directing the campaign is Burton C. Peters of Fond du Lac, Badger Council finance chairman. He announced to a group of Scouting leaders meeting at Beaver Dam this week to kick-off the drive, that the council hoped to raise \$36,700 from industry and trust funds, \$16,500 from special gifts and \$16,500 from the parents of boys in scouting.

This week each parent will receive a letter from his son's cubmaster, scoutmaster, explorer post advisors, or sea scout skipper explaining the need for the wilderness campsite. The appeal points out that each \$5 contribution will purchase one inch of sandy beach shoreline on Lake Virginia. The camp property surrounds the lake.

Badger Council will continue to operate Camp Shaginappi on the east shore of Lake Winnebago for "short-term" or weekend camping.

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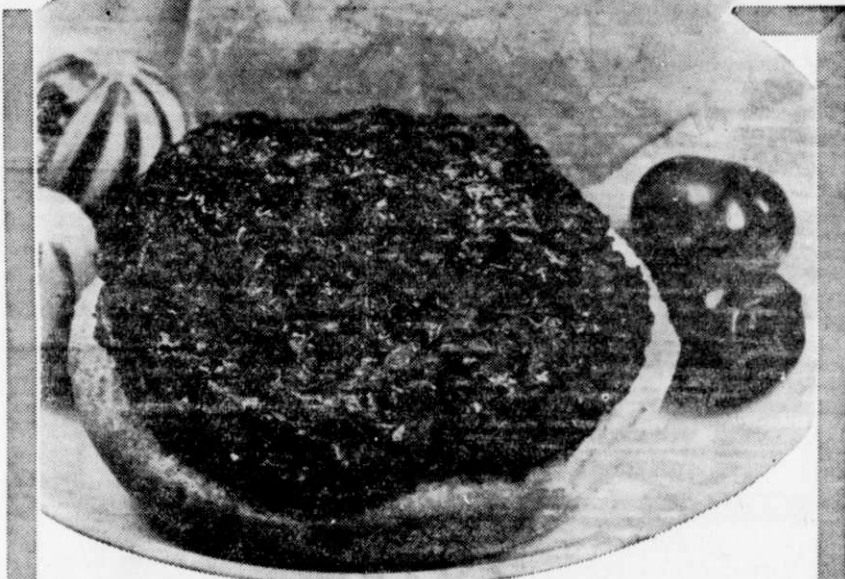
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**VILLAGE BOARD MINUTES**

**Resolution Commending Indians' Scenic Moraine Basketball Champions Adopted**

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session at 8:00 p. m. in the Council Room of the Municipal Building with President Wietor presiding and all Board Members present.

The minutes of the meetings of March 2nd, 16th and 23rd were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Yoost, seconded by Trustee Behnke and duly carried.

The Board authorized the purchase of a 4th of July fireworks display from the Spielbauer Fireworks Co., Green Bay at a cost of \$480.00. Motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee HERRIGES and duly carried.

The Board authorized the installation of three (3) electric door operators for the Fire Station from Minz Supply at a cost of \$635.00. Motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried.

The application of Earl Schroeder for a bartender's license was approved upon motion by Trustee Behnke, seconded by Trustee HERRIGES and duly carried and the commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

Village Engineer Jim Elders reported on a group of used sewage lift stations which were for sale by the Village of Menomonee Falls at a cost of approximately 70% of new price.

The firm of Stone and Robinson was authorized to make a comprehensive study of future sewer line grades in the Bel-Ric Rustic Timbers subdivisions and surrounding area. Motion by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee HERRIGES and duly carried.

Civil Defense Director Marvin Martin reported on the recent Governor's Disaster Conference he attended at Madison.

The Board discussed the possibility of joining the Wisconsin Institute of Municipal and County Employers. Proposal was tabled.

The Board authorized the purchase of a chlorinator (one ton unit) for the sewage treatment plant at a cost of \$1112.00 upon motion by Trustee Yoost, seconded by Trustee HERRIGES and duly carried.

### WHY IS A HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY NECESSARY

What is a library? Why is a library a necessary part of the school? A library is an area, given over to a collection of print and non print materials. The library is necessary to develop, to expand, to relax an individual in his search for knowledge.

The library offers materials in scientific fields, all periods of history, great works in literature, biographies, autobiographies, encyclopedias, current and past issues of periodicals for the student involved in research.

The library offers micro-film of various periodicals. Tapes are provided by the Science Department

in some subject areas to enable students to pick up a missed lecture or to serve as a review. Current periodicals are available, as well as a variety of newspapers, both of which give students a view of what is happening locally and on the national and international scenes, Washington D. C., Laos, Cuba, Ireland. These current sources not only inform but often force the student to rationally think, then form an opinion of the world he lives in.

Perhaps the most important role of the library is relaxation. Every student needs to relax, to escape from reality. The library can take you to every corner of the world, to another galaxy, deep below the crust of the earth, into the twenty-first century or to first civilization. Through imagination any journey is possible; any wish can be fulfilled by using your mind and the library.
