## Proposed Building Needs in School District Would Cost Over \$3 Million

PLANS INCLUDE HIGH SCHOOL EXPANSION AT A COST OF \$2,385,217

A cost survey totaling \$3,009,183 for proposed building needs in the Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 was presented to the Board of Education Tuesday night by Jack Fieweger and Clint Mochon of the architectural firm of Schutte-Mochon.

It was pointed out that if bid within the next six to eight months, the figures would be "safe and maximum" ones for a referendum.

Included in the plans are a proposed 7,770 square foot addition to the Wayne Elementary School at a cost of \$186,247; a 7,186 square foot addition to the Farmington Elementary School at a cost of \$157,219 and 104,090 square feet of expansion at the Kewaskum High School at a cost of \$2,385,217.

Also included in the total is an alternate bid on a swimming pool at a cost of \$280,500. The total project cost, without the pool, amounts to \$2,728,683. The cost summary was based on schematic sketches which board members viewed at their May 12 meeting.

The open concept educational center type of plan will be used rather than the conventional, four-walled classroom. Included in the projects costs are building costs, utilities, fixed equipment, site work, architectural fees and a contingency fund. A report on recent soil borings on the Kewaskum High School site has not been received.

The board asked the architects for drawings, showing elevations, for a July 13 board meeting.

## Burglars Get \$100 in Break-In At Hon-E-Kor

Burglars broke into the Hon-E-Kor Country Club, Kewaskum, early Saturday morning and escaped with slightly over \$100 in change and paper money.

It is believed the burglary took place sometime between 2:30 a. m., when Mr. and Mrs. Bud Korth, proprietors, left the place after locking up the tavern, and 4 a. m., when Moe Mariucci, groundskeeper, reported for work on the golf course.

Entrance to the place was gained through a window on the south side of the building. The windows are high off the ground and apparently one of the burglars stood on an empty oil drum which was near the window and was boosted up by a companion. After getting inside the burglar opened a door leading to the porch on the east side of the barroom and left his accomplice in.

They forced open the cash registers in both the bar and pro shop, removing the change and bills and also obtained an amount of money from a cigar box hidden under the bar. Korth estimated that approximately \$50 was taken from the bar register and the remainder from the pro shop and cigar box. In their search for more money the burglars ransacked the cabinets and coolers under the bar. They also removed all of the whiskey bottles from the shelves and left them on the floor. No whiskey, cigarettes or other stock were taken.

Apparently the men were about to force open the coin box in a pool table when they were scared off either by a cruising police squad car or by Mariucci when he reported for work.

Washington county authorities are investigating the burglary and report that they have possible leads.

## BUSINESSMEN OBJECT TO LOSS OF PARKING SPACES CAUSED BY TRAFFIC SIGNAL

Three members of the Metropolitan Builders Association of Milwaukee along with Robert Kirst, a local realtor, appeared before the Village Board Monday night asking for village sanction of a building project in Bel-Ric Acres under the FHA "235" plan, designed to help moderate income families buy a home. A cost range of \$18,000 to \$20,000 was mentioned.

To keep the cost of each home within the FHA guidelines, the builders said they would like to reduce the size of the lots from the present average of about 100 feet in width to an average 70 to 77 feet, without re-platting.

Only a \$200 down payment is required and interest is subsidized by the federal government. The homes are sold on a priority basis according to the income and needs of each potential buyer. All homes are built without a garage but a garage may be added by the owner later.

The homes would be sold to fully qualified families who have a need but not the wherewithal and would be varied in appearance, the builders pointed out.

Although village board members voiced no apparent objection to the "235" plan, they did object to the present plat being cut up, inasmuch as only two months ago the final plat was accepted from Myron Belger, the subdivider. The matter was referred to the public works committee for study and recommendation.

Also appearing were David Skrentny, Marlin Schneider and Harvey Ramthun, Jr., all of whom

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



HERE FROM NEBRASKA



## High School's Proposed Vocational Education Plan Approved by State

### GRUBER, O'BRIEN MEMBERS OF ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Kewaskum High School has received notification from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction that its proposed plan for the projected development of vocational education in the high school has been approved.

The Vocational Education Plan was also approved by the School Board on Jan. 26, 1970. The plan was submitted to the Department of Public Instruction for its approval. The department has requested each school district in the state of Wisconsin to submit a Long Range Vocational Education Plan to the department.

The Long Range Vocational Education Plan is the result of many meetings of vocational teachers, counselors, and the high school principal. Also consulted were the principal superintendent, experts in the field of vocational education, and many written reports. Especially important was the contribution of the advisory council on vocational education at KHS. It serves as a direct line of communication between vocational education in the high school and the needs of the community.

Members presently serving on the advisory committee are: Jack

Sutton, Personnel Department, Gehl Company; Joseph Gruber, President, Allied Industrial Workers, Kewaskum; Gerald Miller, Office Supervisor, Ziegler Company; Mrs. Carol Miller, Home Economics Department, West Bend Vocational School; Eugene O'Brien, Personnel Manager, Regal Ware.

Included in the plan are: a mission statement, which defines the school's philosophy of education and the immediate and long range goals of vocational education in particular; the administration and supervision of the vocational program; local and community resources; guidance and counseling services available to vocationally oriented students; population projections for 1975; description of the present program; articulation of high school and vocational school programs; a listing of manpower needs; physical

facilities available and projected; and methods of program evaluation.

Obtaining the approval of the Department of Public Instruction for the LRVEP means that in the future, vocational education at Kewaskum will be coordinated with population, manpower needs, student needs, and business needs. Furthermore, the development and improvement of the vocational program will be assured as set forth in the plan.

The plan is available upon request at the high school office.

conduct businesses near the intersection of Fond du Lac Ave. and Main St. where an automatic traffic signal has been approved.

Because the state requires a two-lane entrance on Hwy. 45, installation of such a signal would necessitate giving up some parking spaces ahead of their business places. To this they objected,

stating that customers would have to park at least a block away and "the center of town will be a dead area," if from 11 to 14 parking spaces are lost.

The board presented a map it had drawn up, proposing the loss of only six spaces, but pointed out that the state must approve. The suggestion was made that possibly the sidewalk, which is wider than average at the intersection, could be cut back, allowing more highway space. The matter was referred to committee.

Sue Behnke and Carol Nigh, representing the Kewaskum Community High School student council, asked for and were granted permission for the council to do some cleaning up along the Milwaukee River here on Saturday. They said it was the wish of the council to participate in the project after being criticized for their recent hunger march. "We were told we should do something rather than march," the girls said. The village will provide trucks

and drivers.

The board gave its approval to an ordinance that will change the name of Tower Street to "Reigle Drive" to honor James O. Reigle, retired president of Regal Ware, Inc. The street leads to the manufacturing plant. The suggestion for the name change came from a Regal employee.

It was noted that four out of the five families who had petitioned for curb and gutter on the section of Braatz Drive that lies west of Western Avenue had changed their minds. It was decided to offer the Village of Menomonee Falls the sum of \$1,000 for its own lift station. Original cost about three years ago was listed at \$14,328.

Ten Class B and one Class A liquor licenses were approved. William Martin was given permission to attend the Clerks' and Finance Officers' Conference at Eagle River, June 16-19.

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
