Doris Beimborn Is Merit Scholarship Test Semifinalist

Principal Edward E. Connors has announced that Doris Beimborn, a student at Kewaskum High School, has been named semifinalist in the 1971-72 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The approximately 15,000 semifinalists appointed this week are among the nation's most intellectually talented high school seniors. They will compete for some 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1972.

The semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST), which was given last February to more than 655,000 students in about 16,600 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

The semifinalists are representative of the country's most intellectually able young people, according to Edward C. Smith, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). From this group will come many future leaders in business, industry, and the professions," he said.

"These students bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers, and their communities. The future success of these young people will, however, depend upon their ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels that they are capable of attaining."

Semifinalists must advance to finalist standing to be considered for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded next spring. Semifinalists become finalists by receiving the endorsement of their schools, substantiating their high NMQST performance on a second examination, and providing information about their achievements and interests.

About 96 percent of the semifinalists are expected to become finalists, and each will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships which are allocated by state. Many will also be considered for the renewable four-year Merit Scholarships provided by some 500 corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, professional associations, other organizations, and individuals. Each finalist will receive a Certificate of Merit in recognition of his outstanding performance in the program.

Names of the winners in the 1971-72 Merit Scholarship Program will be announced in the spring of 1972. Some 28,000 students.

Turkey Shoot Is Postponed

Rain and an all-day drizzle caused postponement of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club's annual Turkey Shoot at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday. The event was re-scheduled for this coming Sunday, Sept. 26, at the same time, 9 a. m. to sundown. This was the first time the shoot was postponed in 15 years.

This year's shoot will feature artificial targets instead of live turkeys. For those who purchased advance tickets and will now be unable to use them, all unused tickets will be honored at next year's shoot.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators.

For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots for a dollar on advance sale tickets), the marksman attempts to win a fine frozen turkey for his family's larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

Trout fishing contests are another attraction. They offer fine sport for the pro and amateur alike. The angler keeps the fish he catches.

Trap shooting contests are conducted throughout the day. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events may bring their own shotguns and ammunition. An archery target range and marksmanship contests have been added. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

Daniel Rodenkirch Is Appointed to County Commission

Daniel Rodenkirch, who operates a dairy farm at R. 1, Kewaskum, in the Town of Farmington, was appointed to the County Park and Planning Commission last Wednesday to fill the unexpired term of the late Lee Fickler. The term runs to July 1, 1974.

Local FFA Presents Brats to Gov. Lucey On Aircade Tour

While Wisconsin citizens are celebrating "Wonderful Wisconsin Week," Sept. 19-25, the state's vigorous agribusiness industry was recognized with its own special day Wednesday, Sept. 22.

Preceding the observance of "Wonderful Wisconsin Week" Gov. Patrick Lucey and his group made an aircade tour of various cities in the state for two days last Thursday and Friday. One of the cities visited was Sheboygan, where members of the Kewaskum FFA Chapter and other Section 10 FFA members, along with Roy Esser, FFA advisor of Kewaskum, presented Gov. Lucey with 15 pounds of brats and other sausages on his aircade tour stop.

State Secretary of Agriculture Donald E. Wilkinson points out that the state's agri-economy has grown so strong that an estimated 50% of all jobs held are embraced by it, directly or indirectly. "It is time to recognize this vital contribution to our state's economy," he emphasizes.

The ag secretary explains that few persons, even those directly involved, recognize the impact of agri-business. He says that agriculture and related industry include: Production of food and fiber, provision of supplies and services to such producers, processing of food and fiber to convert it to human use, transportation of these commodities, distribution and marketing, financing, manufacturing, education and many, many more.

Special activities on Agri-Business Day were varied throughout the state, under the direction of State Chairman Bill Kasakaitas, of the State Farm Bureau. These included community market days, Farmer of the Year programs and awards, farm visits and special educational programs in schools.

"I am pleased that Wisconsin agri-business is being recognized with its own day during Wonderful Wisconsin Week, but agri-business should be stressed every day of the year, if we want to enrich this very fundamental segment of Wisconsin's economy," Wilkinson said.

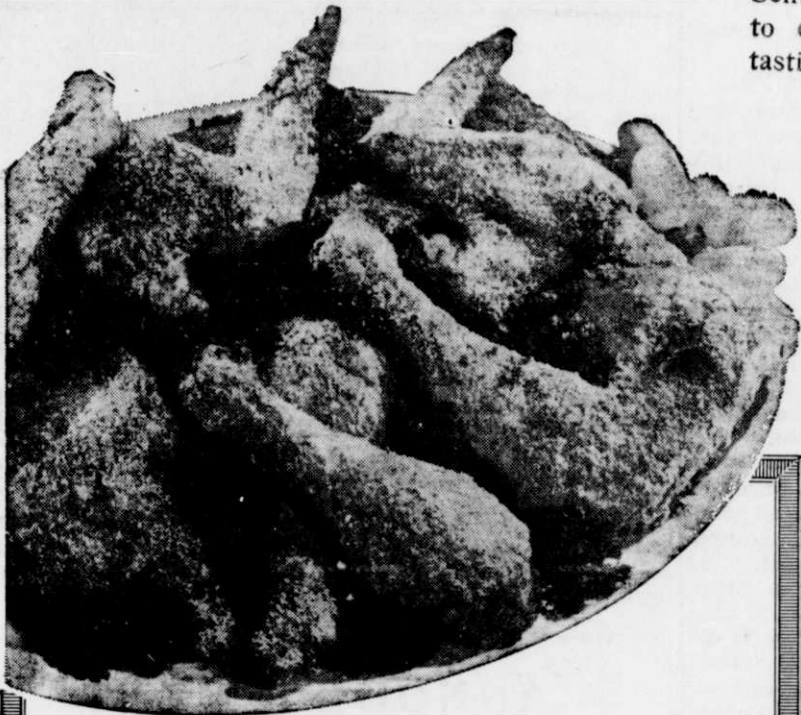

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Indians Blank Germantown in Scenic Opener, 14-0, for 8th Straight Win

The Kewaskum Indians opened play in the Scenic Moraine Conference on the right foot by defeating Germantown on the Warhawks' new football field in a Saturday afternoon game, 14-0. The win was the Indians' second of the season and, adding to the six straight after the Mayville defeat last year, ran their streak to 8 in a row.

The meeting was a showdown between two unbeaten teams and stirred up much fan interest. The Warhawks came into the contest with two victories to their credit, one a 19-0 rout over Hortonville and the second a 7-6 win over West Bend East of the Little Ten in non-conference games. Kewaskum romped over Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference, 48-13, in their opener. The Indians did not have a game scheduled last week and the layoff showed as they had trouble getting going against the Warhawks.

Germantown was far from a pushover. They gave the Indians a tussle and will be tough for their opponents all season. They are also big and Kewaskum can feel relieved to have this one tucked away.

Both quarterbacks, junior Dale Luedtke of Kewaskum and veteran Frank Blau of Germantown, had their problems. Luedtke hit on only 4 of 15 passes and had three bombs intercepted, all of them by Blau, his opponent. Blau made good on 8 of 26 passes and had 4 intercepted. These interceptions quickly changed the complexion of the game but also indicated the strength of the defensive units and good pass coverage by both teams. There was some real hard hitting all through the battle.

Biau started off with the idea of scoring quick by uncorking two long passes on the first series of offensive plays. After the first was incomplete, Jim Gaffke intercepted the second heave and returned it to the Warhawks' 41. After Terry Backhaus made a substantial gain on the first play, Luedtke, with second and one, decided to pass for a possible touchdown and he suffered the same fate by having his pass intercepted.

Germantown then made the first down by bringing the ball to their 40. Blau tried to pass again and this time Ray Hessel managed to intercept on the Warhawk 40. After 8 plays Backhaus pushed it over from the 3. Luedtke passed to Tom Theusch for a 2-point conversion and it was 8-0. The running of Gaffke, who carried 4 times for 35 yards, one of them an 18-yard sprint led to the score.

Following the kickoff, Germantown bounced back. A 26-yard pass and a 15-yard penalty on the Indians helped bring the ball to Kewaskum's 15. Blau went to the air again and Gary Marx came up with an important interception, the 4th of the first quarter. Neither team could get going offensively in the second period and the half ended 8-0.

It was the same story in the defensive third quarter as neither team could come close to scoring. Several minutes into the final period, Blau grabbed off another Kewaskum pass and a 32-yard completion by him put the Warhawks deep into Indian territory. Getting nowhere on the ground, Blau chose to pass again, only to have Kewaskum newcomer Mitch Misko make

the fourth interception.

The Indians immediately went to work. A 33-yard completion to Glen Eichstedt and a 15-yard run by Gafke took the ball to the Warhawks' 7. Germantown held and Kewaskum took over on the 8 and Gaffke scored to make it 14-0. The try for extra point failed.

Coach Joe Harlow had praise for his defensive unit, which shut out Germantown's vaunted pass receivers. Their ace receiver, Jim Geisthardt, was held to one reception. He caught the TD pass that defeated West Bend the week before. Misko and Mitch Ogi put on a good pass rush throughout the game. Gaffke, Marx and Larry Williams also stood out and the Indians held the Warhawks to only 69 yards on the ground, while making 142 rushing themselves. The losers out-gained the Indians in the air, 128 yards to 54 but had 4 intercepted.

In other opening games, all of them played Friday, defending champion Mayville handled Grafton handily, 28-6, Hartland edged Slinger, 7-6, and Kettle Moraine bested Pewaukee, 25-14.

This week Kewaskum again plays away and again on Saturday afternoon at 1:30 at Grafton. The Blackhawks, with veteran Brian Bliese at the reins, gave a big and tough Mayville squad some bad moments last Friday. It should be a hard game with the Indians a slight favorite.

Mike Backhaus of Kewaskum edged out Jerry Ninnman, Dodge, for second place individually and Mike Schultz, also of Dodge, took fourth.

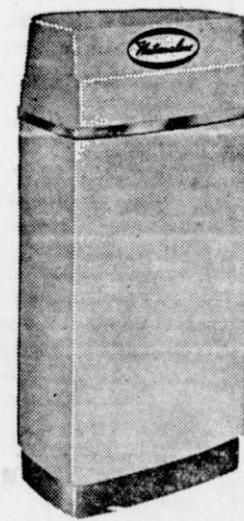
Other finishers for the Indians were Perry Nigh 8th, Kurt Schmidt 7th, Craig Carr 10th, and Rick Butz 19th.
