
All participating in the parade are asked to be at the high school before 9 o'clock. The Legion post chaplain will deliver the address.

Advisory Council Of Local Schools OK's 5-Year Plan

Kewaskum Community Schools' Advisory Council on career and vocational education approved a five-year plan to develop and improve career and vocational education within Kewaskum Community Schools.

The advisory council has met several times a year for the last three school years and has produced a long range vocational education plan approved by the Dept. of Public Instruction during the first year. The last two years were spent working on the five year plan, which will be presented later this month to the school board for final approval.

In introducing new programs in the areas of vocational and career education, the council hopes to provide equal and basic education for those 60 per cent of K.H.S. students who enter the job market immediately upon graduation. The program also establishes a coordinated approach to budget expenditures and new course development.

Jr. Woman's Club Given Awards at State Convention

The Wisconsin Federation of Women's Clubs 75th Anniversary Convention was held May 16-18 at the Pfister Hotel in Milwaukee. Attending on Junior Day, May 17, were Mrs. Otto Ramthun and Mrs. Marvin Perkins (delegates), Mrs. Hugo Straub, Mrs. Norman Kempf, Mrs. LeRoy Keller and Mrs. Norman Gruber.

Speakers for the morning session included Mrs. Harry Wagner, Jr., GFWC recording secretary and Jesse Owens, track immortal and member of Lincoln-Mercury Sports Panel.

Wisconsin Junior Awards were presented following the luncheon. The Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club was 1 of 24 clubs receiving the 1971-72 Diamond Award (100% participation). This award is given those clubs accumulating points in proportion to membership in the departments of conservation, education, fine arts, home life, international affairs and pub-

lic affairs, plus monetary donations to specific national and state projects and convention attendance.

The Kewaskum Juniors were also awarded the certificate for the best over-all work of a club with under 50 members in the International Affairs Department (AFS, UN, CARE, People to People, Project Concern, etc.).

Following the awards presentations, the Wisconsin Ballet Company presented a mini-concert. In its 11 year history, the company has taken full-scale ballet performances to over 150,000 Wisconsin citizens under the direction of Hungarian-born Tibor Zana. Included in the mini-concert was a lecture-demonstration to bring about better understanding and enjoyment of the ballet.

Prior to adjournment of the afternoon session, the entire Wisconsin Junior delegation went on record in opposition to the GFWC proposal to set the age limit for Junior club membership at 35. This record of opposition will be presented by the Wisconsin delegation at the General Federation of Women's Clubs convention at Denver, Colo. June 5-9.

Break 3 Records As Warhawks Win Scenic Track Meet Here; Indians 4th

THEUSCH IN DISCUS ONLY CHAMPION FOR KEWASKUM

Wilbert Henry, one of the top high school sprinters in the state, broke his old record for the 440 yard run and won two other events Friday as Germantown Washington High repeated as champions in the Scenic Moraine track meet held in Kewaskum on a hot day.

It was mainly a two-team meet with Germantown and Kettle Moraine literally running away from the field. The Warhawks squeezed past runner-up Kettle, 67 to 61 1/2. Germantown took the triple crown this year, winning the indoor, the relays and now the conference outdoor.

Henry, Germantown's colored ace, ran the 440 in 49 seconds, clipping 1.1 seconds off his old record. Two other meet records were set. Mark Ardington of Kettle Moraine took a first in the mile run with a record breaking 4:25.8, knocking nearly 10 seconds off the old mark. Larry Krause, Mayville, clipped nine-tenths of a second off the old record with a 1:59 clocking in the 880 yard run for his win.

Tim Wimmens of Kettle was also a triple winner. Henry took the 100, 220 and 440. His younger brother Mike took 3 seconds. Cumblers won his specialty, the high jump and both hurdle events. His 15.1 in the high hurdles tied the conference mark.

Kewaskum, which placed 4th, had a lone champion in the discus, senior Tom Theusch, who heaved the "saucer" just over 130 feet. The Indians' Randy Backhaus, who was expected to be a front-runner in the 2 mile, took 3rd 12 seconds back, even though it was his best time of the year. Larry Krause of Mayville was a double winner. His 1:59 in the 880 was far below his recent 1:54 effort which stands as the best in the state, but he anchored the winning mile relay team to a low 3:30.1.

Sheboygan South won the Regional crown with a 330, edging cross-town rival Sheboygan North by 2 strokes. Kewaskum finished 3rd with 338, Sheboygan Falls 4th with 361, Oostburg 5th with 384, Cedar Grove 6th with 407 and Random Lake 7th with 412.

Backhaus, Theusch Set Records, Qualify For Track Sectional

Ripon High School won its own Regional meet Tuesday evening with 66 points. Kewaskum wound up 4th with 25 points.
