Village Board Awards Contract For 8,500 Feet of Curb, Gutter

Rennhack Construction Co. of Reeseville has been awarded a contract for installing about 8,500 feet of curb and gutter in Kewaskum. The Village Board on Monday night accepted the firm's base bid of \$2.67 per foot which was low among four that were opened on April 16.

The total per foot cost comes to \$3.24 after engineering, legal and contingency fees are added. Most of the curb and gutter will be laid in Bel-Ric Acres subdivision. Cost of the project is to be borne by property owners.

Bids for phosphate removal equipment and an enclosure to house it were opened in the presence of board members preceding the board meeting. They were opened by Charles Strand of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers. Bids will be tabulated and Strand will give his recommendation at a special board meeting at 7 p. m. on May 22.

Bids were asked for on general construction, for equipment to be purchased by the village, and on plumbing, heating, ventilating and electrical work. Of the four bids received from various firms, only one was for general construction. Other firms bid on some of the five equipment items but none bid on all.

The village was ordered by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to remove phosphate from its sewage effluent by Dec. 31, 1972. The village requested, and was granted, an extension to May 15, 1973.

Because of delays in pre-construction operations, another extension was asked for. The DNR granted one to Dec. 31, 1973 provided that temporary phosphate removal facilities are arranged for by May 15. Peter Albers, sewage treatment superintendent said complying with that request should not be a great problem and that temporary facilities will be installed by the May 15 deadline.

Richard Zarling was re-appointed zoning administrator. On recommendation of the finance committee and with board approval, the assessor's salary was raised from \$600 to \$720 per year.

A building permit was approved for Murray Construction Co. to erect a one-family dwelling in Bel-Ric Acres. Two permits were approved conditionally for Jos. Schneider, pending submission to the village of corrected plats. Zoning administrator

Local MIA Father Speaks in Chicago

Edwin Fickler of Kewaskum still feels the government is doing what it can to find the MIAs, although his missing son's name was not among those on the list of returning POWs.

Fickler spoke at a meeting of the League of Families of American Prisoners of War and Missing in Southeast Asia in Chicago Saturday. He told the 100 families that the U.S. hasn't forgotten their missing soldiers. Fickler said, "At least we feel they are doing something. I think the government is doing all they can."

Capt. James E. Fickler, USMC, has been missing in action since 1969. He is a graduate of Kewaskum High School.

However, some others were not optimistic about government efforts. Several returned POWs who spoke to the delegates also had mixed feelings on U.S. attempts to locate the 1,356 lost servicemen.

The director of the Defense Department POW-MIA Task Force, Air Force Brig. Gen. Russel Ogan, told reporters before the meeting that Army recovery teams based at the Joint Casualty Resolution Center in Thailand would begin to visit crash scenes and battle sites this week.

Acker Presented 2nd Scholarship

About \$2,500 in scholarships were presented last Wednesday at the annual awards program for music students at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point.

A large percentage of the funds used in the citations were contributed by Professor Emeritus Susan E. Colman, who taught and was an administrator in teacher education programs at UW-SP from 1931 to 1952.

Five outstanding musicians currently high school seniors who plan to enroll at UW-Stevens Point, were among those named on the program as recipients of \$200 scholarships, also given by Miss Colman. They included Dana Acker, a student at Kewaskum High School.

High school seniors who were honored won their scholarships on their high school academic records plus either their proficiency as a performer or potential of becoming an outstanding teacher.

Recently Acker was also one of nine teenagers who received \$200 scholarships in the first annual UW-Stevens Point Writers' Workshop for Secondary Students. Supt. of Public Works Armin Oppermann was directed to meet with the public works committee to go over proposed plans for blacktopping of streets in six areas. Board Discusses Entrance Age for Kindergarten

Entrance age for kindergarten students was one of the topics of discussion at the Monday evening, April 30, Board of Education meeting. A first reading of a new policy was made and a brief discussion held. The new policy would change from Sept. 1 to Dec. 1 the date by which a child must reach five years of age to enter kindergarten. This change is being made to conform to a Supreme Court ruling in the matter.

A request by the local baseball team to put up temporary outfield fences for their games was approved on a unanimous

vote. May 10 at 8 p. m. was set for a special board meeting to review and decide on the acceptance of a bid on the \$1,600,000 promissory note issue. The May 28 meeting, which would fall on Memorial Day, was scheduled instead for Tuesday, May 29.

Approval was given to hire David Drexler for industrial arts and assistant football and wrestling coach. This is an additional industrial arts position authorized earlier by the board.

A question concerning the pay for those taking the school census was tabled pending a survey of schools in the area.

Discussion was held concerning the possibility of delaying the deadline date for submitting building proposals. The reason for considering a delay was the difficulty in getting soil tests made within a reasonable length of time. These are necessary for developing firm prices. No final decision was made on the question.

A preliminary budget was presented for consideration. Of the budget items, the Board approved purchasing school supplies and A/V equipment which had been bid, the purchase of a mower for Wayne, and a curriculum study program to develop a continuous progress math program. Teachers from the local staff would be hired to develop the program. The implementation of this program would depend upon availability of teachers to work during the summer.

The meeting was adjourned to executive session to discuss personnel salary questions.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in the Council Room of the Municipal Building in special session called by President Wieter.

President Wieter presided and all Board Members were present.

The main purpose of the meeting was to discuss with the officials of the Town of Kewaskum the proposed 1973 fire fighting contract between the village and the town.

Present for the Town of Kewaskum were Chairman Carl Meilahn, Supervisor Jerome Herriges, Supervisor Arnold Amerling, Clerk Alfred Seefeldt and William Hickman, attorney for the town.

Present for the Kewaskum Fire Department were Chief Armin Oppermann, Assistant Chief August Bilgo, Jr. and Captain Richard Boden.

Chief Oppermann explained how the Fire Department operates and how "out of the village" fire calls are handled.

President Wieter explained that the fire contract fee was computed as one mill upon the equalized valuation of the town.

The Town of Kewaskum proposed that the village and the town be established as a fire district and that the cost of

maintaining the fire department be prorated to each municipality according to the percentage of fires in each municipality during the course of the year.

The village replied that since the village owned the fire station and all of the fire equipment, the establishing of a fire district under the terms proposed would not be fair to the residents of the village.

The town officials were informed that the village would not deviate from its present contract terms.

The owners of the Z & R Subdivision requested that the village order for them the materials necessary for the sewer and water mains and laterals in the subdivision. The cost of the materials to be billed to the subdividers.
