## 342 Swim Passes Already Sold

### Board Expresses Dissatisfaction With New Sludge Conditioner

Dissatisfaction with the new sludge conditioner at the sewage treatment plant was expressed by the Kewaskum Village Board at its Monday night meeting.

Pete Albers, Superintendent of Wastewater Treatment, informed the board that the sludge dewatering device which was started up on May 19 had already broken down several times and only three days of operation could be accomplished.

The equipment is from the Permutit Company of Morton Grove, Illinois, and according to the contract, the village must be satisfied with its performance over a 100 day period.

Albers reported that already the teeth on some zippers which hold a screen on the equipment had become detached. He also said there were already difficulties getting the equipment replaced. Certain screens for this particular machine were no longer in stock.

Albers also felt the man from the company who was to assist in getting the machine initially operable was not qualified. He stated that the person insisted on adding polymer, which is quite expensive, to the sludge instead of speeding up the machine. Albers noted that another start-up man who came with a pilot unit was able to get better results and explained different methods and why they had to be tried.

As for the dewatering performance, Albers said only one truck load had been produced. Sludge may be adequately dried for a while and then turn more liquid.

The board also felt that if this type of service and performance were any indication of things to

come, a second look should be taken at the actual purchase of the machine. The village has not paid any money to the company and will not do so until the equipment is operating according to specifications set by the village engineers. The finance committee did not approve one bill from Permutit for \$29,335 at this session. Albers also refused to sign the bill. The board eventually moved to send a letter and make a phone call to the company demanding that the machine be made operable by a qualified person within a few days.

Bids were opened for asphaltting certain village streets over the summer. Payne and Dolan of Waukesha was awarded the contract with unit prices of \$18.79 per ton of asphalt and \$.95 per gallon for "tack coat" - a kind of tar glue between the old and new layers. The total bid was \$25,377. Three other bids were received from Scott Construction of Lake Delton with a total of \$26,975, Ram Construction of Byron with a total of \$27,300, and Reliance Construction of Sheboygan with a total of \$29,856. Supt. of Public Works Augie Bilgo also preferred the low bidder because they have done the work satisfactorily in the past.

A flag was presented to President Stollenwerk by Clayton Stautz, Wes Kuehl and Marilyn Haug of the Robert G. Romaine Legion Post. Stollenwerk in turn presented the flag to Evangeline Teeselink for use at the library. He thanked the Legion for its donation.

Liquor store licenses were granted to Sylvester Keller of Uptown Liquor and Mike Coulter of Coulter's Liquor Mart for the period from July 1, 1980 to June 30, 1981. Liquor licenses were also granted to Ken Bon-





Carl Spoeth, Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee, reported that some 342 swim passes have already been sold - almost double last year's number. The only remaining chances to get a season pass and ID card will be from 9-3 on June 7 and from 9-12 on June 14. Lessons will be held from 10-1 on weekdays starting June 16. Each instructor has six classes, averaging eight kiddies each.

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

The U.S. Environmental Agency monitored meeting rooms where smoking was permitted and found that non-smoker's lungs registered four times the normal monoxide levels although they had not touched a cigarette. [Monoxide levels of 8 parts per million, compared with 2 ppm. in rooms where smoking was banned.]  
The 8 ppm. of monoxide in the lungs of non-smokers was the equivalent of smoking 4 or 5 cigarettes - enough to produce a dull headache, tired feeling, and perhaps a non-smoker's cough among those present.



Through this model project, the Cedar Lake Home Campus will be developing a series of educational seminars for relatives who have family members in extended care facilities.


It will begin a family welcome friend program, and encourage on-going programs to help family members feel more a vital link in the total team of homes for the aging.

**UWWC Offers Course on 'Glacial Heritage'**

Kettles, kames, eskers, drumlins, glacial lake West Bend! People in Washington County live on and travel across these glacial features every day, but do you recognize them for what they are?

Can you tell the difference between an esker and a drumlin? Do you know that a world-famous kame, White Kame, almost a textbook-perfect glacial creation, exists in our geographic backyard? Can you spot the remnant of shoreline of glacial lake West Bend near the radio station on Decorah Road?

These fascinating aspects of the beautiful, northern Kettle Moraine area of southeastern Wisconsin will be studied in a four week course offered this summer at the University of Wisconsin-Washington County in West Bend.

The one credit course, "Glacial Heritage" will be taught by Edwin J. Domisse, Assistant Professor, Department of Geography at UWWC. Classes will be held Monday and Wednesday evenings from 5:15 to 6:55 p.m. in the Main building, room 215, beginning June 16 and concluding July 9.

Registration for "Glacial Heritage" and all of the other summer session classes will be held Wednesday, June 11, in the Main building lobby, from 2 to 4 p.m. and again from 6 to 8 p.m. The fee for one credit is \$28 for Wisconsin residents and \$112 for non-residents.

Prof. Domisse asks that any one interested in taking this course contact him either on campus on the day of registration or by phoning the campus, 338-1161 between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. any weekday. The course is not recommended for anyone who already has extensive knowledge of geology or has

had any of the regular university courses covering this material.

For anyone else who is curious about the distinctive formations left by the last receding glacier, ten thousand years ago, this course promises endless fascination. Teachers, travelers who hope to see Glacier National Park or the Rocky Mountain National Park, and summer residents of the Kettle Moraine will be especially interested.

The subject matter will be divided into two main types of glaciation, Alpine and continental, with the concentration on the characteristics of the continental glaciation of the Kettle Moraine. Prof. Domisse intends to illustrate his lectures with beautiful slides that he has been accumulating for over 15 years. Class members will also spend some time outdoors on the field trip planned as an important part of the course. You will also learn how to recognize features of glacial landscape on topographical maps, in aerial photos, and in the field.

Don't let another summer go by without learning about the unique and beautiful area called the "Kettle Moraine."



TO THE EDITOR:

When President Carter made his recommendations for putting a halt on inflation he made one recommendation that is very disturbing to me. I am referring to his plan to have taxes withheld on individuals' savings account interest and on dividends.

I find this proposal to be unnecessary and harmful to millions of Americans, particularly senior citizens.

Every savings institution is already required to file a Form 1099 which reports the amount of interest earned by those having a savings account. If the

President is truly concerned about making sure no one evades paying taxes on this income why doesn't he simply have the Treasury Department do a better job of monitoring the 1099 Forms?

Another reason for opposing this plan is the great hardship it would place on those living on fixed incomes, most significantly senior citizens. By withholding taxes on interest the government will be limiting the amount of income individuals can earn since their interest will not be compounded. For those on fixed incomes every dollar matters, and this idea would be extremely costly for them. Many who do not pay taxes would be required to file income tax returns simply to get a refund of the money that shouldn't have been taken from them in the first place.

Finally, I question this plan because we are trying to encourage people to save money. Withholding their earnings will not serve as an inducement to save. When I proposed a plan to

exempt the first \$500 of interest income from taxes, I did this to encourage more people to save. With a savings rate of slightly more than 3% the U.S. is not developing the capital necessary for new home construction and purchases, business expansion and modernization with its subsequent new jobs and in general the types of investment that will result in keeping our country a productive and growing society. We need to be encouraging saving, not discouraging it.

The Carter plan is a bad idea and anyone who agrees with me should contact Senators Nelson and Proxmire to urge their opposition to this ill-conceived idea.

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## Indian Track Teams Both Regional Winners

# Girls, Boys Also Qualify for State in Two Events at Sectional

Last Tuesday afternoon the Kewaskum girls' and boys' track teams won both ends of the Class B regional meet they hosted. Seven schools participated in the regional here.

As usual it was a dogfight between Kewaskum and Slinger for first in both ends of the meet. The Indian girls beat the Owls, 108 2/3 to 103 1/3, and the boys won, 101 to 98. The other five teams, Lomira, Horicon, Mayville, Campbellsport and Milwaukee Rufus King finished well behind.

The Owl girls moved to within three points of the Indians going into the last race but as it turned out Kewaskum won the race on the strength of good second and third legs by Barb Wilson and Diane Bremser to win by 5 1/3.

For the boys it was the first regional win in many years. As qualifiers for the sectional, (first, seconds and thirds) the Indians had all three relay units and 11 individuals.

The girls had seven seconds. Their only first was the mile relay unit. Close seconds were recorded by Katie Lightner, 100 meter hurdles, the 800 meter relay, and Julann Zemlicka in the 200, also the 400 relay of Lisa Kempf, Amy Nigh, Sue Bade and Lightner in their best time of 51.9. Slinger had four firsts.

The Indian boys got strong performances from Mike Pettit — a first in the 100 meter in 11.6 and a winning long jump of 19-8 3/4. Pettit also turned in a great anchor in taking the 800 meter relay, along with Joel Herriges, Jeff Decker and Perry Kempf. Steve Beck got a second in the 880 in 2:03.9 and contributed points in the pole vault with his best at 10-6.

Regional qualifiers advanced to the sectional at Kiel Friday, which was held in miserable weather of rain, wind and even some hail. There the Slinger girls turned the tide on Kewaskum by nipping them, 67-60, for first place. Following second place Kewaskum were Lomira, Sheboygan Falls, Mayville, Reedsville, Horicon, Kiel, Valders, Brillion, Milwaukee King and Campbellsport last.

The Indian boys placed fourth in the Kiel sectional with 52 points, behind Sheboygan Falls, Slinger and Horicon. They were followed by Mayville, Kiel, Lomira, Chilton, Random Lake, Milwaukee King, Campbellsport and Valders.

The Kewaskum girls, who have been strong in the relay events all season, qualified two teams for state and just missed sending a third. The Indian 800 meter team upset Horicon, defending state champ, for first place. Team members include Julann Zemlicka, Laurie Wilson, Katie Lightner and Diane Bremser. In the 1600 relay, Laurie Wilson, Barb Wilson, Bremser and Zemlicka also took first place, qualifying for state.

One disappointment for the Indians came in the 800 meter race where Barb Wilson finished second. Barb was the Class B state champ in the event last year. Lisa LaVarda of Lomira beat her with a time of 2:26.2.

In the boys' end of the

sectional Kewaskum's Mike Pettit and Joel Herriges were late for their graduation here that night as they were busy at Kiel qualifying for the state track meet, along with juniors Perry Kempf and Jeff Decker. They are the first Kewaskum boys to qualify for state in several years.

Pettit qualified in the long jump on his final try with a leap of 20-11, one-half inch better than the second place winner. Pettit also was a part of the 800 meter relay team which will go to Madison this weekend after running the event in 1:34.5. Other team members are Herriges, Decker and Kempf.

Pettit's win in the long jump almost didn't happen. After a long delay, the pit contained much water and the event was almost postponed. Indian coach Dave Drexler dug the entire pit out and refilled it so the jumpers were able to compete.

There were also some tough moments for Kewaskum. Pettit missed in the 100 meters by .02 of a second and Julann Zemlicka failed to go to state in the 200 by 1.01 of a second. Another was the disqualification of the boys' mile relay team because Herriges was called for moving after set position was called.
