Developer Asks Variance For Elderly Housing Project

Peter Knaup, developer of the Meadow Creek apartment complex, appeared before the Kewaskum Board of Appeals public hearing Thursday evening.

Knaup asked the Board to approve his request to construct a 25-unit elderly apartment rather than a 12-unit "maximum" building as set forth in the zoning ordinance.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling stated that after reviewing the ordinance and Knaup's request, his recommendation would be to approve the request. Zarling said the complex would contain a total of 37 units. This figure is below the number of units allowable in a unit per acre formula.

Knaup gave a short presentation of the Meadow Creek Apartments. The elderly unit would contain 24 one-bedroom units and one manager's unit. There would be closed security. Proposed electric heating would be controlled by individual thermostats. An emergency cord will be located in both bathroom and bedroom. Pulling this cord will alert the caretaker, central office and emergency medical help to a tenant in trouble.

Regal Ware Recalls 6,800 Percolators

Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, is voluntarily recalling about 6,800 electric percolators which could pose a potential shock hazard.

Routine company testing of the 10-cup percolator indicated the insulation on one of the wires may deteriorate and cause an electrical shock to consumers, according to a Regal spokesman.

After discovering the problem last May, Regal notified the Consumer Product Safety Commission and corrected the defect in the plant, Dave Zoerb, Director of Advertising, said.

About 3,000 of the percolators have been repaired or recalled already, while another 6,800 are either on store shelves, in warehouses or in kitchens, he said.

The voluntary recall includes stainless steel percolators sold by Montgomery Ward and Co. and Sears, Roebuck and Co. with the model number K7591 stamp on the bottom, and J. C. Penney Co. pots with the model number 784-3071 on the bottom.

Zoerb said people with potentially defective percolators may bring them to the Regal office at 1675 Reigle Drive, Kewaskum, or call 626-2121.

A caretaker would be available 24 hours through a two-way radio system. The proposed units will be larger than those in the Meadowbrook Manor in West Bend.

The eight-unit building has two-bedroom units for single parent and handicapped tenants. The four-unit building has two three-bedroom and two two-bedroom units for the handicapped. The handicap units are larger, have lower counter and sink areas and a shower to accommodate wheelchairs.

Knaup said due to the heavy work load, the Wisconsin Housing and Finance Authority had not yet approved the project. Approval was expected by January 31, 1981, in which case construction could begin in spring.

The Board told Knaup they had 30 days to act on his request and would notify him of their decision.

The Board adjourned to closed meeting.

Three Seniors Commended in Merit Program

The principal, Clark A. Pearson, of Kewaskum High School announced that three seniors are being commended for their outstanding performance in the twenty-sixth annual (1980) National Merit Scholarship Program. Letters of Commendation from the school and National Merit Scholarship Corporation, which conducts the competition, will be presented to Doreen Klug, Ken Scott and Patricia Slegler.

More than one million students entered the 1981 Merit Program by taking the PSAT/NMSQT in 1979. About 33,000 of these students throughout the United States will receive a commendation for outstanding test performance. Commended students rank below the level required for Merit Program Semifinalists—the only participants who will continue in the 1981 competition for Merit Scholarships. Nonetheless, Commended students have shown exceptional academic promise by scoring among the top five percent of Merit Program participants.

An officer of the corporation stated that "to be designated a Commended student in the Merit Program is an attainment deserving of public recognition. The continued educational and personal development of such students will benefit the entire nation."

Commended students who requested it have been referred as worthy candidates to admissions and financial aid officers at two higher education institutions of their choice. Village Board Reviews Solid Waste Disposal Site

The major topic at Monday night's Village Board meeting covered the problem of disposing of solid wastes collected from the water treatment plant.

The Board again reviewed the possibility of entering into an agreement with area farmer Roger Neumann. Board member Don Mlodzik stated he was not happy with this answer and felt there must be a better, cheaper solution. He would like to see private individuals haul the sludge and disperse it on their own land. Superintendent Pete Albers stated the solution wasn't that simple. The DNR governs disposal of such wastes and approves how and where such wastes may be dumped due to the chemical contents. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated, out of nine area farms, only one, the Neumann farm, was approved for acceptance of these solid wastes. August Bilgo did not think it advisable to enter into a 5-6 year contract with Neumann. He felt the land could take only so much treatment wastes before it eventually reached capacity. This point could be reached before the Village's contract expired. Also, the DNR could change regulations and stop the village from using the Neumann pit.

Mlodzik suggested looking into a contract with a disposal company, and allowing them to handle the problem of these wastes. Dan Schmidt said he would check this alternative and see what costs would be involved with such a plan. The solid waste decision was tabled.

Chief Hlavaty gave a report on the juvenile vandalism problem. He felt part of the problem was lack of parental supervision. He said it did not affect just one subdivision but the entire village.

In the last three months, the police arrested 56 juveniles for various offenses. Chief Hlavaty stated many of these juveniles were taken home only to find no one there. Hlavaty said about 80% of the parents care, but

about 10% could care less. The chief stated, in some cases, the police were in the home more than the kids. He felt it was just a small group who continued to cause trouble and they were working to improve that situation.

A building permit was granted to developers of the new shopping center. The permit allows for construction of foundations and footings to grade only.

Public Works Chairman Mlodzik informed the Board his committee is still working to solve the sidewalk-bussing problem for Bel-Ric Acres. Dan Schmidt told the Board the state did not object to a route along state land on Highway 45, however, the Department of Transportation would not consider the request for a reduced speed limit on "45" till Minz Supply and the new shopping center were opened.

Dan Schmidt said a notice will be published notifying all sewer and water utilities users that effective November 15, 1980, all outstanding 1980 bills will be assessed a 3% late payment charge. This amount will be



Sponsors for Melissa Ann were Jack and Mary Ellen Collins of Fountain Valley, California.







added to the bills total and placed on the 1980 Tax Roll as part of the Water and Sewer Special Assessment. A request to place stop signs at the east end of Keller and Habeck streets was granted.

Jeff Rohrer told the Board construction has begun on the raft at the Kiwanis Park. Also work on the Nature Trail is progressing.

Three new ordinances were passed.

The first, No. 80-3, Malt Beverage and Intoxicating Liquor Ordinance makes it a civil violation rather than a crime if a minor is ticketed for being in an establishment with such a license or is picked up possessing such beverages.

Ordinance No. 80-4 covers traffic violations or private property. The ordinance allows for citations to be issued in such areas as school grounds and private parking lots. The resolution was requested by the School Board.

A Parking Lot Ordinance No. 80-5, allowing the village to issue permits for overnight parking on the Municipal Lot was adopted. Fees for the stall rental would be \$5.00 per month. Parking hours would be the same as the Winter Street Parking ordinance.

The Board then adjourned to closed session.

Indians Are Bombed by Speedy Chilton Team, 40-0

Things are getting tougher for the Kewaskum football team. After losing to Plymouth by 12 points in their first game and New Holstein by 26 points last week, Chilton romped over them Friday night by 40 points, 40-0, on the Tigers' homecoming.

Chilton scored on three touchdown passes of more than 45 yards and a pair of TD runs over 30 yards. Francis Popp gained 131 yards in 12 carries and Darren Sattler added 79 yards in six carries for the Tigers, who also got five completions in six attempts for 189 yards from quarterback Joe Bolz.

With an explosive offense, Chilton struck from all over the field. Their ace, Popp got the Tigers on the board on their third play from scrimmage after a Kewaskum punt. After carrying for two long gainers, Popp broke through the line and moved to the outside for their first score with the Indians on his heels.

Kewaskum came back with a good drive, moving from their own 28 to Chilton's 31 yard line. Fullback Randy Heberer carried for 24 of the yards and his brother Tim had a 17 yard run. The drive stalled when a sweep lost six yards and then a pass was knocked down.

Chilton scored three times in the second period. The first was on a draw play with Sattler going 33 yards after an Indian fumble recovery on a bad snap from the shotgun formation. The second came on a 46 yard pass play from Bolz to Popp, who took a short pass and raced down the sidelines for the score. Then with less than a minute left, Bolz threw a screen pass to flanker Dan Schwarz, who went for a 63 yard score.

The Indians had another scoring opportunity shortly before halftime. Jim Krahn's 32 yard run moved them deep into Tiger territory. They got a first down and goal from the five after Randy Heberer picked up the first down with a second effort on fourth down. A penalty moved them halfway to the goal line but then two Indian penalties and a 10 yard loss moved them back to the 23. Following another penalty on the Tigers Sattler intercepted a Rick Leitheiser pass to end the threat.

Chilton scored twice more in the second half, one in each quarter, on 61 yard Bolz pass to Hertel and a 21 yard pass from Rieder to Meyers.

The Indians moved to the nine yard line in the third period but fumbled. The rest of the way they tended to their injured as at least five players had to leave the game and both sides made many substitutions.

The going won't get any easier for the Indians this Friday night when they host the

undefeated conference leading, Two Rivers. Two Rivers rolled over highly rated Sheboygan Falls Saturday, 44-13.




