Boltonville's First Fire Chief Celebrates 100th Birthday

Bernard W. "Ben" Wierman, a resident of the Samaritan Home, West Bend, since December 26, 1979, celebrated his 100th birthday at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, where he is a patient.

"Ben," as he is called by the youngest toddler to the oldest of the living, was born in the Town of Lima, Sheboygan County, January 15, 1884.

In 1901, he began teaching in a one room rural school in Addison Center, Washington County, and later in Beechwood, Sheboygan County. He then followed the millwright trade throughout the United States and in Mexico City for two years and then returned to the United States and pursued his trade prior to purchasing the Boltonville Roller Mills on March 10, 1914, which he owned and operated until his retirement in 1956.

He is a charter and honorary

lifetime member of the Plymouth Chapter of the "Knights of Columbus" and in 1983 was awarded a plaque from the Boltonville Fire Department expressing their appreciation for over 50 years as a member of the department.

Ben was on the Boltonville School Board for over 20 years, but was a "behind-the-scenes" politician and many public officials and potential office hopefuls sought his advice and foresight. He had a sixth sense as to future political outcomes.

His wife Anna of 71 years died in 1981, as did his two sons, Giles in 1981 and Richard in 1982. Still living are a brother Frank of Plymouth and a son Felix of Lomira.

Many people came to the hospital to extend their best wishes and he received numerous birthday cards including one from Ronald and Nancy Reagan, however, they probab-

ly had other commitments and could not attend. As one 30-year-old young man so aptly expressed his feelings on his card "to the most admirable man we all know" best expresses everyone's feelings toward Ben.

Kewaskum Nature Trail On Cable TV Friday

The GFWC Kewaskum Jr. Woman's Club nature trail will be highlighted in a 30-minute documentary film entitled "Follow The Trail," to be shown Friday, January 20, at 5:30 p.m. on River Bend Cable-tv, channel 18.

The film, produced by Mrs. Nancy Malvick of the Kewaskum club, is narrated by Cal Stott, retired forester and author of a detailed trail guide, and Bob Lord, natural resources graduate from Stevens Point. Footage includes the September 11 ribbon cutting ceremony and grand opening of the trail in

Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park. Comments by Lord and Stott accompany shots of several stations along the quarter mile trail.

Shown in the walk are many red oak, burr oak, sugar maple, butternut, hickory, and basswood trees found in the park, as well as hi-bush cranberry and gooseberry bushes. The "edge effect" is explained, a large oak tree is measured, and a general history of the area is given.

The nature trail is open to the public in summer and winter during regular park hours.

Blue Squad Light Not Official Until May

At Monday night's Kewaskum Village Board meeting, Trustee Mary Krueger questioned the legal status of the new blue and red lights on the village police car.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt informed the board that while the new lights were not technically legal until May

1st, many communities had begun using them as they put new equipment into operation. Schmidt stated the reason the village had gone to the new lights early was because the new squad car has been put into operation and the red lights from the old squad do not fit the new one. "We could have purchased another set of red lights said Schmidt, but they

Victim of Snowmobile Mishap Dies of Injuries

James C. Aupperle, 22, of 3101 County Trunk D, rural Kewaskum, died Saturday, Jan. 14, at Froedtert Memorial Lutheran Hospital in Milwaukee of injuries received Jan. 8 when his snowmobile rammed a tree in the Town of Auburn.

Aupperle was one of two snowmobilers riding machines along a marked snowmobile trail that runs between Auburn-Ashford Drive and Youth Camp Road in the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County. Sheriff's

officials said Aupperle apparently missed a curve and struck two trees.

He sustained head injuries when he was thrown from his snowmobile, and was brought out of the woods by the Kewaskum Fire Department rescue squad. A companion, Terry Garbish, 24, of Random Lake, found Aupperle when he went back to look for the victim after noticing he was no longer traveling behind him.

Kewaskum Students Participate in Child Identification Project

Over 1,000 Kewaskum students in the Kewaskum School District participated in a fingerprinting program aimed at discouraging child snatching or kidnapping.

In cooperation with the Farmington PTO, Beechwood PTO, Little Whistlers Homemakers Club and Kewaskum

Junior Woman's Club, county law enforcement agencies have visited all the district elementary schools and recorded the prints for each child on a personal identification card which was then sent home to their parents for safekeeping.

In a letter informing parents of the identification project, Washington County Sheriff Clarence Schwartz stated,

"each year several thousand children are snatched or kidnapped. This figure does not include the missing children which may total up to a half million per year." Schwartz noted that fingerprinting can only identify a found child. He also recommended parents keep a current picture of their child with the prints and update it every six months.

would have become invalid in less than 100 days and that would have been \$80.00 wasted."

Schmidt said a public notice had been published in the newspaper notifying the public of the blue light and the notice will be run again as required by law. Schmidt said the same question arose when fire trucks switched to white lights.

The purpose of the blue/red light law is so the public can distinguish police vehicles from ambulances. With the new law each service will run with its own identifying lights. Ambulances will use all red; police will have blue and red, and fire equipment will use white lights.

Public Works Superintendent Augie Bilgo asked for, and received approval to advertise for bids on a new chassis only for the garbage truck and a complete dump truck for snowplowing. Bids on the chassis will be opened February 20th, and dump truck bids on April 2nd. Schmidt told the board money has been budgeted the last three years for the purchase.

The board approved the recommendation of administrative Committee Chairman Dave Nigh that Ms. Colleen Shaw be hired as a secretary for the Municipal Building, at a wage of \$4.50 per hour. Nigh noted that when the secretary begins her job, the position of Police Secretary will be eliminated.

Protection and Public Safety Chairman Howard Laubenstein updated the board on the snowmobile traffic situation in the village. He said he had met with Sno-Chiefs representatives and together, they had worked out a solution. Laubenstein told the board there would be a public meeting on Thursday evening, January 19th, at the Amerahn. He will then report his recommendations to the board at its next meeting on February 6th.

The question of painting some type of logo on the new water tower came up again. Schmidt said he had received a letter from the engineering company saying the village might be unhappy about their decision later as the tower would be very plain. Schmidt said the firm noted what was another \$1,000 when you're spending \$80,000 to \$90,000 for a tower.

Several trustees said they had looked over West Bend's plain towers and found nothing wrong with them. "We're not in dire straits, but I think we should save money wherever we can," said Nigh. The board decided to stay with the motion to drop the

lettering on the new tower. Laubenstein asked whether the village would accept the lettering if someone offered to donate it. The board agreed if such an offer were made it certainly would not be turned down.

Krueger informed the board that because of very limited use of the library on Fridays, the hours would be shortened beginning February 3rd. The new hours will be from 12:00 to 6:00 p.m. Schmidt also noted the library would be closed on January 27 and 28th, so installation work on the new windows can be done.

Installation of the new municipal building windows was scheduled to begin on Tuesday, January 17th.

The firemen were called out again at 2:01 a.m. on Wednesday for this week, Jan. 18, to the Dairyland Seed Co., 3570 Hwy. 45. A fire panel alarm at the Washington County Sheriff's office was activated by a heat sensor in the furnace room. There was no fire. The thermostat did not shut off the furnace causing excessive heat in the furnace room, thus setting off the alarm. There was no damage. Twenty firefighters answered the alarm and were at the scene 45 minutes.

Indians Edge Plymouth, Kiel by 1 Point; Move Up

The Kewaskum Indians narrowly squeaked by with their second conference victory, 63-62, over the Plymouth Panthers last Friday night in Kewaskum. Kewaskum, now 2-3 in conference play, was in command for most of the game, leading from the beginning. For a change, Kewaskum, and not their opponents, had the score and the clock on their side as the final period ran down. The Indians received a fourth quarter scare but even though they were only 15 for 33 from the free throw line, they held on to win with the help of a few breaks. After an impressive first half by the Indians, Plymouth went into the bonus situation with 3:45 left in the third period. This could have, as it has in the past few games, meant doom for Kewaskum, but the Indians

held together with a gusty inside offense, led by Indian Dennis Butz, and kept their lead. Kewaskum's lead became slimmer during that time as Plymouth used free throws to their advantage, but things evened up, as Kewaskum went into the bonus situation as the third period ended. Kewaskum opened up the fourth quarter with a good, but not comfortable, lead of six points. Plymouth's full-court trapping defense looked as though it might begin to work as the Panthers cut the Indian lead to four, but Indian guard Brian Ruplinger wouldn't allow this to happen as he, on three consecutive plays, stole the ball and dribbled the length of the floor for an easy two. Ruplinger's string of three baskets gave Kewaskum a 10 point lead with 3 minutes to go

in the game. The game was far from being over, though, as a combination of sloppy Indian ball handling and Plymouth free throws killed Kewaskum's hopes of coasting to an easy win. After a Kewaskum timeout, the Panthers scored four unanswered points, and with under two minutes to go, the score was 61-58 in Kewaskum's favor. Plymouth then fouled Indian players in hope of getting the ball back. Kewaskum could have put the nail-in-the-coffin then, but the Indians failed to convert on these free throw opportunities, and the Indian advantage became smaller. Free throws by Jim Hanrahan allowed Kewaskum to cling to a one point lead with under 30 seconds remaining. Then, after a Kewaskum turnover the Panthers had a chance of winning the game with 11 seconds left, but Kewaskum got a break when a Plymouth player lost the ball out of bounds with 2 seconds left. All the Indians had to do now was to just waste the last seconds for the win, but instead, the upcourt pass, received by Butz, was turned over to the Panthers with one second to go. Plymouth's last second desperation shot fell short, and the Indians had themselves a victory, 63-62.

Ruplinger led Kewaskum in scoring with 13 points. Hanrahan followed with 12 and eight rebounds, and Jeff Squier finished with 10, 9 of which came in the first half. Plymouth was paced by their center, Rick Meyer, with 19 points and Troy Fritz who had 18 points. The Indian JV's were also victorious, coming from behind to defeat the Panthers, 53-51. Bob Yahr led the JV's in scoring with 15 points with Ron Theusch next with 13. Todd Steger also had a fine game with 8 points.
