Barn a total loss in T. Eden fire

TOWN of EDEN- Fire departments from two area communities responded to a fully engulfed barn fire early Wednesday morning. Despite efforts to save the structure, it along with numerous animals perished in the blaze.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office was notified of the fire at W2561 Sunset Drive on Wednesday, July 6, around 2:01 a.m. The property is owned by Arnold A. Gudex.

Upon arrival of emergency personnel, the barn structure was fully engulfed. The barn was utilized for dairy and poultry operations along with storing hay. It was also attached to feed silos.

Several animals, both cattle and chickens were lost in the fire; however the exact number is not available at press time Wednesday morning.

Fire Departments from Eden and Campbellsport responded along with deputies from the Sheriff's Office.

The cause of the fire is unknown and remains under investigation at this time.

Indians' b-ball team could end season with perfect EWC record

Mother Nature may be all that's stopping Brandon Chapman right now.

Kewaskum's junior catcher in his last two-plus games had two walkoff hits, two home runs and two doubles.

On Tuesday, Chapman lifted a 2-0 pitch over the fence for a solo homer to beat Two Rivers, 4-3, in the seventh inning. In his first at-bat of the second game of the doubleheader, he smacked a two-run homer to give Kewaskum a 2-0 lead.

Lightning was spotted and the game was stopped. Within 30 minutes, the teams and their fans could have used an ark to exit the Kiwanis Park. Plans to finish the game were still

being determined as of Tuesday night.

Last Friday, Chapman hit a single to left misplayed by Plymouth's left fielder, allowing the winning run to score in the ninth inning. It was Chapman's third walkoff hit of this season.

The Indians are 13-0 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, 17-5 overall, headed into the final week of the regular season. They are again flirting with the EWC's first undefeated season a year after going 17-1.

But each game seems to be getting harder. The Indians' once mighty bats capable of 11 runs in one inning have cooled. Pitching has been saving the day.

On Tuesday, Brad Boegel went six innings, whiffed nine and walked two. up 3-1, a couple of errors in the sixth

inning let Two Rivers tie the game. Lucas Kopeschka pitched a scoreless seventh and got the win before Chapman's heroics.

It was a reversal of last Friday, when Boegel relieved Kopeschka, who flirted with perfection and losing in the same game. The senior pitched 5 2/3 of perfect ball before coming a little unglued in the seventh.

Panther Trevor Thiel grounded a single to the left side to start Plymouth's half of the inning, Kopeschka's second hit allowed. He threw wild to try to hold Thiel on first, allowing him to take second.

A bunt moved Thiel to third, and a wild pitch scored him.

Piggly Wiggly to get new electronic sign

Kewaskum's Piggly Wiggly is getting a new, electronic sign to announce sales and store events.

The Plan Commission unanimously approved the new sign last week. Village Board approval is not required.

The 60-square-foot sign will replace the existing one and be moved closer to Highway 45, said Zoning Administrator Chad Cook. The store put up its original sign farther from the road, thinking 45 would be expanded, he said.

Cook said while the existing sign must be manually changed every day, messages on the new one may be switched electronically.

The sign follows village ordinance, Cook said.

Of the sign's 60 square feet, the reader board will cover 20 but Cook said the electronic letters can vary in size so drivers may easily read them.

The Commission passed the plan, 7-0, with little discussion.

Jose is a strong, Hispanic and Caucasian 11-year-old boy who tries to overcome every obstacle given to him. He has had some setbacks in his behavior, but he is an amazing kid who is constantly smiling and laughing.

Jose is in the fourth grade and functions developmentally at the age of a 5- or 6-year-old. He seems to enjoy all of his classes and has an IEP in place to receive speech and language therapy, along with occupational and physical therapy. Jose is deaf and communicates through sign language. He knows about 200 signs and requires an interpreter in the classroom. He struggles with having friends since his classmates don't know sign language and are unable to communicate with him.

Jose also has a seizure disorder and occasionally will fake a seizure, although when he is told to stop by his foster parent, he will stop. He is in need of a family who is able to communicate with him through sign language and has the love, patience and understanding to deal with his special needs. He needs a family who will be able to make a life-long commitment to him, since it's not likely that he will be able to live independently.

Jose has a larger-than-life personality and enjoys watching cartoons and sports on TV. He also enjoys playing soccer and basketball and becomes completely enveloped in whatever he is doing. He is a very determined child who tries his hardest at everything he does.

Jose would benefit the most from a two-parent family. However, if a single parent with the experience and resources were interested, Jose's worker would also consider him or her. He would also benefit if he were the youngest child in the home, and the children in the home did not have sexualized behaviors. Jose's worker would like to keep him in Wisconsin, but if the right family were out of state, the worker would be willing to consider them as a forever family.



Kohler woman seriously injured in Scott crash

TOWN of SCOTT- A 77-year-old Kohler woman was seriously injured last week after a collision between her vehicle and a fully loaded milk tanker at Hwy 28 and Abbot Drive.

The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department was notified of the crash on Thursday, June 30, at 8:33 a.m. Batavia First Responders, Random Lake Ambulance, Random Lake Jaws and Wisconsin State Patrol responded to the scene. Flight for Life was later responded.

A preliminary investigation revealed the milk truck

driven by Scott Reiter of Oostburg was southbound on Highway 28. Jacqueline Hamel, of Kohler, was driving a van westbound on Abbot Road. She drove into the intersection and collided with the milk truck.

Reiter was not injured from the crash. The Wisconsin State Patrol Motor Vehicle Inspection was to conduct an evaluation of the milk truck, findings from that investigation have not been revealed to the media.

Hamel was airlifted to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee. She was still listed in Critical condition on Wednesday morning.





ERVIN G. VAN BEEK

Ervin G. Van Beek, age 95, of West Bend, passed away Wednesday, June 29, 2011 at Cedar Lake Health and Rehabilitation Center in the town of West Bend.

He was born on April 12, 1916 in West Bend to the late Joseph and Anna (nee Sauer) Van Beek.

Ervin attended St. Mary's Grade School and West Bend High School.

Ervin initially was employed at the Barton Washer Company. In 1941, upon receiving a 4-F draft status due to a leg injury suffered during a motorcycle accident, he traveled to Baltimore, MD, where he worked at the Martin Aircraft Plant building B-26 bombers. He tested the first prototype bomb chute used on the B-26's. In 1942, with his father ill, Ervin returned home to work with him at the automobile dealership. His interest in airplanes and flying remained throughout his life, however, next to his family and friends, Ervin's passion in life was motorcycles. He rode them for nine decades, from 1929-2000 and through all of the 48 continental United States.

Ervin was united in marriage to Rosemary Jansen on October 28, 1944 at St. Mary's Immaculate Conception Church.

In 1946, he opened the first new motorcycle dealership in West Bend. He sold and serviced the Harley-Davidson brand as part of Van Beek Motor Company, the local Chrysler-Plymouth franchise, owned by his father, Joseph Van Beek.

When his father passed away in 1953, Ervin and his sister, Lucille continued running the business jointly. In June of 1965, the automobile dealership was discontinued. Ervin concentrated on motorcycle sales and service. He relocated to the former Lithia Brewery Building, renaming the business Van Beek Cycle, Inc. He remained at this location until he retired in 1980. Ervin sold the business to Jim Dricken, who continued operating under Van Beek Cycle until 2000. In addition to Harley-Davidson, he sold and serviced Bridgestone, Triumph, and Suzuki motorcycles.

Ervin was on a first name basis with Arthur Davidson, one of the original four Harley-Davidson founders, in addition to several subsequent CEO's, including former president Bill Davidson Jr. Ervin would often pick up new motorcycles directly from the factory, and invariably, Bill would wave him into his office for a visit. He had a good working relationship with the company through the years. Ervin was deeply moved when Harley-Davidson recognized

his life-long contributions to motorcycling with a framed proclamation and private tour of the Harley-Davidson Museum in Milwaukee on October 11, 2008.

Throughout his many years in business, Ervin's most important goal was good customer service. He would never let a customer go away unhappy. He would do whatever was necessary to satisfy their needs, often at his own expense. It's this business legacy which he was the most proud of during his retirement.

Ervin was a member of St. Mary's Immaculate Conception Parish, the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) in Oshkosh, and the Antique Motorcycle Club. He enjoyed time at his cottage on Long Lake.

He is survived by his two children, Tom (Barbara) Van Beek of West Bend, and Lori (Stan "Whitey") Heisler of Silver Creek; three grandchildren, Greg Van Beek of West Bend, Lynn Bannenberg of Silver Creek, and Kevin (Melissa) Heisler of Batavia; a sister-in-law, Evelyn Jansen of West Bend; two brothers-in-law, Steve Jansen of West Bend and James Jansen of Chicago; other relatives and friends.

He was preceded in death by his parents; wife, Rosemary Van Beek, and a sister, Lucille (William) McCarty.

A Mass of Christian Burial was held on Tuesday, July 5 at 7:00 p.m. at St. Mary's Immaculate Conception Church, West Bend. Rev. John J. Radetsky was the presider. Visitation was at the church on Tuesday from 3:00 p.m. until the time of the mass.

Ervin's relatives, friends, and former customers were invited to bring their motorcycle to the visitation in his honor. Burial took place Wednesday at 10:00 a.m. in St. Mary's Cemetery in the town of Barton.

Jim Mann, Financial Advisor from Ehlers and Associates provided a detailed synopsis on the financial situation in the Tax Increment District #2. To date the TID#2 has approximately \$14 million in value which has generated a \$266,994 tax increment in 2010. The base value for the TID#2 which is not included in the increment value was \$2.9 million. The principal of the debt for TID #2 is due beginning in 2013 with increases each subsequent year. To cover this debt TID #2 will need either more development to generate more increment or contributions from the developer. The \$8 million dollar General Obligation Bond is for twenty years and will need to be paid by 2025 even if the TID#2 is declared distressed and can be extended out until 40 years.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel reported on the progress on resolving the EMT shortage. The most difficult times to cover shifts are during business hours and on weekends. It's required to have one drive and two EMTs before they can respond to a call. In May the shifts were covered due to the requests that have been made for more help. However upcoming retirements and resignations may make it more difficult to cover shifts. Administrator Heiser reviewed the scheduling needs and proposed some possible solutions to the shortfall in EMTs: hire part time EMTs to supplement volunteers, request DPW crew to participate or disband the EMS and contract out to a third party. Discussion included the pros and cons of contracting for ambulance services, the dedicate service that some EMTs are providing, the possible conflicts of having hired employees and volunteers, the desire for additional help just to relieve some of the stress in covering shifts. Action will be taken at an upcoming Village Board meeting.

The Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles provided a detailed report on the part-time park and wastewater treatment plant summer help from

their start of employment on May 17th. Jerry Gilles also presented the DPW annual report. He reported on the certification that is required for the Water Department and Public Works employees and the staff that supports these departments and the functions they carry out. The DPW activities and projects included: hydrant replacement of the old Brother Hydrants, catch basin repairs, the hydrants, turn program, street lighting requirements, long range planning that should be established for the water towers and the issues related with an aging ground storage reservoir.

Administrator Matt Heiser:

1. Announced St. Lucas will be hosting a National Night Out in Kiwanis park on August 2, 2011 from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.
2. Announced the Visioning Session has been scheduled for June 13, 2011.
3. Reported the Kewaskum Chamber is pursuing a grant to install a canoe launch at River Hill Park. Consensus of the Board was to consider the request to install the canoe launch if the funds are acquired.
4. Reported on the actions of other municipalities to pass a resolution that could make employee contributions to their Wisconsin Retirement System pre-tax.
5. No action was taken on the county contract for the high band radio system until some of the language in the contract can be clarified.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the tentative Ward Plan for the Village of Kewaskum. The population for the Village determined by the 2010 Census is 4,004. The Ward Plan for Washington County would then require five wards to be created with a deviation of 300-1000 people per ward. A tentative Ward Plan was presented with the goal of achieving equal population, recognizing common and natural features to draw boundaries, creating compact wards and avoiding odd shapes. Consensus of the Board was to accept the proposed Ward Plan and have the resolution drafted for possible adoption at the next Village Board meeting.

Harry Roecker, Chairperson for the Administrative Committee, reported the bills were recommended for payment. Motion by Norman Kufahl to approve the bills as recommended, second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried.


Indians could end with perfect season in EWC

innings of perfect ball, were down 1-0 and Kopeschka was in line for the loss.

"I was starting to get tired. I haven't really been running that much. I've got to get back in shape again," Kopeschka said.

But this is Kewaskum in an EWC game. The Indians have gone 59-7 in the EWC dating to 2008, sometimes winning in dramatic fashion.

Sure enough, Sam Olla draws a one-out walk, followed by a Boegel walk.

Senior Cody Nuernberg singled to left field to score Olla and Kewaskum tied the game, 1-1.

In the eighth, lefty Mike Schladweiler led off with a line drive single to left. Brett Boegel pinch ran, and took second on an error.

Corey Burdick followed with a single to left, but Boegel was thrown out at the plate, the second time the Indians were pegged out at home. Austin Goeden was thrown out on a Kopeschka single to center in the fifth.

In the meantime, Brad Boegel had relieved Kopeschka with two outs in the seventh and was mowing down the Panthers. In 2 1/3 innings, he whiffed five and only allowed one baserunner on a strikeout pitch that got away from Chapman and allowed a Panther to take first.

In Kewaskum's ninth, Boegel got hit in the head on an 0-2 pitch with one out. Nuernberg walked, and Chapman singled to left. Coach Doug Gonring had the stop sign on for Ethan Vetter, but a misplay of the ball changed his mind. Vetter slowed, then sped up and made it home before the ball did.

Kewaskum again survived, 2-1, after stranding six runners in the first three innings.

"I was just trying to hit the ball," said Chapman, who struck out in the seventh with a chance to win it.

Base running had Gonring concerned. The team didn't run hard last week and against Plymouth, didn't take the extra base when it could have and didn't score from first on a ball

that reached the wall.

"It's a win. I'd rather win and learn something than lose and learn something," he said. "But we've got to understand how to run. Know what the counts are, know what the situations are, when to go, when not to go, how hard they have to play this game. It's a different speed."

Gonring knows his courtesy and pinch runners are young - mostly sophomores - and he expects them to develop.

He said he wanted to leave Kopeschka in as he had a one-hitter going, but he remembered losing a 1-0, eight-inning loss against New Holstein in 2009 when Cody Nuernberg had 19 strikeouts. But Gonring knew Kopeschka was tired.

"Oh man. He did a great job on the mound," he said. "I just could see he was all red in the face."

Despite being pulled before he could get the win, Kopeschka was happy.

"The game was definitely fun, though," he said.

It was another example of Kewaskum's late-inning mentality.

"I think we're just mentally tough. Get all shaken up in the head and everything and just not get all too tense or anything," Kopeschka said.

"We just never want to lose. We never give up. We're just good in the seventh we're a comeback team," said Chapman.

Today, the Indians play at next-door rival Campbellspport (4-9 EWC, 7-10 overall). Friday, they are at New Holstein (4-10, 8-10) and Saturday they host Nicolet and Saturday they host Sheboygan Falls (7-4, 10-5) and on Tuesday play at Two Rivers (5-10, 7-10).

The final regular season game is Thursday against Slinger. Playoff seeds are being released this week.
