Walker survives recall, 85% of voters turn out in Village

The state made history Tuesday as Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker became the only governor in U.S. history to survive a recall effort. In some municipalities Walker on margins of 4-1 and 3-1.

In the Village of Kewaskum, 2,017 of the 2,366 registered voters turned out and cast 1,514 for Gov. Walker and 1,472 votes for Lt. Governor Rebecca Kleefisch. Tom Barrett and Mahlon Mitchell received 492 and 499 votes respectively.

Township of Kewaskum voters cast 520 votes for Gov. Walker and 513 for Lt. Governor Kleefisch. Barrett and Mitchell received 137 and 139 respectively. Clerk Nancy Boden reported a total of 662 ballots cast by the 714 registered voters there. She also noted 59 new registrations.

In the Wayne Township, 1,188 voters turned out from the 1,467 registered voters. They overwhelming gave Gov. Walker their support with 963 votes. Kleefisch received 953. Barrett and Mitchell received 224 and 218 respectively.

KHS agri-science class learns while expanding Community Gardens

A teacher's dream in action. This is reality for Kris Beaver, Kewaskum High School agricultural education and business education instructor. He implemented a project for his agri-science students -- a hands-on activity -- that would not only reinforce their textbook learning, but would also impart the importance of reaching out to those who are less fortunate.

Prior to heading outdoors with his class, Beaver consulted with Master Gardener Bonnie Wenzlaff, coordinator of Kewaskum Community Gardens, regarding the agri-science class enterprise, which began this spring. The class rented two of the 15'-by-20' plots in the gardens, located south of the Kewaskum High School tennis courts, on property the school district owns. All of the produce provided from the potatoes, onions, string beans, broccoli, tomatoes and peas the students planted in April and May in their two plots will be donated

to the Kewaskum Community Pantry. "This project is one of the ways for the students to apply their knowledge of photosynthesis and how plant growth works," Beaver said. "They can see the application of things we talked about in class, such as how the temperature affects plant growth."

The outdoor assignment entailed several aspects. "We opened up one end and pulled the fence back," Beaver noted. "The students doubled the size of the garden. And helping feed those in need is something good for the community."

Chuck Dreher, a member of the school district's maintenance crew, used a sod cutter, on loan from Hon-E-Kor Golf Course, to cut the sod into long strips, so the garden could be expanded. "The kids then cut the sod into 4-foot strips and rolled them," Beaver said.

Student Ryan Elbe brought a roto tiller and tilled the soil throughout all of the plots.

"Then the kids put up a wire fence around the garden and pounded in the fencing, which the district purchased,

and put the gate back," Beaver noted.

Two of the students, Jake Forbes and Lucas Greenwood, made the tomato cages. "The students mulched around the plants, so that there will be very little weeding required," Beaver said.

He has a volunteer crew of a teacher, two students and a parent who will assist with caring for the plants in the students' plots during the summer.

Then in fall, "The students will dig up the potatoes and onions," Beaver said.

Wenzlaff is very grateful for the work the students did. "I'm happy we doubled the size of Kewaskum Community Gardens," she said. "Kris is awesome to work with. And it is great that all the plots have been roto tilled. Otherwise, each person renting a plot is responsible for that."

She provided a brief history of the Gardens, which opened three years ago with six plots, available for rent by area residents. Last year, the garden increased in size to 12 plots, and there



are now 18 full plots and two half plots, all of which are rented. Wenzlaff uses one of the half plots as a demo plot, and donates the produce grown there to the Kewaskum Food Pantry.

In 2009, a group of readers involved with the "Kewaskum Reads" program, sponsored by the Kewaskum Public Library, read a book, a non-fiction narrative, titled, "Animal, Vegetable, Miracle," by Barbara Kingsolver.

The book detailed a rural lifestyle in which families grow their own food and buy only food raised in their own neighborhoods. The book's theme focuses on diversified

farming being at the center of the American diet.

Wenzlaff was among those who read the book. "It was a great book," she said. "A family lives on its own and is self-sustaining. We had a discussion of the book, and wondered what we could do to make something like that happen. The Kewaskum Community Gardens is an outgrowth of that discussion. A lot of people had read the book and wanted to start a community garden. I then got involved as coordinator."

The Washington County Master Gardeners, the organization to which Wenzlaff belongs, have a plot

in the Kewaskum Community Gardens. "Since this project is a core project, we Master Gardeners can donate volunteer hours to the project," Wenzlaff explained. "If people have questions, they can call on us [Master Gardeners] for assistance."

Wenzlaff has completed a master composter course and is hoping to get a composting bin. "People can then bring in their old leaves and items such as watermelon rinds, so that these items can be returned to the soil," she said.

She is encouraged that students are involved with the Kewaskum Community Gardens and learning lifelong skills through their project. Some of Beaver's students expressed their appreciation for learning about gardening and their awareness now of the importance of paying it forward.

Marissa Philippi, a sophomore, said, "I enjoy growing plants for the community and helping others out. The project has taught me to be helpful and to volunteer more often."

"Mr. Beaver has taught the class many great techniques about gardening and helpful information about plants, such as plant diseases," she added. "I like it that the food is going to the Food Pantry to help others out and to be beneficial to people."

Kimberly Elbe, a junior,

said she likes being involved in an outdoor project with the entire class. "I like working with all the plants that are going to produce food for the Food Pantry," she noted. "Being involved taught me that hard work pays off in the end."

"I will be able to use the things I learned in the future," Elbe said. "I feel really good about the food going to the Food Pantry, because the whole class worked really hard to produce the food that will come out of the garden."

In her future, Elbe plans to use what she learned through the gardening project. "I will be able to produce healthier and more stable plants to maybe sell or to start my own business," she said.

Junior Jake Forbes said he enjoys being able to plant the plants and realize that the food produced is going to help those who come to the Food Pantry.

"I learned it may not be fun at first, but the outcome is very nice," he admitted. "And I will be able to use all I learned later in life."

Danielle Rodenkirch, a senior, said she likes being outdoors and weeding the garden. "I learned that having a garden and healthy plants is difficult," she said. "There is a lot of work to having a successful garden."

"I am happy the food is going to the Food Pantry to help someone in need," she added.





Ramthun family to host Breakfast on the Farm

Harold and Eileen Ramthun; Harold's father Harry Ramthun, 91; and Harold's sister Catherine Ramthun are expecting breakfast guests, from 6:30 until 11:30 a.m., on June 9, at their Homestead Acres farm, 2296 Club Lane, in the town of Farmington.

How many guests? Between 4,000 and 5,000 are expected. The seven-member Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee has selected the four-generation Ramthun farm as the site for hosting its 25th annual Washington County Breakfast on the Farm, which is open to the public, with breakfast to be served rain or shine.

The meal features all-you-can-eat pancakes, plus a serving of eggs with ham, applesauce, cheese, milk and coffee. The event also includes a wagon ride to the farm, barn tours, a petting zoo, pedal tractor pull, milk-jug tossing, a simulated cow-milking contest, live music, antique tractor display and a chocolate or strawberry ice-cream sundae or root beer float for \$1.

According to Mike Strupp, a member of The Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee, the annual Breakfast on the Farm event provides an opportunity to educate non-farming neighbors about agriculture. In addition to enjoying the breakfast, guests will be introduced to an up-close exposure of an operating dairy farm, on which 140 cows are milked twice each day.

Strupp noted that proceeds from the breakfast are used to support agriculture education in Washington County. In addition to the annual breakfast, the Committee also helps provide funding for other agricultural youth activities. Some of these are: the Agriculture Adventure Land at the Washington County Fair; the Real Seals promotion, in which those who bring in 25 or more Real Seals to the Washington County Fair receive a \$1 discount on sundaes, purchased at the Farm Bureau food stand; the Washington

County Agriculture Ambassador program, in which Barbara Schulz Kluever, the county's current agriculture ambassador, visits with some 4,500 first through fourth-graders in their classrooms in the county's 23 elementary schools to educate students on topics such as ice-cream making and preparation of foods made with dairy products.

Another program the Committee sponsors is the 4-H window contest, in which 14 of the county's 17 4-H clubs compete for prizes in decorating windows at local businesses.

The Ramthuns are busy making last minute preparations for their guests.

Harold, a 1973 graduate of Kewaskum High School, is grateful their farm was selected for the event. "I think it's good," he said. "It's a good chance for kids to see what a farm is about. Not many people have that opportunity."

As for advance preparations, "All we have to do is make it presentable," he said. "The Washington County Dairy Promotion Committee and their volunteers are doing the rest."

However, "We are doing some clean-up and painting," Harold admitted, adding that the committee will set up two tents, which will be used to seat guests for the breakfast, along with seating in a tractor shed.

Eileen, who is retired, following a 34-year tenure at the B.C. Ziegler Co. in West Bend, and who works alongside her husband in their farm operation, said she is excited about the upcoming event. "It's fun. It's neat," she said.

"We are decorating with a lot of flowers and displays in the tents. We will have two 'Welcome' signs with cows, pigs and roosters on them and a cow planter with flowers on each side of the tents. There will also be milk cans with flowers in them."

In addition, the Ramthuns ordered t-shirts and hats with special inscriptions, "Washington County Breakfast on the Farm," made for their employees and themselves, by LR Trophy & Sportswear in

Kewaskum.

Eileen and Harold's usual routine is to milk their cows at 4 a.m. However, on the day of the breakfast, "We will get up to milk at 2 a.m.," Eileen said.

The Ramthuns' operation is rich in history. John Bahr, Sr., Harold's great-grandfather on his mother's side, emigrated to the United States from Germany in 1880. John met his wife Hedwig here.

The couple established the homestead in the town of Farmington in 1902 -- 110 years ago. The farm was passed down to their son Bernard and his wife Mary Bahr in 1919.

The farm was sold to Harry and Marie (Bernard's daughter) Ramthun, after their marriage in 1945. Harry and Marie worked their 176-acre farm with horses and made many improvements over the years.

In 1998, Harold and Eileen Ramthun, the fourth generation of the family, purchased the farm. They reside in a horse next to the homestead, Harry and Catherine still reside in the homestead. A retired Amity Leather employee of 40 years, Catherine helps out on the farm.

Currently Harold and Eileen own 500 acres and rent an additional 120 acres. They raise corn, oats, and hay -- all of which are used to feed livestock, consisting of 120 cows, milked in a stanchion barn; 120 steers; and 160 calves and replacement heifers.

In 2004, a calf barn was built on the homestead, to house the young heifers and steers. And in 2008, a manure storage facility

was constructed.

In addition to their Homestead Acres, the site of Breakfast on the Farm, the Ramthuns own two other farms in the area. They purchased their first farm, located on Highway 144, in 1983. An addition to the barn and a drive-by bunk feeder were constructed to expand the operation in raising steers.

The couple purchased another farm on Highway 144 in 2010 and have made improvements to the barn since then.

"We would like to thank everyone who attends the 25th annual Breakfast on the Farm," Harold said. "We hope you enjoy your breakfast, the tours and the various activities."

Elementary schools lose three long-term employees to retirement

Classes have ended in the Kewaskum School District this week and that means the last day of school means just that for two elementary school educators and one secretary.

The "pupil-teacher ratio" will decrease for Lora Schreiber next year, from numbers in the mid-20s to one to just one on one.

"I'm going to be spending my first year (of retirement) taking care of my grand daughter, Daisy," Schreiber said about her immediate plans after spending 37 years teaching with the Kewaskum Schools and 39 years in the field of education.

Daisy Schreiber will be a lucky girl, receiving plenty of special attention from someone who knew she wanted to be a teacher since she was seven years old. "My first grade teacher (Ms. Haggdorn) was actually the one who influenced me to become a teacher," Schreiber said. Then there was the matter of a \$200 scholarship that paid for her tuition at a two-year teachers college in Sheboygan Falls.

Later, she finished up her degree at UW-Whitewater.

Schreiber's first job was as a teacher's aide with the Kettle Moraine schools, then after a year she learned there was an opening in Kewaskum.

"(The late) Tom Larsen interviewed me on my birthday, and they hired me," Schreiber said, recalling Larsen being donned in his typical golf shirt and shorts in his Farmington Elementary office.

"I've been in every school (in the district) except the high school, and I even tutored some dyslexic students in the high school," Schreiber went on, noting she finished her career as a fourth grade teacher at Farmington.

Schreiber cites Ann Glisch and Don Potter as personal mentors, along with "all the teacher partners I have worked

with" over the years.

As far as the changes she has seen in education, Schreiber said, "Technology is amazing. The kids come in with a ton of technology."

Another change is all the mandates teachers must respond to. "You have to be on your toes," Schreiber said.

Schreiber is affectionately known as "the keeper of all things" by her fellow teachers, but recently she has been doing a little house cleaning of educational materials she accumulated. "I've been giving them away and taking some home for Daisy. 'I've always enjoyed sharing things with my colleagues,'" she said.

Schreiber also plans to renew interest in some old hobbies. "I'm going to fully plant my garden before July 1," she said, along with scrap booking and helping her husband, Michael, with the paperwork associated with his business.

Lora and Michael are the parents of two grown sons, Ben and Tom.

Concerning what she will miss most in education, Schreiber said, "I'll miss the kids and I'll miss the camaraderie with the staff," she said. Referring to the former, Schreiber said, "I'll miss the kids' faces light up when they catch on to something I was teaching them ... That's something special in teaching."

Mary Krell

We would be remiss in not including Mary Krell among the list of 2012 "retiree grads." Krell played a prominent role in securing smooth operations at two of the district schools, first at KHS (1995 to 2001) and then Farmington Elementary School (2001 to 2012).

Her winning smile often set the tone for a visit to the schools' offices.

Krell grew up in West Bend but married a KHS grad, Ronald Krell. Mary worked as a secretary for eight years at Line Materials in West Bend but became a stay-at-home mom when daughters, Carrie, Krissy and Becky, came along.

When they started school, she got back in the working field and felt she was lucky to have worked alongside, and been mentored, by the late Betty Mertzig and Janet Hogan.

"They were wonderful people," Krell said. They taught me how to work hard ... It was a good team in that office."

"Betty never took a break

except for lunch. She was always at her desk ... Janet, too, indicating it would be hard to count up all the extra free hours these two gave to the district.

Mertzig also gave Krell a wonderful piece of advice when the two worked together. After talking with one of the high school girls, Krell said Mertzig came over to her and said, "You know, those might be the kindest words that kid will hear today ... That always stuck with me."

When Krell moved to Farmington, there were two immediate changes. "I'm taller than most of the kids at the elementary school," she said kiddingly, adding the other change is the hugs she often received from the younger students.

When asked why she decided to retire now, Krell said both she and her husband have lost siblings the last two years. "You never know how many years you have left," she said. "We want to enjoy them."

When asked if she and Ron have traveling plans, Krell said, "Hawaii in January," referring to the fact Carrie is getting married there. And Krissy is getting married in June, so, "We have a lot of happy times ahead."

As far as hobbies are concerned, Krell said, not many "other than (taking) a nap." Krell once enjoyed sewing, knitting and crocheting, and may take them up again. They will take the place of answering the school phone, enrolling

new students, greeting people when they visited the school, giving first aid, and "assisting the teachers any way that I could."

"The hugs from the kids," Krell said, is the thing she will miss most, indicating, "In some ways, it (job as a elementary school secretary) is like being a grandmother," which she hopes will come in handy in the future.

Marilyn Krantz

When she is asked about

her retirement, Marilyn Krantz says, "Now I'm going to Plan B in my life," but when people ask about specifics of that statement, she answers, "I don't know."

After all, when you have been in a pattern of being at a school nearly 10 months of a year by 8 a.m., and spending the majority of your day there, obviously there will be a period of adjustment.

Krantz, who was in the Special Education Department for the past 25 years, does know she has hobbies she will enjoy spending more time on.

"I do gardening, reading and cooking," Krantz said, adding there will also be extra time to spend with her family, including a daughter who is currently in medical school at UW-Madison, a son in the technical college in La Crosse and a daughter who will be a junior at West Bend West High.

For the past 25 years in Kewaskum and five more in other districts before that, Krantz has considered her students as an extended family. "I have enjoyed the time I spent with these kids and their families,"

Krantz, a UW-Eau Claire graduate, taught in every building in the district except the high school. "I was at Farmington, Wayne and the Middle School," finishing up her career at the Kewaskum Elementary School, she said. "I have made a lot of friends over the years in this district."

One major change she has seen in Special Education over the past three decades is the addition of "inclusion" in the program, meaning the students are in a regular classroom with a modified curriculum where they can experience success.

Krantz also volunteered

some of her spare time to serve as the agent manager for Special Olympics in the Kewaskum District for the past 20 years. "I would like to see it continue," she said, indicating she put out the word for a successor at a recent teacher gathering.

"We don't have a real large group," she said, indicating the district offered programs in bowling, basketball skill and track and field and when students have been interested in swimming or gymnastics, they have been welcomed in West Bend's program. "Mary Fiegel (West Bend's agent manager) has been wonderful." "That (to keep the Special Olympics program going) would be my fondest wish," Krantz said.

What Krantz will miss most about teaching is simple. "I think it's the daily contact with the students, and the creativity we can incorporate in their lives."

Krantz's philosophy has been simple and effective: "If you take small steps, you can go a long way."





Incumbent Chairman John Theusch, Clerk Joanne Oneska and Treasurer Ken Ramthun were unopposed. In the Town of Kewaskum, all the incumbents, Chairman George Allmann, Clerk Barbara Hinz, Treasurer Dolores Prost, Supervisors David Dorn and Daniel Stoffel were unopposed. In the Town of Wayne, incumbent Supervisors Leonard Peter and Mark Strobel warded off challengers John Oelhafen and Ronald Panzer. Strobel received 253 votes, Peter 237, Oelhafen 143, and Panzer 52. Incumbent Chairman Carl Hohlweck, Clerk Orville Kern, Treasurer Gerald Schulz and Constable Robert Schulteis were re-elected without opposition.

The Kewaskum High School boys 4x100-meter relay was approximately 35 seconds from a win in the WIAA Division 2 State Track and Field Championships in Saturday's finals.

Just like he had done in the sectionals and the preliminary race on the UW-La Crosse track, senior Eric Perkins had already made up some of the stagger on the first corner and was about 30-40 meters from handing off to Ted Wollner when tragedy struck.

Perkins took another step when he pulled up suddenly and couldn't continue in the race. His hamstring had given way.

"Eric had some extremely bad luck," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said, indicating it was not the left hamstring that had given Perkins trouble during the season but rather the right one that gave way.

All the other three runners, Ted Wollner, Joe Wollner and Jordan Hanson could do was look on in disbelief.

"We were on top of the world Friday," Gosa went on, noting his runners came into the competition "very focused ... very businesslike."

In the prelims, the Indians had taken an early lead in their heat and were never really challenged. Hanson finished with a strong anchor to turn back two other quartets to win with a blazing time of 43 and .20 seconds (43.20), the fastest of all of the 16 teams running in the event.

This didn't mean winning on Saturday would be an automatic because Luxemburg-Casco and West Salem were close with respective times of 43.26 and 43.43, but the Indians had to be the favorite.

"A thing of beauty," is what Gosa called Friday's effort, which broke the school record of 43.34. "Jordan Hanson ran very well," he said. "When we beat Luxemburg-Casco, I was impressed."

As things turned out, Luxemburg-Casco ended up winning in the finals with a time of 42.99, followed by Dodeville-Mineral Point at 43.20.

Joey Wollner had competed in the pole vault on Friday afternoon, clearing 12 feet (12-0) to finish 13th in the event. The winning height of 14-0 was turned in by Preston Perkins of Marinette, and it took a vault of 13-6 to finish in

the top six.

"A bad day," Gosa said. "He got 12 feet, and then his steps weren't right. He's a much better vaulter than that."

Wollner had made 14 feet in practice on Tuesday but was far from duplicating that on Friday.

Kewaskum's Liz Bohn, who attends St. Mary's Springs High School in Fond du Lac, had a great state tournament.

On the opening day, the lanky freshman helped the Ledgers' 4x800 relay smash the existing Division 3 state record with an amazing time of 9:37.64 and did so running in the slower of the two heats.

Bohn also finished sixth in Saturday's final of the 400 meter run. Bohn was clocked in 1:00.34 in the finals, chipping off .40 from her preliminary time of 1:01.14.

Bohn had qualified for state in a third event, the 4x400 relay, but this unit had to settle for ninth place with a time of 4:14.41. This foursome had just one senior runner, so better finishes are probably ahead for them.

Springs finished in a tie for seventh place with Spring Valley. Both teams scored 22 points.


