State of the art facility boasts Linac and CT equipment

New Kraemer Cancer Center to debut July 9

Those suffering from nearly any form of cancer have something positive to look to, a beautiful state-of-art facility to receive their treatments in a variety of ways, close to home. Froedtert Health's Kraemer Cancer Center will open early next month.

The 21,000-square-foot facility, situated on the 143-acre St. Joseph's Hospital campus boasts state-of-the-art medical equipment, technology, furnishings and uplifting art work, is part of the Froedtert & Medical College of Wisconsin Cancer Network. In addition to the Cancer Center on the garden level, the \$18 million Kraemer Cancer Center also includes the 18,000-square-foot Froedtert & The Medical College of Wisconsin Specialty Clinics of the first floor and 18,600 square feet of connecting and shelled-in space on the second floor,

for future growth, with a total of more than 58,000 square feet.

The addition is located on the hospital's west side and connected to the hospital and Froedtert Health Medical Group's West Bend Clinic-South. CG Schmidt Inc. was the general contractor for the project, with Zimmerman Architectural Studios Inc., Milwaukee, serving as project architects. Construction began in April 2011 and was completed last month.

The name of the Kraemer Cancer Center honors its original donors, Alyce and Elmore Kraemer. The center has been housed in leased space at the former hospital site on Oak Street. It will be moved to the new facility, on the weekend of July 7-8. Physicians will begin seeing patients there on July 9.

"Froedtert Health is committed to serving the growing health care needs of West Bend and Washington County," said Cathy Jacobson,

president of Froedtert Health. "By bringing advances in technology, treatments and specialty services, we are able to offer the best of both worlds to our patients -- community-based care with the world-class services of an academic medical center."

The Kraemer Cancer Center will feature advances in treatment and technology, combined with the expertise of Medical College of Wisconsin cancer specialists. One advantage for area residents who have cancer is that they will be able to receive more of their treatments close to home.

Then too, because the Kraemer Cancer Center, part of the Froedtert & The Medical College Cancer Network, patients also have access, when needed, to highly specialized treatments and additional clinical trials, through a connection to the



Fireworks believed to be to blame for cemetery fire



Kewaskum firefighters quickly extinguished a grass fire at the St. Lucas Church Cemetery last Wednesday before it could get out of hand. Officials say the fire started due to fireworks debris. Fire Chief Mark Groeschel reported his department received the call at 11:13 p.m. They responded with an engine and the brush truck and found a small fire just north of the cemetery. "Cause of the fire is under investigation, but some fireworks were found in the burned out area," he stated. No injuries were received by the 22 personnel who responded. "As we all know it is extremely dry. People should refrain from outside burning if at all possible. It does not take much to start grass, and or weeds to burn in these conditions. Fireworks are illegal in the state of Wisconsin and people should refrain from them," Groeschel explained.

Skelton hired as KMS new principal

Kewaskum School District's search for the next middle school principal has come to an end. At the Board of Education Special Meeting held on Monday, June 25, a unanimous vote approved hiring Oshkosh Elementary School principal Julie Skelton.

Skelton, a Campbellsport resident, was chosen from 87 applicants. She will begin as KMS middle school principal on July 1. Skelton states, "I am very excited to get back to a small community."

Skelton began her career at St. Norbert College, but received her Masters and Principal Licensure from Marian University. She began teaching in Random Lake at Our Lady of the Lake Catholic School and later in Oshkosh at Oaklawn Elementary School. For the past two years, she was principal of Jefferson Elementary. Julie also was the English Language Learner (ELL) Coordinator for the Oshkosh School District, which helps children for whom English is a second language.

Besides her work experience, Julie's letters of recommendation and references emphasized her strong leadership qualities including high expectations for teachers, forward thinking and commitment to student support.

One of Julie goals for KMS is to "create a stable and collaborative learning environment for children and staff."

"I look forward to engaging the community and forming partnerships which support one another benefiting the community and the district," Skelton continues. At Jefferson, she helped families find resources and learn how to be more involved with their child's education. She engaged local businesses with involvement in school SAGE (Student Achievement Guarantee in Education) nights/events. She commented that Kewaskum was already doing a great job trying to engage the community.

Integrating new technology into a school's curriculum to increase student achievement is another goal Skelton has for KMS. At Jefferson Elementary, every classroom had Smart boards installed, and computer lab time became technology integration focused. "I am excited to bring this skill set to Kewaskum as they emerge on the technology frontier," she states. "Technology is a passion of mine."

Skelton's contract was decided during closed session at the Board's special meeting. A District official stated her salary would be \$85,000 annually.

Ewald prepares to leave district, Smasal begins July 1

Interim superintendent of schools David Ewald sat through his last meeting on Monday with incoming superintendent Jim Smasal at his side. Smasal begins with the district officially on July 1.

Ewald was recently thanked for his dedicated service to the district at the regular meeting earlier this month.

Ewald came to the district in July 2011 to replace Michael Krumm who retired. Ewald had previously retired from the South Milwaukee School District as their Superintendent. He managed the Kewaskum District three days per week.

Board President Tim

Ramthun, who voted against Ewald's hire, presented him with a plaque, thanking him for his year of service.

"In the beginning there was a little apprehension about how things were going to shake out and over the course of time, in working with Mr. Ewald, we came to understand that we truly found ourselves blessed with this individual who came to our community to do the type of work that he did," Ramthun stated at the meeting.

Ewald read the plaque to those in attendance after being asked to do so by Ramthun who said he would become emotional if he read it.

"I have always felt it to be an honor to be working in a place that is so vital in

creating a positive future for our children, their families and our communities. Kewaskum is one of those truly special places that takes seriously the responsibility that goes along with that potential for good," Ewald stated on Tuesday.

Smasal was given a two-year contract by the district this past March. He was principal of Winneconne High School.

Because the district left the superintendent's salary in the current budget and Ewald was paid significantly less than Krumm, Smasal started working part-time, weekly in the district in April. He has been paid \$7,055 to date for the days he has worked in district prior to July 1.

"I could wait until July 1, but there is so much going on. If I

waited, I would be waiting a year to get acclimated to the district," stated Smasal.

One such example of things he undertook since April was the hiring of the new Middle School Principal.

"Jim exemplified attention to detail, a sense for proper procedure, management discipline with a focus on solutions, and a passion for educational excellence from the moment I met him. He has proven these characteristics to be part of his DNA, which assures not only that we'll be an effective team but also that success is guaranteed. He is a class act and I am more than honored to serve with him," stated Ramthun.

Smasal will receive a

\$125,000 annual salary for 260 days of employment. His fringe benefits include, health insurance or an alternative benefit plan, dental insurance, life insurance, long-term disability insurance, \$2,500 annually in professional development reimbursements, membership in one national and one state organization of his choosing, vacation pay that includes 20-days annually, half the contributions to the Wisconsin Retirement System and mobile phone with telephone service.

Because Smasal is required to live within the district within one year of taking the position, he is entitled to \$3,000 worth of moving expenses.

Citizen help requested in controlling Kewaskum's wild cats

While most of Kewaskum's citizens are sleeping, the population of feral cats in the village is growing. Kewaskum's Chief of Police has brought in the Washington County Humane Society and asking village residents for help.

Feral cats hunt during the night, but some citizens also leave food outside for them encouraging them to stay and breed. The rising number of these cats has left some village residents having to clean up after these cats such as removing cat waste off their property.

Since becoming Chief in February, Tom Bishop has had multiple citizens come up to him about the feral cat problem and heard concerns from a village board meeting. Currently, Parkview Drive and the area to the east are the most impacted. Chief Bishop asks citizens not to feed the feral cats. "They are not domesticated pets," he states, "They are wild animals. That is no different than bringing out food for raccoons."

A wild cat lives approximately 5-9 years and each year can have 3 litters of kittens averaging 4-6 kittens per litter. One cat can potentially produce 18 more cats per year. It is important for citizens to understand how quickly a feral cat population can become a problem.

Jackson had a similar situation in 2007 in the Green Valley Manufactured Home

Community and remedied the situation humanely using the Trap/Neuter/Release (TNR) Program offered by the Washington County Humane Society (WCHS) on Hwy 60. Chief Jed Dolnick of Jackson states the program was "seamless" and "definitely solved the problem." According to Marnie Brown, Executive Director of WHCS, from 2007-2009 a significant reduction was noticed in Jackson.

Chief Bishop urges citizens of Kewaskum to participate in this free program offered by WCHS.

Under the TNR program, any feral cat caught live in a trap can be brought to the Humane Society, where the cat will be spayed or neutered and have its ear clipped for future identification, if the cat were to be caught again. Any cat over four pounds will also be vaccinated for rabies.

Afterward, the citizen will be required to return the cat to the area from where the cat was caught. Feral cats form strong family bonds and separation can cause undue stress including depression. The WCHS retains the right to refuse service to anyone felt to engage inappropriately to the staff or volunteers of WCHS as well as the cats.

For the safety of the cats, the WCHS requests using only humane traps. The WCHS does have humane traps available as well for residents that notice feral cats. A resident can contact the facility, arrange to pick up a trap and will be provided with instructions for

proper use and transport of the cats. A small deposit is required initially, but returned once the trap is brought back. Cats will be accepted Mondays 8:30 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. or Tuesdays 8:30 a.m. - 10:00 p.m.

Chief Bishop understands the catch and release program is a long-term solution to the problem, but emphasizes that short term solutions such as poisoning the cats like rodents is a felony offense according to the DNR. These feral cats are healthy wildlife and should be treated with the same respect as other wildlife.

Chief Bishop strongly encourages residents to participate in the TNR program if they notice feral cats in their area and please do not feed them. For more information or to schedule a trap pick-up, please call Tina Duris, Operations Manager, at WCHS at 262-677-4388.

West Bend. They also have seven grandchildren, 13 great-grandchildren and 3 great-great-grandchildren.



New Kraemer Cancer Center to debut July 9

academic medical center. Via a press release, Dr. Johnstone, M.D., MPH (Master of Public Health), a Medical College of Wisconsin radiation oncologist and director of radiation oncology at the Kraemer Cancer Center, explained that uniting cancer services on the same site on which the hospital is housed makes it easier for patients to receive the right care at the right time and across a collaborative,

multidisciplinary care environment, that benefits patients, their families, staff and physicians. "Patients will be able to be seen by multiple cancer specialists at the same clinic space and receive more integrated, highly specialized and timely care," she affirmed. "New radiation-treatment capabilities will enhance the high-quality cancer program already in place and take it to the next level.

"Key advantages of these technologies include the ability to deliver higher doses of radiation with more precision, spare healthy tissue and reduce side effects, to provide patients with the best possible outcomes." During a recent tour, John Koenig, director of Froedtert & The Medical College Cancer Network, showcased a specially designed room, housing the sophisticated \$2 million linear accelerator, AKA the "Linac," featuring image-guided technology. The Linac uses radiation therapy to treat tumors in patients with cancer

and weighs approximately five tons. It was delivered to the new Kraemer Cancer Center April 4. While receiving their radiation therapy, patients can view a soothing, scenic overhead mural -- just one example of the breathtaking art, displayed in the center. Another example is the donor-recognition art, that was moved from the cancer center on Oak Street and is the work of artist Karen Singer, a Madison native. It was installed with the opening of the first cancer center at the Oak Street facility, in spring 2000.

The wall art consists of five, wood-framed custom ceramic tile pieces. The larger one is sculpted in low relief with bold, impressionistic images of a Kettle Moraine farmscape. Four smaller art pieces depict flowers found in this area -- daylily, purple coneflower, mayapple and periwinkle. Commissioned for the cancer center, the art was a gift from West Bend Mutual Insurance Company. The original artwork depicting the soothing beauty of the scenic Kettle Moraine and the healing properties of the flowers of the region was selected for the center, because it reflects the care and compassion of cancer care at the Kraemer Cancer Center.



The new center also features expanded space for chemotherapy services. Patients have the option of receiving their intravenous chemotherapy medications in a common area, for up to six patients, allowing for socialization during treatment. This area features spacious windows, affording a view of the adjacent prairie area. Or patients can receive their chemo in one of the six semi-private rooms or in one of two private rooms -- ideal for patients who need additional care or rest. To enhance the quality of life for patients through their treatment and beyond, the Froedtert & The Medical College Small Stones Wellness Center is part of the Kraemer Cancer Center. It will be staffed by an aesthetic wellness coordinator. The Small Stones Wellness Center will include cancer education and information, ranging from

books to skin, hair and nail care for all cancer patients during their treatment.

It will include a variety of scarves, hats, beauty and skin-care products. A licensed cosmetologist will provide hair care and assistance with wig selection, cut, style and fit.

In addition, patients will have access to a variety of supportive services, including cancer rehabilitation, physical therapy and lymphedema treatments, certified oncology nurses, oncology nurse practitioners, a cancer dietitian, a psych oncology nurse and a breast-care program and breast-care navigator.

The name "Small Stones" for this section of the center was selected for its symbolism in a Chinese proverb, "Those who remove mountains begin by carrying away small stones."

A public open house is planned for community residents to view the new facility, from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Aug. 15.

The center's combined nursing station provides for enhanced collaboration among medical and radiation oncology staff. The outpatient clinic with exam rooms has separate waiting areas for male and female patients.

Other special features are an on-site Cancer Center pharmacy, a large, open-concept lobby area and convenient cancer patient parking and canopied entrance.

A cancer survivorship clinic is scheduled to open in August, offering post-treatment resources for patients.

CancerNetworkspecialties at the Kraemer Cancer Center include: radiation oncology; hematology and oncology; thoracic, gynecologic and urologic oncology; plastic and reconstructive surgery (located in the Specialties Clinics on the first floor); colorectal surgery (also in the Specialties Clinics) and breast surgery, as of fall

2012.

Kraemer Cancer Center services include: chemotherapy, blood products and other infused treatments, radiation therapy, clinical trials, pain management, tumor board conferences, cancer nutrition services, counseling for newly diagnosed cancer patients and cancer genetic counseling.

Additional services include: a breast-care program, breast-care navigator, cancer rehabilitation, physical therapy, lymphedema services, and complimentary therapies.

The Alyce and Elmore Kraemer Cancer Care Center was initiated in 2000, with the support of a \$2 million donation in June 1998 from Alyce Kraemer. Her contribution represented a significant portion of funds raised for the center.

In June 2009, Medical College of Wisconsin oncologists began providing radiation oncology services at the center. Then, in July 2010, the center became part of the Froedtert & The Medical College of Wisconsin Cancer Network.

Plans for a new cancer center to be located on the hospital campus at 3200 Pleasant Valley Road, were announced in November 2010. The new Kraemer Cancer Center name was announced April 20, 2011 during a construction celebration at the hospital.

Two major pieces of equipment from the Oak Street center, the linear accelerator and the CT scanner, are slated to be auctioned in the near future.



Their mojo missing in action most of midseason may have made a comeback, albeit against a struggling team.

The Kewaskum Indians hammered New Holstein on the road Monday night, 15-1 in the 10-run mercy ruled-shortened five-inning game, for their 16th win of the season.

"We scored early, fast and quick," said Coach Doug Gonring. "That was a little bit more of the way we had started

off the year. We were a little faster there."

The Indians scored four in the first and six in the second in cruising. They made the most of nine hits and took advantage of four errors.

Brad Boegel was 2-for-2 with two doubles and an RBI. Corey Burdick was 2-for-2 with three RBIs and Jake Hardy 2-for-4 with four RBIs.

Garrett Yahr pitched 1 2/3 innings and whiffed three in earning the win. Zach Hedlund pitched 2 1/3 innings, whiffing

four and walking two, and Hardy pitched one inning.

The Indians went to 11-1 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and 16-3 overall, just ahead of Plymouth at 10-2 and Sheboygan Falls at 9-2. New Holstein is 3-10 in the EWC, 4-14 overall.

On Saturday, the Indians lost against Homestead, 12-4. Gonring said he moved people to different positions to change things up, but he wasn't happy with how his team responded.

"We did not compete that

day at all," he said.

Against Campbellsport at home last Friday, the Indians ho-hummed their way to a 6-3 victory, making efficient use of four hits to Campbellsport's five.

"It's a win. I'm just not getting the effort the way I want it," said Gonring.

Hardy had two hits and Tony Gonring had one.

The offense hasn't been there as of late, with the Indians only collecting a handful of hits in several games, including their first conference loss against Plymouth in which they got three.

"It stinks. The best hits have been foul," said Gonring.

"Our bats have been slow, including mine," said Boegel. "I think we've got to take more cuts."

On the mound, Boegel did the job, whiffing 12 and walking three in going all seven innings.

The team did earn a steak dinner for getting the Cougars out in three pitches in one inning. It's a deal Gonring has with his team each season. So far that was the first dinner this year he will reward the team with after the season.

At Two Rivers last week, the Indians took advantage of mistakes and won, 13-3 and 10-0.

In the 13-3 victory, Tony Gonring was 3-for-4 with a double and three RBIs. Yahr was 1-for-3 with two RBIs and Sam Olla 1-for-3 with a double and two RBIs. Bryce Thull was 1-for-1 with a double.

Yahr got the win, whiffing two in two innings. Burdick pitched two innings, whiffing two and walking one. Brandon Chapman pitched one inning and struck out two.

In the 10-0 win, Olla was

2-for-4 with two home runs and three RBIs. Gonring was 1-for-3 with a double.

Hedlund pitched four innings, whiffing two and walking two while only allowing one hit. Brett Boegel pitched three innings, whiffing one and allowing no hits.

The Indians were scheduled to host Sheboygan Falls on Tuesday, a team they beat, 1-0, in a pitching duel a couple of weeks ago, host Two Rivers on Thursday, Kiel on Friday and Marquette on Saturday. They play at Plymouth on Monday.

Kewaskum has earned a no. 1 seed in the sectional in this year's new playoff format, and Coach Gonring isn't exactly thrilled. The Indians get a bye in the first round, meaning they'll be idle for seven days unless Gonring can find a game. He is looking into scheduling a scrimmage with the Kewaskum A's.

"We haven't had three days off. Our first eight days of practice is the longest we haven't had a game. Now we're going to have a whole week and I can't find a game," he said.

Sheboygan Falls got a No. 2 seed and Plymouth a 3. Campbellsport, despite a only handful of victories, got the no. 4 seed.

The Indians host the winner of Howards Grove and New Holstein on July 13. Sectional finals are July 16 and the state tournament July 20. The tournament this year is down to four teams and will be played at Concordia instead of Stevens Point.

"One game at a time. I know it's a cliché over and over again. It is one ball game, one day, one opportunity," said Gonring.
