Former Hausmann homes receive county landmark designation

Two newly landmarked, Queen Anne Victorian, three-story homes, that Mitch and Shirley Ogi own, on Fond du Lac Avenue, Kewaskum, display unique features of the 19th century. Their rich history, authentic restoration and the fact that history is well documented has earned the prestigious distinction.

Mitch and Shirley have been renovating the homes since purchasing them and restoring them to their original decorum. Mitch says he dedicated the landmark designation to the homes' builder, Dr. William Hausmann.

Dr. Hausmann was the original owner of their home at 1554 Fond du Lac Ave., constructed in 1894,

while William's son, Dr. N. Edward Hausmann, built the house directly south at 1546 Fond du Lac Ave., in 1904. The Ogis own that newly landmarked home too and rent it to their oldest son Matthew, and his family.

Mitch noted the two Hausmann doctors served residents of the Kewaskum area for 70 years.

When William Hausmann passed away, his wife Charlotte Hausmann became the owner of the home built in 1894. Later, some of Charlotte's children resided there, until it was sold to William and Wilhelmine Bruhn, in the 1940s.

The Bruhns later sold the house to Dr. Howard Rumsey and his wife Mary. They sold the house to Dr. Robert Butler and his wife Ruth. The Ogis purchased the home from the Butlers. The home at 1554 Fond du Lac Ave.,

in which Shirley and Mitch reside boasts a total of 14-rooms, with three full baths. Matthew, his wife Amy, and their three children -- Abigail, 8; Annah, 7; and Calib, 6 -- rent the 10-room home, with two full baths, at 1546 Fond du Lac Ave.

The retired former owner of Kettle Moraine Agency, a Kewaskum-based insurance agency, Mitch and his wife Shirley, a social worker at Cedar Community, West Bend, purchased the house at 1554 Fond du Lac Ave. in 1996, from Dr. Robert Butler, a chiropractor. But Mitch had been familiar with the house since his childhood.

"Dr. Rumsey, a chiropractor, had used the house as his home and practice for 30 years," Mitch recalled. "I

Building and maintenance jobs posted in school district

After the elimination of the Director of Building and Grounds, support staff positions within the Kewaskum School District needed restructuring to include those responsibilities. At the board of education meeting on July 9, Superintendent Jim Smasal's request to post the newly revised positions was approved.

Due to a change in job duties, employees were told they would need to reapply when new job positions were posted. Per verbal agreement, those employees would be notified first. Public posting will occur at the end of next week.

"What we are asking from our previous custodial, building/grounds maintenance people is to sign up for any or all positions they feel comfortable that they can perform or would like to do in a priority sequence," Smasal said.

Smasal discussed the importance of authorizing the posting of 16 building/grounds positions under seven different job descriptions. The communication of choice was email with a request by Board President Tim Ramthun for a return receipt for follow-up in a couple days if needed. "After that is completed, go ahead and fill the positions. Our goal was to have this done by the end of the month. I think we are on a good timeline for that happening," Smasal stated.

The first motion for posting of building/grounds jobs specifically maintenance and custodial was given by Jim Leister with Troy Hanson giving the second. All voted aye.

A support staff handbook and a listing of potential changes were handed out by Smasal for board members to review for the August 13 meeting.



National Night Out Aug. 7

Tuesday, August 7nd, our neighbors in Kewaskum and Washington County are invited to join forces with thousands of communities nationwide for the 29th Annual National Night Out crime and drug prevention event. National Night Out, which is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch and cosponsored locally by St. Lucas Lutheran Church and School, will involve over 15,000 communities from all 50 states. In all, over 37 million people are expected to participate.

National night out is designed to: (1) Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; (2) Generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime efforts; (3) Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community relationships; and (4) Send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

A block party will be hosted Tuesday, August 7, 6-9 pm at St. Lucas Lutheran Church and School, 1410 Parkview Drive. Parkview Drive will be closed down and activities will take place in the church parking lot and the school grounds. Bring a lawn chair and stay a while. Food and refreshments along with a free bounce house will be available.

The Kewaskum Police Department and Kewaskum Fire Department will have equipment on display. Various volunteer groups will lead children's activities.

The River City Irregulars concert band will perform a traditional band concert at 6:30. The Kewaskum Big Band will follow at 8:00. Both groups

will perform in the church parking lot.

Even if you aren't able to make it out to these events, turn on your porch light, sit outside, visit with your neighbors, and take a stand against neighborhood crime and drug abuse.

National Night Out, 'America's Night Out Against Crime,' was introduced by the Association in 1984. The program was the brainchild of NATW Executive Director Matt A. Peskin. In an effort to heighten awareness and strengthen participation in local anticrime efforts, Peskin felt that a high-profile, high-impact type of crime prevention event was needed nationally.

While the traditional 'lights on' and front porch vigils remain a part of NNO, activities have expanded considerably over the years to include block parties, cookouts, parades, visits from police, festivals, neighborhood walks, safety fairs, contests, rallies and meetings.

Peskin said, "It's a wonderful opportunity for communities nationwide to promote police-community partnerships, crime prevention, and neighborhood camaraderie. While the one night is certainly not an answer to crime, drugs and violence, National Night Out does represent the kind of spirit, energy and de-

termination that is helping to make many neighborhoods safer places throughout the year. It [NNO] is a night to celebrate safety and crime prevention successes - and to expand and strengthen programs for the next 364 days."





grew up with the Rumsey kids and liked the style, background of the house and liked its location. Dr. Rumsey sold the house to Dr. Butler in 1990."

The initial plan was to use the house as an investment. "But my family loved it, so we decided to move in," Mitch said. "They more or less said, 'We can move in, or you can live in the old house.'"

The architect/carpenter who designed and built the homes was Louis Brandt.

A year or two after settling into their home, Mitch and Shirley began the renovation. One of the projects of many was installing a new roof.

"The original roof had been replaced just once," Mitch said. "They used really good materials -- tongue-and-groove boards for the underlay of the roof. When the roofers were replacing it for us, they took off one set of asphalt shingles, and the original cedar-shake shingles were underneath. We now have three-dimensional, green Certainteed Presidential shingles."

Other projects included refinishing the hardwood floors in some of the rooms and removing the suspended ceilings in a couple of rooms.

"We redid the ceilings in the design of the day -- plaster," he said. "We re-plastered those ceilings."

In the room with the fireplace, "The chiropractor who owned the house had an x-ray machine," he added. "It had to be anchored to the ceiling, so they had dropped the ceiling down two feet. The rooms now have 12-foot ceilings, like they were originally designed."

The gas, hot-water heating system has been updated, and a thermostat installed in each room. "The house used to have just two thermostats," Mitch

said. "We also installed central air conditioning."

While some of the rooms are still carpeted, "We are slowly removing the carpeting in other areas," he noted, adding that some of the hardwood flooring has designs in it.

"We want to go back to hardwood floors where we can," he said.

The original wood siding was replaced with cream-colored, seamless, steel siding, accented with hunter green gutters and window trim. "Doc Rumsey had put steel siding on," Mitch recalled. "The new steel siding is narrower and has the appearance of natural wood."

The three porches on the first level were refurbished to reflect the porches as they were originally. "We replaced the bad boards and raised the balusters [railing supports], so that kids would not fall over," he noted.

The wiring was replaced in the home. In that project, fans with lights attached, were installed on the porches. "The fans keep the mosquitoes away," Mitch explained.

Regarding their home at 1546 Fond du Lac Ave., they purchased it in 2001. "I bought

that house, because I could choose my neighbor," Mitch said, then laughed.

He wanted to buy the house when it was on the market in 1986. "But the price was too high, because I was buying my business at the time," he recalled.

Lorena Wagner purchased the house back then. The woodwork had numerous coats of white paint. "Lorena removed the paint herself and redid the wood in stain and varnish," Mitch said.


Wagner sold the home to Erwin and Gloria Kamrath in the 1990s, and they resided there for a few years, until selling it to the Ogis. "My son and his family moved in shortly after we bought it," Mitch said.

He noted that the interiors of the two homes are not similar. For example, the rooms in Mitch and Shirley's home are rectangular, while those in the other house are square.

The house that Matthew rents has a unique feature. The closets contain built-in dressers.

The third floor of the house was originally used as quarters for the groomsmen (caretakers of the horses and equipment).

Among the renovations,

a new roof was installed. The hardwood floors were sanded and varnished.

What Mitch enjoys most about the home in which he and Shirley reside is "reading out on the porch," he said. "When the kids were younger, we'd sit out there at night and count the cars that went by. We'd tell the kids, 'When you get to 100, it's bed time.'"

Shirley enjoys the fact that the house has rooms for

a variety of purposes. She particularly likes the old-style kitchen, which has a cast-iron, replica stove, similar to those at the time the home was built. She also enjoys the privacy of the spacious backyard.

Then too, while their children -- Matthew, Emily and Ryan -- were attending school in Kewaskum, they were able to walk there, since the schools are only a few blocks

Great focus is also being applied to the value proposition for the taxpayer; ensuring expenditures are justified with results applied to improving





For the past four years, the Boys and Girls Club Kewaskum chapter has worked with our local youth. Averaging over 50 children, the summer program of the Boys and Girls Club comes to an end July 13.

"We provide a safe space for the kids to go to where they can experience a wide variety of activities and learn different character building tools," states Sarah Swanson, Unit Director for Kewaskum.

Children attending the Club have options of signing up for classes designed for the summer or participate in open activities.

Classes included are rocket science, dance, advanced art, and cooking. Members can also participate in four different sports -baseball, volleyball, basketball, and soccer.



25 Years Ago

May 1, 1987

The Fond du Lac County Coroner's Office has completed its investigation and ruled the death of a 23-year-old Milwaukee woman on April 23, a suicide with bizarre circumstances surrounding the incident. Sylvester Krahn of Adell was traveling south on Highway S, just north of New Fane around 3:15 pm when he noticed smoke off the roadway. Being a volunteer fireman, he stopped to investigate and found a young woman standing next to a burning car. Krahn asked the woman if there was anyone in the car and she stated yes. He tried to open the car but found the doors locked and the woman claimed the keys were inside. Krahn broke windows to determine if there was indeed someone inside but by then the car was too heavily engulfed in flames. At that point the woman grabbed some clothing and started walking up the hiking trail to a wooded area. Krahn stayed at the scene and flagged down a driver to notify the fire department. When Krahn failed to hear sirens he went into New Fane and made a second call and returned to the burning car. When the Fond du Lac County Sheriff and the Kewaskum Fire Department arrived Krahn explained the situation and a deputy went into the woods to search for the woman. The deputy found the woman hanging from a tree. According to other individuals on the scene, apparently the woman had tried to take her own life by attaching a long hose found at the scene to the exhaust of the vehicle but somehow the car started on fire. There did not seem to be an apparent motive.

After more than a year, the Washington County Sheriff's Department announced in a written statement on Monday, that it is suspending its investigation into the February 12, 1986 shooting deaths of Allen Guenther and Lee Luebke at a Town of Farmington residence. Sheriff Clarence Schwartz and District Attorney David Resheske advised that the criminal investigation into the deaths had been suspended pending any new information. In November 1986 Sheriff Schwartz requested that experts from the Division of Criminal Investigation, Wisconsin Department of Justice, conduct an independent review of the Sheriff's Department investigation into the incident. After reviewing the case, the Division of Criminal Investigation concluded that the investigation of the incident by Washington County was complete and professional and that all investigative leads had been developed to their maximum potential. Conflicting statements and evidence presented during last year's two-day inquest only seemed to cloud the issues, resulting in Judge James Schwalbach handing down an

advisory opinion that he could not, from the evidence present, determine if a crime had been committed or whether at least one of the deaths may have been self-defense.



Administrator Matt Heiser:

2. Reported the "No Parking" request from Kewaskum Frozen Foods on Midland Avenue has been dropped. They are working out the issues associated with semi trailers entering the alley on Midland Avenue.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the Recall Election held on June 5, 2012. The election workers were Elizabeth Hallen, James Westphal, Elizabeth Bellin, Elvira Nigh, Steve Baker, Nancy Harris, Karen Schaub, Patrick McFadden, Shirley Koth, Gail Van Ess, Lavern Geidel, Pat Herriges, Darlene Tessar and Eileen Petri. There were 2017 voters and no incidents were reported. There was an 85% voter turnout.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission announced the next meeting has been scheduled for June 25, 2012.

Norman Kufahl, representative for the Library Board, reported on the June 12, 2012 meeting. The circulation for May 2012 was 6,183 compared to 5,486 in 2011.

Administrator Heiser reported on the outstanding utility connections that have had an extension until June 2012 to connect to the municipal water and sewer. The properties affected include 689 Edgewood Drive (Charles Ogi), 120 Badger Road (Allyne Rodenkirch), 811 Prospect Drive (Marion Bunkelman) and Kewaskum Trading Post located at 770 Prospect Drive. The property owners have received extensions since 2006 on the requirement to connect to the municipal water and sewer service. The property owners have been notified that the extension will expire in June 2012. All of the property owners have contacted the village expressing different concerns as to why they will not be able to connect within the extension period. The Board expressed concerns about granting another extension when these properties should have connected in 2006. Motion by Craig Garbisch to require the property owners, Ogi, Rodenkirch, Bunkelman and 770 Prospect Drive, to connect to the municipal water and sewer by September 1, 2012 after that date the Village will install the water and sewer connection, second by Richard Knoebel. Voice vote, motion carried.

Police Chief Thomas Bishop reported on the request by the Kewaskum Police Department to purchase new service firearms. Chief Bishop reported that the current firearms were purchased in 1991, accessories and parts for the firearms are becoming difficult to obtain, and at this point 2012 budgetary funds available. The police department is seeking Board approval because it was not a listed budget item for 2012. Chief Bishop obtained price quotes from: Streicher for Smith & Wesson Firearms - \$4,933.69, Kiesler for Glock Firearms - \$4,771.21 and Ray O'Herron for Glock Firearms - \$5,408.00. Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to approve purchasing new service firearms from either Streicher's or Kiesler's after testing the firearms to determine which is the appropriate make and model for the police department, second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried.

The current siren testing schedule was reviewed. Emergency Government Director Chad Cook expressed concerns that two of the sirens are experiencing mechanical difficulties. The current test allows for a "growl" test on Saturday at noon. The manufacture of the sirens stated the sirens are built to be used on a regular basis. It was recommended a full test of the sirens should be completed weekly or daily. Consensus of the Board was to place this item on a future agenda for action.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to appoint Jim Hovland as the bargaining committee member, second by Richard Knoebel. Voice vote, motion carried.

No action was taken on the bridge railing color until the color of light poles can be determined for the Main Street/Hwy 28 project. The Plan Commission was also asked to give a recommendation on the bridge railing color.

Motion by Craig Garbisch, second by Norman Kufahl to approve the issuance of an operator's license for 2012/2013 as listed. Voice vote, motion carried. No objections were noted by the police department.

Wollner, Backhaus named as top track athletes


Coach Jerry Gosa has closed the book on yet another track season at Kewaskum High School, a season that was highlighted by a school record time of 43 and .20 seconds (43.20) in the boys 4x100-meter relay but plagued by a low number of participants that prevented the Indians from coming close to winning any invitationals.

"It wasn't a stellar season," Gosa said in recapping 2012, but in no way did he want to take any credit from the 40 athletes who worked hard to better themselves.

At the year-end banquet, Joey Wollner was named as the MVP of the boys team, and "For the second year in a row, it was Aly Backhaus as the MVP of the girls."

"We were glad Joey Wollner healed fast," Gosa said, recalled how Wollner injured his knee in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet, then came back a week later to finish fourth in the Division 2 regional at North Fond du Lac and cleared 13-feet to finish third in the sectional and advance to state.

"Not only did the relay team need him, but he got a change to qualify for state for the second year in a row.... He had a nice season."

Wollner only managed to clear 12-0 in La Crosse and finished 13th in the field of 16 but he was a member of the quartet that had the fastest 4x100 time in the preliminaries on Friday, putting them in position to win a state title.

The story didn't have the happy ending the Indians and their coaches had hoped for as senior leadoff runner Eric Perkins pulled a hamstring midway during his leg of the race and was unable to continue.

"They ran super well on Friday ... it's too bad that happened," Gosa said, referring to Perkins' injury. Perkins, a four-year regular on the team, was hampered much of the season by leg injuries.

Gosa expects relays and

the pole vault will again be strong next year. "Having Teddy (Wollner) back will be huge. Hopefully he'll take a leadership role and get the kids back to state," Gosa said, noting his returning vaulters, Corey Burdick and Tristan Marx, both have a lot of potential, and sprinter, jumper Jordan Hanson "has a lot of talent."

Letter winners for the year included: seniors — Joey Wollner, Perkins and Andy Doll; juniors — Burdick, Hanson and Ted Wollner; sophomores — Andy Buelow, Zachary Luedtke, Joey Seitz and Casey Steinman; freshmen — Ricky Heinan, Marx and Brandon Mikolajczak.

"Aly did a real good job in the triple jump and in the relays. Actually she ran all

three (sprint) relays," Gosa said, praising her efforts and leadership.

Other key seniors were sprinters/jumpers Tess Bandy and Natalie Bandy along with senior hurdler Val Hedlund.

Gosa also praised the determination of senior Heidi Johnson who overcame two hip surgeries just to participate in the sport this spring.

Gosa said there were several of potential stars in the freshman class but several of them chose to be on the fast-pitch team. "That's the way it goes," he said, indicating you try not to be disappointed when athletes do not come out for the sport either because they chose another or do not want to put in the work track demands.

Expected to be top performers next year at discus thrower Stephanie Henk, who improved her throws over 30 in a three-week period, high

jumper/replay runner Ashlee Stahl and sprinter Kelsey Phillips.

Letter winners for the girls included: seniors — Amber Resop, Backhaus, Tess Bandy, Natalie Bandy, Hedlund, Johnson and foreign exchange student Silvana Trevalle; juniors — Stahl, Phillips, April Stern; sophomores — Jessica Etta, Henk, Jessica Nurkala, Kayla Oelhafen, and foreign exchange student Anna Pardo Lopez; and freshmen — Jennifer Fisher and Amanda Plachinski.

Gosa also paid tribute to one of his valued assistants, Jason Meinen, who has resigned his position.

"I really think Jason has done an outstanding job coaching the triple jumpers, high jumpers and long jumpers," Gosa said. "We're going to miss his expertise and ability. He was very helpful to the program."



The Kewaskum A's picked up an 8-5 win over Oakfield on Sunday afternoon and remain unbeaten in Rock River League play.

Oakfield quickly raced ahead to a 2-0 lead in the first inning, taking advantage of a shaky start from Kewaskum starter Jim Ziegler. The A's were able to answer back in the bottom of the first though as Jake Spaeth belted a solo homer to lead off the inning. Brad Young and Austin Sarauer followed with singles and Dan Shea tied the game at 2-2 with a RBI single of his own. Kurt Zagzebski gave the A's the lead as his ground-ball double play brought in the third run of the inning for Kewaskum.

Indians finish off 4th straight EWC title with eyes on bigger prize

Brutal heat and top competition - the Indians rose above it all last week behind the arm of Brad Boegel and won their fourth straight Eastern Wisconsin Conference title.

The senior all-everything player tossed two complete games at conference title contenders Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls. Kewaskum almost let a letdown game on senior night get away against Campbellsport last Friday, but pulled that one out in the end to go 16-2 for another outright crown.

The week completed a spectacular run everyone involved will remember for a long time. Three years ago, Kewaskum went 15-3 in the EWC, following it up with two straight 17-1 seasons.

Five seniors, a few of whom have been on varsity for several years played a major role in those conference crowns.

"It's fun to go to baseball," said Boegel. "They're great guys and we work hard."

"It's awesome," said shortstop Sam Olla.

"It feels great," said Tony Gonring. "We wanted to do something special."

"It means a lot, actually," said catcher Brandon Chapman. "Something to look back on when you're older."

Garrett Yahr said he's been playing with these same guys since elementary school.

"It's just an awesome time," he said.

"Four in a row," said Coach Doug Gonring. "To have that many is kind of a special roll." The Indians' hitting hasn't been what it has in past seasons, but that could make them all the more potent come

the postseason, which starts Friday at home against the winner of Howards Grove and New Holstein.

Against Campbellsport, Gonring scored the winning run in the bottom of the sixth on a wild pitch, sliding in from third without a throw. He walked to lead off the inning, took second on a wild pitch and was sacrificed to third on a bunt by Olla.

Kewaskum hung on, 4-3.

"I just saw it was low and it was a curve ball so I just kept going," Gonring said of the winning run.

The game was closer than it would look to be on paper given Campbellsport is at the bottom of the EWC standings.

"As my dad would say, it wasn't pretty but it got the job done," said Gonring.

He knows pops well.

"Nothing pretty but it's a win," said Coach Gonring.

The Indians scored two in the fourth inning. Brett Boegel walked and Olla hit a one-out double to left field to score him. Brad Boegel followed with an RBI single to center.

In the third, Brad Boegel reached on a fielder's choice and came around on a wild pitch and two errors.

Yahr started and allowed two runs in four innings. Zach Hedlund went 1 1/3 inning and Brett Boegel finished the game. In the top of the sixth with the game tied at 3-3 and the Cougars threatening, Boegel got a groundball back to the mound and started a 1-6-3 double play. It was Olla's favorite kind - the ones he can set and throw.

Beyond that, the Indians overcame four errors to pull out the victory.

The Indians have won three in a row and five of their

last six regular season games.

"This is actually the first year we've had momentum going into the playoffs," said Olla.

While winning conference and earning a trip to state is the ultimate goal every year, getting to state has eluded the Indians so far. But this season has a different sectional lineup, with familiar foes Sheboygan Falls and Plymouth, the Nos. 2 and 3 seeds, respectively, Kewaskum's toughest competition on paper.

But one part of Kewaskum's game has to ignite.

"We got pitching. We just haven't gotten that hitting. I so richly would like to see our kids do," said Coach Gonring.

"I think it shows that when

we do start hitting we're going to be a force," said Boegel.

Kewaskum 3, Sheboygan Falls 1 (July 5)

Boegel tossed his third straight complete game against Falls this season in the conference-deciding clash. Kewaskum took two of three from Falls, which finished in second place at 15-3.

Boegel tried a new strategy knowing he already pitched 14 innings against the Falcons.

"I tried working backwards on some kids," he said. "Try and keep 'em confused as much as I could."

He scattered five hits, walked one and whiffed nine, including the final five batters he faced.

"We needed a senior to come up big this week and he did that," said Gonring. "Fabulous performance."

At the plate, Boegel hit a solo home run in the fifth inning on a 3-2 count over the left field fence to give the Indians a two-run cushion.

"He threw me a hanging curve ball and I just put a good swing on it," Boegel said.

Olla turned two double plays on ground balls, one from second baseman Mike Burdick and another from Boegel.

"Easy double plays," Olla said.

Kewaskum got two runs in the second on Brett Boegel and Austin Goeden walks and an Olla single. Boegel singled in one run with an infield hit up the middle, and a throwing error scored the second.

The Falcons scored in the sixth with a standup double from leadoff hitter Bobby Musil. He took third on a wild pitch and scored on a groundout.

The game was the third

classic pitching duel between Brad Boegel and a Heili. Cole Heili went the distance in a 1-0 Kewaskum win in June - a suicide squeeze by Goeden in the seventh was the difference - and Nate Heili pitched a 2-1 Falcons' victory at Kewaskum two weeks later in which all runs were scored in the first inning.

Cole last week again took the tough loss, allowing four hits and four walks while striking out seven.

Kewaskum 5, Plymouth 2 (July 2)

Boegel allowed two unearned runs in the first inning on the road, then shut down the Panthers, who finished third in the EWC at 14-4. He scattered six hits, walked three and whiffed 11.

In the fifth with Plymouth in a jam, Boegel was intentionally walked to load the bases, bringing up Chapman, who said it was a move of "disrespect."

"I felt like I had to do something."

A 2-2 fastball down the middle he did something with, crushing a grand slam to left field.

On the record heat

"Here it's fine because the tree blocks the sun," Chapman said of catching home games. Road games are a different story.

"The heat was pretty hard on you. Now that it's getting cooler we'll play even better," said Yahr.

Tony Gonring is looking forward to less wardrobe changes, "so I don't have to go through two shirts before the game."

"It's about time," Boegel said of the cool front arriving.
