Boegel named 'Player of the Year', Gonring named 'Coach of the Year' three years in a row

Not many people were happier to see Brad Boegel walk across that stage with his high school diploma than the baseball teams of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

It's the only thing stopping him from dominating his competition.

Boegel was named player of the year for the third straight season in the EWC, this time sharing the honor with Sheboygan Falls' Cole Heili.

"Pretty fantastic little roll right there," said Coach Doug Gonring.

This year, Boegel earned the award more for his pitching prowess. The pre-season all-American with the big stick was often pitched around, keeping his offensive numbers down a little.

But on the mound Boegel stepped up. He went 7-2 in the EWC with a 1.40 earned run average, both tops in conference. He whiffed an EWC-high 77 (next highest was 49) to walking 21.

He allowed a conference-best average of .212.

The shining moments came in the final week of the season. With Kewaskum's fourth straight conference title hanging in the balance, Boegel tossed two gems against the other top two conference teams.

First, Boegel scattered six hits and allowed no earned runs in a 5-2 win at Plymouth. He whiffed 11 and walked three.

Later in the week, Boegel scattered five hits, walked one and whiffed nine, including the final five batters he faced, in a 3-1 win at Sheboygan Falls. A victory the next day against Campbellsport gave Kewaskum a 16-2 EWC record and its fourth straight conference crown.

"What he did for us as a pitcher and how he ran our team the last week of the season to win the conference, he deserved what he got," said Gonring. "There are other ways to be a great teammate."

At the plate, Boegel hit .339 with 20 RBIs and tied for a league-high three homers.

"He was a marked man. Guys pitched around him. It's not as easy hitting when people aren't pitching to you," said Gonring.

Boegel made the EWC second team in 2009 as a pitcher, before being named player of the year as an infielder in 2010 and 2011.

Joining Boegel as a three-time first-teamer was shortstop and leadoff hitter Sam Olla. The senior hit .483 and scored 26 runs, both second in conference. He tied for the EWC lead with three home runs. He was 10-for-11 on steal attempts and walked 12 times.

"Sam had an unbelievably offensive year, where last year he didn't hit the

District to appeal arbitrator's judgement to let accused teacher back in classroom

After seven months of arbitration, the decision to dismiss Special Education Educator Linda Kiser from Kewaskum Middle School was overturned. School district officials will now appeal that decision despite a legal model existing.

On November 9, 2010, Kiser was asked to leave her position following findings of excessive force against students with disabilities. After the school received a complaint from a parent on October 14, 2010, the district investigated and discovered the incident was not alone.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal said this week, "We believe the actions were of severity that termination was an appropriate exercise of our right."

In the court filing, four students experienced incidents of pinching, pulling, and pushing into furniture in efforts by Kiser to either redirect or control behavior. Another student claimed Kiser raised her voice numerous times, and they conformed to avoid being grabbed.

Additional students witnessed Kiser's actions. A member of support staff not only confirmed student accounts, but had been pushed by Kiser herself and told to leave a student alone. Kiser is also accused on refusal to conform to students' IEPs.

The Kewaskum Education Association, the local teachers' union filed a grievance against the district on November 6, 2010 with a request of arbitration on November 23, 2010. Stanley Michelstetter, II heard testimony on April 12, 14, 15 and May 5, 6 of 2011.

Under arbitration, a third party who is knowledgeable, independent and impartial resolves disputes between two parties. An arbitrator is agreed upon by both parties or provided by law, and both parties are bound to the decision.

On May 3, Michelstetter decided to overturn the district's decision citing that the school board's action was too severe. His ruling was a 30-day

Landmark sites - - treasured assets Judgement (Continued from front)

The process involved in having a property or geological site approved as a Washington County landmark entails a great deal of research on the part of the individual applying for the historical honor. Just ask Mitch and Shirley Ogi who had their neighboring village of Kewaskum homes dedicated this past weekend.

Landmark sites are formations or structures which represent or reflect elements of the county's cultural, social, economic, political, architectural, archeological or geological history. The commission landmarks such properties for the education, pleasure and welfare of the residents of Washington County and tourists.

A few of Washington County's esteemed landmarked sites are the Basicilia of Holy Hill, National Shrine of Mary-Help of Christians, in the town of Erin, approved as a landmark in 1977; the Great Divide, town of West Bend, 1978; and Lizard Mound County Park, town of

Farmington, 1997.

During the past 35 years, the nine-member Washington County Landmarks Commission has approved 38 sites within the county to receive landmarks. These include the two Ogi homes on Fond du Lac Ave. The Queen Anne Victorian homes are significant for their architecture.

Residents interested in having properties landmarked must apply to the Landmarks Commission. The owners are required to state why they feel their properties are worthy of being landmarked and must also conduct the necessary research. Applicants shall obtain a copy of the original deed from the 1800s, when the government first sold the property and copies of the deeds of all owners of that property to the present date.

These records are on file at the courthouse. Properties usually have been divided and sold several times, since the government first owned them. Those sites that the Commission approves have a historical marker, a plaque adopted by the commission, erected on the property to identify the landmark site, such as the

plaques on the Ogis's properties.

The original owners of these two homesteads were Dr. William Hausmann, at 1554 Fond du Lac Ave., and Dr. N. Edward Hausmann, William's son, at 1546 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum, respectively.

Priscilla Hausmann donated a book to the Landmarks Commission outlining the history of the Hausmann family.

Barb Wenzlaff, of Kewaskum, a member of the Washington County Landmarks Commission for the past 17 years, explained that the organization meets annually to elect officers and periodically, as the need arises. Presently, Marilyn Merten is chairperson of the organization.

Members of the Washington County Board appoint members to the Washington County Landmarks Commission for a three-year term. Commission members may be appointed for more than one term and serve at the pleasure of the county board.

suspension followed by reinstatement, citing 'with the exception of three incidents, Kiser's use of physical control and restraint was acceptable and respectful contact.'

Paul Hemmer, attorney for the district, filed for a petition and application to reverse Michelstetter's ruling on July 13. Both sides will file briefs for a judge to hear oral argument to reach a decision.

In Hemmer's petition, Michelstetter refused to accept any student testimony without supporting adult and non-parental confirmation. Hemmer also stated the Michelstetter's order violated Wisconsin Stat-

ute and principles of Wisconsin law.

Kiser's reinstatement, according to the petition, would put the students at risk with the chance of repeated behavior and deprive special education students their right to full benefits of education. In addition, the district would be at a disadvantage to protect children, if without adult validation, students would not be believed.

"Kids are our number one property," Smasal said, "We don't feel it [the decision] was in the best interest of students." Kiser was contacted to comment, she did not return the reporter's call.

Vehicle titles will be sent to lien holders starting July 30

Wisconsin soon joins 38 states in becoming a title-to-lien holder state. This means that any title with a lien (loan) listed on or after July 30, 2012 will be sent to the lien holder rather than the owner. Lien holders may choose to receive either paper or electronic titles. The advantage to electronic delivery is that Wisconsin does not issue a paper title to the lender or owner of the vehicle until the lien is satisfied. This process eliminates most of the paper handling involved in vehicle titling and results in greater convenience and lower costs. These changes implement provisions included in the 2011-2013 state budget passed by the legislature last year.

As far as vehicles titled before this date are concerned, Mitchell Warren, director of the DMV Bureau of Vehicle Services wants people to know that "if you already have your title, even if it lists a lien holder, nothing changes. You can keep it. Titles will only be issued to lien holders on or after July 30, 2012."

Owners of vehicles with liens purchased on or after July 30, 2012 will receive a Confirmation of Ownership (www.dot.wisconsin.gov/drivers/vehicles/title/lienholder/images/t056-sample.jpg) and will receive the actual title when all liens are paid off. Warren notes that "a confirmation of ownership does not replace a vehicle title. What it does do is confirm that a person owns the vehicle and specifies that there is a lien on that vehicle."



Successful businesses depend upon finding new opportunities. When Alter-Ego moved to a new location, 20 year business owner, Renee Pastorius, made new plans.

Pastorius started her career in 1992 under Dave Jaecks aka "Weezle" at the then Main Street Tattoo. She took over the operation three years later. Shortly after hiring a body piercer, she moved in 1998 next to Auto Body Dynamics with a name change to Alter-Ego Tattoo and Body Piercing, LLC

On May 29, Pastorius moved to 204 Main Street to expand business opportunities. Clients will have more privacy and more choices and new artists, Ruth Kudek and Heather Dougherty.

Kudek, a Kewaskum native, started on June 7 and is accepting new clients with small designs and lettering. Her available days are Thursday- Saturday. Spangenburg, a recent fine art graduate of UW- Milwaukee, is still under apprenticeship.

"These two women are amazing people," Pastorius states, "I'm looking forward to them bringing a new clientele base, young and fresh for the future of Alter-Ego."

Jaclyn Gregor, has been with Alter-Ego for six years and Brenda Watson was recently hired, helps out with phones and clients.

The larger building allows for classroom activities, so artists will no longer need to drive to Wausau for

Bloodborne Pathogen Classes. Pastorius will offer CPR and First Responders classes for tattoo industry artists as well.

Pastorius wants to use the new location to help give local artists (college graduates to high school students) experience with a place to show work, just like Coffee Corner Bistro. Wall space will

be treated as an Art Gallery, so flash photos of tattoos will not be on the wall but in portfolios. Most important to Pastorius' business plan is working with a hospital and to convince insurance companies to cover areola reconstruction for women done at the studio such as Alter-Ego. Insurance currently only covers services

if done in a hospital setting.

When asked about the difference, Pastorius says, "The people that are doing it in the hospitals, just put a brown circle around the nipple and color it in solid. WE are the artists here and can make it

look really real!"

"The women with breast cancer have gone through so much already," Pastorius continues. "They just want to look 'normal' again."

The move/expansion has allowed for a partnership with Pahnke Ceramics, Alter-Ego now offers glass bead jewelry with a loved one's ashes fused inside.

As a former member of the state health board, Pastorius was questioned about putting ashes in tattoo ink after a TV program suggested the idea. "I will not do anything unsanitary that could harm a client," she said.

Alter-Ego offers tattooing (designing to logos), portrait and remembrance tattoos, body piercing, permanent make-up, and ash beads. In addition, Pastorius educates school children in art education and business.

"I keep adding adventures here and there to keep the business thriving," Pastorius states, "The new location will allow me to do all these things in time."





Days Gone By**25 Years Ago**

May 22, 1987

Next week the Kewaskum High School Olympics of the World team leads for the World Finals, a first for Kewaskum since the district joined the international competition three years ago. The six-member team, consisting of Scott Kulas, Leighton Peterson, Greg Weddig, Mitch Gebheim, Becky Morlen and George Walz, and their coach leave May 27 for the three day meet at Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant, Michigan. About 6,000 people are expected to attend.

Ervin Lawrenz, 69, of the Town of Scott, was seriously injured Saturday by a young bull on the Willard Schroeder farm in the Town of Sherman. According to reports, Lawrenz was checking line fences and apparently did not know there was a bull among the herd of cows in the field in which he was walking. The dehorned yearling bull apparently charged Lawrenz from behind butting the man into a creek. Lawrenz was rendered unconscious. He was discovered some time later with

his feet and legs submerged in the water. His body temperature had dropped very low, apparently due to the time spent in the cold water. He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital and later transferred to St. Luke's Hospital in Milwaukee where his condition was noted as improved after surgery.

After questioning by the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department early last week, an eight-year-old boy admitted setting the May 9th fire which destroyed a barn, Harvestore silo, a freestall shed and over 70 head of cattle on the William Timblin farm, Hwy. B, Eden. The youngster, no relation to the Timblins, told authorities he also had been involved in almost a dozen other fire setting incidents near his home in Fond du Lac.

A fire on the Claude Stommel property, Town of Ashford, early this week is being considered a suspicious nature and is under investigation according to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's department. Firefighters from Campbellsport, Knowles and Lombira were called to the scene, but were unable to save a 32 foot by 60 foot building used for storage.



The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Knoebel, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Norman Kufahl, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Mike Berger to approve the minutes from the June 18, 2012 meeting, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reported the roofing projects

in the parks have been completed. Repairs were completed on the beach house, NE concession stand and AAL Shelter.

Craig Garbisch arrived at 7:15 p.m.

Administrator Heiser reported:

1. The DOT does not require the Village to own the poles for hanging a banner over the Fond du Lac Avenue right-a-way or to have a village employee hang the banners. The DOT does prefer the Village would have ownership in the poles and would hang the banners. The Village insurance carrier also recommended ownership of the poles and hanging the banners. The League of Wisconsin Municipalities also recommended the Village own the poles and hang the banners because the public would perceive it that way regardless. The Board also discussed charging a fee for hanging banners. Local approval is required before a banner can be hung. - 1/2 cup chopped green onions
- 1 pound skinned salmon fillets, 1 inch thick





ball very well and made the first team," said Gonring. "He was our Paul Molitor. He did the things a leadoff man had to do. Get on base and score runs."

Boegel and Olla will play baseball at Maple Woods Community College in Kansas City, where Albert Pujols played.

Senior Tony Gonring made the EWC first team for the second year as outfielder and often batting in the No. 9 spot.

"He still hit .315. When he did get on, he was the second fastest or maybe the fastest, setting table for Sam and Brad," said Coach Gonring. "Tony's toughness for being able to play after having some failure was the biggest thing for our team's success. There's a guy that didn't give up."

While struggling at the plate can often translate into poor play in the field, Tony didn't let it happen.

"That never happened to that kid," said Coach Gonring.

Senior Garrett Yahr made the EWC first team for the first time as infielder, playing third and first. On the mound, he went 4-0 in the EWC and whiffed 23 to only four walks in 16 1/3 innings and earned the nickname "vulture" for taking so many innings. He hit .333 with 14 RBIs.

"Garrett was integral to this part of winning the last two championships. He came on

unbelievably this year, sucked up innings," said Gonring.

Senior catcher Brandon Chapman made the second team because Sheboygan Falls' Bobby Musil had such a great season, leading the EWC in average. Record heat this summer and an equivalent of a third-degree burn on his hand never got to him as he didn't want Gonring to give him breaks.

"To tell you how tough Chappy is - he had a blister on his hand that tore off. He sprayed Tuff Skin on it, put on tape and never missed a game," he said. "He is just scratching the surface of his ability of his ability to play his game. He's as good a catcher as I've had in 25 years."

Chapman, hitting behind Boegel, hit .268 with 18 RBIs.

Four came on a grand slam against Plymouth in that last week of the season after Boegel was intentionally walked.

Corey Burdick made the second team at second base. He hit .240 with nine RBIs.

"Corey had a solid year. his defensive prowess, his ability to get to balls other kids can't get to is a plus," said Gonring. "He has unbelievable ability if channeled correctly."

For the third year in a row, Gonring was named coach of the year.

"That's a nice honor," he said. "Ryan (Fladvid, Sheboygan Falls) has done a hell of a job and changed culture over there."

The Indians finished 23-6, their third straight 20-win season, and 16-2 in the EWC. They lost at Sheboygan Falls,

6-0, in the sectional semifinal. Gonring has said all the stars have to align to advance in one-game baseball tournaments.

"Winning the conference four years in a row with these kids is more important to me," he said. "16-2 - I'll take that anytime."

"We were 17 games over .500. We only lost six games.

How many more games could you have won? It was a professional schedule in 39 days. Trying to be perfect every day out," he said.

For four years in a row, nobody was more perfect than Kewaskum in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.
