Kewaskum schools scored well on new report cards

In the past, student achievement was based solely on WKCE (Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination), but now schools are being graded on more than test scores. Kewaskum schools scored at or above the benchmark of meeting expectations, and the district plans to raise the scores in the future.

Preliminary report cards for Wisconsin school districts were released on October 22, 2012. "The 2011/12 preliminary school report cards are a starting point for using multiple measures to evaluate our schools," states Tony Evers, State Superintendent of Schools.

The overall grades for the Kewaskum School District were the following: Farmington 77.8, Wayne 76.5, Kewaskum Elementary 80.2, Kewaskum Middle School 68 and 69.3 for Kewaskum High School.

A grade between the range of 63-72.9 reveals the school meets expectation; whereas, a grade between 73-83.9 has a grade listed as exceeding expectations. Grades were determined by a formula including four priority areas: student achievement, student growth, closing gaps, and on-track and post-secondary readiness.

The preliminary report card score is not percent correct, the number is an accountability score. Evers states, "The report cards reflect a better, more comprehensive way of measuring schools' effectiveness at helping out students graduate ready for college and career." Statewide, 85.8% scored at or above expectations.

Student growth is a score that shows growth regardless of current performance level. Both reading and math are evaluated, and the scores are combined. Positive results earn points, while negative results assign a negative point. Student growth makes sure every child is showing growth.

Closing gaps compared economically disadvantaged students, students with disabilities, or English language learners to complimentary groups to identify improvement levels. Currently a gap does exist, so a school's ability to close the gap between the two groups is assessed. A N/A was assigned for smaller schools with fewer than 20 students to create the subgroup.

On-track and postsecondary readiness for each school assessed different numbers to predict college and career readiness. Graduation and ACT participation were used for the high school; attendance rates and eighth grade math were used for the middle school, while attendance and third grade reading for the elementary schools.

At the high school and middle school level, preparatory testing is currently offered to students to aide for the ACT. The PLAN Test is offered at the high school, and the EXPLORE

Test is offered at the middle school.

As for student achievement, math and reading are assessed and compared against state academic standards. Basic level scores gave .5 points, proficient scores 1 point, and 1.5 points for advanced level. Three years of test data are averaged to take into account random year-to-year variances.

With the sole exception of a decrease in reading at Farmington since the 2010/11 school year (40.1% to 36.7%), all schools showed increases in math and reading since the 2010/11 student assessment. The biggest increase was at the middle school with an increase from 33.9% to 54.2% in math.

The formula to determine the grade is adding the student achievement score, student growth score, and closing gaps score and then dividing by three. That number is then added to attendance scores and other on-track/postsecondary score and the sum is divided by four.

Deductions are then applied if the student engage-

ment (test participation level, absenteeism, and dropout rates) number was applicable. All district schools had zero deductions with more than 95% participation, less than 13% in absenteeism and less than 6% drop-out rate.

Compared to a state grade of 35.8% in reading, all schools in the district scored higher. For math all schools scored higher than 48.1%, the state average.

Kewaskum School District plans to increase those percentages as well as the overall grade. With the recent implementation of the STAR Assessment Test, Darcy Budnik, Curriculum Director, relayed, "STAR has really helped us focus on where our strengths and where our deficits are, so we can be very focused on delivery of extended learning time."

Extended learning time is given a minimum of three times a week at the elementary level, and five times a week at both the middle and high school level. In addition, both Farmington and Kewaskum Elementary Schools are Title

I schools and receive federal funding for reading specialists to address reading needs.

A team of Kewaskum educators recently attended a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) conference to learn how to prepare Kewaskum youth for the future demands of people in technology and engineer related careers. Since the high school already has strong programs, the district is looking to create a link to the elementary and middle schools.

As for the report cards, each school has begun creating goals specific to their school to improve identified deficits. When discussing the elementary schools, Budnik said, "Even though they exceeded expectations, the scores were different."

In summation, the report cards have shown which areas the schools need to address with additional help, while maintaining those areas deemed as strong. November will have another round of WKCE testing, and another set of report cards will be released in Spring.

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New DNR Online Map Shows 1.1 Million Private Acres Open to the Public

More than one million private acres classified as open for public use under a landowner-incentive program are easier for outdoor enthusiasts to find thanks to a new online state mapping tool unveiled today by Governor Scott Walker. Earlier this year, the Governor directed the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to develop a mapping system as a short-term solution, while a more comprehensive mapping application is developed by the department.

"The Managed Forest Law (MFL) is a valuable program for the overall health and productivity of our forests," said Governor Walker. "MFL land plays an important role in Wisconsin's timber industry, the tourism industry, and in our

state's rich hunting heritage. Lands enrolled as 'open' in this program must be accessible. The mapping tool will raise awareness about specific parcels of land that are open to the public."

Created by the DNR, the web-based mapping tool will help users find privately owned land open for specific recreational activities under the Managed Forest Law. This law is a landowner-incentive program that incorporates sustainable forest practices, such as timber harvesting, wildlife management, water quality and recreation—while improving public access to these lands.

"We understand some of the MFL land parcels are hard to find," said DNR Secretary

Cathy Stepp. "This new tool was developed in response to immediate concerns that some of the lands are hard to find, especially for the upcoming hunting season. We have been working on a more detailed system that will digitize the tens of thousands of maps associated with the tax law programs. However, because of the size of that project, we wanted to take action now to provide better information in the interim."

To access the mapping tool which also includes lands enrolled under the Forest Crop Law, visit the DNR web site at dnr.wi.gov, and type "MFL open land" in the Search or Keywords field.

Farmington's Orchard Grove Cemetery returned to life

On Saturday, October 20, friends and members of the Farmington Historical Society met to celebrate and discuss the nearly completed restoration of Orchard Grove Cemetery, at the corner of County Highways H and HH in the town of Farmington.

Since the first burial (William Willis, 1848) on grounds which became known as the Farmington Cemetery, the Danforths sold the property to the town in 1854 for \$25. In 1958, families of the interred petitioned the town to take over perpetual care. Larry Stevens has been the caretaker for many years. There are 161 burial plots and over 150 stones, including family monuments, on the site. The latest burial, was Doris Vorpahl, who passed away in 2004.

The audience was treated to a power point presentation which included information about Orchard Grove cemetery restoration and repair in general, and several biographies learned about the interred. Society members Norbert Dettmann, Bernice Wendel, Barb and Vic Shier, and Lisa Lickel, read those biographies.

The restoration project began in 2008 with a tour of the site. Gene Kenney and Lisa Lickel walked through the grounds, documenting stones, their current conditions, state of the landscape, and compared placement of the monuments with a copy of the plat provided by the town.

Kenney attended workshops on proper repair and cleaning technique, as well as communicated with experts in the field. He worked on over half of the stones, lifting fallen ones and building new bases, re-setting smaller headstones and repairing those whose pieces he could gather and reassemble. Many broken pieces were left around a large tree on the property.

Kenney, with occasional help from other members of the society, spent the next three years digging out and laying new foundations, searching for misplaced burial sites and covered stones, properly cleaning lichens and moss grown into the stone, and general cleaning. He documented every step, and made displays and a booklet for public education on the matter. This booklet and other documentation will eventually be made available on the Farmington Historical Society web site.

Some of the tools to clean stones included wooden scrapers and a gentle cleaner, Orvis compound, available at the West Bend Elevator. "Never use anything harsh or sharp on the stones," Kenney said.

"The goal of the society was to restore the cemetery," Kenney said, "and give the broken and tipped stones the care they deserve."

The site caretaker's job is to cut the grass, and although Stevens also cleaned stones, it is not his job to repair or reset the stones. Farmington Historical Society was given permission from the Town Board to undertake the project. The cost of the project was aided by a fundraiser matched by the local chapter of Modern Woodmen of America, assisted by Jeff Jaeger, and donations.

After performing repairs and removal of much overgrown planted material, Kenney went on to research the interred. "Phebe (Wolford - one of the interred) wouldn't let me alone," he said. "Once I learned that she was related to the Albright family, I couldn't stop researching."

He spent hours on genealogy sites and forums to learn the history and the interconnections of the families. Widowed Phebe Wolford, like so many of Farmington's earliest pioneer settlers, came from Pennsylvania along with her grown daughter, son-in-law, and grandchildren. Her

daughter's husband's siblings, the Albrights, joined them. In the terrible summer of 1864, four family members were lost to an unknown epidemic: daughters Mary, 20, and Nancy, 8; son Jacob, and year-old granddaughter, Mary.

The family histories help document the early life in Farmington and Wisconsin. Many of these settlers went on to settle South Dakota in the 1880s, that's why few descendants remain. Marion Schacht and her son Darren, are some of those

few.

They attended the program and were impressed by the repair and research done. Darren, a special education teacher in Milwaukee, graduated from Kewaskum High School, having grown up in Farmington. His family is buried in the cemetery, and he recalls that he caught the family genealogy bug "When I was in sixth grade in the late seventies. I remember my grandmother telling me stories about the Westcotts."

The Westcotts were residents of Orchard Grove, as it was known back then. A thriving cheese factory, school, and several large farms made up the community. The cheese factory no longer exists and the school is now a residence.

The older Westcotts are buried in the cemetery. One son, Glenway Westcott, born in 1901, went on to become a poet and well-known novelist. He died in New York City in 1987. The Grandmothers, 1927, was supposedly based on people who lived in the community and caused a bit of scandal. His books are available for study at the county historical society, and are now out of print.

Kenney was also able to determine that two of the families, the Manleys and the Palmers, were descendants of the Mayflower pilgrims. Two men fought in the War of 1812.

Eleven of the interred were born before 1800. Epitaphs and all readable information has been recorded. There are several burials that took place without a costly headstone, according to burial records, obituaries and family lore.

Guests of the program also included Dana and Cory Heinecke and Debra Kindler who were looking for information on the White family, some of whom are buried at Orchard Grove. Cory has been researching the family, and shared the connection between the Whites and the Marshmans.

"To many people," Kenney said, "a cemetery is just a cemetery. Each headstone, either standing or broken, has a story."

Of the several interesting pieces of information shared at the meeting and afterward, Darren Schacht was able to recreate the epitaph now absent from his great aunt and uncle's headstone, Fredrich and Selma Schacht, who both passed away on April 17, 1894.

Weep not dear parents
Disturb not our rest
Our Savior has loved us
He loved us best

In the Biology of the Florida Keys Marine Environment (BIO 298) course, students will experience first-hand the ecosystem of the Florida Keys. The course focuses on the mangroves, sea grasses and the coral reef.




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

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25 Years Ago

September 18, 1987

On behalf of the Kewaskum Village Board and the Kewaskum Historical Society which joined together to form Kewaskum's United States Constitution Bicentennial Committee, Dan Schmidt, Village Administrator and former president of the Kewaskum Historical Society, presented Bicentennial flags to representatives of Kewaskum's area schools. Flags marking the 200th birthday of the Constitution were presented to Kewaskum School District Administrator Penny Kleinhans, who accepted the gifts on behalf of the Kewaskum School District; Sister Phyllis Wirtz, principal, who accepted for Holy Trinity Catholic School, and Rod Bollinger, principal, who received a flag for St. Lucas Lutheran School. Along with the flags, Schmidt provided informational materials which will allow the schools to apply for various grants related to the Bicentennial celebration of the Constitution. The Village of Kewaskum was also recognized with an official plaque as one of the first seven communities in Wisconsin and one of the first two hundred communities in the United States to establish a United States Constitution Bicentennial Committee.

The American Legion Post #384 of Kewaskum recently dedicated a plaque in memory of the post's namesake, Robert George Romaine. Romaine was the first Washington County casualty of World War II. He was the eldest child of the late Ellwyn and Edna Romaine of Kewaskum. Romaine joined the Navy early in 1942, graduating from the Great Lakes Train-

ing Station in Illinois in June of 1942 as a signalman. Romaine had been in service eight months when he was killed on October 29, 1942, along with fellow crewmembers while they were serving as an armed guard crew aboard an armed merchant cargo vessel. He was reportedly assigned as a gunner on the ship S.S. Pan. The ship was lost somewhere in the North Atlantic Ocean when it was torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine. Romaine's body was never recovered. Because there was no gravesite, the Legion Post requested the plaque and installed it in a place of honor at the base of the post's flagpole. Seaman Second Class Robert G. Romaine was 24 years old when he died. Survivors who attended the ceremony included his brothers, Richard, and his wife, Virginia, of Sheboygan Falls, Curtis, and his wife, LaVerne, of Sarasota, Florida, and sisters, Lucille Hopkins and her husband, Herbert, of Bayfield, Colorado, and Richard's son, Charles. Another sister, Charlotte Faulkner of Stratford, New Jersey, was unable to attend.

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

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

The Department has tentatively decided that the above specified WPDES permits should be issued/reissued. These three permit actions are being conducted jointly because of the operational and ownership connections between the three facilities. The permit issuance/reissuances all need to occur simultaneously so that each facility maintains its permit coverage.

Brief Facility Descriptions:
Daybreak Foods, Inc. - Creekwood Farms (DFICF)
Daybreak Foods Inc. - Creekwood Farm (DFICF) is a Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO) owned and operated by Daybreak Foods Inc. The facility currently has 10,800 animal units and is not planning any significant expansions or changes to the operation. The facility has made a timely application for reissuance of their current permit which expired on October 31, 2012. The Department is proposing to reissue the permit with an effective date of 1/1/2013.
Daybreak Foods Inc. - Creekwood Farm has recently

changed its name from Creekwood Farms. DFICF is an egg laying operation with 920,000 laying chickens in nine barns and 320,000 pullets in three barns. The facility has been permitted since 1985 and is currently permitted under the former Creekwood Farms name.

DFICF produces approximately 20,000 tons of chicken manure annually. Under a contractual arrangement with neighboring Unlimited Renewables (UR), DFICF transfers 100% of the manure and mortalities generated at their facility to UR. The Department has preliminarily approved the Nutrient Management Plan. This plan is basically a contingency plan that addresses the transfer of manure to UR and the process that would occur if operating contracts were not honored. The UR facility and the permitting process are described in the UR section below.

All eggs produced at the facility are broken and separated prior to selling the final products in bulk. 4,000 to 20,000 gallons of egg breaking wastewater are produced daily at the egg breaking facility (16,000 gallon average). The wastewater is processed at a treatment plant (constructed in 2009) prior to being land spread under an approved Land Application Management Plan. The wastewater treatment plant consists of three cells, 1) a 660,000-gallon covered anaerobic digester, 2) a 850,000-gallon aerobic treatment cell and finally 3) a 4,000,000 gallon decanter lagoon where the wastewater is stored until it is eventually land spread. Until recently the treatment system has not met target treatment goals and has been an ongoing source of odors in the area. Over the past year the treatment system has been continuously monitored and frequently adjusted in an attempt to meet the wastewater treatment goals of reducing odors, increasing dissolved oxygen content and lowering the biological oxygen demand of the wastewater. Adjustments to the system include converting the second cell from anaerobic to aerobic, adding additional aerators to the second cell, inoculating the treatment system with preferred microbes and landspreading or moving wastewater of varying strengths between cells in an attempt to reach treatment goals and system equilibrium. The operational considerations for the egg washwater treatment system are addressed in the updated land application management plan required by the proposed permit. Limits and conditions for landspreading egg wash water on

approved sites are also included in the proposed permit.

Unlimited Renewables, LLC (UR) is a manure processing facility that takes 100% of the manure and the mortalities from DFICF and has no animal units. The facility is currently permitted with the Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch facility in Kewaskum due to previous ownership connections. UR has made a complete application for issuance of a separate permit for their manure processing facility adjacent to DFICF. The proposed permit action will issue UR an individual Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO) permit. The facility is not planning any significant expansions or changes to the operation. The Department is proposing to issue the permit with an effective date of 1/1/2013.

UR dries and pelletizes or composts all of the manure and mortalities generated at DFICF and sells the material retail or wholesale as fertilizer under a DATCP fertilizer license. No raw manure is land applied. Wetter manure is composted and distributed to organic farmers for land application on farm fields under the authority and oversight provided by their DATCP fertilizer license. The Department has preliminarily approved the Nutrient Management Plan (NMP) which includes the operating process and information regarding the contractual agreements. This contingency based NMP for UR specifies the process for transfer of the DFICF manure to another permitted CAFO (Roche Farms) after Department approval in the unlikely event that the operating contracts are not honored.

UR has enough roofed space (3 500' x 60' barns) to store at least 4 months of solid manure in the event that their fertilizer business slows or fails.

Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch (KMER)

Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch, LLC is a currently permitted Concentrated Animal Feeding Operation (CAFO) which had previously operated under the name R & J Partnership and later Unlimited Renewables. Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch, LLC is an organic cage free egg laying operation owned and operated by John & Ray Weiss. KMER

currently has 72,000 layers (724 animal units). The operation's current WPDES permit expired on September 30, 2012. The facility made a timely application for reissuance. The Department is proposing to issue the permit with an effective date of 1/1/2013.

The proposed permit action changes the name to Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch and will split the previously combined permit from the UR facility adjacent to DFICF in Lake Mills. The facility has communicated plans to someday expand beyond 100,000 layers at the Kewaskum site. Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch plans to expand to 97,600 layers (976 animal units) during the next 5 years. This expansion will require upgrades to an existing barn and the Nutrient Management Plan must reflect the additional manure generated.

Manure is composted and sold or transferred to organic farmers for land application on farm fields under the authority and oversight provided by their DATCP fertilizer license. Kettle Moraine Egg Ranch, LLC also has 288 acres available for land application of manure and process wastewater. The Department has preliminarily approved the



Informational Hearing Date, Time, and Location: The informational hearing for all three facilities will be held jointly on Monday December 3, 2012, at 10 am in the Lake Mills Municipal Building, 200 Water St., Lake Mills, WI 53551. An informal question and answer session will be held prior to the informational hearing from 9 am until 10 am in the same room as the hearing.

The Department of Natural Resources, pursuant to Section 283.49, Wisconsin Statutes, has scheduled a public informational hearing for the purpose of giving all interested persons an opportunity to make a statement with respect to the proposed permit actions, the terms of the nutrient management plans, and the applications for these operations.

The hearing officer will conduct the hearing in an orderly fashion and will use procedures specified in Subchapter II of ch. NR 203, Wis. Adm. Code, necessary to insure broad public participation in the hearing. The hearing officer will open the hearing and make a concise statement of the scope and purpose of the hearing and shall state what procedures will be used during the course of the hearing. The hearing officer shall explain the method of notification of the final decision to grant

or deny the permit and the methods by which the decision may be reviewed in a public adjudicatory hearing.

The hearing officer may place limits on individual oral statements to insure an opportunity for all persons present to make statements in a reasonable period of time and to prevent undue repetition. The hearing officer may also limit the number of representatives making oral statements on behalf of any person or group.

Informational and clarifying questions and oral statements shall be directed through the hearing officer. Cross-examination shall not be allowed.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS
Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and

cast his or her ballot, except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Where an optical scan system is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

An elector must cast a vote for President and Vice President jointly on one ticket. To vote for persons whose names do not appear on the ballot, write in the names of individuals for both offices on the lines provided. A presidential candidate will not be counted.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If an elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot, and promptly leave the polling place.

After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly. An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector. Both animals had to be dressed in the wild due to their size. The mountain caribou was about 800 pounds and had an antler span of 40 inches and shot from 194 yards.

In the early evening on the last day of the trip and at a distance of 347 yards, the moose was downed. The moose was approximately 1500 pounds and with the antlers 52 inches tip to tip.

For both father and son, it was a "once in a lifetime hunt."

Steady improvement

came through playing year round. "Volleyball was a big commitment for me. I play it all year long," Aycock said. When the high school seasons were over, she played for the Milwaukee Sting, driving to Milwaukee four times a week for practices. In eighth grade, Aycock stood 5-11, and she has grown nearly three inches since then.

"I'm the tallest girl in the high school," she said, so naturally she plays the majority of the time in the middle as a hitter and blocker.

St. Mary's Springs won the team title with 56 points, with Laconia and Mayville second and third with 79 and 82, respectively.

Bohn's time at the state meet was 15:32.36.47.

Running in Shorewood on Friday, the Kewaskum girls finished 11th (last) in a very rugged Division 2 sectional. They had 281 points. Leading the Indians was sophomore Calay McClyman with a good time of 17:06, which was 30th overall. The other counters were Jessica Nurkala, 59 in 19:28; Amanda Plachinski, 60th in 19:30; April Stern, 64th in 19:45; and Annie Fiebig, 68th in 20:29.

Only one boy, Jared Sanborn, competed. He was clocked in 20:03.53 for the 5,000 meters and was 63rd overall.

Austin, Texas, an NCAA-II school, she was offered a volleyball scholarship for the next four years.

"It's not a full scholarship," she said, "but it's a decent amount of money."

Aycock had offers and interest from other schools, including some in D1, but what she liked about St. Edward's is its excellent academics. She
