School tax rate \$9.76, up 86¢

State aid dip forces school district to ask for more in taxes

The Kewaskum Board of Education has approved their 2012-'13 budget with a 9.76% increase in the tax rate over last year's budget. For the second year in a row, revenue through taxes will fund the budget more than state aid.

The tax rate is \$9.67 (down a dime from what was approved at the annual meeting) per \$1,000 of equalized value meaning the owner of a \$150,000 home will pay \$1,450.50. The rate is up 86 cents from last year but down a dime from the estimate at the annual meeting two months ago.

The increase in the tax levy can be attributed to another significant decrease in state aid. Kewaskum's aid decreased by \$874,973 (9.9%). To make matters worse, the district had a decrease in their revenue limit (authorized by the state) due to declining enrollment.

The general fund tax levy - the portion supported by local taxes - is \$10,055,697, up \$438,480 from last

year.

The entire balanced budget is \$19,513,513 down over \$1 million from last year. Of that, state aid contributes \$7,977,029 and property taxes the remaining \$9.6 million. As it did last year, property taxes contribute more to the budget than state aid.

The district was however given an extra \$50 per pupil, called Per Pupil Adjustment Aid for this budget only. It is aid outside of the revenue limit and will not raise base revenues and forces the district to tax at 100% of the revenue limit. This meant an additional \$97,150 for the district's budget.

"The hard part of this is we are in a unique situation where state government was forcing us to raise the tax levy to it's fullest in order to receive additional state aid," Superintendent of School Jim Smasal stated.

Fund balance, essentially the district's savings account used for emergencies like a boiler breaking down and to reduce cash flow borrowing and to help maintain a good credit rating, is at \$3.340 million, or 17.1 percent of the operating budget.

The board approved the budget, 5-2. President Tim Ramthun and Grace Mueller voted against the budget.

"The budget process, from continued reduced state subsidies and concern about the state's flawed formula for calculating district dollars for distribution, combined with the need to do more internally regarding the justification of allocations to various district departments, has been a concern throughout this entire process. I was never comfortable passing the affect of both conditions directly through to the taxpayers, so I voted 'no,'" Ramthun stated.

"I give the school board a lot of credit because they were put in a very unfortunate situation where they were forced to really raise the levy to its maximum, which is a difficult thing to do in this tough economical times. This board is very sympathetic to its community members, the last thing they wanted to do was raise taxes, but the state aid dropped and that put the onus on the board to raise the levy to its limit," concluded Smasal.

Incumbents hold on to seats locally, Republican vote heavy again

One thing can be said about Tuesday's fall election, it was busy. Each municipality saw increases in the number of voters coming to the polls. Locally, each incumbent was re-elected with the exception of the US Senate seat that went to Tammy Baldwin.

Numbers in the Presidential election were still being tallied at press time however President Barack Obama received another four years. Obama also claimed the state of Wisconsin receiving 1,597,201 votes (53%) Romney earned 1,395,499 votes (46%).

The state made history as it elected its first female to the U.S. Senate, Baldwin received 1,528,143 leaving Tommy Thompson behind with 1,363,317. This was the first time the political stalwart Thompson lost a race in the state, he had been involved in state politics since 1966.

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner easily won another term to the House of Representatives. His 249,267 votes completely outweighed Democrat Dave Heaster's 117,972

Those in the 20th Senate District will continue to call Republican Glenn Grothman their senator after receiving 66,254 votes. He received a challenge from Democrat West Bend teacher Tanya Lohr who tallied 30,140 votes.

Being new to the area didn't hurt Saukville native Duey Stroebel. He will also retain his Assembly seat in the 60th district. Stroebel received 23,873 votes compared to his challenger Perry Duman who received 9,670.

Assemblyman Daniel LeMahieu ran unopposed in the 59th district.

In the village of Kewaskum Clerk Stephanie Justmann stated that 2,296 voters turned out to cast ballots. This was up 178 voters compared to the 2008 Presidential Election. A total of 551 voters cast absentee ballots.

"It went very well, similar to the recall," said Justman at the end of the day Tuesday.

The Kewaskum Community Pantry recently received 1274 Food and Personal Care Items from the Boy Scouts during their annual drive. "We were very happy to receive these items as our shelves were

getting a little bare. Thank you to all those who donated to this drive," stated Tom Knorr, food pantry volunteer.

The area churches, Holy Trinity, Peace UCC, House of Prayer, St. Johns New Fane,

Salem UCC, and St. Michael's Parish continue to support the pantry with weekly and monthly donations.

The following is a list of the top ten items that the pantry could use: cereal, instant mashed potatoes, instant white or brown rice, spaghetti-sauces, chunky soups, canned pastas, cream soups, canned tuna, canned fruits and hamburger helper.

Elections

The Romney/Ryan ticket garnered 1,572 votes compared to the Obama/Biden ticket's 682 votes. Thompson received 1,498 votes while Baldwin received 672 votes. Sensenbrenner saw 1,622 while Heaster received 549. Grothman received 1,584 while Lohr tallied 626.

In the township of Kewaskum Clerk Nancy Boden said "Things were very busy, an extremely large turnout."

The total for absentee ballots was broken as 104 were received. The township had broken records set during the 2008 election before 4 p.m. Boden said 37 new voters were registered bringing the total of registered voters to 757.

Numbers there were Romney- 507, Obama- 188; Thompson- 481 to Baldwin's

196; Sensenbrenner received 536 while Heaster earned 142; Grothman saw 523 while Lohr garnered 170.

Handling her first Presidential election Farmington Clerk Chris Schellinger said things went, "as expected, we had steady long lines in the morning."

A total of 2,239 voters turned out to cast ballots. Schellinger said she added 123 new voters and received 279 absentee ballots.

Numbers in Farmington were: Romney 1,678 to Obama's 532; Thompson received 1,625 while Baldwin received 533; Sensenbrenner received 1,680 while Heaster received 438; Grothman garnered 1,672 while Lohr had 513; Stroebel received 1,649 to Duman's 455.

Letter to the Editor

To the Editor:

I never thought I would be so happy to see the Kewaskum Gridiron season come to an end. We usually look forward to it and are often sad when it is over. We had some really great teams this year and were put up against stiff competition. It was looking to be another fun experience for both kids and adults.

This year, however, many of the kids were discouraged and adults were not impressed. Coaches were playing students that were having behavioral and academic problems throughout the season, for the sake of playing their "Favorites". When kids get into trouble in the community or in school they should see consequences from the extra-curricular activities as well.

The "Law of Effect" states that the likelihood of the repetition of an action depends on the consequences. Playing the kids that are making poor choices only shows the other kids that you can get away with making bad decisions with very little consequence. What kind of message is this sending to the kids that are following rules and academic expectations? What kind of message does this send

to those that feel the rules do not apply to them? The only consequences came to the entire team during practices. Why should the only consequence be to the whole team, and not much of a consequence to the individuals?

Coaches have also said that they often make their playlist determinations in the beginning of the season. How do they know what the potential of the other players are, if they are not willing to give everyone a fair chance? We have a great team that has worked together as a "TEAM" for several years and won every game. This year the coaches were using only their favorite players over and over until the opposing teams figured out who to target. We obviously do not win games this way because they took on their first losses in years.

Our Gridiron kids know the field they are playing and have expressed concern to the coaches about how some teams were playing and what they needed to do to improve. Coaches were not making adjustments or playing special teams regardless of what they were being told was happening on the field. If Gridiron expects to continue, each kid should be given opportuni-

ties to excel and grow, otherwise there will not be enough players to make up the Gridiron teams and future High School teams.

Kewaskum woman involved in fatal WB crash

WEST BEND- A collision involving a pedestrian is still under investigation a week later. That accident left a West Bend man dead after he was struck by van driven by a Kewaskum woman.

The accident took place in the 700 block of S. Main Street on Tuesday, Oct. 30, at about 6:30 p.m. A 67-year-old man was struck by a southbound van. That van was driven by a 41-year-old female from Kewaskum.

Gerald R. Maslom, 67, of West Bend, was transported by West Bend Fire Department Ambulance to St. Joseph's Hos-

pital in West Bend and then transferred by Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital.

According to police, Maslom later died the following day at approximately 8:00 p.m. The preliminary investigation has determined that Maslom was not in a crosswalk and was crossing the street at mid-block. It does not appear that alcohol or drugs were a factor in this motor vehicle crash.

According to Lieutenant Micheal Hartwell, of The West Bend Police Department, the accident remains under investigation by his department with the assistance of Wisconsin State Patrol. The name of the van driver has not been released by police.





Seven years ago, Sue Polster opened an assisted living facility in Campbellsport, and six months later opened a second in Jackson, but that wasn't enough. "I always wanted West Bend," Polster said, and on October 24, she had open house for Ivy Manor II in West Bend.

At the corner of Indiana and Forest, two buildings stand side by side- Ivy Manor I and Ivy Manor II. By 2014, a third building will be started to create a three building complex, as requested by the city of West Bend.

Ivy Manor is a "unique concept compared to some other places," Polster reveals. The facility has 20 units, but six of the rooms are suites de-

signed for couples, so 26 residents can be accommodated. "There is a lot of open space for the size of the building," Polster relays.

Also unique is the location, nestled along the Milwaukee River, there is a patio for residents to sit. "You can sit out on the large patio and see the river, the ducks, and the cranes and heron that come," Polster said, "which is nice in a city."

The rooms are big enough so residents don't feel too close, but small enough to know your neighbors. Each room is equipped with cable television service and a private bath with a walk in shower.

Polster, with her husband David, and daughter Stacy Noreika oversee management of the facilities. "It is small

enough that it is home-like," Polster commented about the atmosphere, while talking about the homemade meals and snacks. Special nutritional needs can also be accommodated.

All of the Ivy Manor locations are CBRF (Community Based Residential Facility) certified and can accept early to moderate dementia, hospice care and elderly clients needing assistance. Residents can be non-ambulatory, ambulatory, or disabled. "Everything is easily accessible," Polster stated.

Monitoring for health is done by onsite RN/LPN and medication management (including administration) are provided. Care plans are designed for residents. Personal care assistance is available as

well.

Residents are offered a daily activity such as bingo, cards, crafts, and afternoon socials. The Senior Center of West Bend also comes to sing with residents supporting a strong music program. Also available are church services

and a beauty/barber shop.

"Just give us a call, and come for a tour," Polster encourages those interested by calling (262) 334-1590.

The Prize of Freedom

On November 11, we honor our veterans for their unwavering service and sacrifice. This Year of the Veteran we commemorate, acknowledge, and affirm the contributions made by our veterans to secure the liberties we continue to enjoy.

Veterans served with courage and honor. But why were they willing to fight? They served because they believe not that war is good, but that sometimes it is necessary. They served not for the glory of war, but for the prize of freedom.

Who were these men and women who fought for the prize of freedom?

I read with great appreciation just a few days ago of one such individual who, like so many, went to war not knowing if he would come back. He dared risk it all for the prize of freedom.

James Des Jardins, Green Bay, was a young fighter pilot

whose plane was shot down in the German countryside in November 1944. He had been Missing in Action since. Just days ago, after all of these years, James Des Jardins was identified and his remains were returned to his family, a family that 68 years earlier had mourned and buried his older brother, also a pilot shot down during World War II. But this day, the day when James returned home, it was a day of celebration, not just for James' homecoming, but for everything he sacrificed to defend. His family celebrated the gift James left for them: freedom.

Einar Ingman, Kewaskum, was an Army corporal who served in Korea. When the leaders of the two leading squads of the assault platoon of his company were wounded during a mission, he assumed command and combined the squads. He then located and charged an enemy machine gun that was attacking his men and threw a grenade at it. He killed the remaining crew with his rifle. He charged a

second enemy machine gun. He was hit by grenade fragments and gunfire and seriously wounded. Before falling unconscious, he killed the entire enemy guncrew, compelling the remaining hostile troops to retreat. For his valor and actions beyond the call of duty, Ingman received the highest military honor, the Medal of Honor. Next week the Department will celebrate the gift of freedom Corporal Ingman gave us as we unveil a monument at the Wisconsin Veterans Home at King to Wisconsin's 62 Medal of Honor recipients.

These are just two stories of selflessness and gallantry among thousands, stories of men and women who revered freedom. They defended our right to live in peace. And they deserve to be celebrated.

So this year, let's celebrate the nearly 400,000 veterans living in Wisconsin and those who are no longer with us. Let's celebrate the men and women who stood up for you and me. They have made our

world safer, more democratic, more peaceful. They defeated the forces of fascism, imperialism, and terrorism. This is the prize of freedom.

Today, and every day, let us celebrate the Wisconsin men and women who have served our country, appreci-

ate their sacrifices, and take a moment to honor the legacy of these heroes and especially those who made the ultimate sacrifice.




Preview day at St. Mary's Springs





Indians receive seven all-conference nods

Numbers were down, injuries were up and the coaching staff shifted around a bit.

But as Coach Jason Piittmann puts it, "tradition never graduates" when it comes to Kewaskum High School football.

The Indians made the playoffs again this season, a place with which they are plenty familiar and a place other teams would just like to visit.

Kewaskum finished 6-3 overall, 5-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. It's the first season in recent memory they haven't contended for the title right down to the last game and the first season in several in which they lost two games in a row.

For the first time in eight seasons, the Indians didn't win 10 games and didn't win a playoff game.

Piittmann said he had the lowest numbers since he started coaching in 2003, and the Indians had their fair share of injuries.

"This was definitely a challenging season for us," he said at the team's annual awards ceremony last Sunday.

But a .667 winning percentage isn't exactly something to dismiss. While it's a down year in Kewaskum, it would be a highlight for most other schools, especially those in Washington County, which regularly struggle to send teams to the postseason.

Less players meant more had to play both sides of the ball, and the Indians' skill and work ethic shined come all-conference voting. Though they finished third in the EWC, they landed seven first team all-conference players, including three players who made the offensive and defensive teams.

Nate Krupp was a unanimous selection and named the Defensive Back of the Year. The senior had 33 tackles, four interceptions and two touchdowns. For the entire season, he had 43 tackles and five picks.

On offense, Krupp made the second team as a receiver, racking up 534 yards and four touchdowns on 28 catches for a 19.1 yards-per-catch average. For the season, he had 615 yards and five scores on 35 catches.

Alex Fechter was named EWC Defensive Lineman of the Year and selected to first team offensive tackle despite missing some time due to injury. He made 61 tackles, including 10 for a loss, had three sacks and one forced fumble.

Teddy Wollner continued the several-year tradition of Kewaskum having an inside linebacker on the EWC first team. He had 93 tackles, 11 for a loss, two forced fumbles and an interception. For the entire year, he had 107 tackles and

two forced fumbles.

On offense, Wollner ran for 723 yards and eight touchdowns on 114 carries, averaging 103.3 yards per game. For the season, he ran for 899 yards and scored 10 times.

Piittmann said those are impressive numbers but even more so given late in the season Wollner asked to be moved to fullback to fill in for injured Derek Aupperle.

Other all-conference players included: first team guard Justin Zolp, first team kicker Hunter Flanders, and honorable mention defensive end Greg Rate.

Piittmann said one of his proudest moments of the season came during a loss. Kewaskum fell behind Two Rivers, 21-0, in the first quarter. While many teams would have packed it in, the Indians fought back, shutting out Two Rivers the rest of the game. The comeback fell two points short at 21-19, but Piittmann said he was as proud of his team in that game as he was in any for the entire season.

After two straight losses headed into the final game of the regular season against a Sheboygan Falls team needing a victory to qualify for the playoffs, Kewaskum came up big again, making several game-changing plays in a 14-7 win.

"Our kids answered the call when they had to," Piittmann said.

A 48-13 loss at Seymour in the first round of the playoffs wasn't how Kewaskum wanted to go out, but Piittmann said if a few plays in the first half were executed differently,

the game would have had a different complexion.

"We couldn't have been prouder as coaches of what these kids did and how they came through," he said.

For the team awards, offensive line coach Jason Last selected Zolp as his offensive lineman of the year, earning the highest mark on his articulate 1-4 grading scale (1 - pancake, 2 - good job, 3 - struggled, 4 - you sucked).

For those voted on by players, Flanders was named special teams most valuable player for his field-position changing kicks and ability to score. Fechter was the defensive MVP and Wollner the offensive MVP. Defensive back Nick Banks was named most improved, excelling while being switched from one side of the field to the other.

Piittmann thanked the team's Leadership Council, now in its second year. Players apply to be part of the group and meet throughout the summer. Members include Matt Ringwell, Flanders, Brett Boegel, Banks, Michael Holt, Casey Steinman, Aupperle, Woller, Fechter and Zolp.

Team captains come from the council. Those were Boegel, Aupperle, Wollner and Fechter.

Team manager emeritus Josh Dreher, who last year in a tuxedo announced his retirement from the team, pulled what Piittmann called a "Brett Favre" and came back again this season. (The coaches appreciated it because he sometimes brings them snacks at practice.)

Dreher received a basket

of goodies from the players, including two cans of Pringles. He said he would be back for "one more year."

Kewaskum reloads its team next year with a junior varsity squad that got blown out in the first week by West Bend East, 40-0. It then proceeded to go undefeated in conference, winning every game by double digits.

"This group of guys started something great," Piittmann said. "The sky's the limit for these guys if they keep working hard."

The freshman finished 3-5

on the season, 3-4 in conference. Coach Dave Rockhill said the team's best game was the last one against undefeated Sheboygan Falls. It came down to the last play, and Kewaskum fell just short, 25-20.

"I think that proves we can play with anybody," he said.

One of Piittmann's annual highlights, the academic awards, will be released later this week as first quarter grades were still coming in.

"It was exciting to watch these players play the game and to coach them," said Piwoni. "They truly made this


team great and we enjoyed our best season in recent memory because of their commitment and character. What a great group of guys to coach I will really miss the seniors and everything they stand for."
