

Man beaten at Village apartment complex, attacker at large

A 36-year-old Milwaukee man was beaten at an apartment complex in the 200 block of Knights Avenue Thursday evening Nov. 29. Police are continuing their search for the attacker who remains at large.

Kewaskum's Chief of Police Tom Bishop, said the attack took place shortly before 6 p.m. as the victim was waiting to enter the apartment complex. Robbery is not suspected in the motive according to the Chief as nothing was taken from the victim.

"The victim was struck from behind with an unknown object," Chief Bishop explained. After the attack, the aggressor fled on foot.

The victim stated he did not recognize his attacker so police do not have a description. It is believed the attacker may have fled through a neighboring residential area and may have been seen.

Kewaskum EMS responded to the scene and transported the victim to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend with non-life threatening injuries. He was later treated and released.

Kewaskum alums assist UW-Oshkosh Titans with upset

There is certainly no quit in the UW-Oshkosh football team.

For the third week in a row, the Titans have wiped out deficits to keep their playoff hopes alive.

This time, the opponent was third-ranked Linfield College (OR), and Oshkosh was down 15 points before touching back with two, fourth quarter touchdowns to tie the game at 24-all and eventually win 31-24 in overtime.

"It was definitely crazy," KHS Alumni Brandon Peter said about the exciting comeback. "It's all a dream."

When asked if he was worried down 24-9 in the fourth quarter, Peter said, "Not really, With our offense, we

know we can score in a minute if we have to," also confident the defense can get the ball back in a hurry.

Nick Wara's quarterback sneak with 7:43 remaining brought the Titans within two points, and they tied the game on a Wara to Cory Wippenfurth pass for the 2-point conversion.

About the Linfield field goal try that was blocked in the closing seconds of regulation, Peter said, "I took a knee and just watched it," and after seeing a teammate knock it to the ground, "Then I had to get ready for the overtime."

In the OT, Oshkosh got the ball first and needed just two plays to score and what a spectacular play it was. When Wara threw the pass, it looked to be too long, but somehow Caleb Voss got

a hand on it, tapped it to himself and made a circus catch.

That's only half the story, however, because Voss was extremely close to the sideline. He turned his body and tip-toed to the end zone for a 21-yard TD.

On its possession, Linfield went to its bag of tricks on second down, but on the double-reverse pass call, the second handoff was botched, and Andrew Thompson fell on the loose ball, cinching the victory.

The fifth-rated Titans improved their season record to a perfect 13-0 and will face the University of St. Thomas Saturday in St. Paul, MN., at 2 p.m.

POLICE REPORTS

In late October, a concerned citizen called Kewaskum Police to report suspicious behavior of a group of people dressed all in black.

After parking two vehicles at the McDonalds parking lot, the group of six people walked away from the car. They proceeded westbound toward the corner of Badger and Prospect.

Police encountered the suspects at the back service door of a garage. The suspects were caught smoking marijuana at a residence; however, one subject fled on foot. After giving chase, the subject was apprehended.

Additional help with the situation was requested from the Washington County Sheriff Department. A dog was brought out to sniff the vehicles for drugs, but the drivers consented to a search before the dog was used.

A search of the cars revealed drugs and drug paraphernalia. All the suspects were juveniles and students of Kewaskum High School. Several citations were issued.

On November 3, a wallet was taken from an unlocked vehicle. The wallet contained driver license, debit card (with pin number), and \$100 in cash. Later on November 7, the actor used the card at Westbury bank to withdrawal \$200, but was not identified since the actor covered up the camera.

On November 8, two trucks belonging to a resident in the 500 block of Washington Ave were illegally entered. An engraved iPod was taken from one truck and loose change of about \$5 taken in total from both trucks.

Around November 10, an unknown actor stole both a black and orange digital Kodak camera with a black

camera bag and a knife from an unlocked truck in the 400 block of Reagan Dr. Between the dates of November 13-14, another resident and her fiancé had money taken from their vehicles.

Kewaskum Police Department had three calls about thefts from unlocked vehicles on November 15. Two residents had loose change taken from their vehicle with an approximate value of \$5 and of \$1.50. The third vehicle was rummaged through, but the owner did not notice anything missing at this time.

No arrests have been made at this time. Though there haven't been any recent reports of thefts from vehicles, residents seeing suspicious activity in or around vehicles are urged to contact the police.

On Nov. 15, a half-dozen instructors from Jazzercise studios in Kewaskum, West Bend and

"We wanted to keep it local and since it was a women's event, we wanted to give to breast cancer," says Kewaskum Jazzercise instructor Kate Korth.

The structured, choreographed 45-minute set consisted of 10 burlesque-style dances that focused on cardio and strength training.

A blend of pilates, yoga, jazz dance, resistance training and kick-boxing, Jazzercise combines dance-based cardio with strength training and stretching to sculpt, tone and lengthen muscles for maximum fat burn.

Johnson was pleased at the turnout, especially for a first event.

"They made the night a rousing success," she said.

Johnson says studio owners in Kewaskum, Hartford and West Bend are talking about making it an annual event.

"It might be fun to do it before the deer hunters take off. It's something the ladies would look forward to every year," says Johnson.

After the workout, dancers retired for food and raffle drawings.

Adell man threatens Farmington farm workers

TOWN of FARMINGTON- A 24-year-old Adell man was arrested last week after witnesses state he entered a dairy farm and pointed a handgun at them. Authorities later discovered the man was undocumented immigrant and turned him over to Federal authorities.

The man entered the Chris Elbe farm on Orchard Valley Rd around 2:30 a.m. demanding to speak to a subject that worked there. When the witnesses stated that subject was not there, the suspect displayed a handgun and pointed it at them. After several minutes, the suspect left the farm.

Deputies developed information that the suspect lived in the town of Scott. With the assistance of Sheboygan County deputies, the suspect was located there and placed under arrest. During a subsequent interview, the suspect admitted to possessing a firearm and deputies suspected he was intoxicated. He also stated that he was in the United States illegally. The suspect was booked into the Washington County Jail on two charges of Endangering Safety by Reckless

Use of a Weapon, and Carrying a Concealed Weapon.

Deputies later contacted Immigration and Customs Enforcement with case information. They verified his illegal status. With that information, the Washington

County DA will not pursue state charges, and the suspect will be charged with Federal firearms and immigration charges. The suspect was turned over to Federal authorities on November 29.







many birds head to warmer even tropical climates. But, there are many species that remain to tough out rigorous weather and some that even migrate from the North to enjoy our balmy winters. For many people it's a special treat on a dull gray day of winter to catch a glimpse of a bright red cardinal or hear the cheery notes of a chickadee.

Bill Mueller, a member of the Wisconsin Society of Ornithology, will explain what birds remain through the

cold and snow of a Wisconsin winter and which ones are most likely to be seen in our yards. He will provide tips and techniques of attracting these hardy feathered friends to your yard by meeting their basic needs of survival. He will also cover how to keep your bird feeding area free from disease and unhealthy practices. Make sure to join us for an evening with the birds.







A tribute to Ellie Ramthun, my dad

A son first, he then became a husband, a father, a grandfather, a great-grandfather, a brother, a brother-in-law, an uncle, a great-uncle, a cousin, a foreman, a mentor, a christian, a neighbor and a friend to many...and he relished in the honor of all.

Childhood didn't start out easy for dad however as his parents divorced when he was four. He initially stayed with the Ramthun family in Kewaskum yet around the time he was seven (1941), he went to live with his mother. During that time, with the economy as it was and WWII just starting, he ultimately moved to new towns and schools seven times between the first and eighth grade! You could say that with the trials and tribulations of that instability he would have been affected. Perhaps that's true but it didn't show with dad, especially in his academic achievements as he earned mostly A's and some B's, regardless of where he attended, one-room schools and all!

During the summer months, he'd come back to Kewaskum to be with his father, to help the Ramthun family business as well as work on the Krautkramer (Roger) and Backhaus (Victor) farms. He enjoyed working on the farms. He saw himself as a servant of the earth, attracted by a hard-days work and the accomplishment from it...

Dad ultimately moved back to Kewaskum after his grandpa, Henry Ramthun, passed away in 1947, starting the eighth grade that fall and as a KHS freshman in 1948. This is where dad's character really started to show. His intelligence, work ethic, dedication, respect, loyalty, leadership, communication skills, relationship building and passion for doing his best in all he did, came out. Continuing on with his academic excellence, he also excelled in the extra-curricular sports of football (QB), baseball (catcher) and basketball (point guard). He was the go-to guy for Ernie (Doc) Mitchell, starting at the varsity level in all sports as a sophomore! Their relationship continued beyond KHS (Ernie's daughter Patty was one of our babysitters!)

In the 1952 Chieftan, dad's list of accomplishments included: Class President 2-4, Class Sargent-at-Arms 3, basketball 1-4, baseball 1-4, football 1-4, letterman 2-4, prom committee 3, prom royalty 3, homecoming committee 1-4, homecoming royalty 4, football captain 4, operetta 3, Chieftan staff 4 and Christmas program 4. His overall KHS achievements directly reflected his amazing character and Clifford Rose, then KHS principal, recognized his abilities and insisted dad go onto college. Fate stepped in however and with family business requests for help coming from his uncle's, Myron Perschbacher and Harvey Ramthun Sr., Dad ultimately stayed in Kewaskum to help his family, earning his PhD in life here and we are all grateful he did! Once an Indian, always an Indian, even then.

Though both knew each other since 1947 and served as homecoming royalty months earlier, fate stepped in again the

spring of 1953 when, while both were at the popular hang-out of Bill Brun's (corner of 28/45), dad jokingly indicated he was going to take mom out for her birthday. Mom thought he was kidding so days later while walking home from school, she saw dad approach in his car and stuck her leg out. Dad stopped. He eventually took her home and while doing so, mom asked if he was serious about the 'date'. He was and on February 11th, 1953, mom's 18th birthday, they went on their first date, a Tyrone Power movie called "Quovadis." Soon after the date, dad became quite ill and needed to be treated by mom's father, Dr. Edwards, who jokingly asked what my mother had done to that 'very nice boy'. I think it was just a way to see mom as after her KHS graduation and attendance at nursing school, dad began to write mom letters, love letters, two to three per week! He was smitten by her and they married ten months after their first date, December 12, 1953. They made a great couple, both incredibly attractive, in love and 'right' for each other, soul mates. It is truly amazing how their lives got to this point after all that had taken place, especially with dad! (Coming attractions - read dad's 1952 yearbook comments to mom).

Stability grew with an increase of family and a new Kewaskum home at 1435 Roseland Drive, both now a joyful part of their lives as of 1956. The growing family resided there until 1970 when dad and mom purchased the 80 acre Wesenburg farm just north of Kewaskum. It has been their home since, the foundation of many great memories for all coming from the joy of being in the country, family gatherings and in farming. Doing the work associated to successful farming was a genuine joy for dad, even while he continued his professional role as a journeyman plumber, a service he performed for more than 50 years, retiring finally in 1996.

Although successful in his life, dad also suffered with challenges and even failures. He had losses, disappointments and a vice or two over time but these were the exceptions. His strength and commitment to family, his practicality and drive for excellence, a passion for doing right and compassion for his fellow man, turned constructive events into opportunities, a trademark in his life. He never hesitated applying himself in any fashion in order to get the necessary work done. He was an inspiration, even for his fellow plumbers, gaining the reputation from his work mates that if you wanted to know 'what' to do, to "ask Ellie" or if an apprentice needed to know 'how' to do a job correctly, to "watch Ellie". He impressed all many times with his uncanny ability to retain numbers and plan details while on any job. He was also well-versed in history, not just local matters but our national history as well. He was especially drawn to the Civil War era. He was a born leader, structured and practical, respected by all he ever worked with...

Courage was also reflective in his entire life, with two particular events to share. The first was in the late 1960's when dad was deer hunting with his brother-in-law, Bill Edwards, several from the Dreher family and some others. Apparently, there was a situation that involved alcohol, a knife, a fight and the need for dad to step in and help save Bill from harm. As told, dad may have actually saved a life that day! The other was Friday, November 2, 2012 at 5:00 a.m. After suffering the second heart attack in his life 30 minutes earlier and having been resuscitated, he stayed true to his word, as he was a man of his word, and with conviction for quality of life, instructed the medical personnel to remove the ventilator. He knew what this would do yet even in that moment... even in that moment, knowing he didn't want to go but that he needed to for himself and his family, dad went to sleep for the last time in an exceptional way, his way, with dignity and grace; peacefully, painlessly and quickly. I honor, respect and accept dad's final decision of his life, the ultimate sacrifice, as it was a selfless act of love for us all and we pray that God received his servant with great joy. In the end, what strengthened dad's resolve most was his faith in Jesus, his Lord and Savior, in God the Father and in God the Holy Spirit. He didn't just read the bible - he studied it and it became a priority in his life. His faith was his strength, more so these last years, which is the example for us all!

For those who knew dad and take him to his rest today, they knew him as a generous, good and decent man, a role-model and hero. He was a salt-of-the-earth man and of the many values he taught, the one most profound was that you shouldn't define your life by your job, your job title or how much money you make. To dad, it was more about the service you perform and the ability to make a positive difference in the lives of the many. That was simply his goal, one he humbly exceeded! Without question, he will be greatly missed...

His legacy is his life - what he did and how he did it, as is his family and how they too should lead a purposeful life, just as he did.

In closing, I wish to read an expression from the funeral of a good friend's mother that I attended earlier this year:



1. Reported on the current phosphorus regulation compliance alternatives for the Waste Water Treatment Plant. The alternatives include contracting with a design engineering firm, discharging into wetlands, trading phosphorus levels with other areas or incorporating an adoptive management plan. 

New boys' basketball coach Keith Traska let his team out of practice 30 minutes early on Monday so they could rest before Tuesday's game against West Bend West.

Nobody left.

The players hung around to shoot for the half hour - voluntarily.

It's that kind of commitment and culture Traska wants to bring to Kewaskum basketball.

"They want to win. They

want to do things the right way," he said.

Back is Hunter Flanders, a 6-foot-4 lanky, athletic senior with quickness and leaping ability that creates matchup problems for defenses.

Corey Burdick returns in a week after serving a suspension for knocking over a first baseman on a base hit during baseball season.

Traska coached both Flanders and Burdick when they were freshmen on the junior varsity team a few years ago, and he knows what they're ca-

pable of.

Others already making some noise this year are Nate Stockhausen and Nate Krupp. Stockhausen matched Flanders' game-high 20 points in a 63-53 win against Mayville last Saturday, and Krupp added 17.

Traska expects post player Greg Rate to contribute as well, making a balanced scoring attack.

"The nice thing is there's four of 'em. I don't know how you're going to stop four guys who can score," he said.

Coming off of a season that yielded one Eastern Wisconsin Conference victory, the Indians may surprise some people this season. Traska is banking on it.

"Hopefully teams will overlook us and we can shock them," he said.

Traska said athleticism is his team's strength so far, and its attitude.

"We have a team - they play with a chip on their shoulder," he said. "They want to work."

Traska is working on taking advantage of both traits. He hails from St. Louis where hoops is played a little quicker than what people are used to in these parts, and Traska is teaching his team the up-tempo pace.

"Excitement and energy," he said.

Defensively, the Indians will play zone and man-to-man.

"We're going to mix it up a lot. Keep everyone off balance," Traska said.

Concerns so far include lack of reach - both on the

bench and in the air. Depth and height might be challenges. Flanders is the big guy at 6-4. Against Grafton in the season opener last week, the Indians ran into a couple of giants in a 67-42 loss.

But this team has some heart.

"We've got guys who are dedicated. They play hard," Traska said. "We've still got to develop them into basketball players."

Therein lies one challenge. Traska said he was told Kewaskum is more of a football and baseball school.

"We're trying to change the culture. There's no reason Kewaskum can't be a basketball school, either, with the athletes we have," he said.

Traska said realistically he would like the Indians to finish in the middle of the pack in the

EWC, but "I don't see anything that says we cannot win conference this year. We're just going to have to go out and battle tooth and nail each game."

It's going to be a grind.

"There will not be an easy win in conference this year. Every game we're going to have to battle," he said.

These are battles with which he is familiar. Traska has taught in West Bend 11 of the last 12 years and now teaches in Kewaskum. He coached the girls one year at West Bend East, was varsity soccer coach for six years and has coached at other levels.

The Indians, 1-1, were scheduled to face West Bend West at home Tuesday, and host EWC foe Two Rivers on Friday. They play at New Holstein on Tuesday and at Campbellsport Thursday.

The Spartans went a perfect 5-0 and most by impressive margins, 66-9 over Kewaskum, 47-15 over Freedom, 48-20 over a pretty solid Bayport outfit, 61-9 over Sheboygan Falls and 40-27 over Port Washington.

Kewaskum came in with high hopes, but not much went right for the Indians, on the mat or on the scale during the weigh-ins.

"We've come up here and got roughed up a little, but we never ended up 0-5," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said. In their second match, the Indians were beaten by Sheboygan Falls, 57-

16, by Port Washington, 68-3 Bayport 59-12 and to Freedom 39-30 in a match that went down to the final bout.

"You can't give up 18 points to teams like this" Aupperle said, referring to the forfeits at three weight classes and several things factored into the situation. "You've got Logan (Dreher) out (skin problem), Nick Bier isn't here. He is doing something at a college day, and Garrett Buth didn't make weight."

As if that wasn't enough, the Indians lost 170-pound Derek Aupperle to an injury in the third period of the first match of the day. He was leading at that point 5-3.

Several of the Indians had good days vs. the impressive field, Senior Brett Scoles went 5-0 at 160 pounds, while junior Joey Seitz was 4-1 on the day at 138, and senior Austin Goeden was 3-2 at 145.

"One sixty, that was probably the toughest weight class here," Aupperle said, noting Jordan Pardowsky, Scoles' first opponent was third in state (Division 2) last year, (Alex) Walla has been there, and (Brandon) Fleischmann (of Port)... he's a tough kid."

Scoles gave up an early takedown to Pardowsky, but by the end of the first period led 3-2.

There was plenty of action the next two minutes with Scoles posting a late escape and takedown to break a 4-4 tie and turn it into a 7-4 lead, which is where the score ended after the KHS senior rode Pardowsky out.

Scoles was a dominant 9-0 major winner over Brandon Broetzmann of SF, then he got another shutout (6-0) over Fleischmann before a tight 6-4 win over Walla of Bayport.

In the finale, Scoles pinned

Blaz Daul of Freedom in a brief 1:47.

Seitz won four decisions, starting with a 6-4 victory over Brandon Blemke of Lux-Casco and a thrilling 9-8 decision over Alex Fitzgerald of SF, a state place winner and defending Eastern Wisconsin Conference champ.

After stumbling a bit in a 9-1 loss to Eli Rosado of Port, Seitz rebounded with a 6-4 win over Derek Dundin of Bay Port and a 8-4 OT decision over Dustin Jensen of Freedom.

A takedown with :04 remaining gave Goeden his first win, a 4-3 decision over Dylan Blemke of Lux-Casco, and he overcame a sluggish start to beat Charles Menke of SF, 10-6.

The match Goeden would probably like to have back was his 6-1 loss to Nate Schnell of Port.

Goeden then lost a 9-3

decision to Alex Blaney, who finished third in state (Div. 1) a year ago. Blaney had two pins and two major decisions in his other matches.

In his finale, Goeden and Chad Verhasselt of Freedom were scoreless with seconds remaining when Verhasselt got out of position and Goeden made him pay, scoring a reversal and near fall for a 4-0 win.

Ted Wollner finished 2-3, with a pin and a forfeit victory, while Cole Schiebel picked up two forfeits at 106 and Zach Heberer received one at 113.

Despite the fact his team was winless, Aupperle said, "It was definitely a starting point for us. We can only get better from here... We'll get there!"
