Fire in attic causes damage to village home

School District increases 2014 tax levy

The Kewaskum School District approved a final version of its 2013-14 budget Monday night.

The levy increased 2.41 percent to \$11.750 million because of a decrease in aid, District Business Manager Julie Thoreson said.

The total budget decreased 2.44 percent to \$24.462 million.

For taxpayers, the mill rate increased 52 cents to \$10.19, but Thoreson said that was due in part to a decrease in equalized property value in the district.

A preliminary budget required by board policy was approved in June. The board passed the budget in time for the Nov. 1 deadline to set the levy.

During the meeting the Board of Education continued to refine its meeting schedule in an effort to stay informed while cutting down the hours spent behind the gavel.

On Monday night they okayed devoting one of the district's two monthly meetings to four topics - insurance, the Visionary Committee, policy and employee compensation.

The second monthly meeting would be flexible, taking on one or all of the categories in more of a workshop format.

Kewaskum Police shut down drug house

The smell of marijuana coming from a Main Street condominium complex resulted in the arrest of two occupants and a West Bend woman Wednesday, Oct. 23.

Michael Landry, 29 and Tiffany Becker, 24, are each facing assorted drug charges that include narcotics possession and maintaining a drug trafficking place.

Pamela Rau, 28, of West Bend, was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia and narcotics.

According to the criminal complaint, a Kewaskum police officer found probable cause after Landry opened the door to his residence and the officer was overwhelmed by the odor of burnt marijuana coming from the apartment.

He saw drug paraphernalia and a pistol magazine as well as several other handgun rounds in plain view, the complaint states.

Upon further investigation, the officer also discovered other drugs and a ledger with dollar entries that appeared to be cost or profit estimates for selling oxycodone, the complaint

states.

According to court records this is not Landry's first incident with law enforcement in Washington County in regards to drug charges. In October 2002, he was found guilty of possession of marijuana. Later that year he was found guilty of endangering public safety with a dangerous weapon. In 2005 he was found guilty of resisting an officer and receiving stolen property in Ozaukee County.

Rau's appearance is slated for Nov. 15 and Landry and Becker will appear in court Nov. 21.







Kewaskum School District honored two individuals for their commitment to the district's youth. At halftime during the homecoming football game, Dennis Westerman and Kevin Flasch were awarded the "Outstanding Service Award."

Started in 2008, the award was designed to "recognize those who have dedicated part of their life for the benefit of children." Nominees are judged by length of service, the impact on the children, and contribution to the school district.

Shaske had been involved with Kewaskum Gridiron Club since 2003 arriving early for set-up

Board of Education Clerk Mary Miller, describes him which such adjectives as supportive, kind, respectful and patient. "He is always willing to help out," she said. "He never brings attention to himself. He is there and doing things."

"I'm not much for words. It's something I wasn't looking for," Westerman said humbly. "It's nice to do something for the community."

Quality Education group making strides

Teachers in the Kewaskum School District have a new group of supporters. Quality Education for Kewaskum Students' mission is to create an environment in "a district that families and teachers want to come to and to stay."

The group began in May when concerned members of the community began discussing issues they felt impacted students' education. Members noted personal knowledge of families looking for alternative education options for students like other school districts, homeschooling or charter schools.

"We asked, what are some of the problems, the concerns, and what can we do?" Robyn Bindrich said. The group decided to be proactive and founded Quality Education for Kewaskum Students.

Collectively and with concerns over a high teacher turnover rate, the focus started on supporting the teachers in hopes of retention. "We want teachers to feel valued and do the job to the best of their ability," Jenny Gerhartz said.

An anonymous donation gifted every teacher in the district a voucher for a cup of coffee at the Coffee Corner in Kewaskum with a letter of appreciation and of encouragement from the group.

A Facebook page was started to "keep people informed on what is really good in Kewaskum." Some posts are recent school events, and other posts offer links to educational related information.

Former students in the district will be writing letters of testimonials about teachers who positively impacted their education.

At the last meeting, another issue was pointed out. "We started to hear some negative rhetoric about the common core [curriculum]," Bindrich said. In response, the group discussed finding a speaker to talk about the advantages as well as debunk myths.

The group also attends school board meetings. "We try to get a better idea of what is going on in the district," Gerhartz said. "It's important that we

know what is going on."

Members are also looking to support candidates for the school board they feel reflect the values in their mission statement such as embracing a culture of cooperation among the community, administrators, teachers, and school board as well as offer challenge to all students on all levels.

In a press release, Mugs McFadden, a representative for the group, stated, "We understand the financial realities facing the District, but encourage careful consideration of programming that benefit all students such as retaining experienced teachers, limiting class size, and increasing support for gifted and special needs kids."

"Public education is a great privilege we have as a nation," Gerhartz said, "Let's do that education part the best we can."

The next meeting of Quality Education for Kewaskum Students is Sunday, Nov. 3 from 7-8 p.m. at Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum. Anyone is welcome to attend.

College sports update

The football teams from University of Wisconsin -Oshkosh and UW-Whitewater continued on their collision course two weekends ago as both won games to improve to 3-0 in the WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference) and 6-0 overall.

Whitewater played a rare Friday night game Oct. 18 and stomped on winless Eau Claire, 42-0

Playing at the road Saturday afternoon, the Oshkosh Titans spotted UW-River Falls seven points, then started clicking on all cylinders toward a 41-13 victory.

Nick Olla, in his first full season as quarterback, continues to improve. For the second week in a row, Olla did not throw an interception as he went 17x28 for 279 yards and a touchdown.

The touchdown pass, a 13-yarder to Zach Kasuboski, came in the second quarter; giving Oshkosh a lead it would not relinquish the rest of the way.

Olla also carried the ball four times for 18 yards and one touchdown, which came with just nine minutes to play in the game.

D3football.com currently rates the Titans No. 9.

Quarterback Matt Behrendt and a host of talented receivers lead Whitewater, currently rated No. 5. Senior Joe Paulus helped the Warhawks hold the BluGolds to just 67 yards rushing and 136 total yards. Paulus had three solo tackles and one assist, and one of the tackles was for a loss.

The Seibel brothers and their UW-Stevens Point teammates were ever so close to upsetting seventh-ranked UW-Platteville until the Pioneer quarterback, John Kelly hooked up with Trevor Whitehead for a 30-yard touchdown pass with 56 seconds remaining in their game at Platteville.

The later heroics gave the Pioneers a 24-23 win, improving their record to 3-0 and 6-0, while the Pointers are currently 2-1 and 4-2.

Senior inside linebacker Cody Seidel turned in a stellar performance with three solo tackles and six assists, including one sack.

Younger brother Bo, who also plays on the inside, chipped in with a pair of solos and four assists, and for the second game came up with an interception. The pick came deep in Pioneer territory and set up a Pointer score.

At Carbondale, Ill. the North Dakota State football team remained unbeaten after a bit of a scare in the early going when host Southern Illinois jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the first quarter. The Bison then scored 31 unanswered points for their seventh victory of the 2013 campaign. Red-shirt freshman Eric Perkins

helped the defending NCAA IAA Bison, catching one pass for seven yards.

Switching to an indoor sport, freshman middle hitter Anna Aycock seems to have found a good spot to continue her volleyball career, playing for NCAA Division 2 St. Edward University in Austin, Texas. The Hilltoppers lost six seniors last spring, opening the door for the younger players to step in. There are seven new players, including five freshmen, on the roster.


St. Edward's is currently 7-12 overall and 5-5 versus Heartland Conference opponents. The Hilltoppers split their last two matches, losing to Texas A&M-Kingston 25-13, 19-25, 21-25, 19-25 before topping McMurry in five games.

When Schiebel moved back to the area from Minnesota, she had a hard time finding a position as a paralegal and when her unemployment insurance began to run out, she took a cue from a cousin, and began to advertise her cleaning service.

Since then her business has grown from four clients to putting a special shine on a dozen homes and a local business.

The best part of being her own boss is the flexibility the job affords.

"I can be flexible for my clients and they are nice enough to be flexible for me," Schiebel said.

While she performs many of the same duties her competitors do, Schiebel adds an extra touch, wiping down the inside of microwaves and cleaning the blades of ceiling fans.

Before attacking dirt with a dust rag and broom, Schiebel meets with clients, walking through the home to find out, room-by-room, what they require.

She also provides a checklist of routine chores.

"Most people can't stand dusting or cleaning bathrooms," she said.

Schiebel will work out weekly, biweekly or monthly service with a client.

General cleaning is the most popular service offered, but Schiebel will help organize, clean basements and attics, and she does do windows - for an extra charge.

Most work is done on a flat rate basis, but there can be hourly charges when organization is also required.



Pilgrimage to Holy Hill on foot brings Champion priest here

Fr. Andrew Kurz's life journey has taken him from his birthplace in Wauwatosa to a seminary in Lincoln, Nebraska and back to Wisconsin first to Appleton and more currently to Green Bay.

Most of these moves have been made with the aid of a car, but from Oct. 13-25, Fr. Andrew, a Roman Catholic priest from the Green Bay Diocese, left his vehicle in the garage to make a 130-mile pilgrimage from the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help to Holy Hill, which is designated as Mary, Help of Christians.

The idea to make this pilgrimage, and hopefully to initiate group pilgrimages in the future, came to Fr. Andrew several months ago after he watched the movie, "The Way," for the third or fourth time.

Fr. Andrew said he thought to himself, "I'd like to do this ... but why do I have to go to Europe?" Fr. Andrew then started planning and penciled in Oct. 13-25 as tentative dates of his walk. He was obviously unaware of what might come up at any of his three parishes — he is the administrator of St. Thomas the Apostle in Sugarbush, St. Kilian in New

extensive planning. This included determining the safest route, deciding how many miles he would attempt to walk each day, where he could stay overnight and where he could say Mass each day.

"I started training. I did the Confirmation retreats with the kids," the 42-year-old priest said, explaining during the summer months, he and the Confirmation candidates walked from their parishes to the Shrine in Champion.

And how did those 7.5-mile walks go? Fr. Andrew learned one thing, that teenagers are not accustomed to doing anything in silence, something he feels is essential for God to direct their lives.

One of Fr. Andrew's stops last week was at the Holy Trinity Parish rectory in Kewaskum. He said he had called pastor, Fr. Ed Kornath, about the possibility of staying there and visited him once to finalize the plan.

Fr. Ed was going to be on retreat the day Fr. Andrew was passing through, but he offered him the rectory for the evening and asked if he could help out with Mass October 23.

Parishioners were happy to meet Fr. Andrew and hear the story of his vocation and the planning for the trip.

"My deeper conversion came from praying the rosary," Fr. Andrew said, "And by God's providence, I was sent out to Nebraska and by God's providence, I was sent back to Wisconsin."

Fr. Andrew also believes God and the Blessed Mother are the driving forces behind his trip, which was conducted in order to bring attention to the need for teaching children what they must know to gain salvation.

Fr. Andrew slept several nights in parish rectories. He also stayed in a "casa" the Carmelite sisters have near their monastery in Denmark,

Wis. and one night he slept in one of the primitive shelters on the Ice Age Trail.

So far, except for a pair of tired feet and "a few dogs," he hasn't run into any problems. "I have a few treats (for the dogs)," Fr. Andrew said, indicating he was also carrying a slingshot just in case he would come across an unfriendly animal.

The upside of the pilgrimage was all the time he spent in personal prayer and reflection. One epiphany Fr. Andrew experienced was coming to the realization that the planning of the pilgrimage was "more the hand of God than my planning."

On days one and three of the journey, two different parishioners accompanied him, and another day he was accompanied by Fr. Peter Mitchell, a priest from the Archdiocese of Green Bay and several students from Ball State University in Indiana.

This group walked together on Blessed John Paul II day, and Fr. Andrew said, "It seemed like John Paul II was smiling down on us... It became something

we were doing with him."

After Mass at Holy Trinity and breakfast at the Gateway Cafe, he proceeded to walk to West Bend Wednesday where he visited Fr. Nathan Reesman. Then his goal was to reach Pike Lake State Park Thursday, and he covered the final leg Friday morning.

Parishioners greeted him at Holy Hill after arriving on a tour bus. They participated in the Stations of the Cross and Holy Mass which he directed at Holy Hill before departing back to Champion.

While he said the pilgrimage was "a workout," Fr. Andrew was quick to add, "I'm already hoping and praying to bring a group through (the area) next May."



Battered and bruised as they were, the seventh grade Kewaskum Gridiron team emerged as the lone winner in the Parents' Day slate of games against the Oshkosh West Flyers held this past Saturday.

"Afterward she (Krier) said, 'I'm going to state next year,'

and she's got the drive to follow up on it," Backhaus said.

Usually it's Amanda Plachinski and then her younger sister, Haley, but this time the freshman finished ahead, taking 51st in 18:51 with Amanda right behind in 52nd with an 18:56.

Then came Debalek in 55th (19:42), and Backhaus said, "You could tell she was struggling."

Sydney Rosenthal was the final counter, covering the 4,000 meters in 19:46.

Wisconsin Lutheran had the upper hand over Shorewood in the boys' race, 36 points to 48.

Kewaskum had just four runners, not enough to count as a team.

Senior Josh Fiebig finished his career by turning in a 19:56, good for 57th.

Backhaus said number two runner, Jared Sanborn, did not run because of work and Zach Heberer skipped the meet to go bow hunting.

Zach Geidel (22:59), Josh Radke (23:05) and Zach Staehler (23:09) had a tough time in the talent-laden field but were commended for their commitment to the team this season.

WAUWATOSA - After 51 practices and 10 games, it came to an end for the Kewaskum football team with senior quarterback Brett Boegel on the sideline in street clothes, unable to help his team overcome the brisk 20-mile-per hour north wind and a 35-0 loss to host Wisconsin Lutheran at Raabe Stadium in the Division 3 first-round game, October 25.

Most people gave the sixth-seed Indians (5-5) a long shot in knocking off the third-seed Vikings, but with sophomore Michael Prochnow starting at quarterback in the place of Boegel, who wasn't cleared to play due to a concussion he suffered in the Plymouth game, things didn't go quite as well as the visitors would have preferred.

It was not only a game of big yards for Lutheran (7-3) but maybe a little divine intervention and some lucky breaks that helped them advance into the second round.

On the first play from scrimmage for Kewaskum, they drew a procedure penalty and from there, it snowballed. After getting a first down at their 40-yard line, the Indians fumbled and Lutheran senior defensive end Jonathan Schroeder fell on the ball. It took the Vikings four plays to score from 30 yards at the 8 minute 24 second mark of the first quarter for a 7-0 lead.

Kewaskum's running game wasn't working, despite lining up with two running backs behind the QB or using

a wishbone formation. After the second straight three-and-out series for the Indians, the Vikings went seven plays for 60 yards. The drive ended with a 50-yard bomb from junior QB Logan McShane to junior receiver Jacob Frey. He caught the ball between two Kewaskum defenders, fumbled it, panned it up off the turf and ran into the end zone for the team's second touchdown of the quarter with no time remaining. It was 14-0, Wisconsin Lutheran, and they would have been shut out of the quarter but the Indians helped them out.

On the play before the second touchdown, Kewaskum couldn't get their hands on a fumble by sophomore running back Terrence Ward who recovered the ball. Had the Indians pounced on that ball it might have boosted their confidence and had a short field to work with to stop the bleeding.

Sophomore receiver Charlie Witek, at 6-foot-2, was in a jump ball battle with Lutheran 5-11 junior defensive back Caleb Kuske in the end zone and almost caught the ball, but the ball fell into Kuske's hands for an interception and a touchback. The turnover by Kewaskum resulted in a beautiful 34-yard touchdown run with 6:51 left in the half by Ward. He put a juke move on Kewaskum junior defensive back Bille Lehmann in the open field and was off to the races. The Indians trailed at the half 21-0.

"We made too many mistakes, especially early,"

Kewaskum coach Jason Piittmann said. "They capitalized. They're a very good football team and they showed it tonight." The Indians had only 87 first half yards to Lutheran's 258.

The miserable night continued along with the gusting and frigid wind in the second half. Two more miscues by the

Indians turned into 14 more points for the Vikings and made it a fast-moving game. A bad snap to sophomore Benjamin Watzig on an attempted punt set up another score by Ward. After the second interception by Lutheran defensive back Reed Goede, sophomore Austin DeNoyer crossed the goal line on a three-yard run with 4:01 left in the third quarter. The 35-0 lead forced the clock to run by WIAA rules.

"All the bounces went their way," Piittmann said. "There was the fumble (Ward recovered his own fumble before their second touchdown), the fumbled catch (to Frey). They fumbled in the endzone (recovered by LaMarche when Ward lost the ball). You know, there's three of them right there. That's the way things go. The ball went their way every time."

Piittmann gave every senior a hug and encouragement that brought closure to the football careers.

"It was a great group of

seniors," he said. "I couldn't ask for any more. They were fun to be around. They were one from practice one all the way to practice 51 (last Thursday). They're a super bunch of young men. I told the team, 'Seniors, now it's your turn to pass the torch to the underclassmen and take the responsibility of getting to where you guys didn't this year.'"
