## Mother and daughter travel from Arizona to research family origin in Farmington

Located on Newark Drive on the southern edge of the town of Farmington lies a small stone church called St. Peters. Elizabeth and Gina Eagle from Arizona traced part of their ancestry to the original inhabitants to this area via the church.

"It's really nice to see where you're from," Gina Eagle, mother, said. Originally the last name was written "Igel" but pronounced like 'eagle.'"

The Eagles' search for their roots began with a family reunion in the 1900s after a mention of the Igel family in a small book, but lacked information about the family.

"We need to figure out who these people were," Gina remembered saying after reading the book.

Elizabeth, her daughter, began a fervent search about nine months ago and spent the bulk of her free time researching their ancestry.

The search for information has been long and tedious as multiple leads and documents were requested and researched. Even so, not all the information is available and sometimes dead ends stopped their progress.

Information about the great-great-grandfather, John, stalled after failing to find a birth certificate and having census records that didn't match up.

"All my family members who would have known information are pretty much all deceased," Gina Eagle said.

The search had yielded successes such as Helena, John's wife to whom

Elizabeth has traced back to the 1600s via documentation.

One search for Walter, son of Peter Igel (great-grandfather), led Elizabeth to relatives who had handwritten documents linking Peter to St. Peter's church in Farmington.

Elizabeth contacted the Farmington Historical Society for additional information. The society receives donated materials like family histories, books, newspaper clippings, business records, and photos to organize and catalog. An access database has been created to help.

According to Lisa Lickel of the Farmington Historical Society, requests for family information are received about every other month.

During a discussion about gene

## Village approves new TIF utility district

The Kewaskum Village Board voted to forward a proposal that may mean tax relief for some and added taxes for others at a special meeting June 24.

The board took action on a preliminary resolution to create Utility District 3, which could be used to help pay for debt the village incurred when utilities were installed in Tax Incremental District 2.

TID 2 is located on the south end of the village between Highway 45 and Prospect Drive and the neighborhood of Nature Haven Estates.

Since those owning developed properties are currently paying for utilities, only vacant lots would be assessed.

Last year the village enacted a one-year moratorium on impact fees as an incentive to generate new home construction. The question of whether to extend that moratorium will be taken up at the July 7 regular board meeting.

The Village's Financial adviser, James Mann of Ehlers Inc. gave the board two options - to create Utility District #3 to cover half the TID shortfall or create a third and fourth utility district. UD4 would encompass vacant lots within the non-TID area of UD2.

The board opted to create UD3. Earlier, Village Administrator Matt Heiser explained that TIDs have their own revenue and expenses. Properties that are already developed are contributing to the TID, vacant land does not, and current increments generated are not enough to completely cover infrastructure debt payments.

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## Village looking at revising handling of delinquent water utility users

The Kewaskum Village Board is looking at changing their policy regarding delinquent water bills. Currently the village has \$168,000 ranging in \$1,000 to as much as \$7,000 per customer in past due utility charges owed to them.

The Village of Kewaskum sends quarterly statements for the water and sewer utility. Village Administrator Matt Heiser informed trustees overdue utility statements receive a one percent service fee for each month they are overdue. Each October, those with overdue accounts receive a warning letter, notifying them if they don't pay their bill, the total will be placed on the tax bill and an additional 10 percent will be levied.

The notice going out in October reflects any money owed from quarters three and four of the previous year along with quarters one and two of that year.

Heiser reported that he and treasurer Janet Knops have discussed at what point should a customer's service be shut off. Both felt if a customer hasn't paid anything for one year, then

water would be shut off.

"We think this is substantial and something we should be working on, we are working on trying to define a fair method in which water is shut off," Heiser said.

A number of administrative challenges face the village. Department of Public Works Coordinator Chad Cook stated there are some services that have one shut off valve for multiple utility customers. There is also the issue of valves breaking when they are shut off or turned back on. If a valve is broken in the process it would be the utility's responsibility to fix it. There is also the obstacle of staff organizing who gets turned off and who gets turned back on and when.

One thing Heiser is certain of is that customers requesting a payment plan would be worked with to ensure their service is not shut off.

Trustee David Zehren said he checked with the village of Campbellsport and was told if customers don't pay before the next reading they are shut off and to get back on the customer must pay a fee to be reconnected. Trustees Richard Laubach

and David Spenner agreed with implementing that policy in Kewaskum.

Village of Campbellsport Clerk Becky Tellier stated they send notices quarterly like Kewaskum which are due within 30 days. Once that point is reached a second notice, giving and additional 10 days is sent. After the 10 days a disconnect notice is sent and the disconnection takes place.

Knops said the village currently imposes a reconnect fee of \$40, but she was unsure if the village could legally charge a reconnect fee due to rules and regulations with the Public Service Commission.

Trustee Richard Knoebel thought the village should be more lenient and disconnect after two quarters of non-payment. The rest of the board agreed the two quarter shut-off (six months) was a good route to take.

Knops estimated there were about 100 users that would be affected following that policy.

Heiser and Knops will update the board as the change in policy takes effect.

## Area teens killed in crash with sheriff's deputy

Tragedy rocked the Kewaskum community last week as news spread of a double fatal automobile accident claimed the lives of two popular area teens.

The crash occurred Wednesday June 18, at 8:39 a.m. on County Highway H at Kettle Moraine Dr. in the Town of Kewaskum during wet weather. An on-duty Washington County Sheriff's Deputy was also involved in the crash. He suffered non-life threatening injuries.

According to a press release from The Wisconsin State Patrol Waukesha Post, the crash involved a marked Washington County Sheriff's Office 2014 Chevrolet Impala driven by Jesse L. Williams, 35, of Kewaskum and a 2004 Ford Taurus, driven by Travis S. Trapp, 16, of Cascade. Trapp's vehicle also had a pas-

senger, Brent A. Schultz, 16, of Kewaskum.

The Wisconsin State Patrol's Technical Reconstruction Unit is reconstructing the crash. Their preliminary investigation determined Trapp's vehicle was westbound on County Highway H when it crossed left of center and entered the eastbound lane and was struck by Williams' vehicle. Heavy rain, and wet pavement may have contributed to the crash.

Williams was transported to Street Joseph's Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. He was treated and released.

Assisting at the scene were Washington County Sheriff's Office, Kewaskum Police Department, Kewaskum Fire Department and Washington County Medical Examiner's Office.

alogy, Dan Plzak of the historical society said, "You look back and find stuff that surprises you."

"We traced the name back to Germany, and the name meant hedgehog," Gina Eagle added.

For Elizabeth, the discovery of her ancestry was surreal. "It's hard to think they traveled with a horse and wagon," she said. "I have a cellphone. They had a covered wagon."

According to Elizabeth Eagle, St. Peter's church was "absolutely gorgeous" and "amazed it's still standing" and pointed out all the stone detail. The original church was built in

1847 out of wood by the German immigrants who created the community. In 1861, the church was rebuilt out stone.

Today a group of dedicated individuals, some also are descendants of the original inhabitants, take pride to maintain the church. Two days a year it opens its doors for mass- July 4 and Nov. 2 (All Souls Day).

In the cemetery at St. Peter's, the Eagles located two tombstones of cousins (sons of John and Helena): Mathias and Johanna Igel and Bernard and Angeline.

It is believed John and Helena are buried here as well, based on a death record stat-

ing Helena's burial in St. Peter's cemetery in Farmington, but some headstones are unreadable or no names are given such as two stones markers, next to Mathias and Johanna, labeled "vader" and "mutter."

Information found from the historical society was given to Elizabeth, and she returned favor with documents she had found. Both parties agreed to keep in touch.

"It's been a journey," Elizabeth stated, but her journey to Farmington did leave her with the desire to move the area, perhaps to replant the roots of her ancestors.

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## Regal Ware receives funding for expansion

The City of West Bend and Economic Development Washington County (EDWC) have approved terms for incentive funding to support the growth of Regal Ware at their West Bend manufacturing facility. The City of West Bend approved at their meeting Monday evening, allocation of funding from their revolving loan program fund for two companies at terms recommended by EDWC's Revolving Loan Fund Committee. The EDWC loan committee approved proposed terms for a county revolving loan proposal to both companies as well.

"The low-interest loans that we have been offered will allow us to invest in new, highly technical equipment which will allow us to improve our efficiencies, expand our production capacity, and improve competitiveness with foreign producers" explains Tracy Pearson, SR VP and Chief Financial Officer of Regal Ware.

"The new equipment will require workers trained in computer controls to run an

integrated system of operations versus traditional mechanical operation of one or two machines which are part of a production line."

To support the success of the companies in Washington County, the City of West Bend and Economic Development Washington County (EDWC) put together a joint proposal for both companies. Regal Ware will receive \$400,000 in low interest financing offered through a County revolving loan fund and a matching \$400,000 in low interest financing offered by the City.

Regal Ware's corporate headquarters is located in Kewaskum.


"These projects demonstrate that Washington County can get deals done to accelerate business growth while providing pace-setting leadership in Wisconsin for collaboration between the County and local communities," said Christian Tscheschlok, Executive Director of EDWC.

MD Design of Germantown

will receive \$150,000 low interest financing offered through a County revolving loan fund and an additional \$150,000 in low interest financing offered by the City. MD Design is a machine shop moving to the city.

Terms of the loan proposals remain in negotiation and are expected to be finalized by the end of July.

Economic Development Washington County (EDWC) is an independent economic development organization fueling growth businesses and industries for the creation of quality jobs and wealth in Washington County. EDWC accomplishes this through a focus on existing business development consulting; engaging in driver-industry business attraction; supporting qualified start-up enterprises and serving as a central voice on economic development issues. ## Highway 28 Weekly Update

The past few weeks of rain may have stalled work in gardens and lawns but the Main Street project is working two weeks ahead of schedule, according to Department of Transportation officials.

For the July 3 fireworks display, the village recommends parking in the downtown area and walking to Riverhill Park because of construction on Main Street.

The deck pour on the north side of the Milwaukee River bridge was scheduled for June 23, but officials said the work was weather-dependent.

Curb and gutter placement west of the Milwaukee River ongoing and curb placement east of the Milwaukee River will follow. Grading work is ongoing on the eastern portion of the project.

WE Energies is still on track for plans to place conduit after curb is installed, which is slated to take place from now until June 27.

A traffic switch is tentatively scheduled for July 8 to allow work on the south half of the Milwaukee River bridge.



physical education instructor, said. "They keep coming back. It's gotta be fun."


Moser has taught outdoor adventure for five years. Students learn about canoeing, fishing, campfires and last year, slacklining.



### VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

**JUNE 2, 2014 7 P.M.**  
The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Andy Pesch, Dave Spenner, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Chad Cook, Thomas Bishop, Janet Knops and Stephanie Justmann. The news media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on May 29, 2014. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Richard Knoebel to approve the minutes from the May 19, 2014 and May 20, 2014 meetings, second by Dave Spenner. Voice vote, motion carried.

President Pesch opened the public hearing on the applications for the Class "A" Retail Fermented Malt Beverage Licenses; the Combination Class "A" Retail Fermented Malt Beverage and Intoxicating Liquor License; and the Combination Class "B" Fermented Malt Beverage and Intoxicating Liquor Licenses. Brandon Kohn from Kohn's Corner Mart was on hand to explain his desire for a Class "A" Intoxicating Liquor license. He conducted a survey of his customers and this service was the most requested. There are not any other businesses on the east side of the Village with a liquor license. The Class A quota in the Municipal Code was discussed.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to close the Public Hearing, second by Jim Hovland and carried by roll call vote. Laubach-aye, Knoebel-aye, Zehren-aye, Pesch-aye, Spenner-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0)

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel reported the fire department was awarded a \$48,520 grant to replace an air compressor that was purchased in the 1980's. The fire departments portion of matching funds is \$2,426.

Police Chief Thomas Bishop reported on the request to establish a Second in Command position. Currently, there are seven full-time employees in the Kewaskum Police Department, 1-Chief, 1-School Resource Officer, and 5-Patrol Officers and two part-time officers also fill in when needed. The Second in Command would be a non-union position, creating continuity in government, handle administrative and emergency government duties. Other duties include the radar trailer,

patrol supervisor, assisting the chief, follow-up on cases, event planning, court officer, handling administrative duties and vehicle registrations. The position could be filled with the current staffing within the police department. The Second in Command position would have a one year probation period with the option of returning to the union. It was suggested to increase the wage by \$5,000 from the patrol position to \$62,000 a year. If this position is filled from within the department another part-time officer should be hired. In the future there would also be a need to hire another full-time officer when the financial position improves.

DPW Coordinator Cook reported on the DPW activity. A stock pile of fill from water main breaks has been removed from the DPW yard, wood chipping continues the first and third Monday's of the month, Kiwanis pool in filled and prepared for the summer season, Chad Cook and Ben Propson also attended a day long safety session and three more training days are required.

Administrator Heiser reported:

1. The Hwy 45/Hwy 28 intersection will be closed the entire week to finish the last part of Village utility installation. Negotiations with the WisDOT continue about having the pavement in this intersection properly replaced that will be cost effective instead of patching the area.

2. The action items from the Visioning Session were reviewed. A Visioning Session will be scheduled in fall and will cover the financial plan, capital improvements, street projects and the status of the succession plans. Committee meetings over the summer will develop the department goals and review existing internal goals. The Administrator goals will be reviewed once a month at a Village Board meeting.

3. The new limits on phosphorus discharge became law in April 2014. The Slinger Waste Water Treatment Plant upgrade to meet this requirement will be toured on June 3, 2014.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the May 21, 2014 Board of Review. The 2014 Assessment has increased \$286,600 over the 2013 Assessment.

Richard Knoebel, Chairperson for the Administrative Committee, reported the bills were recommended for payment as presented. Motion by Jim Hovland to approve the bills as recommended, second by Dave Zehren. Voice vote, motion carried.

JUNE 10, 2014 6 P.M.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Special Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Board members present were Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, Dave Zehren, Andy Pesch, Dave Spenner, Kevin Scheunemann (arrived at 6:07 p.m.) and Jim Hovland (arrived at 6:02 p.m.). Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Chad Cook, Stephanie Justmann, Attorney Timothy Fenner from Axley Brynson, LLP and Jim Mann from Ehlers Associates. Members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on June 5, 2014. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

Attorney Timothy Fenner reported on the history of the Tax Incremental District #2 being created to encourage economic development on the designated tract of land south of the Village along Highway 45. The public improvements were installed by the Village for the anticipated development that was to occur. General Obligation Bonds in the amount of \$8 million have been issued to the Village to pay for this infrastructure. Currently the increment is not covering the debt repayment resulting in a shortfall up to 2013 of \$478,000. This has been covered by the tax levy. The TID#2 has been declared distressed extending the number of years to recover the cost of the infrastructure. If the Village Board does not want to continue with the current status quo revenue will need to be generated to cover the debt repayment instead of it falling to the tax levy.

Three options were presented by the Financial Advisor Jim Mann: Option 1-create Utility District #3 (UD#3) made up of vacant lots in the TID#2, create Utility District #4 (UD#4) made up of 60 lots from the Planned Unit Developments benefited by the storm water utility. The entire cost of the debt would be covered by the UD #3 and UD #4. Option 2-create UD#3 and UD#4 and cover 50% of the shortfall with the tax levy. Option 3-create UD#3 and UD#4 and allow \$67,000 to be covered by the tax levy. The
