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## Village board discusses DPW coordinator and 2015 budget Main Street to open next week

Village Trustees learned Monday evening The Wisconsin Department of Transportation would re-open Highway 28/Main Street Tuesday, Nov. 11.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated he received word barricades will come down and the traffic lights will be turned on at the intersection of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue. He explained the lights would flash yellow for three business days and then return to functioning as they did before the project.

Heiser and members of the Department of Public Works were to participate in a walk-through with project

manager this past Wednesday.

During Monday's Village Board meeting downtown business owner Jodi Strobel asked when parking lines would be painted on the roadway. Heiser informed her and the audience that parking lines were eliminated from the project budget as a cost saving measure.

**Village will promote from within for DPW coordinator**

With the departure of DPW Coordinator Chad Cook, Heiser asked the board for direction on filling the position.

Heiser advocated for promoting from within the Department of Public Works.

Heiser stated if the board ap-

proved, the village would solicit letters of interest from DPW crewmembers. He said if there is no inside interest, the village could hire from outside the DPW.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann said he wanted to see the village hire someone, he preferred inside, but did not want to see Heiser overseeing the position because he had enough on his plate. "I am very opposed to that," he stated.

Trustee Jim Hovland asked if a crewmember was promoted if another person would be hired for the crew. Heiser thought it would depend on the person applying. Hovland thought

## Indians come up short in fourth quarter

A lot had gone right for the Kewaskum High football team Friday night — converting a fourth down play for a 27-yard touchdown on its first drive, an emotional goal line stand in the second quarter, taking advantage of a fumble on a punt return, leading to another TD — but the Indians couldn't find a way to get in the Catholic Memorial end zone in the closing seconds, and their season ended in a heart-breaking 27-21 defeat.

Playing at Schneider Field on the Carroll University campus, the Indians came in as underdogs in this Division 3 Level 2 game, but right from the opening kickoff it was obvious they were ready to give the Crusaders, co-champions of the powerful Classic 8 Conference, all they could handle.

KHS coach Jason Piittmann said while no one was giving his team much of a chance, he and his coaches kept reminding the players they only had to be better team the one time, in the playoff game. "We proved it. For that night, we hung right with them to the bitter end. I was extremely proud of our kids. They left everything they had on the field."

Perhaps the Crusaders were a little stunned after the Indians took the opening kickoff and moved 71 yards in 10 plays for the first score of the game, a fourth down pass from Michael Prochnow to Charlie Witek, a combination that has been successful all season and would be again later in the game.

Brandon Thull was responsible for 37 of the yards, including 18 on a pass play, before a short run by Thull, a screen pass fell incomplete and a lateral that ended up losing five yards,

there might be a need to hire some part-time plow operators.

Trustee David Spenner asked if there were crewmembers who would meet the requirements of the position. Heiser stated the DPW Coordinator position did not have minimum requirements. Spenner asked if staff could look at that and come up with a job description for the board to review. Heiser will bring more information to the board on a job description.

Spenner also proposed the village look into finding a current employee to take on the role of deputy administrator for when Heiser is not available. He suggested this would be important in succession planning for the future. Heiser agreed and will develop a list of items this person would be responsible for.

### City of West Bend will handle inspecting

Cook was also the village's in-house building inspector. His departure left the village without an inspector. Until this week, the village relied on Brian Kober, a village resident and inspector from another community in Cook's absence. On Monday the village board approved a contract with the City of West Bend to handle all building inspections.

The contract that was approved was a six month contract. At the end of that contract the Village Board will decide if they want to keep using the City or if they will use another firm for building inspections.

Heiser stated that those with inquiries should still contact the Kewaskum Village Hall.

### Lower school levies hurt Kewaskum TIF

Heiser informed the board of some changes to the last budget proposal that was presented to the board. While decreases in the levies of the school district and Moraine Park Technical College MPTC are good for taxpayers, it didn't help add funds to the village's Tax Incremental Finance District.

Heiser said due to Wisconsin Act 145, MPTC has almost cut their levy in half. He also stated figures from Washington County are not in, but they are projecting a 3 percent decrease in their levy. He estimated a \$52,000 decrease in revenue from the TIF District.

The total shortfall that will need to be added to the tax levy is estimated to be \$230,000.

The last budget proposal saw the board levying the same tax as 2014 which would give the village an extra \$35,000 to be set aside for future capital improvements. Now that savings will be used to offset the TIF shortfall and the tax rate would need to increase.

Heiser stated he and treasurer Janet Knops are working to see if the TIF debt shortfall could be put into debt service and then covering that amount would not be included in the village's levy limit. This would allow the village to add more to fund future projects in the village.

Heiser also reported other municipalities are handing out two percent pay raises for employees. In the last budget proposal, the village board authorized a one percent raise. To go up to two percent would be another

\$8,000.

Trustee Jim Hovland thought raises should be based on merit after the employee reviews that were conducted. Spenner agreed and threw out the idea of the one percent raise with opportunity for additional one percent to be given to those who had a favorable review.

The current budget has \$160,000 for road work in 2015. The village will receive an \$80,000 grant to cover half of that expenditure.

"We just keep borrowing based upon what is presented to us on a week to week basis. Nobody can run a household like that, how can you run a village like that? You have no idea how many years are left until you have to borrow a substantial amount of money to address infrastructure," Spenner stated.

Trustee Kevin Scheuermann agreed. Heiser was then given permission to seek outside help for a more complete financial plan.

Trustees approved the annexation request of Harold and Kaye Schladweiler, Highway 45 next to Roger & Dan's Auto Service at the south end of the village.


## Poppy Day Nov. 10


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

## Campus Notes

## Potential for deer crashes will be high again this fall

Although a robust deer population is a boon to hunters and automotive body shops, the speedy and unpredictable animals are hazardous for drivers on Wisconsin roads every fall.

October and November are the mating season for deer, and they soon will increase their activity particularly at dusk and dawn while moving back and forth between their bedding and feeding areas. As they roam, deer may dart unexpectedly onto roads and into the path of vehicles.

"If you can't avoid a deer in the road, it's safer to hit the brakes and hit the deer than to swerve suddenly and try to miss it. If you swerve, you risk losing control of your vehicle and hitting another car or a stationary object like a tree," says David Pabst, director of the WisDOT Bureau of Transportation Safety.

Motorcyclists must be especially careful because deer crashes can be fatal. Motorcycles were involved in six of the eight fatal deer vs. motor vehicle crashes in Wisconsin last year.

"The one exception to the 'don't swerve' advice applies to motorcyclists," Pabst says.

WisDOT and the Wisconsin State Patrol safety officials offer the following advice to prevent

deer crashes and injuries to motorists:

Be on the lookout for deer, eliminate distractions while driving, and slow down especially in early morning and evening hours, which are the most active times for deer.

Always buckle up. There are fewer and less severe injuries in vehicle vs. deer crashes when drivers and passengers wear safety belts.

If you see a deer by the side of the road, slow down and blow your horn with one long blast to frighten it away.

When you see one deer, look for another one. Deer seldom run alone.

If you see a deer looming in your headlights, don't expect it to move away. Headlights can confuse a deer, causing it to freeze.

Brake firmly when you notice a deer in or near your path.

Don't swerve suddenly because you may lose control of your vehicle.

If you hit a deer, get your vehicle off the road if possible, and then call a law enforcement agency. Walking on a highway is dangerous, so stay in your vehicle if you can.

Don't try to move the animal if it is still alive. The injured deer could hurt you.



## Bastian earns player of the week honors

Truman State University volleyball student-athlete Kayla Bastian earned the Great Lakes Valley Conference Offensive Player of the Week for matches running from Sept. 8 through Sept. 14, 2014.

Bastian, a graduate of Kewaskum High School, averaged 3.83 kills, 2.92 digs, and 4.04 points per set, while hitting .327 in three regional matches - of which two were conference contests - last week to lead Truman to a 3-0 record. Against Illinois Springfield, she collected a career-high 23 kills, hitting a

career-best .488 with a 23-3-41 attack line. Bastian also added eight digs and two block assists for 24 total points in the match. Her dominant play continued against UW-Parkside where she averaged 3.0 kills per set against the Rangers, finishing with six digs and a block assist for 9.5 total points.

She then rounded out the week with 14 kills and a career-high 21 digs over Lewis where Truman prevailed 3-2. The redshirt-sophomore is averaging 3.26 kills, 3.04 digs, and 0.26 blocks per set and hitting .239 overall for the Bulldogs.

This is the first career weekly award for Bastian and the first for Truman since teammate Allie Brak earned the honor on Oct. 14, 2013.

The Bulldogs travel to Illinois for three matches spanning two days this coming weekend, as Truman faces off with McKendree (11 a.m.) and West Texas A&M (3 p.m.) on the McKendree campus on Saturday, before battling UIS for the second time in 12 days in Springfield, Ill., on Sunday at 1 p.m.



*April 14, 1989*

The Kewaskum School District administration was told by members of its board the budget proposed for 1989-90 is unacceptable and reductions are going to have to be made somewhere, as the preliminary '89-90 school board budget represents a 22 percent levy increase which is up almost 9 percent from last year. This boils down to a hike of about \$3.04 per \$1,000. On a \$70,000 home this would equal an increase of \$212.80.

In a related matter, Perry Ankerson showed no mercy at the board meeting as he went through a list of high school teachers and their class loads, proposing consolidations, reductions and even elimination of some courses. His cuts are targeted at classes with low or small student numbers. Ankerson noted that as it is nice to have small student numbers in class, if increasing class sizes is what it takes to eliminate staffing, then that is what he proposes. He has children attending school in the district and he has no reservations about them being put into large classes, indicating his goal is to save taxpayers money.



## 100 Years Ago

**April 25, 1914**

Miss Elsie Guth, school teacher of district 3, located about three miles southwest of this village and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L.D. Guth of this village, defended herself at the school building last Friday afternoon shortly after school was dismissed, from intended assault by a man who had previously given his business as book agent. Fleeing the assailant, Miss Guth ran to the M. Johannes home a short distance away relating her story to Mrs. Johannes. Upon arriving at her home, Miss Guth related the story to her parents and the au-

thorities were notified. The accused man was said to be from Chicago. Being unable to furnish the assessed \$1,000 bail, the defendant was remanded to the county jail.

While playing with gunpowder last Saturday afternoon, Oscar Kratz and Lester Herbst, two young boys of Schleisingerville, came very close to being severely injured. Both had their eyebrows and hair badly singed and the Kratz boy had his face quite severely burned, necessitating the attention of a doctor.

Otto Pfingston of New Prospect received his law books for Justice of the Peace and is now ready for business. Charles Warden sold out his share in the Jersey mill to M. Johann.

Peter Mitchell of Dundee, an old veteran of the Civil War, was taken seriously ill last week. He was later taken to the Soldiers Home in Milwaukee.

**May 2, 1914**

Last Saturday afternoon August Ebert, a well known res-

ident of the Town of Scott, met with a painful accident which might have resulted in his death. While in the act of throwing down some cornstalks from a scaffold above the barn floor, he happened to step through an opening, over which were spread a few bundles, thereby falling about 15 feet onto the barn floor. Aside from being jarred up, it was found that no bones were broken.

Chester Dobbs of Chicago, Illinois, charged with assaulting Miss Eleanor Guth, a teacher in the district No. 3, with intent to ravish on Friday, April 17, was bound over to the Washington County Circuit Court which convenes again in October.

The gum machine at the depot in West Bend was robbed sometime last Sunday afternoon, the sum of \$3.67 being taken. On Sunday evening the gum machine at Kewaskum was also robbed of \$2.50 and the cash drawer in the station agent's office also opened, but

there was nothing to take.

It has just become known that Miss Leta Frohmann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Frohmann of Boltonville and A. R. Woog of Batavia were married at Waukegan, Illinois on April 14.

Anton Schladweiler and Alfred Schoetz of Boltonville called on friends in New Prospect Sunday. They made the trip with Mr. Schladweiler's new Yale twin cylinder motorcycle.

A new enterprise is being launched near Cedar Lawn. The farmers held a cheese meeting for the purpose of organizing a cheese company. The factory will be located on the Nic. Klotz farm.





## Nuernberg gets first collegiate start

After serving as backup quarterback at UW-Stevens Point for over two seasons, Kewaskum High alum Cody Nuernberg finally got his chance to start this past Saturday against UW-Oshkosh.

Nuernberg, replacing Kyle Larson, who is out with an injury, led the Pointers to the first touchdown of the day, a 22-yard touchdown pass to Jared Panikow at the 7:06 mark of the second quarter. The Titans responded with two long TDs early in the third quarter, however, and went on to post a 21-7 victory over the Pointers.

The Pointers' lone scoring drive covered 66 yards in 11 plays.

Nuernberg, a 215-pound junior, finished the day going 17x39 for 175 yards and two interceptions. He also fumbled on the Pointers' opening drive. One of Nuernberg's passes went to Nate Krupp, a sophomore from Kewaskum.

On the defensive side of the ball, senior Bo Seibel, another product of the KHS football program, was one of the team leaders with three solo tackles and four assists. For the year, Seibel has 29 solo tackles, 25 assists, 4.5 quarterback sacks, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

set up a fourth-and-12 from the CM 27.

"Charlie came open on the post, and Mike hit him," Piittmann said, indicating taking the lead was very important. "It definitely gave our kids some confidence."

While the KHS drive took 4:48 off the clock, Memorial needed just one play from scrimmage to tie the score. Josh Karfonta took the handoff from Alex Bray and was off to the races for a 55-yard TD.

"It was a good call by them. We missed a tackle, and the kid was gone," Piittmann said.

The Crusader's second possession was highlighted by a pair of long passes, eventually picking up a first down on Kewaskum's 5-yard line. Here's where the Indians got tough, stopping Tommy Garza on three straight runs, forcing the Crusaders to call for an Eric Fridl field goal, which sailed harmlessly wide of the left goal post.

Ben Watzig made some key tackles to keep CM out of the end zone, and Piittmann said, "Coach Bobby Bannasch called some great blitzes."

Late in the second period, the Indians cashed in on a break when Garza dropped a fair catch, and the ball was recovered by Matt Hetebrueg on

the Memorial 30-yard line.

On first down, Prochnow found his favorite receiver, Witek, for a 27-yard strike, and on the next play Thull plowed into the end zone from the 3, giving the Indians a 14-7 advantage after a second successful PAT kick by Max Hardy.

That score came with 1:03 remaining in the half, and Memorial quickly moved down the field to Kewaskum's 8-yard line, but a final pass attempt to Fletcher Metz fell incomplete.

Memorial took the ball to open the third quarter, and the Crusaders knew they had to be effective offensively if they were going to win. Memorial put together a 56-yard, eight-play drive that ended with Garza going the final 15 yards.

Still, Kewaskum maintained a 14-13 edge as someone got a hand on the Fridl's PAT try, and it was unsuccessful.

Piittmann went to his book of tricks when the Indians got their hands on the ball next. After three plays netted just four yards, they lined up to punt, but the direct snap went to Steve Nurkala, and he scampered 12 yards for a first down at Memorial's 33-yard line.

Unfortunately, Kewaskum managed just three yards on its next play and three straight passes fell incomplete, tuning

the ball back over to Memorial.

The Crusaders took its first lead with 9:30 left in the game when they came up with another big play, a 55-yard pass from Bray to Robbie Gogin after Bray scrambled away from a couple would-be tacklers. Memorial added the 2-point conversion on a Bray run for a 21-14 lead.

Here's where Kewaskum answered with a big play of its own. Any guesses who was involved? If you pointed to Witek, you are correct at the 6-1 wide receiver, who ended up with five catches for 129 yards, gathered in a pass and went 64 yards for the tying TD.

"It was a perfect ball by Michael. Charlie was able to get it above the defenders ... the two defenders ran into each other," Piittmann said, and Witek was off to the races.

A 21-21 tie, with 7:13 remaining. It was anybody's game. Memorial started a drive at its 33-yard line, picking up a first down at the 44 and then at Kewaskum's 44 after a Bray-to-Metz hookup.

The clock showed 5:06 remaining, and Bray's nine-yard scamper on first down moved the ball to the 35. Certainly the Crusaders would stay on the ground in an effort to move the chains again, or would they? No, a pass play was called, but

Josh Baker wasn't fooled, and he came up with a huge interception at the 35-yard line.

First down, and Prochnow went to Baker with a pass that netted five yards, but on the next play, Thull was held to no gain, and a third down pass fell incomplete.

Did Piittmann consider going for it on is 40? "I did briefly," he said, but, "I didn't dare give them a short field."

With the wind at his back, Watzig got off a good punt that settled at the Memorial 26 with under 3:00 to go. Was an overtime in the cards? It sure was a possibility, even after Metz got free for a 32-yard reception and a first down at the KHS 38.

Garza picked up seven yards on first down, then Bray hooked up with Gogin for the go-ahead TD. with 1:06 left in the contest. Fridl missed again, leaving the door slightly ajar for the Indians to pull off the win.

A fourth down pass to Witek helped to keep the Indians' hopes alive, then spunky Nurkala hauled in a 35-yard toss from Prochnow with :14 remaining, giving Kewaskum the ball on the CM 16. Time for about two plays, The first was incomplete, and the Indians set up three receivers left and two right for the final play, a pass that was intercepted by Mikey

Wurster.

Kewaskum coaches, players and fans thought Thull was interfered with as he moved inside the 5-yard line, but no call was made. Piittmann said the film showed Thull being tripped as the ball arrived. "In my opinion, a flag should have been thrown," he said.

"CM played well," Piittmann said. "They took away our running game for the most part. Thull was held to 70 yards in 20 carries, and the Indians had only 82 total yards on the ground to go with Prochnow's 254 passing yards. Nurkala wound up with 80 on six catches, and Piittmann said, "He had a really nice game," as did lineman Sam Fechter, who was sidelined in the second half after he got a concussion.

Led by Garza's 124 yards, Memorial rushed for 248 yards and had 204 passing for a total of 452. The Crusaders will face Wisconsin Lutheran this weekend for the right to play in the state finals in Madison.

Kewaskum finished the season at 9-2, with its two losses decided late in the game. This one was especially painful.

"We had it (the victory) dialed in, but we came up a little short," Piittmann said.


