Indians fall in OT

You had to be there to believe it. A buzzer-beating three-point shot by Campbellsport's Koy Walsh sent Tuesday's D-3 regional game against Kewaskum into overtime, and the visiting Cougars outscored the Indians 8-5 in the extra period to earn a 68-65 win and the right to face No. 1-seeded Ripon on Friday night.

Campbellsport had just 30 points in three quarters and scored 30 in the fourth, erasing Kewaskum's 49-34 lead with six minutes left in the game.

Charlie Witek led all scorers with 30 points but missed four of five free throws down the stretch and the Cougars climbed back into the game on their outside shooting.

The Indians were up 60-57 after Josh Baker made two free throws with :04 remaining. KHS coaches told their players to foul in an effort to give up two points and not three, but no one was fouled and when Tanner Ramthun was hemmed in, he dished the ball off to Walsh on the left wing, and Walsh did the rest.

Brady Hanson had the Indians' lone basket and Witek went 3x4 in OT, while Walsh and Ty Schmidt (a three-pointer) scored baskets for the Cougars, who also had three free throws.

Community learns about i4 Learning Community School



On Tuesday, February 17, the Wayne Elementary School staff and i4Learning governance council hosted an information event for parents and community members. Approximately 75 people were in attendance to learn more about the school and district's plans to open the i4Learning Community School this fall, encompassing two main educational philosophies: multi-age learning and Project Based Learning.

The staff started with an overview of the changes that have already been implemented this school year, mainly the multi-age learning environment.

"Our learning environment this year has allowed us to meet each student where they are and let them grow," Mrs. Anne Wheiland, a K-2 cohort teacher reported.

This year students at WES have been learning in grade level cohorts instead of traditional grade specific classrooms. Four year old kindergarten is still a stand-alone grade level class, but kindergarten through second, two teachers in the morning and three in the afternoon.

The third through fifth grade students are in the 3-5 cohort with two teachers. Teachers shared how this new way of grouping students has been working and the positive impacts they have noticed this year.

"We are very excited about the progress that we've made and changes in-store for next year," stated Mrs. Petersen, 3-5 cohort teacher.

The staff also provided information on planning and professional development that has happened over the past year in preparation to facilitate the new and innovative educational model. In addition to the training they have already participated in, staff will continue professional development throughout this school year and summer months to learn more

about Project Based Learning.

The presentation concluded with videos that the teachers created that highlighted what a typical students' day looks like in each of the cohorts this school year. These videos and the slideshow presentation from the event are available on the www.i4Learning.org website under the "News" tab.





Moraine Park welding students construct SWAT team training device

Students in Moraine Park's Welding program were put to the test as they were asked to construct a door frame that could withstand the strength of a trained SWAT team. This unique opportunity came along when the college was approached by the Fond du Lac Police Department with an idea to build a steel door frame that their SWAT team could use in door breaching drills.

"In the past, we would have to borrow this device from other counties, which can be time consuming," said Ben Colwin, Fond du Lac Police Department assistant SWAT team leader. "In talking with other agencies, it was recommended that we seek the help of our local technical college."

The project was a perfect fit for Moraine Park's welding students and, more specifically, it complemented the curriculum for the Fabrication for Welders class. The project began with a planning phase in spring 2014, and then the fall 2014 class followed up with the actual fabrication of the frame. Students used donated steel from McNeilus Steel, Inc., of Fond du Lac to construct a heavy-duty frame that is adjustable to accommodate doors ranging from 55 to 96 inches wide.

"It was a fun and unique project that the students really enjoyed," said Jeff Beach, welding instructor at Moraine Park. "The project taught students how to envision a plan and fabricate a project using structural

materials."

The Fond du Lac SWAT team is made up of 13 officers, and they will begin using the frame in obstacle course training. Four SWAT team members received WallBanger™ instructor certification from The Safariland Group, which is a company that supplies breaching tools. The certification authorizes those individuals to provide in-service door breaching training to other members of the agency.

- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons McCormick Caraway Seed

Tip: Make muffins instead of bread. Prepare dough as directed and divide among 12 greased muffin cups. Bake 20–25 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Slow Cooker Corned Beef and Cabbage

Prep time: 10 minutes
Cook time: 8 hours
Servings: 12

- 8 small red potatoes
- 2 cups baby carrots
- 1 small onion, quartered
- 1 corned beef brisket (4 pounds), rinsed and trimmed
- 2 tablespoons McCormick Mixed Pickling Spice
- 1 teaspoon McCormick Minced Garlic
- 1/2 head cabbage, cored and cut into wedges

Mint Chocolate Chip Cookies

Prep time: 15 minutes
Cook time: 10 minutes
Servings: 3 dozen, or 36 (1 cookie) servings

- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1–1 1/2 teaspoons McCormick Green Food Color
- 1 teaspoon McCormick Pure Peppermint Extract
- 1 1/2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 375°F. Set aside. Mix flour, baking soda and salt in medium bowl. Beat butter and sugar in large bowl with electric mixer on medium speed until light and fluffy. Add eggs, food color and peppermint extract; mix well. Gradually beat in flour mixture on low speed until well mixed. Stir in chocolate chips.

Drop by heaping tablespoons about 2 inches apart onto ungreased baking sheets.

Bake 10–12 minutes or until edges are lightly browned. Cool on baking sheets 1 minute. Remove to wire racks; cool completely.





Jim Mann from Ehlers and Associates reviewed the option for refunding the TID #2 debt. The current interest rates and call date of the existing debt would allow for refunding or possible restructuring. Jim Mann explained four options:

1. Advance Refund the 2009 issue keeping the same amortization, maximizing savings of approximately \$350,000.

2. Advance Refund the 2009 issue extending the debt a single year, maximizing savings of approximately \$250,000.

3. Advance Refund the 2009 issue extending the debt a single year, increasing up front savings at the expense of reducing the back end savings of approximately \$125,000.

4. Advance Refund the 2009 issue with a combination of GO Debt and a TID Revenue Bond (need to find a purchaser), using the debt concept from Option 3. This would extend the debt by 7 years and add to the cost by \$900,000.

The Board discussed if the savings should be recognized at the beginning or end of the debt schedule. A fifth option may be to have set schedule of level interest

A life lesson about the importance of resilience was mastered by members of the Kewaskum High girls basketball team in their D-2 regional tournament game at Ripon on February 24. Unfortunately it didn't produce a victory as the host Lady Tigers prevailed, 46-39.

"We had a rough start ... down 11-0 to start the game," first-year KHS coach Russ Thull said, reporting Ripon's Shannon McNeill hit a pair of threes at the beginning for Ripon.

The Indians didn't give up, however. They battled back to score seven in the closing minutes of the first quarter and actually surged into the lead by intermission, 20-17, according to Thull, who remarked, "I was happy with how we responded to the initial adversity."

Ripon regained its touch

after the break, scoring 15 points in the third quarter, so it was anybody's game down the stretch, depending on which team could come up with a little run.

"The game went back and forth the rest of the way," Thull said, reporting Marisa Bunge got a hot hand for the Tigers, scoring two 3-points to counter a couple of the big baskets produced by Kewaskum's Hailey Herriges, who led the Indians with 15 points.

"Hailey hit some big shots for us, including two threes," the coach said, adding scoring help came from Maddie Kreis and Erin Matusinec, who chipped in with eight and seven points, respectively.

Mikala Dogs returned after missing three games with an ankle injury, but she was limited to two points. When asked if Dogs was 100 percent, Thull said, "No, probably eighty per-

cent tops," adding it would be hard to say if the Indians would have won if she had been at top speed.

Unfriendly roll leads to tough loss for Indians

After successfully converting all seven free throws he had taken in the first 31 minutes and 58.2 seconds of Friday night's game against Sheboygan Falls, Kewaskum's Charlie Witek couldn't get the tie-breaker to drop with 1.8 seconds remaining, and the Indians wound up losing their Eastern Wisconsin Conference season finale in overtime, 46-39.

Witek made an amazing fadeaway shot, while being knocked to the floor, to tie the game at 38-all, and the home fans were going wild after Kewaskum had come back from 11 points down (36-25) and was now in a position to win the game.

The Falls coach called time out in an attempt to ice Witek, but he looked confident at the line as he bounced the ball a couple of times and propelled it toward the basket only to have it rattle around and out.

There was no time to dwell on the miss. The Indians had to focus on the four-minute overtime ahead, and they got the ball first after controlling the tip. The opportunity ended without a shot when Jason Hanson was whistled for traveling with 3:11 remaining.

The Indians quickly got it back when Josh Baker fell on a loose ball, and a timeout was called before the Falcons could attempt to tie him up for a jump ball.

Witek missed a jumper at 2:13, then the Falcons were off target on a three with 1:48 left, and the score still knotted at 38-all.

Harris Avdic scored the first points of the OT on a putback basket with :58 left. Kewaskum missed again, but Mike Prochnow came up with a steal seconds later. Unfortunately, his long pass attempt was intercepted by the Falcons, who got two free throws by Ross Krist and Avdic in the final 25 seconds.

With the loss, Kewaskum's record fell to 3-11 in EWC play and 8-14 overall.

"Just mental mistakes killed us," a disappointed KHS coach Keith Traska said afterward. "Our only senior tonight, Dean Schlice, played well. It's hard to find other nice things to say ... I'm that unhappy."

While he applauded the fourth quarter comeback, Traska said, "We didn't get the inside play we needed to have. We need five guys to show up, and we're only getting two or three. That's our sixth loss by

two or three points or in overtime."

Traska didn't want to take anything away from the Falcons' effort. "I give Falls credit. They had eight, three-pointers tonight. When they're hitting, they're tough to beat."

Ryan Schmitt, a 5-foot-9 junior, hit three long bombs from the baseline in the first half, scoring 11 of his team's 23 points before going out with an ankle injury. Austin Madden also hit a trio of baskets beyond the arc on his way to a 10-point effort.

Witek led the Indians with 11 points, seven below his season average. Next high were Schlice and 6-7 Jason Hanson with eight and seven, respectively.

Junior point guard Josh Baker was a beast on the boards for the Indians, hauling down a team-high 10, while Witek added nine.

The Indians need to re-group quickly as they were scheduled to entertain Campbellsport Tuesday (March 3) in an opening-round D-2 tournament game.

The game vs. Falls was Senior Night, and the lone seniors, Corey Stern and Schlice, were honored when they were

presented basketballs signed by their teammates. Schlice started and played very well in his final regular-season appearance, scoring eight points and chipping in with two rebounds and two assists and three steals.

Stern, who has been sidelined the past three weeks because of illness, said he enjoyed being involved in the sport, especially "the teamwork ... and just the group of guys."

When asked about his favorite game this year, Stern said, "the Two Rivers game. It was probably our best win of the year."
