## Say Cheesewurst

– Winning Specialty Bratwurst Brings Smiles To Local Sausage Maker

Nate Broker studied marketing in college, but he has never used his degree.

Instead, he fell into the meat business, and is now an award-winning sausage maker at Kewaskum Frozen Foods.

Broker's cheesewurst was named the grand champion bratwurst for this year's Wisconsin State Fair.

"It is a popular item," said Amy Ries, whose husband is an owner of Kewaskum Frozen Foods. "It's cheese and bratwurst, all in one. What is there not to love?"

### The recipe

Broker does not use traditional seasoning to create the cheesewurst. Instead, he uses a number of secret spices, along with cheddar cheese and pork.

"I don't know how to

describe it. It has a very unique taste. A lot of cheesewursts are essentially a smoked brat with cheese, where ours has a flavor all its own," Broker said. "It is like its own entire kind of sausage."

The entire process of creating the cheesewurst takes about six hours. Grinding and smoking are the most time-consuming parts of the entire procedure, Broker said.

Broker's cheesewurst competed against other specialty cooked bratwursts in the state to be named grand champion at the state fair. The bratwursts in the category must be nontraditional in the sense that they have a special ingredient, like chicken, beef, turkey, pepper, onions or cheese.

A panel of judges determined which bratwurst reigned supreme by smelling and tasting all the entries to determine the winner.

The interior texture of the bratwursts should be firm and even throughout, Broker said.

"They are looking to see that it does not have a mushy or soft texture," Broker said. "If you have too much fat in there it will be grisly or greasy in your mouth."

In addition, the bratwursts were judged on their appearances. A good smoked and cured bratwurst should have a continuous, even color, with no visible defects, such as water spots that occur during the cooling process.

Each sausage should be the same shape and size, and the casings should be sealed. Unlike some of the competitors who twist the casings by hand, Kewaskum Frozen Foods has machines that tie off each sausage.

## Youth Exhibit Projects At Fair

The Washington County Fair officially opened on Tuesday, but many people were there last week setting up tables, chairs and decorations.

"There have been volunteers who have been preparing all week for it," said Megan Buehler, 4-H youth development staff assistant.

Swarms of people buzzed around the Ziegler Family Expo Center last Thursday, setting up the nonanimal exhibits for junior and open class competitions. About 75 volunteers prepared stations for woodworking, arts, wildlife, cake decorating, communications, and technology exhibits.

A number of the displays centered around this year's science and technology theme, "STEAM Into Action."

Youth have been working all year on more than

80 projects to submit at the fair.

"It certainly is a culminating experience, a lot of people look forward to it," Buehler said.

The Washington County 4-H has 730 members, and more than 300 adult volunteers, Buehler said.

Youth have the option to work on a project for the fair individually or with others in a local club or with peers at the county level.

Local clubs are run primarily by adult volunteers. The Wayne Crusaders, one of the largest clubs in the county with more than 100 members, is made up of people from all over the region.

"It is very common for members to live in a different city and be a part of that club," Buehler said.

Most of the projects in the Ziegler Building were judged on Monday.



"The better equipment you have, the easier it is to maintain, especially from one piece to the next," Broker said. "The judging gets real nitpicky, where they look for any tiny variance."

#### Making sausage

Broker has been the sausage maker at Kewaskum Frozen Foods for two years.

Prior to coming to Kewaskum, he owned his own meat store in Hartford for about 13 years.

It was a career he never planned.

He started working at a sausage shop while he was in high school.

"I was just doing odds and ends for them after school," Broker said. "I really took an interest into

it."

After high school, Broker attended the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee to study nursing, and ended up getting a marketing degree.

He continued working at the sausage shop throughout college, but never intended to become a full-time sausage maker.

But when the store owner got cancer, he asked Broker to take over the business for him.

"I kind of had to learn on the fly, essentially," Broker said. "I just kind of fell into it."

Over the years, Broker has experimented and developed different recipes.

"I really enjoy different flavored brats," he said.

#### Going places

Broker and Kewaskum Frozen Foods have been producing the now-famous cheesewurst recipe for several years.

Last year, the American

Association of Meat Processors named the cheesewurst the best in the nation.



# Chief's Corner

The Second Amendment of the United States Constitution grants the right for citizens to keep and bear arms and all 50 states have passed laws allowing for the carrying of concealed weapons in public.

The Kewaskum Police Department has held concealed carry classes over the last few years in an effort to aid the public in learning how to properly handle firearms. Many different organizations hold classes that follow the curriculum issued by the State of Wisconsin Department of Justice, which is the curriculum that we follow. However I decided to hold these classes on the premise that we could offer a view that other instructors could not — the view and issues law enforcement face when dealing with those with CCW Licenses.

Law abiding citizens who have a firearm concealed on their person may be the best way to assist law enforcement in protecting our communities. Police officers are highly trained in using firearms and exist to catch and arrest those who attempt to harm law abiding citizens. However there are many times where police are responding to a crime that has already happened, like a robbery for example.

There just aren't

enough police officers in this country to be everywhere at all times or to be able to respond in a short amount of time. Therefore, if you are a law abiding concealed-carrying citizen, you may find yourself in a situation where an imminently life threatening criminal act is taking place and you decide to intervene.

In this situation there are some important issues to remember. The responding police officers do not know immediately who the "bad guy" is when arriving on scene. The police weren't there to see how the events unfolded, therefore they must conduct an investigation to determine what occurred.

As soon as you see the police, you need to re-secure your weapon and follow all commands given to you. You may be handcuffed, placed into the back of a police car and transported to the department to be interviewed and to obtain a statement. You may feel like the criminal for a short period of time, but if you did everything appropriately within the scope of the law, then you should be able to leave the scene or department knowing that you helped stop a criminal who was a threat to society.

I am not sharing this information to scare anyone off from carrying, and ultimately using a firearm

in a warranted situation. I just want those who carry a weapon to understand the responsibility associated when involved in such an incident. A firearm is never used to just 'shoot someone in the arm or leg,' firearms are deadly force. Before you even consider carrying a firearm, I recommend you take a carry concealed weapons training course to learn some of these issues that would not have been covered in other approved courses; such as a hunter's safety course.

There are 318.9 million people in the United States and only 765,000 sworn law enforcement officers to protect them (U.S. Census Bureau, 2014 ). In this day and age, criminals seem to have no regard for human life and will use firearms to commit their criminal acts. Couple that with terrorism, domestic or otherwise, and we live in a society where citizens need to be able to protect themselves and others.

I simply request that those who decide to carry a weapon take an appropriate class, and take time at the range, in order to be able to safely and appropriately use deadly force if ever encountered with the situation.

# Long-Range Planning Begins For Kewaskum School Facilities

The Kewaskum School Board continues to take steps forward to developing a long-term building improvement plan for the district.

The board agreed Monday night to form an ad hoc committee of 20-40 members to determine the district's facility needs.

"The goal of the facilities long-range planning group is to make sure that all the facilities and curriculum are in line," said Matt Wolfert, president of Bray Architects, an architectural firm that specializes in educational planning and design.

The plan is for the ad hoc committee to begin meeting every three weeks in September or October. The committee's goal will be to develop a plan and send out a committee survey to the entire community next March, Wolfert said.

The community's feedback on potential building solutions would give the board time to consider whether it should go to referendum in November 2016, Wolfert said.

"The makeup of that group is pretty important. Obviously, we want a good blend of board members, educators, administrators and interested citizens who understand and want to help the district establish a direction for facilities," Wolfert said.

The board's goal is to determine who will serve on the ad hoc committee by the next school board meeting on Aug. 10.

Ideally, all seven board members would be part of the ad hoc committee, he said.

we want to make sure that everybody is getting an even playing field and the citizen committee members aren't simply allowing you as a board to steer the direction and they are rubber stamping. We want to be careful and make sure that doesn't happen because their voice is critical," Wolfert told the board.

It is important for the committee to explore all solutions, even those that do not seem viable from the get-go, Wolfert said.

"They have to be explored so that the public can see and get comfortable and hopefully understand why that solution was not the recommendation of that committee," Wolfert said.

Sometimes a plan comes together rather quickly, and the direction and the ideas and the concepts that come forward are well received by the committee members, Wolfert said.

"Other times it may take two or three or four meetings to get there," Wolfert told board members Monday night. "The benefit of where you are in the process is that we have time to do that, we don't have to rush through a process to get to a solution because you have to go to referendum or want to go to referendum next spring. You deserve credit for starting now."

The ad hoc committee will likely meet in the middle school and high school buildings so that committee members can experience some of the difficulties teachers are faced with on a daily basis in the facilities.

"It is a lot different sitting here and talking about some of the challenges at the high school or the middle school than it is sitting in one of the rooms that we are having the challenge with and actually conducting the meeting there," Wolfert said.

The school board decided Monday night to begin the process of hiring a construction manager to be a part of the ad hoc committee and support the district as it potentially heads to a referendum process.

School Superintendent James Smasal said he would send out a request to potential construction managers.

At the board's next meeting on Aug. 10, Smasal will report where he is in the process. The board hopes to set up interviews at that time.

Bray Architects will send out engineers in the next month to evaluate plumbing, HVAC and electrical systems in the facilities.

In addition, the architecture firm will talk with staff, educators, principals and others to get a better understanding of how the facilities support the way that students learn and teachers teach, Wolfert said.

"We will hopefully create a vision of how the facilities can continue to support the quality education that is currently going on, but also if improvements are made, and if the community would like to see improvements made, how the facilities can better support the district and students for many years to come," Wolfert said.

"It prevents the struggle of [when] the committee makes a recommendation or a suggestion after months worth of work and the board disagrees and goes a different direction. We now have a committee that has worked really hard and put a lot of time and effort into it, and is at odds potentially with the board," Wolfert said.

However, board members need to remember to give all committee members equal say.

"You should participate, but as much as we can,

The 12 students built bridges they had designed from balsa wood and wood glue.

One of the bridges weighed less than 0.010 of a pound and could hold 42 pounds.

"You could rest your newborn on it," said Jack Paul, who will be a freshman at Kewaskum High School.

The bridge building was just one project that the students did in the 4-H Gateway Academy held last week at West Bend West High School.

Sponsored by the University of Wisconsin-Extension 4-H and West Bend Joint School District 1, the technology camp was open to students going into seventh through ninth grades. The students learned leading technologies in robotics, aeronautics and computer design.

"We are exploring ways to get positive youth development, and this was one of those program models that has been really successful to our youth," said Brianna Stapleton Welch, a 4-H youth development educator.

Last week's five-day camp offered science, engineering, technology and math experiences for youth.

"There's not a moment we are not doing something," said Jack's cousin Luke Hupfer.

In addition to designing bridges, the students built solar-powered cars, electrical circuits, catapults and rockets. They also

used different computer programs, created T-shirts, operated a three-dimensional printer and participated in team-building activities.

Jack's favorite project was creating snap circuits.

"They are electronic components that you snap together to make a complete circuit," Jack said. "Right now I'm trying to make a dimmable light bulb. On the other side I will have a fan with speed control, so this is like what you would have in a house with a dimmable fan and a light, but this is simplified."

"I liked building the bridges. It was really hard to do, though," Luke said. "I also kind of like the solar cars this year because I won. Not last year,

though."

The students all were interested in learning, said Ryan Johnson, who taught the class with fellow technology teacher Jacob Gitter.

"Most of the students have a very high interest level," Johnson said. "It was a very good week."

The camp was made possible because of its sponsors, Charter Steel, DACO Precision Tool, Spiros Industries, Dennis and Cindy Backhaus, Signicast and Server Products, Inc.

"The sponsors made donations and provided field trips. They all contributed," Stapleton Welch said. "This used to be grant funded, and that grant funding ended sev-

eral years ago, so we would not be able to offer this program if it weren't for these companies. And hopefully, the kids get to understand the work opportunities with companies in the area."

This was the third year that Jack attended the camp. He is considering going into mechanical engineering, and the camp is offering him a solid base.

Both Jack and Luke recommend the camp to other youth who enjoy technology, although Luke cautioned that it involves a little math.

"If you don't want to do the math, you don't have to. Just don't raise your hand," Jack said.

Like the weather, things looked pretty bleak last Tuesday evening for the Kewaskum High baseball team in its regional opener against Nicolet.

Down 4-1 after five innings, the Indians used back-to-back, two-out hits by Cole Surprenant and Demmon Hunter to tie the game in the bottom of the sixth; then Michael Prochnow's second double of the night opened the door for a winning run, which was scored on a wild pitch.

"A different way to win," KHS coach Doug Gonring said, but he'll take it. He's been around the game long enough to have experienced both sides of games like this one.

With the win, the No. 7-seeded Indians improved to 18-10 and move into the regional final against second-seeded Homestead. Nicolet ended its season at 7-19.

The first three innings were completed in a flash with Prochnow facing 11 batters and giving up just one hit, an infield single to Jake Olin in the third.

His counterpart, Jacob Braun, was also effective. He faced the minimum three in the first and second before an error by the Knight's third baseman allowed Devyn Zillmer to become the first Indian to reach base in the bottom of the fourth.

Surprenant's bunt moved him to second, and after Hunter Demmon fouled out, Bille Lehmann came through with a solid hit to center field for a 1-0 lead. Lehmann took second on the throw home but was erased when Dean Schlice struck out.

Nicolet didn't waste time tying the score, picking up a run in the fourth on a single by Braun, a single to center by Kyle Brahm, and a passed ball.

KHS threatened in its half of the fourth but Braun managed to strike out Dylan May and Zillmer for the second and third outs.

Then in the fifth, Nicolet surged into a 3-1 lead with Olin reaching on an error by Demmon after one out and Craig Carey following with a double to right. Prochnow got Braun to strike out but while Matt Appleby was at bat, he was called for a balk for the second run, and the third scored on a passed ball.

Nicolet added what looked to be an insurance run in the sixth on a double by Joe DeLia and a single to left by Adam Plotkin. DeLia had to wait to see if the ball would drop, and he scampered home when

Zach Heberer bobbled the ball in left.

Then it was all Indians, who sent seven to the plate in their half of the sixth, which started with an error by Nicolet's third baseman of Prochnow's grounder. Matt Hebebrueg followed with a bloop single to right, and Andy Neu drove in a run with a smash that went under the shortstop's glove. Braun struck out Heberer and then Surprenant hit the first pitch deep to left and just in play.

"It was right down the line. I thought it was foul at first," Surprenant said, adding he was getting fooled by Braun's curve and was looking for the fastball." He got one and took advantage of it.

The double scored a pair and then Demmon slapped an 0-and-1 count to left for a base hit, and the game was tied.

Nicolet went down quickly in the seventh. Now all the Indians needed was a run. The odds were in their favor after Prochnow hit the second pitch to deep center field. Nicolet intentionally walked Hetebrug, Neu promptly bunted them to second and third, and with Heberer at bat, Braun threw the wild pitch, Brandon Mikolajczak, who was pinch running for Prochnow, dashed home with the winning run, and the Indians erupted from the dugout to celebrate the win.

Gonring said he was going to try the suicide, but, "He (Heberer) didn't have any confidence on his first one (when he eventually struck out in the sixth)."

The veteran coach was tickled with the way Prochnow hit and pitched. "Mike played himself right into a victory," Gonring said. "He's been hitting the cover off the ball."

While Prochnow only had three strikeouts, "He got their guys to hit ground balls."

Prochnow gave up two earned runs on seven hits, while Braun issued one earned run.

When asked about keys to his win, Prochnow said, "I relied on mixing up my pitches so I wasn't predictable."

About his big double in the seventh, the lanky junior said, "He just left the curve ball hanging. I sat back and drove it to left field."

Concerning the condition of his pitching arm, Prochnow said, "Right now it feels all right." And would he be ready to pitch Friday vs. Homestead? "We'll see what Doug's got in store."

# Dennis Prunty Wins 36th Annual Superseal Slinger Nationals

Erasing the memories of a year ago where he fell victim to a mechanical failure with the checkered flag in sight, Dennis Prunty once again dominated the Superseal Slinger Nationals presented by Miller Lite Tuesday night at the Slinger Super Speedway and drove to

the victory to claim his first Nationals title.

"I always wanted a big check and I don't know what to do, the girlfriend wants a ring, the kids want to go to Disney, but I want to go to the Snowball Derby," Prunty said after being presented with the \$10,000 winning prize and alluding to the end of the year Florida race he has attempted the past few years, "So we're going to the Snowball Derby, baby!"

Prunty took the lead on lap nine and led a whopping 189 of the 199 laps, collecting nearly \$6,000 in additional bonus money and survived a late caution period with six laps to go that was set up due to contact between second place running Ty Majeski and a lapped car, which resulted in the lapped car spinning. Majeski, who had cut into Prunty's lead in the closing laps, was

placed at the tail end of the lead lap cars in sixth place for his involvement in the incident which left Conrad Morgan to challenge Prunty for the win.

Morgan, who paced the opening eight laps of the race, gave a valiant effort on the inside for a few laps after racing resumed, but in the end was no match for Prunty and he had to settle for a second place finish.

"I'm out of breath and Dennis (Prunty) did a heck of a job," the 67-year old Morgan said afterwards. "He was tough right from the start and he kept that car going and kept the tires under it all night."

"In this race you have to survive the first 100 laps, then survive the next 95 and race the last five or so and that's what I tried to do," Morgan continued, "but he just had me beat."

# KHS Bats Go Silent In Regional Finale

Consistent hitting was a weak spot for the Kewaskum High baseball team for much of the season, and it was evident again last Friday night when the Indians fell to Homestead 12-2 in a five-inning game and were eliminated from the WIAA Summer Baseball Tournament.

The Indians started well, coming up with two hits in the first inning (to take a 1-0 lead) and another in the third, but from then on, Highlander pitcher, Joe Panella, was in control, not allowing a single base runner and striking out the side in the fifth.

Conversely, the Highlanders came up with nine hits in the final two innings, including three doubles, along with two home runs by Trevor Cho, who ended up with five runs batted in (RBIs) in the contest.

"That's kind of been our M. O. all year long," KHS coach Doug Gonring said afterward about the Indians not being able to get hits in clutch situations.

Kewaskum center fielder Bille Lehmann led off the game with a double down the left field line and alertly moved to third when HHS catcher Brooke Ralph dropped Dean Schlice's third strike and had to throw to first to get the out.

The next man up, pitcher Michael Prochnow, hit an 0-and-1 pitch for a single to left, giving the Indians a 1-0 lead and giving their fans plenty of optimism.

Homestead also scored a single run in its half of the first on an RBI single by Sean Driscoll, and first baseman Andy Neu kept the Highlanders from getting another run or two with his diving grab of a line drive, which ended the inning.

The Highlanders added another single run in the second on a sacrifice fly by Luke Neusen with the bases loaded

Kewaskum tied the game (2-2) in the third, thanks to a perfect suicide squeeze. Lehmann was on third after reaching on an error and moving around on a hit down the left field line by Schlice. On the throw to third, Schlice took second, so the Indians had two aboard with one out.

Lehmann was halfway home when Prochnow dropped the bunt down to the right of Panella, whose only option was to throw to first for the out.

Panella ended any further damage when he got designated hitter Matt Hetebrueg to strike out on three pitches.

Prochnow, who came into the game with a perfect 7-0 record, faced just four Highlanders for a routine third inning, but the hosts exploded for four runs in the bottom of the

fourth. The big hit was Cho's two-out, three-run homer, which cleared the wall of the Highlanders' short, 261-foot right field.

After giving up the home run, Prochnow threw one pitch (a ball) to Mitch Sutton, and Gonring decided it was time for a pitching change.

"The very next inning, I was going to make my move," Gonring said, praising his ace pitcher by saying, "He competed. I thought he gave us a chance to win" but adding there were errors, both physical and some mental, that gave the Highlanders too many at bats.

"The game was still a game when it was 2-1," Gonring said.

"The momentum changed when we couldn't get that last out (In the fourth)."

Neu came on in relief but after walking Sutton and Driscoll, Adam Kelly drilled a single to left for a 6-2 Highlander lead.

Enter pitcher number three, Cole Surprenant, who got Tyler Woldt to ground out to Neu unassisted to end the inning.

Panella struck out Surprenant, Hunter Demmon and Lehmann in the top of the fifth, and the Highlanders were quickly back on offense. Surprenant got the first out, then gave up a single and a walk before Demmon came in to pitch.

Demmon gave up a double to Jared Stieve and Cho's second homer, which barely cleared the fence. At this point, Gonring called on senior Jared Krueger to pitch. He gave up one run on two doubles before Sam Schlosser marched to the mound, striking out the first man he faced, walking

the second and giving up a single to Trevor Cho, which ended the game via the 10-run rule.

"I wanted to make sure every one of them (his pitchers) got an inning," Gonring said, indicating he didn't have much of a chance to let any of the reserves bat because of the 10-run rule, a rule he isn't keen on, especially in tournament games.

When the team gathered after the final out, Gonring said he thanked the seniors, Lehmann, Demmon, Schlice, Hetebrueg, Krueger and Brandon Mikolajczak for their efforts.

As far as the returnees, who will play in the North Shore next season, Gonring said, "They have to get better for next year," and get in the weight room to get stronger. He noted the Indians didn't have a single home run this season, and this is the first time in his coaching career that has happened.

The Indians finished the season at 18-11 and with his top three pitchers and much of his infield returning, 2016 could be another good year.

## DNR To Hold Series Of Public Meetings On Starry Stonewort

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources will hold a series of public meetings in southeast Wisconsin to share information about starry stonewort and answer questions from area lake organizations and interested community members.

The first meeting will be held on July 29 with additional meetings to be scheduled around the region.

Starry stonewort, which arrived from Eurasia and was first discovered in the United States in the St. Lawrence River in 1978,

has now been confirmed in Long Lake in Racine County and Silver Lake in Washington County as well as the previously reported findings in Little Muskego Lake, Big Muskego Lake and Bass Bay in Waukesha County, said Carroll Schaal, DNR lakes and rivers section chief. Starry stonewort, also found in Michigan, Indiana and the northeastern U.S., can form dense lakebed mats that crowd out native plants and eliminate habitat for juvenile fish.

The series of meetings will present information on

the biology of starry stonewort, its current status and monitoring and management efforts. The audience will learn about actions that can help prevent the spread and what lake residents can do to help monitor and control it.

The first informational meeting will be held July 29, from 6 to 8 p.m., at the DNR Waukesha Service Center, 141 NW Barstow St., Room 151. Additional meetings will be announced at a later date.

# Eco-Friendly Pest Control In The Garden

Spots on tomatoes, holes in hosta leaves and wilting stems mean insects and diseases have moved into the garden. Don't let these intruders reduce the beauty and productivity of your landscape. Work in concert with nature to prevent and control these pests and you will be rewarded with a bountiful harvest and landscape filled with beautiful blooms.

**Monitor.** Take regular walks through the landscape. Not only is it good exercise, but it will improve your mood and you'll discover problems earlier when they are easier to control. Look for discolored leaves, spots, holes and wilting. Inspect the underside of the leaves and along the stems to uncover the cause of the problem.

**Identify.** Once you discover a problem, identify the culprit. Your local extension service, garden center or reliable internet resource can help. Once identified, you can plan the best way to manage the culprit.

**Invite the Good Guys.** Toads, lady beetles and birds help control many garden pests. Attract them to the garden by planting herbs and flowers to attract beneficial insects, adding a house

for the toads, and birdbath for songbirds. Avoid using pesticides and learn to tolerate a bit of damage. A few aphids or caterpillars will bring in the ladybeetles, lacewings, birds and toads that are looking for a meal.

**Clean up.** Many insects and diseases can be managed and prevented with a bit of garden cleanup. A strong blast of water from the garden hose will dislodge aphids and mites, reducing their damage to a tolerable level. Or knock leaf-eating beetles and other larger insects off the plants and into a can of soapy water.

Pick off discolored leaves, prune off diseased stems and destroy. Be sure to disinfect tools with 70% alcohol or one part bleach to nine parts water solution between cuts. This will reduce the risk of spreading the disease when pruning infected plants.

**Adjust care.** Reduce the spread and risk of further problems by adjusting your maintenance strategies. Avoid overhead and nighttime watering that can increase the risk of disease. Use an organic nitrogen fertilizer like Milorganite ([milorganite.com](http://milorganite.com)) which encourages slow steady growth that is less suscepti-

ble to insect and disease attacks.

Mulch the soil with shredded leaves, evergreen needles or woodchips. This will keep roots cool and moist during drought, improve the soil as they decompose, and also prevent soil borne diseases from splashing onto and infecting the plants.

**Non-chemical Controls.** If the problems continue, try some non-chemical options for insects. A yellow bowl filled with soapy water can attract aphids, a shallow can filled with beer and sunk in the ground will manage slugs, and crumpled paper under a flower pot for earwigs are just a few ways to trap and kill these pests.

Or cover the plants with floating row covers. These fabrics allow air, light and water through, but prevent insects like bean beetles and cabbage worms from reaching and damaging the plants.

**Organic products.** Organic products like insecticidal soap, Neem, horticulture oil and Bacillus thuringiensis can be used to control specific pests. And even though these are organic, they are designed to kill insects or disease organisms, so be sure to read and follow label direc-

tions carefully.

**Take Note.** Make notes on the problems and solutions in this season's garden. Refer to these next year to help you do a better job of monitoring and managing garden pests. And when shopping for new plants, select the right plant for the location and choose resistant varieties whenever possible.

A little eco-friendly gardening can go a long way in creating a beautiful and productive garden.

## Kewaskum School Board Approves Preliminary Budget

The Kewaskum School District has an estimated decrease in revenue of nearly \$354,000 for the 2015-2016 school year, but is making ends meet by making budget cuts and using reserved funds.

The preliminary budget planned for 2015-2016 is \$22,782,844, compared to \$23,020,323 in 2014-2015. That is a decrease of \$237,479, or 1.03 percent.

At its meeting Monday night, the Kewaskum Board of Education committed a fund balance of \$168,787 from the 2014-15 budget surplus to the 2015-16 operating budget for technology.

The board voted unanimously to approve the balance transfer.

"We are in a very strong position, in about as strong as we have ever been in the last 30 years," Board President Troy Hanson said as the board agreed to use last year's budget surplus for the 2015-2016 school year.

The school district will not get its final numbers until October, but in planning for the 2015-2016 budget, School District Business Manager Julie Thoreson said she is assuming no change in membership, equalized property valuation, open enrollment or charter school grant.

"This year, the state's new binding budget allows for no increase in the per pupil revenue limit. We are estimating flat enrollment, so our total decrease in the revenue limit will be \$154,119," Thoreson said.

At this time, the district is also anticipating no new grant award, which will result in a decrease of \$200,000. The total change in revenue is a decrease of \$353,916.

The district's overall revenue has decreased almost \$2 million since 2010-11, which is just under a 10 percent decrease, Thoreson said.

The district has had to reduce expenditure because of the lower revenue and the increase in

operational costs, Thoreson said. There are increases in the cost of things such as wages, contractors, supplies, utilities and fuel, she said.

"There is an increase in cost that results from things that happen every year," Thoreson said. "Everything goes up."

The district cut \$581,493 from the budget in April. In July, another \$81,000 was cut, resulting in a total budget cut of \$662,493.

The district plans to spend \$237,479, or 1.03 percent, less than it did last year on all funds combined. Last year, the district spent \$23,020,323, while it anticipates spending \$22,782,844 during the 2015-2016 school year.

Preliminary estimates predict that the total amount coming in from property taxes will decrease by 3 percent. Last year's property taxes were \$11,037,682, compared to \$10,703,229 for 2015-2016.

Each student met face-to-face with a judge to explain a project. For example, the student might explain the cake they baked, the wood-working project they completed or the rocket they built.

Judges asked the students, "How did you decide to make this?" "What process did you use?" "Why did you make this decision?" "What challenges did you face when you were doing that?" "What would you do differently in the future?"

The judges rated the students on the projects themselves, but they were also critiqued on the interviews.

"A lot of times, if they are able to articulate what they did and why they

made that decision and what they learned from it and what they would do differently in the future, they might still get awarded a blue, which is a first place, instead of a red, because it's that learning that is happening," Buehler said.

Even the Cloverbuds, who are children in kindergarten through third grade, go through face-to-face judging.

"It is sometimes their first experience talking one-on-one, and we really encourage parents to step back so that they can have that conversation with somebody they don't know," Buehler said.

The Cloverbud judges understand the age-appropriateness of talking with the children and know

which questions to ask to help young children explain.

"It is cool because sometimes we will have parents say, 'I never heard them talk like that before,'" Buehler said.

As they finished interviews on Monday, participants found out which color ribbon they earned: blue, red, white or pink.

But the competitors had to return to the fair on Tuesday to see if they were awarded grand champion, reserve champion, merit or honors, and whether their projects were selected to be sent to the state fair.

Fairgoers will be able to view the projects this week.
