Learning Positive Behavior From Peers At An Early Age

– Screening For Three-Year-Old Role Models To Be Held This Friday

On Tuesday morning, three-year-olds could be seeing playing on the playground together at Kewaskum Elementary School.

Their smiles and squeals revealed that they were having a good time.

But the youngsters were learning from one another as well.

The children were taking part in the school's Early Childhood Peer Role Model Program, which started last year under the guidance of Sara Long, who teaches three- and four-year-olds who have special needs at KES.

"I decided a couple years ago that it would be really beneficial for my three-year-olds to have regular peers around so they have models for behavior and language and other skills that we are teaching them in the school environment," Long said.

So the school started the program last year, with

the three-year-old peers joining Long's class on Tuesday and Thursday mornings.

The young role models seem to get as much out of the program as the regular students.

"I think the biggest thing they get out of it is learning compassion and empathy by learning to work and play along with children who may have differences," Long said. "They enjoy the relationships and the friendships that they receive."

An added bonus is that they get the chance to work on some preacademic skills.

"They get introduced and exposed to the colors, shapes, numbers, letters and all the stuff that comes along with school," Long said.

The program focuses on language and behavior skills. The young students also learn some basic skills following the school routine.

Kewaskum High School juniors boarded school buses last Thursday, passports in hand.

They were ready for a trip to plan their future.

The field trip was to the Washington County Fair Park, where a College and

Career Fair was held. Representatives from various businesses, industries, universities, technical schools, organizations and military branches offered information to the students about available opportunities.

The students visited each representative in

order to fill out their "passports."

At the various college booths, students obtained information such as the cost of tuition, fees, and room and board.

By talking with business representatives, they found out what types of skills were needed for employment at that company, the salary range and benefits.

KHS students have participated in similar College and Career fairs for the past three years.

"This is something we started. It is locally home-grown here, with Slinger and West Bend and Hartford school districts,"

Kewaskum Schools Superintendent James Smasal said. "It is a great opportunity for our kids."

This year, students from Kettle Moraine Lutheran and Living Word attended as well.

To help the students get into the college of their choice, KHS has been making efforts to prepare students for the ACT.

"The most effective preparation is coursework, a rigorous curriculum delivered to our kids. That is ongoing," KHS Principal Scott Stier said.

But the school wanted to do even more.

Perhaps the best thing that comes from the program is the friendships the children make.

Selecting Peer Role Models

To select peer role models to participate in the program, KES will hold a screening this Friday, March 24. There will be two screening sessions held, one from 9 to 10 a.m. and another from 10 to 11 a.m.

Participants must be three years old by September 1 of the following school year.

The screening will consist of a mock preschool program. Three to

four peers will be chosen to participate in next year's program.

"We are looking for kids that have really good language skills, have really good social skills, are outgoing, separate easily from their parents and who initiate interaction with their peers," Long said.

Peer role models will attend school at KES on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 8:45 to 11:45 a.m. during the 2017-18 school year.

Tax Deadline Less Than One Month Away

The tax filing deadline is less than one month away and the Wisconsin Department of Revenue is reminding taxpayers to file their income tax returns by the deadline.

Returns must be received or postmarked by midnight on Tuesday, April 18. The deadline is extended this year because April 15 is a Saturday and Monday, April 17, is a holiday in Washington, D.C.

Department of Revenue is sharing the following tips to make the filing process easier:

- Use our self-service options. Use links to income tax forms and instructions or find answers to common questions about preparing your tax return, tax credits and much more.
- Pay your taxes online. The department offers easy online payment of your taxes on its website. Watch this short one minute video to find out how to make your payment online.
- File an extension request with the IRS if you won't make the April 18 deadline. You must

request an extension from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) by April 18 to avoid late filing penalties. Go to the IRS website at www.irs.gov and search "extension" for more information. Taxpayers who file an extension request with the IRS automatically receive an extension from the state. Keep a copy of the IRS federal extension application (Form 4868) for your records.

•Get free tax help at one of more than 200 Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) sites across Wisconsin. For more information, visit www.revenue.wi.gov and search "free tax help." Call 2-1-1 to find free tax assistance sites in your area.

•Download the WI Revenue mobile app

(available in the Apple and Android app stores) and watch tax assistance videos, check the status of your return or refund, find VITA sites, take action if you received an ID Verification letter, and more.

•Call customer service during off-peak hours at 608-266-2772. Our customer service hours are 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. The best time to call is Tuesday through Friday, especially in the afternoon. Our call center is busiest on Mondays and during the lunch hour.

•Remember DOR will not contact you by telephone or email regarding your income tax return. If the Department needs more information to verify items on your return, it will contact you by letter.

National Weather Service Offers Free Severe Weather Spotter Training

On Wednesday, March 29, a meteorologist from the National Weather Service (NWS) will conduct Severe Weather Safety & Spotter Training at the West Bend City Hall located at 1115 S. Main St. in West Bend. Two identical sessions will be held - an afternoon session from 1 p.m. - 3 p.m. and an evening session from 6:30 p.m. - 8:30 p.m.

This training is free, open to the public and

does not require any pre-registration.

The class will be delivered in two parts. The first hour will address aspects of severe weather safety including high winds/tornadoes, flooding and lightning. The second hour will cover recognition training on weather features that are indicators of severe weather potential. The causes and dynamics of differing forms of severe weather will be discussed

and video/photos of past weather events will be presented to illustrate some of the concepts.

This training is recommended for members of local police, fire and EMS departments as well as amateur radio operators and anyone else with an interest in weather. There will be ample time allowed for questions.

This training is sponsored through the cooperation of: City of West Bend Emergency Management, Washington County Office of Emergency Management, Wisconsin Emergency Management and the National Weather Service.

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

Are you looking to get outdoors? Would you like to hike the Ice Age National Scenic Trail through the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit? Do you like the camaraderie of spending time with other people? Look no further than the Northern Unit's Ice Age Trail Trekkers!

The Ice Age Trail Trekkers is an informal group of people who come together on a Wednesdays from mid-April through September to enjoy an hour or two hiking along the Ice Age National Scenic Trail. There are no membership requirements or fees, but many meeting locations require a Wisconsin State Park System vehicle admission sticker.

Below are the dates and locations for the mid-April and May treks. In the event of severe weather, the hike will be canceled for that day.

•Wednesday, April 19, at 7 a.m. — Hiking 3.45 miles between County Road P and Highway 23. Meet at the County Road P Ice Age Trail parking lot south of Glenbeulah.

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Milwaukee Archdiocese Gains Two New Auxiliary Bishops

Like any normal day, the first thing I did when I woke up on Wednesday, Jan. 25, was check my emails.

What I read was very exciting, and was something I had long expected to happen.

Pope Francis had named the Very Rev. Jim Schuerman, my former boss and friend, as a new

auxiliary bishop for the Archdiocese of Milwaukee.

I texted Schuerman my congratulations immediately. I was overjoyed that he had received such an honor but even more ecstatic that the Church was gaining such a wonderful bishop.

The Most Rev. Jeffrey Haines, who previously served as a priest in West Bend, had also been

named an auxiliary bishop for the Milwaukee Archdiocese.

I met Haines for the first time several days later at a dinner that both he and Schuerman attended in Milwaukee. I had the opportunity to talk with each of the newly appointed bishops separately at that event.

I talked with them not as a reporter, but as one of the 560,766 Catholics in

the Milwaukee Archdiocese.

I was struck by the kindness of both men. The two were extremely humble and genuinely surprised that they had been chosen as bishops.

Both men asked for prayers in their new roles as bishops.

Becoming A Bishop

In the Catholic Church, becoming a bishop is the third and fullest level of the sacrament of Holy Orders. Before being ordained a bishop, one must be ordained a deacon and then a priest.

A bishop oversees a diocese. Kewaskum is located in the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, which covers 10 counties in Southeast Wisconsin. Archbishop Jerome Listecky heads up the archdiocese and is now assisted by two auxiliary bishops.

Last Friday, I was able to attend the ordination of the two new bishops. During the service, the two priests became bishops.

It was an extraordinary event, held at the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Milwaukee, overflowing with beautiful music, ancient rituals and deep prayer.

It was especially mean-

ingful for me because I know what great bishops the Catholic Church has gained.

Fr. Ed Kornath, who is pastor at St. Michael's and Holy Trinity parishes in Kewaskum, knows both Schuerman and Haines well. He entered the St. Francis de Sales seminary at the same time as Schuerman, and Haines entered the seminary one year later.

So the ordination Mass was special to Kornath as well.

"It was a very, very beautiful ceremony," Kornath told parishioners last weekend. "It elevated the entire human spirit."

The Lake Geneva Connection

I first met Schuerman in 2005. At the time, Schuerman was working as a spiritual director and faculty member at St. Francis de Sales Seminary. I was working at St. Francis de Sales parish in Lake Geneva, where I served for over 10 years as director of religious education.

St. Francis de Sales parish has a large Hispanic population that I worked very closely with. That group is how I first got to know Schuerman,

long before he was named pastor at St. Francis. Schuerman is fluent in Spanish and helped out with bilingual events in the Lake Geneva area.

I quickly learned that Schuerman was dependable, kind and patient. He also is very easy to talk with and has a great sense of humor. He soon became someone I would call upon whenever I needed help with anything.

In 2012, my pastor and friend, the Most Rev. David Malloy, was named bishop for the Rockford Diocese. Although we were losing a wonderful pastor, all of us St. Francis parishioners were happy for the people of Rockford. With the loss of Malloy, Schuerman was named our new pastor.

Bishop Malloy was one of about 20 bishops who took part in last week's ordination.

Listecky introduced each of the bishops to the congregation. When he got to Malloy, Listecky revealed one of the Church secrets.

"The way to the Episcopate is through Lake Geneva," Listecky joked.



"We wanted to make sure we put our kids in the best position possible," Stier said. "In preparation for the ACT, we analyzed what we did last year and decided students need a pretest of the ACT."

So In January, the school administered a retired ACT to all juniors.

After the pretest, the students saw their scores on the various portions of the test. They were able to pinpoint the areas they needed to improve. They then attended classes at school to concentrate on those particular subjects.

The staff worked to do what they could to help the students excel on the test. Teachers identified students that they had a close relationship with.

"We essentially held an NFL draft," Stier said.


Eight to 10 students were paired with a teacher who had selected them, and those students were able to take the ACT in that teacher's classroom.

"So everyone was in a small group where they were comfortable. It was a very quiet setting, and only juniors were in the building that day," Stier said.

Only juniors were in the high school on Tuesday, Feb. 28, the actual ACT test day.

The day started with breakfast in the cafeteria and some calisthenics to get everyone ready for the test.

"It helped put everyone in a good frame of mind, and the day went very well. We are excited to see those test results," Stier said.

We get questioned about this all the time. Silver fillings, or dental amalgams, are a safe, affordable and durable restorative material that have been studied and reviewed extensively.

There has been no association with adverse health effects from the material. Past studies have shown that amalgams have a higher success rate regarding longevity compared to resin or white fillings, however current literature now

shows that both materials have comparable success rates. This is due to the product advancements in resin bonding and composition.

Our office offers both options for filling material. If patients are undecided as to which filling material to use, we usually recommend amalgams for the posteriors (or back teeth) since it has been a very reliable and robust product and is more cost effective for the patient.
