Fire Rages Through Village Neighborhoods

Fire destroyed two houses and damaged four more homes on Odawa Circle in Kewaskum on Monday, April 30.

The Kewaskum Fire Department responded to the call of a structure fire at 845 Odawa Circle at 1:36 p.m. Prior to leaving the station, Washington County Dispatch advised that there were now two structures involved.

Fire units arrived on scene and found two residential homes with heavy fire and smoke showing. Additional departments were requested via the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System or MABAS to the Second Box level to respond to the scene to assist Kewaskum Fire Department.

High winds played a role in spreading the blaze, and during the height of the fire, another house fire was reported approximately four blocks away on Jefferson Drive. That fire was brought under control with an estimated damage of \$5,000.

An eighth house was affected on Washington Avenue, when a deck caught fire from blowing debris. The homeowner extinguished that fire with a garden hose.

"I have seen a lot of fires in my years, but I have never seen buildings be consumed so fast," Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said.

Wind gusts reached 25 mph on Monday, and debris blew north and east of the fire.

The following morning, on Tuesday, May 1, wood chips around a garden shed on Washington Avenue caught on fire and charred the garden shed and a fence. It is suspected that the fire may have been caused by smoldering ashes from Monday's fire.

No people were injured in any of the fires.

Total Loss

Monday started out like a normal day for the Herriges family.

Farm Equipment On Roadways

The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office would like to remind drivers that as planting season approaches it is illegal to pass any farm equipment operating on the roadway in a "no passing zone."

Please operate with due regard around farm equipment and share the road accordingly. Agricultural equipment has the right to be on the road and we need to share that road together. Motorists should be especially careful about passing. They should be far enough behind to see clearly around machinery and to ensure that machinery operators can see them and their turn signals. It is illegal and very dangerous to pass farm equipment in a no passing zone. Pass only when the road ahead is clear and there is either a dashed yellow line on your side of the road or a dashed white line.

Here are some additional safety tips and things to keep in mind:

• Farmers on roadways are going to or from work,

just like many other people on the road.

• Most farmers will pull over when they are able to let you pass, but it may take time for them to get to a safe place to do so. Be patient.

• Farm equipment is wide, sometimes taking up most of the roadway. Be careful when passing.

• The red triangle on the back of an implement, farm machinery or other vehicle indicates a slow-moving vehicle (under 25 mph).

• If you're driving 55 mph and come upon a tractor that's moving 15 mph, it only takes five seconds to close a gap the length of a football field between you and the tractor.

• Do not try to pass a slow moving vehicle on the left without ensuring that the vehicle is not planning a left turn. It may appear that the driver is pulling over for you to pass when it is actually preparing to turn. You will drive right into its path, endangering yourself and the farmer.

• Do not pass if you are in

a designated "No Passing Zone" or within 100 feet of any intersection, railroad grade crossing, bridge, elevation structure, or tunnel.

• Do not assume that a farm vehicle that pulls to the right side of the road is going to turn right or is letting you pass. Due to the size of some farm implements, the farmer must execute wide left-hand turns. If you are unsure, check the operator's hand signals and check the left side of the road for gates, driveways or any place a farm vehicle may turn.

WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

Trailer Home Fire

On April 30 at approximately 1:11 a.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a trailer home on fire at 6931 N. River Road in the Town of Barton.

The fire was reported by a neighbor who was awakened by a loud noise and looked outside and noticed that the trailer next door was on fire. The neighbor called 911 and ran over to the house to attempt to extinguish the flames, which were concentrated on the porch area.

The two occupants of the trailer were awakened by their dog, and they, as well as the dog, were able to safely evacuate. There were no working smoke detectors in the trailer.

The trailer and all of its contents are considered a total loss. A second trailer also suffered damage as a result of this fire however firefighters were able to save that trailer.

The West Bend Fire Department was assisted by the Allenton, Jackson, Kewaskum, Kohlsville and Newburg Fire Departments.

The American Red Cross is assisting with the displaced residents.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office and the West Bend Fire Department. However, it does not appear to be suspicious in nature. There were no injuries as a result of this blaze.

Vehicle vs. Train Crash

On April 28 at 3:43 p.m. the Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a vehicle vs. train crash that occurred on Aurora Road 0.7 miles north of County Highway K, in the Township of Addison. St. Lawrence Fire Department and Allenton Rescue were also summoned to the scene.

When deputies arrived, they located a 16-year-old Hartford male who was the operator and sole occupant still inside the vehicle. Due to the extent of his injuries, he was unable to exit the vehicle and needed extrication. Allenton Rescue requested West Bend Intercept to the scene to assist with patient care, and the patient was later transported by Allenton Rescue to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee.

The crash investigation showed the northbound vehicle disregarded the operating audio bells and flashing red signal signifying an approaching train. This railroad crossing is not governed by gates. The car attempted to cross the tracks in front of the train but was struck in the rear driver's side quarter panel causing the vehicle to spin. The vehicle then struck a signal bungalow near the tracks before coming to rest.

Broadway-Style Play To Help Reduce Suicide Attempts And Loss

Life Of Hope is pleased to be hosting its third annual Community Suicide Education Forum, scheduled for May 8 at the West Bend High School auditorium and Silver Lining Building located at 1305 E. Decorah Road, West Bend.

The program will welcome Josh Rivedal to the stage for a one-night only performance of his Broadway style, one-man play, "Kicking My Blue Genes in the Butt".

Rivedal's presentation "Kicking My Blue Genes in the Butt" is a 15 character, one-man Off-Broadway play that deals with Josh's father's tragic suicide.

Included is an educational component where Rivedal highlights his own

struggle with depression and suicidal thoughts and an overview of Rivedal's recovery and how he strives to live mentally well.

Following Rivedal's presentation, attendees will engage in a discussion panel with Josh, Deeatra Kajfosz (Life Of Hope founder and executive director), and three other area leaders who will share lived experience and professional insight to suicide risk factors, behaviors, protective factors, intervention options, and recovery.

Doors open at 5 p.m. at which time participating partner agencies will greet guests and share their mission/program information. Rivedal and Kajfosz

will have an early Meet and Greet to sell and sign books.

The play "Kicking My Blue Genes in the Butt" will begin at 6 p.m. followed by a panel discussion with questions and answers. Admission is free.

Life Of Hope is dedicated to raising awareness, increasing education, and providing support to those most closely affected by suicide ideation, survived attempt, and loss. In only three years since their inception, they have worked with more than 60 suicidal individuals. To date, they have not lost a single one to suicide. All programs are free.

SBA Working Capital Loan Deadline Approaching In Wisconsin

The U.S. Small Business Administration is reminding small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations that May 29 is the filing deadline for federal economic injury disaster loans in Wisconsin as a result of the heavy rains from June 14 through July 14, 2017.

This disaster declaration includes the following counties: Brown, Calumet, Fond du Lac, Manitowoc, Outagamie, Sheboygan and Winnebago in Wisconsin.

Under this declaration, the SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loan program is available to eligible farm-related and nonfarm-related entities that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. With the exception of aquaculture enterprises, SBA cannot provide disaster loans to agricultural producers, farmers, or ranchers.

The loans are for work-

ing capital and can be up to \$2 million with interest rates of 3.215 percent for eligible small businesses and 2.5 percent for nonprofit organizations, and terms up to 30 years. The SBA determines eligibility based on the size of the applicant, type of activity and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition. These working capital loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable, and other bills that could have been paid had the disaster not occurred. The loans are not intended to replace lost sales or profits.

Applicants may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via

SBA's secure website at Disasterloan.sba.gov.

Disaster loan information and application forms may also be obtained by calling the SBA's Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or by sending an email to disastercustomerservice@sba.gov. Loan applications can be downloaded from the SBA's website at sba.gov/disaster. Completed applications should be mailed to: U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155.

Completed loan applications must be returned to SBA no later than May 29.

Fire Rages Through Village Neighborhoods

"I got up at 5 a.m. I remember I burned 50 calories on my elliptical after I had crimped my hair," Amy Herriges said.

Then Amy and her husband, Matt Herriges, got their two boys ready to go, like they always do. Both 4-year-old Noah and 1-year old Jackson were loaded up into their car seats.

Amy pointed out to Noah that there was still a pile of snow in their driveway, even though temperatures were expected to reach into the 70s that day.

The boys were dropped off with Amy's mom in Jackson, and Matt and Amy went to their office in Waukesha, where Matt works as an electrician and Amy works in a heating and air conditioning department.

It was a busy day at work, and Amy was getting calls about starting an insurance claim because her car was backed into last Friday.

Plus, Amy's co-workers were stressed.

"Well, guys, we're all healthy and we're all happy. We've got that, so let's not stress," Amy told them.

At 1:30, Amy went into a

work meeting.

At 1:38, Matt received a phone call from a friend.

"Your house is on fire," Matt was told.

Matt called Amy, and they returned to their home, located at 845 Odawa Circle.

Everything was completely gone.

The couple immediately reflected on what was important.

"We just bought a new bike yesterday for our little guy, but we can get another one of those," they both agreed.

And it no longer seemed like a big deal that the printer wasn't working at the office.

"Thank God no one was in there," Amy said. "We are all healthy. We are all here. We are going to be OK."

The Report

Tom Fabitz, who lives a block away on Chief Kewaskum Place, was there when the first fire engine arrived.

"There was a lot of big black heavy smoke coming out of the house. The smoke and the heat was so bad it burned some siding on the house on this side of the street," Fabitz said.

Next door to the Herriges home, at 835 Odawa Circle, a teenage girl was home from school. She got out safely with her family's two dogs. Two cats remain missing.

That house is about 80 percent gone, Groeschel said.

The following departments assisted the Kewaskum Fire Department on Monday: West Bend Fire Department, Boltonville Fire Department, Newburg Fire Department, Kohlsville Fire Department, Campbellsport Fire Department, Fillmore Fire Department, Beechwood Fire Department, Jackson Fire Department, Kewaskum Police Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Firefighters remained on the scene for approximately five hours. The fire is still under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Department and the exact cause and dollar loss is undetermined at this time.



Grace did not care. She wanted to help the children in Guatemala who had no shoes.

So Grace collected money rather than gifts for her ninth birthday, and was able to provide two pairs of shoes for about 20 children who were living in a Guatemalan shelter.

After that, Grace continued to grow older with each birthday. And her heart has continued to grow in compassion.

Each year, she selected a different cause for her birthday money. She has given to the Humane Society and to Children's Hospital.

For her birthday last year, Grace donated \$200 to the Kewaskum Police Department.

On July 17, 2017, the Kewaskum Village Board recognized Grace's generous support through a proclamation of commendation in recognition of great public service.

"This act of kindness was remarkable because of her age and because it was unsolicited... Grace Lee demonstrated the kind

of selfless behavior that makes communities strong, safe and a pleasant place to live," the proclamation states.

Community Support

The spirit of giving that Grace Lee has embodied seems to have spread through the entire community.

After the devastation of Monday's fires, the Kewaskum community rallied together to support one another. People stepped up to help however they could.

Groeschel noticed that Monday evening as he toured the neighborhood devastated by the fires.

"After the fires this week, the whole neighborhood came together. Everyone was helping each other. At one house, they were taking stuff out and taking it by their neighbors. A neighbor across the street was helping," Groeschel said.



Going up against a very strong field at the Washington County meet held April 24, the Kewaskum girls and boys finished fourth and fifth, respectively, with 49 and 70 points.

West Bend West dominated the girls' side of the meet, scoring a whopping 205 points, with Slinger a distance second with 120.

On the boys' side of the ledger, Slinger (158.5) won by a comfortable margin with Germantown, West Bend East and West Bend West battling hard for the other top spots, ending up with 107.5, 105 and 103, respectively.

While the Indians were too young to be competitive in the distance races and still need work in hurdles, they were outstanding in the sprints, the 4x100 relay and the open 400.

"It was just four (throws) and done," the burly senior said about the format used for the event. "I started with a 145 and finished with a 146," agreeing the warmer weather was helping the athletes perform better.

Sam Schultz continues to shine, winning the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 1 inch. It was the second time the sophomore jumper had cleared that height, and Evans is confident he can add a few more inches in May.

Tyler Heus had a good afternoon, posting a second place in the 400 where he was clocked in 52.24. Heus could be one of the better 400 runners

in the EC conference this spring.

"Heus had grown so much as an athlete," Evans said. "He's totally committed to the 400. He's worked very hard and has improved a lot."

Highlights for the girls in this rugged competition were the win by Abby Meidl in the pole vault and the second by Emily Halterman in the discus. Meidl added three inches to her previous best, winning with an effort of 9-6, while Halterman made a huge jump in the discus, surpassing the 100-foot mark with a toss of 102-02.

"Another one of those kids who is a real worker," Evans said of Halterman.



The two returning D-2 state qualifiers regrouped for an exciting match against East's Joey Michels and Ethan Wedameyer, who were 20-7 a year ago and just missed a trip to D-1 state and beat Slinger a week ago.

KHS got off to a good

start, breaking Michels serve, then winning their own for a 3-1 lead, which was stretched to when they broke Michels' serve again.

East bounced back to win the next two games (4-3) but Chesak held his serve and KHS won the set with two well-played shots by Goeden for a 6-3 win.

Kirtland's Warbler Removed From Federal Endangered Species List

The removal of Kirtland's warbler from the federal endangered species list on April 12 is another great conservation comeback story, and Wisconsin will continue its efforts to grow the tiny songbird's population.

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service announced earlier this week its plans to remove Kirtland's Warbler from the federal list of threatened and endangered species. The USFWS has determined that the species has clearly met recovery goals following years of intensive habitat management, mostly in lower Michigan where the core population is found.

Kirtland's warbler is a wood warbler that measures 5 inches long, weighs under a half ounce, and migrates to the Bahamas for the winter. The first nest was confirmed in Wisconsin in 2007.

The species' numbers in Wisconsin don't yet meet the criteria to be removed from the state's endangered species list. However, Wisconsin con-

tinues to be active in conservation efforts for the species which began when it was first documented breeding here 10 years ago.

"This is a huge milestone for the overall recovery of this bird, and we will continue our work to increase the Wisconsin population," says Drew Feldkirchner, who directs the Department of Natural Resources Natural Heritage Conservation Program. "Decades of commitment and hard work through public and private partnerships in Michigan have paid off, and we are also proud of the work our Wisconsin partners have done to increase our small but growing population."

National recovery team leaders believe the Wisconsin population provides an important backstop to the core Michigan population and that newly established breeding areas on public land in northern Wisconsin will be important as hotter, drier conditions affect the warblers' food supply at

breeding sites in Wisconsin and Michigan at lower latitudes.

Wisconsin's population has grown from only 11 Kirtland's warblers and three nests documented in 2007 to 53 birds and 20 total nests in 2017. Importantly, the population has grown and its range has expanded from Adams County to also include Marinette and Bayfield counties. The birds fledged a minimum of 49 and up to 63 young in 2017.

"Kirtland's are responding to a decade of conservation work from dedicated partners and the numbers of individuals and nests in Wisconsin continue to increase," says Kim Grveles, the Department of Natural Resources conservation biologist who led Kirtland's warbler efforts in Wisconsin for the past decade.

"We're very encouraged by results of recent years and look forward to contributing more birds to the overall population in coming years," she says.

The Kirtland's warbler

was placed on the federal endangered species list about 40 years ago, when its Michigan population dropped to about 300 birds due to habitat loss and nest predation from brown-headed cowbirds.

Starting in the late 1990s, the protections and efforts made under the federal Endangered Species Act enabled the Kirtland's warbler to start expanding its breeding territory to Wisconsin, Michigan's Upper Peninsula and Ontario. The first nest was confirmed in Wisconsin in 2007.

To help increase Kirtland's warblers in Wisconsin, DNR, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and other partners now conduct annual surveys in

seven counties to listen and look for the birds, monitor nests in Adams County and Marinette County where breeding sites have been found, and set traps to keep cowbirds away from the warblers' nests.

The partners are also working to maintain and expand the mix of 5- to 20-year-old jack pine trees and barrens to provide quality habitat for Kirtland's warblers and other species, says Grveles.

In 2017, DNR planted a 125-acre jack pine stand near the Brule River in Douglas County. Also, Bayfield County Forest and Marinette County Forest continued their habitat management efforts that benefit

Kirtland's warblers.

In addition to those county forests, DNR and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, other partners and collaborators include the University of Wisconsin, Wisconsin Natural Resources Foundation, USDA Wildlife Services, Sand Valley Restoration LLC, Meteor Timber, the Wisconsin Traps shooting Association, Bayfield, Marinette, Vilas, and Jackson County Forest Departments, and many birders and other private citizens.

An article is planned for the June edition of Wisconsin's Natural Resources magazine that will highlight Wisconsin's efforts to conserve Kirtland's Warbler over the last 10 years.

No person shall be allowed to appear before the Board of Review, to testify to the Board by telephone or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the Assessor to enter onto property to conduct an exterior view of such property being assessed.

After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact, or provide information to, a member of the Board about the person's objection except at a session of the Board. Open Book shall occur no less than seven

days prior to the Board of Review.

The Board of Review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the Board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the Board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the Board shall waive that requirement during the first two hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, and the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the fifth day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than five days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48 hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first two hours of the first scheduled meeting.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the Board of Review within the first two hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the fifth day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than five days. The Board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the Board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objection and made full disclosure before the Board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

When appearing before the Board of Review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or subject or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all of the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under Sec. 73.03(2a), that the assessor requests. The Village of Kewaskum has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph which provides exemptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or of the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Section 19.35 (1) of Wis. Statutes.

Construction crews are working hard as progress continues on the new Kewaskum Middle School.

The skylight above the middle school gathering is installed and the building is fully enclosed, allowing drywall soffits to start at the middle school second floor. Paint is on the walls in the middle school main office and most of the first floor.


