Boltonville Rain Days To Be Held This Weekend

Despite its name, planners for the Boltonville Rain Days are hoping for clear skies this weekend. But the tent is up, ready to go, even if rain does fall.

Rain Days, the annual fundraiser for the Boltonville Volunteer Fire Department, will be held this Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 25, 26 and 27. The weekend will be filled with live music, games, rides, food, refreshments and fun.

To kick off the weekend, fireworks will be held Friday at dusk. In case of

rain, fireworks will be Saturday night.

"What is unique about our picnic is that it is almost like a huge township reunion. We have people who come from all over the state once a year, just to get together at the Boltonville Rain Days," said Dennis Fechter of the Boltonville Volunteer Fire Department.

The Boltonville Fire Department is known for starting the picnic season each year with its Rain Days and ending the picnic season with the Street Dance in September.

While some fire depart-

ments struggle to get a good turnout for picnics, the Boltonville Rain Days continues to offer be one of the largest events in the area.

"Our picnic and our Street Dance get bigger and bigger every year. It is amazing," Fechter said.

Several years ago, Wenzel Amazements started providing a carnival at the Rain Days.

"It is unbelievable what a difference that has made. They have nice rides. They are so easy to work with, with our fire department, the families and the kids," Fechter said.

Wristbands will be offered to go on carnival rides at a special rate. The carnival ride wristbands can be used on Friday from 6 to 10 p.m., Saturday from 1 to 5 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 5 p.m.

Wristbands may be purchased in advance at Marshall's Country Corner, the Citgo in Boltonville, Kohn's Corner Mart Citgo in Kewaskum and Kohn's Filling Station BP in Kewaskum.



Tom Kohn Honored For Military Service

Tom Kohn of Kewaskum recently went on The Stars and Stripes Honor Flight to Washington, D.C.

The experience brought back memories for Kohn, who served in the Vietnam War. He spent 13 months in Vietnam, serving as a radio telegraph operator.

Kohn recalls those days vividly. He especially remembers meeting his future wife, Gloria, before he left for Vietnam and how that relationship grew while he was overseas.

Gloria

Tom, who is originally from Campbellsport, enlisted in the Marines at age 19 in September 1966.

He went through basic training and then went to radio school. He was stationed in North Carolina for a few months before being sent to Vietnam.

In July 1967, Tom was home on leave. He went out with a couple guys to Club 18 in Campbellsport. Gloria, who was there with a group of girls, caught his eye.

He started talking to her, but Gloria did not tell him

her real name.

"I said it was Sharon, or something like that. You know, beware," Gloria explained.

Luckily, Tom saw Gloria again later at the Wigwam in Kewaskum. They talked, and then went out on a couple dates before Tom returned to the service.

The two were able to see each other again when Tom returned home for a few weeks in September and October before leaving for Vietnam.

The couple stayed in touch. They corresponded mainly through letters.

That December, just a couple months after arriving in Vietnam, Tom called Gloria.

Actually, he called the ham operator in Vietnam, who got a hold of an operator in northern California, who called Gloria.

During that five-minute call, Tom first spoke with Gloria's parents.

Then, with the operators listening, Tom was able to talk directly to Gloria. To let the operators know when he was done speaking, he said, "Over." Then the operators would flip

the switch so that Gloria could take a turn speaking to Tom.

And that is how Tom proposed to Gloria. With the operators as witnesses to the engagement.

"We had talked about it a little before, and had written about it. I thought it would be a good Christmas present," Tom recalled.

It was the perfect gift for Gloria.

"You learn a lot about a person through snail mail, a lot more than even just talking on the phone. I felt I knew him and I knew it was right," Gloria said.

Then, on December 24, the rural mail carrier did something he had never done before: He came up to Gloria's door in New Fane.

"I think I have something pretty important," he said.

The carrier handed Gloria a box that contained a smaller box. It was Gloria's diamond engagement ring.

Tom had purchased Gloria's ring at the military store in Da Nang, Vietnam.

As people spend time with family and friends this Memorial Day weekend – and take time to remember the sacrifices of the heroes that secured our freedom – BloodCenter of Wisconsin is also asking the community to donate as a special tribute to our veterans and those currently serving in the military.

A limited edition “hero” T-shirt will be given to all attempting donors May 25 – June 8.

The BloodCenter is facing an urgent type O negative blood need heading into the Memorial Day holiday weekend. The center currently has less than a one day supply, which could have a devastating effect if massive transfusion situations occur.

As the Memorial Day weekend kicks off the summer season, it is a particularly difficult time for blood donations, and supplies often run dangerously low when needed most. There’s

increased risk for injuries and accidents in the summer months – so each donation counts more than ever. Some trauma situations can require up to 30 units of blood or more.

BloodCenter of Wisconsin donor centers and community blood drives include:

Saturday, May 26: Regular donor center hours at all locations.

Sunday, May 27: Regular Sunday platelet hours at Greenfield, Waukesha and West Bend donor centers.

Monday, May 28 (Memorial Day): Milwaukee, Wauwatosa, Waukesha and Greenfield donor centers are open 6 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Tuesday, May 29: Regular donor center hours at all locations.

Area Memorial Day Programs

Kewaskum

The public is invited to share in Kewaskum's longstanding tradition of holding a Memorial Day ceremony.

This year's Memorial Day program will be held at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, May 28, outside the American Legion Hall, 1538 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum.

There will be no parade this year, because of construction occurring at Kewaskum High School. However, the public is encouraged to still take part in the regular ceremony at the Legion Hall, which will include speakers and a 21-gun salute.

Immediately following the program, members of the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 384 of Kewaskum will serve hamburgers, brats

and refreshments.

Fillmore

The public is invited to a Memorial Day Program in Fillmore on Monday, May 28.

The annual Memorial Day Program in Fillmore will include the exhibit "A Face for Every Name." The exhibit features a photo for every Vietnam veteran from Wisconsin who is remembered on the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C.

The Fillmore Turner Hall, located at 523 Highway H, just 3.5 miles east of Highway 144 north of West Bend, will be open for viewing the exhibit at 11 a.m. on Memorial Day, Monday, May 28.

The traditional Memorial Day Program will begin in Turner Hall at 12:30 p.m.

Refreshments, brats and burgers will be available beginning at 11 a.m.

Andrew Johnson, publisher of the Kewaskum Statesman, The Campbellsport News and the Dodge County Pionier, will share his story of working with community newspapers to locate the photos for the memorial. He has been recognized by the National Newspaper Association for his work on the project. Johnson, whose son David was killed in 2012 in Afghanistan, is a Gold Star Father, and is committed to having a face for the all veterans on the Memorial.

The Farmington Historical Society is sponsoring the event. The traveling exhibit is made available by the Wisconsin Veterans Museum.

Honoring Their Service & Sacrifice

Memorial Day is a day to remember. It is a day for the living to remember those who gave the ultimate sacrifice in the military service for our great country. It is also a time we remember those veterans who served and have passed away. The pages of our Memorial Day section feature many of the local soldiers who were killed in action (KIA), as well as many veterans who are buried locally.

Memorial Day is for all sacrifices made since the founding of our country. It seems to be easier to recognize KIA's who were sacrificed in years close to the time when family members as well as others are still living.

For example, during the time of the Civil War, people in this area thought about their recent sacrifices from here. We don't think of those same sacrifices the same way since we personally did not know the soldiers and their families.

However, our country is still at war against

terrorists in several different parts of the world. Military sacrifices are still being made even recently. Wisconsin has lost more than 300 military members since 9-11 including those from combat, suicide and accidents.

We were fortunate that we did not have to add any local names to the list in our section over the past year from our area. All who sacrificed are important to remember even if they lived in a different time or we did not know them.

Memorial Day certainly can be very personal for those of us who lost someone close.

I was able to visit the traveling Global War on Terror Wall of Remembrance this past year. It was eye-opening to see the huge list of nearly 7,000 names representing the U.S. military KIA's since September. To say "7,000" names is very difficult to comprehend. Their sacrifices become more personal.

Adding a photo like we are doing with the Vietnam Faces project makes the sacrifices even more personal. Each name represents a person who had a life and left behind family, friends and battle buddies.


The folks who run the wall gave me a challenge coin in honor of my son David. On the back of the coin it appropriately quotes John 15:13: "Greater love has no one than this, to lay down one's life for a friend."

No loss in the military is greater than another. All are equally important. It is my hope that readers will take the time to look at the local photos of those who gave all as well as the names of those who have passed on and served our great country on these special pages.

Each will have a different perspective on what this holiday means based on their life experiences and a host of other factors. For example, a battle buddy's view of their fallen co-worker differs from gold star parents who have lost a child.

Memorial Day can be a day of grieving for some. It certainly is a day to ponder the idea that a huge price was paid for us to be free and live the way we do.

Memorial Day is every day for me.

Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund Faces Project And The Traveling Wisconsin Exhibit

Everyone has different life circumstances and talents that can enable them to make a positive difference in their family, community, job and country.

My circumstance is very unique. After my son David was killed in Afghanistan in 2012, I really had to take a hard look at what the rest of my life would look like. Life would be different. I had no choice about what happened on the battle field.

After some time of reflection, I realized in January 2013 that the combination of my being a Gold Star father and a small, well-connected rural newspaper publisher could enable me to help the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund (VVMF) Faces project.

The VVMF are the folks who built the black WALL in Washington D.C. with the names of those who died in military service in the Vietnam War. I learned that Wisconsin Public Radio (WPRT) were helping the VVMF find the photos of every person that was listed on the WALL.

The photos are featured online at vvmf.org and are featured daily by date of birth. The photos will also be displayed at the new education center which will be located by the WALL.

The reason the military did not have photos was because of a huge fire in St. Louis in 1973 that destroyed more than six million military records.

The only way to get the photos was to go to the public and families of the fallen. I further learned that the VVMF would be displaying photos of all military KIA's from the current War on Terror until an appropriate memorial could be built in Washington D.C.

It was a no brainer for me to get involved. These people need my help and they are going to honor my son along with nearly 7,000 others who have made the ultimate sacrifice since 9-11.

I have a unique set of contacts and skills that could make a positive difference for remembering our fallen in Vietnam. So, this has become one of the passions of my life and that is why I will continue to feature the project every Memorial Day edition until the entire project is done.

When we started working with the VVMF Project, the numbers of missing photos were huge. At the time, there were over 58,000 (the number grows every year as discoveries are made) names on the WALL and 1,161 were from Wisconsin.

There was a total of approximately 24,000 photos missing from across the country and 450 missing from Wisconsin. I immediately gained the support for the project of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA), I was immediate past president at the time, and the National Newspaper Association (NNA), when I was a board member.

Beth Bennett, WNA executive director, and I met with WPRT executives from and shared our idea of using community newspapers to find the missing photos. They thought it was a good idea, but warned us we would not really find all of the photos and the project would go on for many years in Wisconsin.

I remember clearly telling them that we are newspaper people. This means that we work within deadlines. I told them that we would make every effort to find all of the Wisconsin photos by Memorial Day 2015 and I sensed they thought I was a little "crazy." It was an impossible goal since only Wyoming had found all of their photos.

We helped find all of the photos from Wisconsin by the Friday before Memorial Day 2015. We published every photo in our Memorial Day edition in 2016, along with many other Wisconsin newspapers.

The people at Wisconsin Public Radio and Television embraced the accomplishment by sponsoring a traveling exhibit with all of the 1,161 photos of Wisconsin military members killed in the Vietnam War. It is called "Wisconsin Remembers: A Face for Every Name." The traveling display is also sponsored by the Wisconsin Veterans Museum and the WNA.

Update On The Gold Star Memorial Trail

It was approximately four years ago that an effort began to build a bike trail between Mayville and Horicon. Raising funds for such a project can be challenging. My wife Laura and I, as well as another Gold Star family from Beaver Dam, Greg and Barb Gassen, learned about the trail. We offered an idea that the trail could be dedicated to the memory of all Wisconsin service members who gave their lives. The rest is history.

The trail was renamed and adopted by the county as a park. Funding for the first phase was completed earlier this year by the county and groundbreaking for the first phase

occurred on February 27 in Mayville.

The trail construction is now at least 37 percent complete and the contractor is working ahead of schedule with a goal of having rock base work completed in July. Paving could happen as early as the end of September.

Contract completion date is November 11, which happens to be Veterans Day. It is hoped that the annual Turkey Run held on Thanksgiving morning will be held on the new trail this year. The official grand opening ceremony will be held on June 1, 2019, which is the Saturday after Memorial Day 2019 and State Trails Day.

Construction on the Gold Star Memorial Trail phase one between Mayville and the Horicon Marsh Education Center is now at least 37% complete. The non-motorized paved trail could be completed as early as September. The contract completion date is November 11, or Veterans Day. This county trail is dedicated to the memory of all Wisconsin military service members who gave their lives in service to the United States.

The photo of Gary looking at his fallen comrades taken by Renee Riddle from the War Memorial captured the moment. I knew as soon as I saw the photo that it would be our feature photo for this Memorial Day.

The moment was a severely wounded war hero who bravely fought off the enemy in a battle where his actions saved many American lives viewing photos of many dead heroes. I am sure he knew many of them.

He is a true American hero and it was awesome to have him present. This is what we are supposed to do on Memorial Day – to review the cost of being free. We will always remember those who gave all for us from all wars!

Newspapers from around the country have joined the effort to find all of the photos. I traveled to Oklahoma, Missouri and Springfield, Illinois twice, to work on the project along with the support of the National Newspaper Association. I included an updated chart about the project on our Memorial Day pages. I am very proud to report that as of May 15, there are 28 states that have completely found all of

their photos, leaving a total of 2,707 missing photos in the U.S.

It is my greatest hope that the newspapers working along with many other organizations and volunteers can finish up this project of finding the last missing photos before the groundbreaking of the new VVMF Education Center in Washington D.C.

What Does “Gold Star” Mean?

The Gold Star concept originated during World War I when parents began hanging red-and-white service flags in their windows. A blue star in the center indicated a son or a spouse was deployed in the military. The tradition goes that when a family member was killed in action, then a “gold star” was sewn over the blue star.

Either flag can have multiple stars that correspond to multiple individuals serving or multiple deaths. I was told by one of my son’s sergeants that there is one family that has three Gold Stars from the current war.

In 1947 the U.S. Congress established the

Gold Star lapel pin to provide widows and widowers, children, parents, and brothers and sisters of members of the Armed Forces of the United States who lost their lives in the defense of democracy and freedom during the World Wars I and II, and any subsequent armed hostilities in which the United States became engaged. The Gold Star pin unique design incorporates the symbols that indicated the family’s loss: the laurel wreath border signifies valor; the purple field (background) signifies the family’s grief or mourning; the Gold Star has been used since World War I to signify “died in a combat theater.”



Semi Fire

The semi-trailer, which was carrying pal-

lets, had moderate damage to the front half.

During the investigation the Washington County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Wisconsin State Patrol in shutting down the ramp to County Trunk FD from northbound Interstate 41. The ramp remained closed for approximately two hours to assist the firefighting efforts of the Jackson Fire Department and cleanup of the ramp. There were no injuries as a result of the fire.



Tennis Team Finishes Off The Season In Grand Style

The Kewaskum High tennis team has come a long way since its season-opening 5-2 loss to Manitowoc Roncalli on April 12 after just a couple practices.

After getting in a couple solid weeks of practice, the Indians reeled off 10 team victories in 11 tries, including a 6-1 win over Waupun on May 15 and a 7-0 shutout over Howards Grove on May 17. The latter win clinched third place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, which is made up of Eastern Wisconsin, East Central and Big East Conference Schools.

KHS assistant coach Peter Garcia called the final win, "rewarding and dominant."

"Doubles were led by last year's WIAA State Tournament entrants, Jared Chesak and Brent Goeden, who won their team-leading 12th match of the year by convincing 6-3, 6-2 scores," Garcia said.

One of the two Tigers, Brand Kushnier was new to Number 1, but the Indians remember 6 foot 3 inch Eric Reinemann well as he and his 2017 partner were the only conference players to beat them last year.

Chesak and Goeden fell behind 1-3 in the first set, then caught fire and reeled off the next five games for a 6-3 win, and in the second set kept the momentum going, winning 6-1 behind some powerful serving and well placed winning shots.

In the final game, Goeden had three aces for a 40-zip lead, and Chesak finished the game with a rocket of a smash.

Both other doubles

teams looks good, with Number 2 Isaiah Cochran and Bret Fahrenkrug coming out on top, 6-2-6-1 to improve to 10-5, and first-year tennis players, Patrick Krier and Tyler Degnitz, overpowering Austin Patzke and Aaron Korpi, 6-1, 6-0.

Coach Garcia said he has to laugh when he reflects on the first day these two young men came out for tennis and he heard one of them say, he didn't know tennis was this complicated.

Krier and Degnitz finished the regular-season at 9-5.

Garcia was happy to see Number 1 singles player, Devin Schneider (5-9), win his final match on the Kewaskum courts. He beat Tyler Dvorachek 6-2, 6-2.

"Devin, at each match, is relegated to play the best tennis player at the opposing school. Devin through his efforts, allows those who play behind him to succeed," Garcia said, but, "This day Devin led his team winning 6-2, 6-2."

The three others singles players, all underclassmen, won in straight sets. At Number 4, Bryce Halvorsen was sharp, losing just two games to finish the regular season at 11-1. Krautkramer, who missed the Washington County Tournament, wound up 9-3 at Number 3 singles while Kyle Loehr won his final two matches to finish the year at 8-7.

Kewaskum's Meidl, Thull And Distance Runners Shine In EC Track Finals

Piling up a massive 182 points, Winneconne overpowered the other seven teams in the East Central Conference Meet held on May 15 at Berlin. Kewaskum, which finished in a tie with Waupun for fifth place with 68 points, had to be satisfied with Abby Meidl's win in the pole vault and good success in the distance events and the hurdles.

The vaulters were at Ripon College on May 12, competing indoors, and the junior Meidl cleared 10 feet, 9 inches (10-9) for the win.

"I came in at 8-6 and made it on the first try," she said. "Then I went up to 9-6 and 10-0. I missed on my first try at 10-0." And after she cleared it on her second try, "I switched to a new pole and made 10-6 and 10-9 on the first try," finally going out at 11-0.

No one else was close to Meidl. Campbellsport's Kaylin Hewitt came in second place at 8-0, while KHS' Jill Braatz finished third at the same height.

This is the second time Meidl has cleared 10-9, which gives her a great deal of confidence moving forward to the D-2 regional and sectional.

"My goal is 11 feet this year," Meidl said, indicating at first she didn't think she would reach it, but in the last two weeks, is more optimistic. "It's getting closer ... I'm excited," she said.

The 3200 was another good event for the Indians, who got a second and third from Alyssa Butz and Romela Olla. The freshman Butz turned in a personal record (p.r.) time of 12 minutes, 37.61 seconds (12:37.61) just a little over three seconds behind the winner, Katie Miller of KML. Olla was clocked in 12:40.17.

"They keep improving. They work together. There's a healthy competition there," KHS co-head coach Kris Evans said about his distance duo. "They're going to go head-to-head to see how far they can go."

Those two girls, plus Grace Marchello and Faith Mertzig combined for a 10:48.38 in the 4x800, which finished fourth.

Sophomore Madelyn Thull did well in both hurdle races, finishing second in the 100s with a p.r. of 16.98, just 0.3 out of first place, and later she came back with a 52.70 in the tough 300 lows where she placed third.

"She's getting stronger

all the time," Evans said of Thull, noting hard work usually equates to improvement, "And that's what we're seeing from her."

Courtney Butzlaff placed fifth in the 400 with a p.r. of 1:03.50 and, along with Breanna Rice, Meidl and Anna Peterson, took third place in the 4x400 relay (4:21.52).

Other top-six finishes included: Marchello, 6th, 6:01.28; 4x100 relay (Braatz, Meidl, Hailey Hasenberg, Hannah Debelak, 4th, 54.76.

One major disappointment came in the discus where Emily Halterman had an off day and failed to make the finals with her toss of 82-04. Halterman had gone over 100 feet four times this spring. "She'll get another chance at regionals," Evans said.

The Indians scored no points in the shot put, long jump and triple jump but did get a seventh from Lizzie Lightner in the high jump (4-8).

Peterson, 4 X 100 Runners, Lone Winners For KHS Men

Men's track teams from Ripon and Plymouth looked strong during quad meets and other competitions this spring, but neither could outscore Berlin in the East Central Conference meet it hosted on May 14.

Berlin did not have a single first place but behind seven seconds and another seven thirds, amassed 162 points, 12 ahead of the Ripon Tigers, while Plymouth had to settle for third at 141.5.

Kewaskum had a double individual winner in senior Cade Peterson, who captured the two sprint races, and also anchored the 4x100-meter relay to victory.

The Indians, hampered by weaknesses in the hurdles and field events, finished fifth in the standings with 65 points, 11.5 points behind Waupun.

Peterson was clocked in a personal record (PR) time of 11 and 00 seconds (11.00) in the prelims of the 100-meter dash but could not duplicate that time in the finals, hitting the finish line in 11.12, 0.31 seconds ahead of Ripon freshman Niko Heinz.

In the 200, Peterson had the fastest time (23.01) in the prelims and cut 0.36 off that for a 23.01 in the finals, with sophomore

Trevor Degnitz adding a seventh place with a 25.24.

"He's just a rock star," Evans said of Peterson. "He's driven like no kid I've ever seen. He's got some goals in mind."

The men's 4x100-meter relay was switched for this competition, inserting Tyler Heus into the leadoff spot after he won 100 in the Plymouth Quad last week. Heus, Tony Steger, Cole Surprenant and Peterson combined for a winning time of 43.54, without much push from the rest of the field.

"His (Heus') handoff was really good. He's quicker (than Cameron Dodge)," Evans said, noting it's been his policy to let the clock decide which runners go in the relays.

In the 4x200, it was Heus, Surprenant, Dodge and Steger toting the baton the two laps for a time of 1:34.56, good for second place.

Because Heus ran the relay, he was kept out of the open 400. Inserted in his place was freshman Carson Thull, who took fourth place with a time of 53.56, his best of the year.

KHS had hoped to score fairly well in the discus, but senior Riley Donovan had to settle for fifth place with a toss of 126 feet 7 inches (127-07). As expected, Winneconne's Caleb Rogalski won the event,

throwing the silver platter 163-04 in the finals after hitting a 155-0 in the prelims.

Kewaskum didn't have anyone reach the finals in the shot, and the Indians were missing their best jumper in the high jump.

"Athletic suspension, per WIAA rules," Evans said about the situation.

The pole vault was held on May 12 in Ripon, with Sam Mezler and Kyle Toth placing sixth and tied for eighth with respective jumps of 10-06 and 10-0.

Other top-eight individual finishes included: triple jump - Gabe Christenson, 8th with a p.r. of 37-02; high jump - Jermaine Thull, tie for 8th at 5-04; 300-hurdles - Dylan Maechtle, 5th with a p.r. of 44.85; 800- Ben Frase, 7th, 2:08.84.

While none of them place, KHS' trio of freshman 3200 runners, Gannon Kreuser, Adams Walls and Clayton Kappler, all dipped under 12 minutes with respective times of 11:45.44; 11:53.52 and 11:59.64.

KHS Golfers Leave No Doubts They Are Best In The Conference

It didn't seem to matter which courses the Kewaskum High golf team play this spring ... they finished first on all of them against East Central Conference foes.

The Indians capped off the final week of the regular season with wins at Mascoutin and the Lake Breeze Golf Course, then spread the icing on the cake with a convincing win in the 18-hole conference test on the Lawsonia Woodlands Course.

Shooting a 315 from its low four counters, Kewaskum won the tournament by 14 shots over Waupun (329). Plymouth wound up with 337 strokes, good for third place, while KM Lutheran wound up fourth at 339, followed by Winneconne, 359; Campbellsport, 373; Ripon, 373; and Berlin, 411.

"It doesn't happen too often that a team sweeps the conference season, winning every meet, but we did just that. I couldn't be prouder of these guys, and all the effort they put in during the summer at Hon-E-Kor really shows," second-year KHS coach Casey Scheel said.

Solomon Zarling of KML captured the medal, shooting a one-over-par 35-38-73, four shots ahead of the Indians' Jacob Schlosser, who carded a 40-37-77.

All the rest of the KHS counters were among the

top six players, starting with senior Jordan Carlton, who came in with a 78, tied for third with Plymouth's Cade Knaus. Then came Brad Buechel, alone in fifth with a 79, and Travis Griesemer and Talon Ralph, tied for sixth place with three others at 81.

"Once again our consistency showed having all five between 77 and 81," Scheel said.

Zarling also won Player of the Year honors for the second year in a row, piling up 82 points on a scoring format that went 10-9-8-7-6 based on finishes in the mini-tour events. Zarling was the medalist three times, plus in the conference tournament, and he was second twice and third once. Schlosser finished second with 70 points. He won the medal twice and was second twice, and also in the tournament.

"He (Zarling) was the most consistent player all year, and (his honor) was well deserved," Scheel said. "I know Jacob really wanted to win that, but those two were the two best golfers all year."

Third was Kaus with 55 points followed by Ralph, who had 54 points. and Carlton (45), who was hampered by not earning any points in two meets and had just one point in another.

"Jordan Carlton finished the year with a strong showing at the conference tournament," and "Talon

Ralph continued his breakout season, finishing strong with a first team all conference," Scheel said.

Those five players earned first-team all-conference honors while Buechel was on the second unit with his 33 points, while Griesemer and Toree Ralph received honorable mention after earning 12 and seven points, respectively.


At Lake Breeze in Winneconne on May 15, the Indians blistered the course with a sizzling 151, seven shots ahead of Waupun. KML and Plymouth tied for third at 166, followed by Winneconne, 170; Campbellsport, 186; Ripon, 187; and Berlin, 201.

Zarling won the medal with an even par 36 with Jacob Schlosser and Talon Ralph tied for second with one-over-par 37s.

Brad Buechel finished alone at 38, for fourth place, while Jordan Carlton's 39 was good for a five-way tie for fifth.

"Our best thing all year has been our consistency. The guys know what needs to be done, and they do a great job of minimizing mistakes," Scheel said.

In one of the closest matches of the year, at Mascoutin, Kewaskum maintained its perfect run, finishing three shots ahead of Plymouth, 156-

WI Farmers & Processors Of Hemp Primed To Bring Millions To Economy

—Rep. Kremer Calls for State DOJ to follow the Farm Freedom Act, Allow CBD Oil Production

Late last year, Wisconsin voted to retake a piece of its heritage and join the bulk of states around America in establishing an Industrial Hemp cultivation, processing and research program under the Farm Freedom Act or Act 100, authored principally by Representative Jesse Kremer (R-Kewaskum) and Senator Patrick Testin (R-Stevens Point).

Thanks to the historic unanimous approval of the Farm Freedom Act, Wisconsin will have the ability to grow and process a new crop this growing season. However, millions of dollars in investment by rural manufacturers and farmers are now at risk thanks to a misguided and disappointing announcement by Attorney General Brad Schimel and his Department of Justice (DOJ).

As the new industrial hemp registration period for 2018 was coming to a close, which saw an incredible 359 submissions, an analytical note prepared by the Wisconsin Statewide Intelligence Center on the legality of CBD oil in Wisconsin claims that production and possession of CBD oil is illegal in this state.

Rep. Kremer issued the following statement in response: "I am very disappointed in our Department of Justice. This is what people mean when they talk about draining the swamp — non-elected government agency bureaucrats who refuse to enforce a law duly passed unanimously by the elected legislature. Even our own Legislative Reference Bureau and Legislative Council attorneys have stated that CBD seed oil from the industrial hemp plant is legal in Wisconsin and is allowed under the 2014 Farm Bill. We have manufacturers and farmers ready to invest millions in rural areas — including the 59th Assembly District. They are now left to twist in the wind by DOJ."

Industrial hemp, a distinctly different plant variety of cannabis than its cousin, marijuana, is non-psychoactive. The Republican Congress' 2014 Farm Bill gave states permission to begin research on industrial hemp, a material that is stronger than carbon fiber.

Industrial Hemp has dozens of high tech, manufacturing and health applications including the replacement of Kevlar in

bulletproof vests, a lower cost substitute for graphene in costly high capacity batteries, and non-psychoactive CBD seed oils that are higher in Omega 3 than fish oils. Over half a billion dollars in Industrial Hemp is already imported into the U.S. every year and is a common place product most Americans drive, build with, eat, and take medicinally every day.

"After more than a year working with farmers, processors, our colleagues, law enforcement, and stakeholders such as the DOJ in good faith to craft legislation to bring industrial hemp back to our state," Kremer continued. "It's incredibly disheartening to see the farming community, already struggling to survive floundering dairy, corn, and soybean prices, under the boot of the DOJ for a perfectly legal, non-harmful, non-psychoactive, commodity with a rich and common place history in our state."

• Southeast Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC) set up equipment on the Eisenbahn trail to monitor trail activity.

Clerk Tracie Sette reported on the 2018 Spring Election: There are a total of 2339 people registered to vote in the Village. A total of 751 voted at the polls on April 3rd, with 69 additional absentee votes. This represents a 35 percent turnout among those registered. There were no incidents to report. The trustees elected, to be sworn in at the next meeting, are Richard Laubach, Richard Knoebel, and Sarah Severance.

Plan Commission member Jim Hovland reported the next Plan Commission meeting will take place on April 24, 2018.

Park and Recreation Chairperson Dave Zehren reported a new ceiling was installed at the Kiwanis Park shelter.

Library Board member Dave Spenner reported the Library Board met earlier today and discussed the budget, financial reports, and circulation numbers.

President Scheunemann presented the Mid Moraine certificate of appreciation to outgoing Board member Dave Zehren.

Clerk Tracie Sette administered the oath of office to new treasurer Sandy Passineau.

Administrator Matt Heiser requested the Board rank items from the visioning session by completing the form and returning to him. The Board would like Administrator Heiser to research state statutes to determine the possibility of the Fire Department budget becoming exempt from the levy.

Dave Zehren motioned to accept the proposed 2018 summer part-time employees, Richard Laubach seconded. Voice vote, motion accepted.

Dave Zehren motioned to replace the stop sign at the intersection of Trading Post Lane and Trading Post Lane with a yield sign, Jim Hovland seconded. Voice vote, motion carried.

Kunkel Engineering returned the lowest bid for the Habeck/Keller street project. Jim Hovland motioned to approve the street project, Dave Spenner seconded. Voice vote, motion carried.





Continued From... Tom Kohn Honored For Military Service

"It's a nice diamond... They had nice jewelry there. It's surprising. You wouldn't think that, because it is where you would go to get your khakis and groceries," Tom said.

Military Service

While in Vietnam, Tom served as a radio telegraph operator. He was stationed in a communications platoon.

Tom was in charge of operating a large AM radio. Measuring 3 by 4 by 2 feet, the radio took up the entire back of a jeep. Tom would go to different units whenever someone needed a radio operator or a radio net set up. If a company needed supplies, Tom would relay that message.

"I set up nets for communications in case telephone lines would go down, or what have you, and they needed a backup net," Tom explained.

Tom's job often was to sit on a hill, in a bunker and keep a radio net out in case something went down with the phone lines.

The most difficult assignment for Tom was when he was stationed for three months in Phu Loc, from December 23, 1967, to February 10, 1968. During that period, Tom had almost no communication with the outside world...or Gloria. He received mail only once every four weeks.

"Otherwise we got mail about a week after he sent it. But during those few months, we didn't know what was going on," Gloria

vividly remembers.

"I would say that was my worst tour of duty because there were a lot of rockets and stuff flying around. One of them blew up my jeep. I was five, 10 feet away in a bunker. That ended that radio," Tom said.

For the most part, though, Tom felt he was stationed in safe places.

"There were some rockets that came in, but that was far and few between. Most of the time they were out in the village parts more than on base. I know Da Nang got a direct hit - I'm glad I got my diamond ring out of there before that hit," Tom said.

Not everything in Vietnam was bad, Tom admits.

"They had a lot of USO shows there, with Bob Hope and others," Tom said.

The servicemen also formed softball teams to pass the time. They were fairly organized, with the players making their own team T-shirts. Tom remembers playing on the radio platoon's team and going up against the rivals, such as the Jeep company team and the communications team.


He also remembers an oversized grill being fired up on Sundays to cook steaks.

Returning Home

Tom finished his tour of duty in Vietnam on November 11, 1968.

He and Gloria were married on November 23, 1968. Tom was 21 and Gloria was 20.

The newly married couple

ple lived on an air base in California as Tom finished his three-year commitment to the Marines.

They then moved back to Kewaskum. Tom returned to his job with the West Bend Company, and later Regal Ware, working a total of 42 years.

They have two children, Craig and Courtney, and two grandchildren.

Honor Flight

Tom was one of 152 veterans who went on the recent Stars and Stripes Honor Flight on April 15. There was a snowstorm in Wisconsin that day, but in Washington, D.C., temperatures were in the 80s.

Each veteran was accompanied by a guardian. Tom's son, Craig, who lives in Sheboygan, went with him.

"It was great to be with him," Tom said.

For Craig, it was a chance to learn some of the stories about his dad's service that he had never heard.

Before leaving on the flight, Craig asked his mother where Tom's combat boots were. He wanted to bring them on the trip.

"They are heavy and they are probably dirty," Gloria told him.

"I have plenty of room in my backpack, don't worry about it," Craig replied.

Once they were in the nation's capitol, Craig gave the boots to his father to hold as they stood beside the Vietnam Memorial. Tom held the boots and searched the wall for any familiar names.

While in D.C., the veterans visited other memorials as well. They saw the Lincoln Memorial, the Korean War Memorial and the World War II Memorial, as well as Arlington Cemetery and the Pentagon.

When the two planes filled with veterans returned to Milwaukee that night, a huge crowd welcomed them back home.

Much like when he was serving in Vietnam, a highlight for Tom was receiving mail on the plane: letters from family, friends, dignitaries and even complete strangers.

"Every time we go through these, I get teared up," he said.

UW-WC Student Max Read Learns About Rocket Science

When he was in middle school or younger, Max Read made a rocket with baking soda and vinegar.

"That was something I just did, but I wasn't into it," Read said.

Last year, when Read was a freshman at the University of Wisconsin-Washington County, he followed his mom's advice and check out some of the clubs.

He saw that there was a physics club, and decided to join.

As a biology major, it seemed like an odd fit.

"Everyone else in the club is majoring in electrical or mechanical engineering," said Read, who graduated from Kewaskum High School in 2016.

The club decided to enter a competition and create a rocket. The contest last year was based on energy.

Read enjoyed the contest so much that he participated again this year. This time, he feels like he has a better understanding of the science behind building a rocket.

"Now that I have two years of experience on it, I have a better idea of how to do it," Read said.

The UW-WC team built a rocket and entered it into a competition sponsored by the Wisconsin Space Grant Consortium. The organization's First Nations Launch program challenged students from colleges across the country to design, build, and fly a competition rocket.

This year the challenge was to have the rocket take a 360-degree photo after it landed.

This was a different contest than last year, when teams were judged on rocket power. For that test, Read's team created a rocket that generated

electricity while the rocket flew.

"It's kind of cool. There is something new every year," Read said.

This year's competition challenged the college students to design and build a "true-scale" model that closely approximates the design of a current or historical rocket or missile. Students were challenged to reach as close to 3,000 feet as possible and maximize descent time as the rocket returns on parachute.

Read worked with his team from UW-WC, which is part of the Collegiate Rocket Launch Group.

A total of five students worked on the project: Read, Kota Grauden, Shane Flynn, Joseph Gawrys and Vanessa Sawatzke.

Professors Swapnil Tripathi and Guy Campbell were both involved with the rocket building process.

The team worked all year on developing the rocket. Along the way, the team submitted design reports and ordered parts to build the rocket.

In March, the UW-WC team had a safety meeting at the EAA Aviation Museum in Oshkosh to make sure everything was assembled properly.

To prepare for the competition, the UW-WC team ran simulations on computers.

"We did one test launch. It didn't work right away; it was too packed. There was a lot more in the booster section, we ended up moving that to the payload," Read explained.

During that test run, the rocket cracked open when it landed, so the team reworked the structure.

"We didn't have time to have another practice launch, so we just did ejection tests on the ground in the soccer field to make sure everything

Some teams ran into problems when a parachute opened too early.

"If the parachute opens too early, they will float for miles or get stuck in trees," Read said.

During its second flight, the UW-WC rocket landed in water.

"Everything landed in the water except the umbrella with the camera on it, so that was lucky. It was still flyable," Read said.

Overall, the UW-WC team did well. The team is still waiting for the final report. Results are expected to be released by mid-June. Top finishers will give a presentation at Fox Valley.

Read hopes to continue building rockets in the future. Next year, he will attend the University of Wisconsin-Steven's Point.

"I would like to start up a team there if there isn't already one," Read said.

Earlier this year, Read and the UW-WC team gave a presentation to the Kewaskum Middle School rocket team.

"It was cool talking to them," Read said. "They have a lot of ambition to have their rocket go above and beyond."

Read recommends that other people learn how to build rockets.

"There are a lot of different aspects to it: the building, the planning and the design. It might take a couple years before you get the ropes, but once you do, you will enjoy it, I think," Read said.

It is a hobby that can be mastered, Read said.

"It isn't that difficult. They say rocket science, but rocket science isn't really rocket science, I guess you could say, at least at this level," Read said. "It's fun."
