## School's Out For Summer

### – Summer School Program Concluded Last Friday

The last day of school in Kewaskum was May 25, but Kewaskum Elementary School was bustling with students throughout the month of June.

A total of 430 students in 4K through eighth grade attended the Kewaskum School District's summer school program, which was held June 5 through June 29.

"Summer school 2018 was a huge success! The staff did an amazing job preparing an assortment of awesome classes. It was nice seeing the enjoyment, excitement, and pride on the students faces as they shared their projects and stories for the day," said Summer School Principal Kristine Dreher.

#### Roller Coaster Lessons

A total of 32 courses were offered in the summer school program. There were art classes and sports classes, writing classes and math classes. There were classes about dinosaurs and classes about bugs.

In the KSD Summer Olympics class, students learned about the

summer Olympics as they recorded times, set up events and competed in games. Another class learned lessons based on American Dolls. Some students even learned how to babysit.

Some students learned about the food, games and crafts of different cultures, and even learned how to say words in different languages. Others learned about healthy eating and how to perform CPR.

Not all of the learning took place in classrooms. Students could be seen walking along the streets of Kewaskum as they learned about the village's history. Some wandered even farther as they learned how to use handheld GPS units and how to find geocaches hidden around the county.

Another favorite class was Roller Coaster Engineering. The class explored the scientific principles of momentum and velocity.

After the students learned about kinetic energy, they worked in small groups to design and build roller coasters from plastic cups, tape, toilet paper rolls, paper and foam pipe insulation.

It was quite a feat.

"We first started by building these poles," explained Ava Hautamaki, pointing at pillars of clear plastic cups.

"Then Alyssa and I had to fold paper into triangles, and Anthony and Ava had to tape them," added Giovannie Haralson.

Together, the group designed and built the "American Demon."

"We came up with that name because the American Eagle and the Demon are my favorite rides at Six Flags," Ava said.

## Kewaskum Native Celebrates 40 Years Of Business Success In England

In 1978, Kewaskum native Barney Skrentny and his British wife, Julia, founded Hospital & Medical Care Association (HMCA).

## Music In The Park Continues On Tuesday, July 10

After a two-week hiatus for Party on the Pavement and the July 3 fireworks celebration, the 2018 season of Music in the Park resumes. The next concert will be Big Cedar Bluegrass on Tuesday, July 10, at 6:30 p.m.

Big Cedar Bluegrass has been performing locally and at regional festivals since 1992 and consists of five musicians who play banjo, acoustic guitar, mandolin, fiddle and upright bass. The band performs instrumental as well as vocal numbers with three- and four-part harmony. In addition to their upbeat bluegrass country music, their repertoire includes folk, patriotic and even some old-time gospel songs. Over the years, the group has produced six albums, including ones devoted to Christian music and Christmas.

The remaining concerts this summer are the Whiskeybelles on July 17, the Bobby Way Duo on July 24, The Kewaskum Big Band on July 31, and after skipping a week for National Night Out on August 7, the series concludes with Pat McCurdy on August 14.

All the concerts are free and take place in the large shelter in River Hill Park. The shelter has picnic tables but many people bring their own lawn furniture. The Fire Fighter's Association sells concessions starting at 5:30 p.m. and the concerts begin at 6:30 p.m.

Donations from Geidel's Piggly Wiggly, The Kewaskum Women's Club, Kewaskum Kiwanis and the Kewaskum Fire Fighter's Association cover the cost of the bands. The Kewaskum Area Arts Council organizes the Music In The Park series every year.

## Indians Stay Hot, Turn Back Falls 5-3

Led by senior Jared Chesak, Cole Surprenant and a trio of pitchers, the Kewaskum High baseball team (18-4) extended its current win streak to eight with a 5-3 victory over visiting Sheboygan Falls (14-11) in a game played on June 30. All of the KHS varsity players saw action in the contest.

When asked if he was using the game as an experience, KHS coach Doug Gonring said, "It was an experiment... We wanted to give the other players opportunities and chances to see what they can do in the future."

Chesak, the starting catcher, was the designated hitter in this game. He delivered, starting with a key bunt that led to a three-run first inning. Chesak also doubled and hit a two-run homer over the fence in left field in the bottom of the fifth. It was his third round-tripper of the season.


"After the first bunt I laid down, I was seeing the ball real well," Chesak said. "I just waited back, exploded and let my hands do the work."

Junior Luke Christenson also had two hits in the contest, singling in a run in the first after Surprenant hit a two-out double to put the Indians up 2-0.

Gonring started left-hander Carson Dogs, who went three innings, giving up just one hit and picking up the win.

Cole Poole pitched the next three innings, giving up one run on one hit while striking out five. Blake Hornung finished up the seventh, giving up two runs on three hits. Jonah Tenpas was on second and Jacoby Endreas on first when Hornung got Seth Aschenback to line out for the final out.

"We had two double plays today," Gonring said. "That always changes the complexion of the game."

PDTR will host its Mid-Season Championship Night program on Saturday, July 7, beginning at 6 p.m. with A-main trophies



# Indians Climb Into First Place

In any title race, winn-ings close games is extremely important, and the Kewaskum baseball team has cer- tainly been doing a lot of that lately. Last week, the Indians earned a 3- 2 victory over Cedar- burg on June 27 and followed that up with a 1-0 decision over Grafton the following night.

With these two wins, and a thrilling 1-0 win over Homestead on June 25, Kewaskum boosted its season record in the North Shore Conference to 9- 2, which is one game ahead of defending champion, West Bend West, which lost back- to-back decisions to Nicolet (9-15) and West Bend East (6-9) to slip to 8-4 in league play.

Good pitching has been a key to the streak, according to KHS Coach Doug Gonring.

"We've had five shutouts in the last 10 games," he said, and nearly had a sixth. "Six out of 10 is unheard of in high school baseball."

In the win over Grafton, the Indians scored the lone run in the bottom of the first on a single by Tony Steger, who stole second, went to third on a fielder's choice and scored on Jared Chesak's single to deep short.

Then the two pitchers, Cole Surprenant and Grafton's Jacob Alek- navicius, kept opposing hitters at bay the rest of the way. Surprenant went 6 2/3 innings, al- lowing no runs and two hits while striking out 10. Blake Hornung relieved Surprenant for the final out.

KHS had just three hits, two by Steger.

### Cedarburg Game

At Cedarburg (7-14) on June 27, the Indians scored single runs in the first, third and fifth in- nings to edge the Bull- dogs. John May con- tributed an RBI single for the first run of the game, while Jared

Chesak doubled to score Tony Steger in the third. Steger had reached base on an error by the Bulldog third baseman.

In the fifth, Ryan Prochnow led off with a single to left field, stole second, went to third on a sacrifice bunt and scored on a squeeze bunt.

Cedarburg got its two runs in the bottom of the third, tying the game at 2-all. Jared Antonneau led off with a double, moved to third on a bunt and scored on Keagan McCarthy's single. He went to second on a wild pitch and scored on Logam King's single.

Luke Christenson got the win, giving up two runs on six hits in six in- nings. Surprenant fin- ished up the seventh, getting the final three outs on a pair of strike- outs and a ground out.

### Homestead Game

A lot of zeros were on the scoreboard during the game at Homestead until Jon May drilled a home run over the right- field fence in the top of the sixth.

Andrew Neu got the win, giving the Indians six shutout innings be- fore being relieved by Luke Christenson for the final inning. Neu struck out six, walked two, and gave up just two hits.

### Looking Ahead

The Indians had a big week coming up, with games at West Bend East (July 2) at Nicolet (July 3) and at West Bend West (July 5) be- fore coming home to Ki- wanis Park to play Whitefish Bay in a makeup game. Two wins will give the Indi- ans the North Shore title.

# Improvements Planned For Kewaskum Parks

## – Theatrical Lights To Be Added To River Hill Park Stage

Three additional theater lights will be installed over the stage in the large shelter at River Hill Park.

The Village Board voted on June 18 to accept the donation from Bruce Towell, a member of the Kewaskum Area Arts Council. The board also approved spending \$500 from the village's park and recreation designated fund balance to cover the cost of installing electrical outlets for the lights.

The stage currently has three lights, and the electrical work will provide a dedicated circuit for the extra outlets.

"Right now there are five or six cords running to three of these lights up there, so it would clean everything up," DPW Working Foreman Dennis Aupperle told the Village Board.

The stage is used on Tuesdays throughout the summer for Music in the Park concerts. In addition, the Kewaskum Theatre Company will present an outdoor performance of the musical comedy "First Date" on the River Hill Park stage August 2-4.

### Two Structures To Be Razed

Following a recommendation by the Park and Recreation Committee, the Village Board voted on June 18 to raze two structures at River Hill Park.

Both the old "North Beer Stand" and the women's bathroom on the north side of the park are slated to be taken down.

The water is currently turned on in the women's bathroom, but it basically is used only once a year for the July 3 fireworks, Aupperle

said.

"I think the old north beer stand is beyond being able to dress it up and fix it up and make it look like how the bandstand turned out. We could hopefully lay a concrete slab there, put some picnic tables on it," Aupperle said.

The structures will most likely be razed in August or September, Aupperle said.

### Kiwanis Swim Pond Improvements

An indefinite freeze has been placed on the family pass pricing at the Kiwanis Park swim pond.

A resident family pass costs \$51 and a non-resident family pass is \$70.

Village Trustee Jim Wright announced at the June 18 Village Board meeting that the village Park and Recreation Committee plans

to add one new item to the pool each year. The village added one umbrella this year. Plans are to add another 25-foot umbrella next year.

The Park and Recreation Committee would also like to add a line item in the budget for trees, Wright said. The funds would be used to replace trees that are taken down due to the emerald ash borer.

### Permanent Foul Lines To Be Added To Baseball Fields

The Village Board voted on June 18 to approve permanent foul lines to be added to two baseball fields at Kiwanis Park.

The Kewaskum Athletic Association will pay to have the lines installed on fields one and two at the park.

# Kewaskum To Get New Rescue Engine

The Kewaskum Fire Department is purchasing a new rescue engine for \$708,435.

"It is a specialized piece of equipment. It's going to have all the necessary fire-fighting equipment and hose on the vehicle," Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said.

The new engine will have a seven-passenger cab. It will contain a cascade system so that air bottles can be filled on scene. Currently fire-fighters must be shuttled back to the firehouse to refill air bottles.

"This piece of equipment will house all of our extrication equipment and it also has a light tower on it," Groeschel added.

The new rescue engine will replace two pieces of equipment: a 1982 engine and a 1993 model.

There are not many people who will drive the 1982 model, Groeschel told the Village Board on June 18.

"They don't feel safe in it," Groeschel said. "It shakes, rattles and rolls when you drive down the road. It clunks. It does not pass the pump

test.... It was a good truck in its day, but its seen its time," Groeschel said.

The 1993 engine is in good condition, but it does not get utilized, according to Groeschel.

Because the new rescue engine will carry equipment, the ladder truck will not need to go to all traffic accident scenes, as it does now.

The Kewaskum Fire Department formed a committee a couple years ago to design the new truck.

"We have been meeting since 2016 on this," Groeschel told the Village Board. "It has been a cooperative effort of all the committee members to come to a consensus to put what we have here in front of us."

Like the department's aerial ladder truck and its last engine, the new vehicle will be built by Pierce Manufacturing.

"They are the largest fire truck manufacturer in the world, and they make a good product," Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said.

Since the company is located in Appleton, it is convenient if the fire truck needs any service, according to Groeschel.

### 75 Years Ago July 2, 1943

Chicago and North Western southbound passenger train No. 154, due here at 5:10 p.m. daily, was delayed nearly an hour and a half Wednesday at the Main Street crossing when a piston rod leading to a cylinder on the locomotive broke off. After making the stop the locomotive would not budge and all traffic had to be rerouted across the Second Street crossing near the Kewaskum Aluminum Company plant. The southbound streamlined train, due here at 5:48 p.m. which does not stop here otherwise, was also delayed here about 15 minutes. The streamliner pulled up in back of the stalled train, blocking off the Second Street crossing so that all traffic was tied up. A switch engine from West Bend was summoned and pulled the passenger train onto a siding to allow the streamliner to proceed. The train remained on the siding until the northbound streamliner, due here at 6:08 p.m. passed through. The northbound streamliner was held up at West Bend, where the streamlined trains meet. About 6:30 p.m. the switch engine towed the passenger train as far as West Bend, from where it was able to proceed under its own power

again.

Mrs. Edward Miller received a letter from her son, 1st Lieut. Fred Miller, the latter part of last week in which he mentions that he and Pvt. Byron Bunkelman, M.P., son of Mr. and Mrs. William Bunkelman, Jr. met in Australia, where both are stationed. Lieut. Miller writes that you can't imagine how thrilled and overjoyed the two were to see each other. He adds that they had a great deal to talk about and had a real visit and reunion together. The two pals were employed together by Miller, Inc. before entering active service and had been searching for a long time before they finally met. Lieut. ### 100 Years Ago July 6, 1918

Schaefer of this village and Florian Furicht of Chicago, who saw smoke and flames shooting from the roof of the building when passing by the place on their way home from a fishing trip. A granary which was standing close by also caught fire and was completely destroyed, together with some barley, wheat and oats. The dwelling house, which was a short dis-

tance away from the barn, was at one time at great danger of being destroyed, only for the heroic efforts of the neighbors in fighting the blaze was it saved.

Joseph Sukawaty, 69, was overcome Friday by a paralytic stroke while shingling a roof on a barn near St. Kilian, and fell about 40 feet. The stroke and the fall combined resulted in his death. Medical aid was summoned immediately after the accident happened but before the doctor could arrive, the man died.

The local draft board has drafted 39 more men from Washington County who will leave for Columbus Barracks, Ohio. The following young men of this village and rural routes are among the list: Isadore Keller of Kewaskum; Charles Klahn, Route 5; William Brandstetter of Kewaskum and Paul H. Seefeldt of Route 1.

A child, mother and grandmother, known as the Loebke family of Milwaukee, were drowned at Round Lake on Thursday afternoon. The three had gone out for a boat ride, and when about 200 feet from shore, the boat capsized, throwing the occupants into eight feet of water. The husband, together with several others who were standing on shore when the boat tipped, immediately rushed to the scene, but arrived too late to save them from drowning. The bodies were taken to the home of Anton Seifert and later removed to the Gilboy, Smith and Senn undertaking parlors in Campbellsport from where they were shipped to their home at Milwaukee.

## Don Charleston Selected As Moraine Park's 2018 Distinguished Alumnus

He retired from Caterpillar on April 1, 2008, after 30 years of service. In his retirement, Charleston

hasn't forgotten about his alma mater and all of the places he has been as a result of his education. He returned to Moraine Park in May of 2016 to establish a scholarship through the Moraine Park Foundation.

# Washington County Drug Enforcement Group Arrests Three

On Thursday, June 28, the Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group concluded an investigation involving multiple controlled purchases of heroin, fentanyl, cocaine and ecstasy with the arrest of three City of Milwaukee residents. The suspects were arrested by the Washington County SWAT team in two adjacent commercial parking lots north of County Line Road in the Village of Germantown. Three suspects were originally taken into custody; however, one was released with no charges at this time. A fourth suspect, believed to be involved, was not arrested at the scene but is still being sought by investigators.

Germantown police officers and Washington County sheriff's

deputies assisted at the scene. Milwaukee Police District 4 officers were consulted during the investigation and also assisted with seizing a vehicle which was directly involved in the prior drug deliveries.

At the time of arrest the suspects were delivering nine grams of heroin to an undercover police officer for \$1,250. Recovered from a vehicle during the arrest was an additional 3.7 grams of heroin and 3.7 grams of fentanyl. Three stolen handguns were recovered from the suspects. These handguns were stolen from Richfield, Milwaukee and La Crosse. The handgun from Richfield was stolen in a 2015 residential burglary. (Case #15-4107)

Several felony drug charges are being requested against the

main suspect for delivery of heroin, cocaine, fentanyl and ecstasy. Charges will also be requested against both men for possession of the stolen firearms and for Felon in Possession of Firearms.

"This was a significant arrest for a couple reasons," said Sheriff Dale Schmidt. "With dose amounts at 1/10 gram, the quantity is large for heroin and fentanyl deliveries. The amount represents 164 individual doses that was available to opiate users in Washington County."

"Also, with illegal opiate sale tactics being very mobile and anonymous it is difficult to conduct these kinds of investigations." Sheriff Schmidt added, "I'm very proud of the work done by the Drug Unit, and appreciative, of the

ongoing cooperation from the Milwaukee Police Department."

"Heroin dealers need to know Washington County law enforcement aggressively investigates and prosecutes drug crimes. If you are delivering across Highway Q, we are working a case on you, it's only a matter of time before you are arrested," Schmidt warned.

The two suspects, ages 25 and 29, remain in the Washington County Jail and were expected to be in court on Monday, July 2.



# School's Out For Summer

– Summer School Program Concluded Last Friday

Like the American Eagle, the students' roller coaster features steep drops. And like the Demon, the American Demon roller coaster has an upside-down loop.

Altogether, the four-foot-tall model roller coaster contains 81 cups. The students used a marble to test the coaster. Ava's group nicknamed their marble "Ocean."

It took a lot of trial and error to get the roller coaster to work correctly so that Ocean did not go flying off the track, made of foam pipe insulation, and rolling across the room.

The class was offered last summer also, and some of the students enjoyed the class so much that they took it again this year. It gave those students an advantage on building successful roller coasters.

"We kind of had an idea of what we are doing. We knew what worked and what didn't work," said Ava, one of the repeat roller coaster designers.

But having that advantage wasn't the only reason Ava signed up to take the course again.

"It's a really fun class," she said.

Perhaps the biggest challenge was deciding which student in the group got to take the roller coaster home. If Ava was selected for that honor, she would have to figure out how to transport the large keepsake home.

"It won't fit on the school bus. My mom or my dad would have to come pick me up, probably my dad because we could fit it in his truck.

We all have to figure something out," Ava said.

### Junior Police Academy

For Erik Krier, who is going into sixth grade, the highlight was being in the Junior Police Academy. In that course, Erik and other students learned about the various aspects of law enforcement, public safety and the criminal justice system through classroom presentations, hands-on activities and guest speakers.

Flight For Life even flew in one day so the class could see how the helicopter is used in emergency situations.

"I was so excited to see that," Erik said.

But Erik's favorite day was when members of Washington County's SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) team visited. Erik and the other students got to climb into the armored SWAT vehicle and get a close-up look at some of the tools that the SWAT team uses.

The students tried on a bulletproof helmet and took turns trying to lift the 40-pound vest that the SWAT team members wear to carry a radio, body camera, ammunition and a bullet-proof plate.

"It is about as heavy as my backpack was when it had all my school stuff on the last day of school," Erik noted.

The students learned how the SWAT team uses a robot and various tools.

The armored SWAT truck is actually a Ford F550 with armor on it. The vehicle weighs

about 17,000 pounds and can travel 70 mph, Sgt. Buck Robertson a member of the Washington County Sheriff's Office and a member of the SWAT team, told the students.

The armored truck has a turret so that the SWAT team members can stand up and shoot from the top of the vehicle from behind a shield. Robertson explained that there are also holes on the sides of the vehicle so that rifles can be fired from inside the vehicle if needed.

"It's kind of like a pirate ship and a cannon!" Erik observed.

### Planning For Summer School

The summer school program does more than provide a fun time for youth.

"It keeps the structure for them to help them remain active in education," Dreher said.

This year's summer school was held at Kewaskum Elementary School. Unlike past years, classes were not held in the middle school because of the district's construction project.

"We were limited on the space due to the construction, but we were still able to offer students this awesome opportunity," Dreher said.

Dreher is already looking forward to what the new middle school means for next year's summer school.

"It is very exciting. We have a wonderful program going and are looking forward to what class opportunities will be offered in 2019," she said.

## Early Osceola History Is Told By Rural Pupil In 1927

*The following article about the Town of Osceola was published in January 1927.*

The history of the Town of Osceola is interestingly told by Nora A. Twohig, Route 1 St. Cloud, winner of the essay contest conducted for rural school pupils in townships throughout the county by The Fond du Lac County Historical Society. The essay illustrated with pictures of pioneer scenes, was one of those read at the annual meeting of the Historical Society January 7.

"The Town of Osceola, a name derived from the famous chief of the Florida Indians, is first made mention of in 1836 when it was organized as a part of the territory of Fond du Lac County," says the writer. "The town was first called Wayne and later named Osceola by W. R. Longstreet. The first settlement was made at what is now Waucousta in 1848."

"The early settlers of the English were James Farr, Washington Noble, John Graham and William Oliver; Irish, Michael Scannell, Joseph Cavanaugh; French, John Airhart; German, Peter Radloff; and Scotch families, the McPhersons, Mc-Dougalls, McIntoshes and others settled in and around Dundee. McPherson named the little village in the southeastern part of the town Dundee, after Dundee in Scotland."

"John Airhart, the Frenchman, has an especially interesting early history. When he was but a mere boy of 16, he joined Napoleon's army and served through the German and Spanish campaigns. He was captured by the English and held a prisoner, and was later sent to Canada and fought during the war of 1812. John deserted the British at Plattsburg. He settled in the State of New York, where he was married and remained until 1848. A large Irish and German population came into the town about 1850."

"The land was obtained from the government and was found to be suitable for agriculture. The timber was cut off, drawn into huge piles and burned and the land made ready for crops as soon as possible. Farming at first was confined to the tillage of small acreages of ground, for which oxen and rude machinery were used, such as braking plow, hoe, hand-rake, grub-hoe, cradle and scythe and mostly hand work

was done by both men and women. This though, in time gave way to more modern and improved methods."

"The early crops included wheat, which thrived on the rich soil, oats, corn, potatoes, and all kinds of garden vegetables."

"There were few cows or cattle kept on those farms or tracts, as they were unfenced and the cattle roamed at large. Some sheep and hogs were owned by the early settlers, but owing to the wild animals, were hard to keep, for bears were known to come and carry the pigs out of the pens."

"The first trading posts were opened at Waucousta in the fall of 1859 by T.W. Purcell. The first cattle fair for Dundee was started by C.F. Brockmeyer."

"The first church was the Catholic church at Armstrong, called St. Matthews, built in 1855. The Dutch Reformed was established in 1876 at Dundee and in 1878 the Lutheran church at Dundee."

### Recreation of Settlers

"The first sawmill was built at Waucousta in 1848 and the first flour mill in 1850 at the same place by John Beeson. The first post office was kept in the home of William Mitchell. House gathering, spelling schools, singing schools and husking bees were enjoyed by those early pioneers and most happy gatherings they were, generally at the school houses. Cotillion parties were held at the hall in Dundee."

"Other occupations besides farming were cooperating on the making of barrels. A cooper shop was erected at Dundee. An ashery for the leaching of large quantities of ashes for the making of soap was also built at Dundee, but the industry did not prove successful."

"In November, 1869 Freeman Sackett and Spencer began the publication of the paper called The Waucousta Representative, a four column folio devoted to local matters exclusively in the town of Osceola. The paper was filled with original poetry, locals, "jokes" in the shape of burlesque advertisements and caricatures. These caricatures were executed on wood with a pocket knife by Byron Hall and Freeman Sackett and were richly enjoyed by the country folk. But the enterprise was not a paying one and was short lived. Later cheese factories were begun and other indus-

tries followed."

"The first town meeting was held in the home of William Mitchell Nov. 7, 1850."

"The roads at first were only trails and the markets distant. It sometimes took the better part of a week to get to mill and back again and many journeys were made on foot."

### Development Marks Town

"The later settlers were Belgian, German, Irish, and Americans. They were a thrifty, industrious class of people. Better homes, better farms, and general prosperity all around has marked the Town of Osceola."

"The little old log and red schoolhouse had given way to five modern well equipped buildings. Among them is a beautiful two-room school at Waucousta. The teachers are well trained for their work and the salary has advanced from \$12 to \$18 per month to \$100, and some teachers get more."

"A great number of Osceola's young men and women have entered higher institutions of learning, and the town has given many to the professional world."

"In patriotic service, Osceola has given unstintedly of man power during all wars and was most generous in Liberty loan campaigns."

"The majority of the people of the town own their own farms. Renters are few and are on places mostly where owners have retired. The size of the farms varies from 40-300 acres. Most farms have splendid barns as Osceola is a dairying town. There are a number of tractors and all kinds of modern and improved machinery is owned by the farmers. The homes are very comfortable and some are models in every respect, with electric lights, running water and telephone."

"The Town of Osceola has no railroad, but it has finely improved roads. Every farmer owns an automobile and nearly all have trucks for carrying produce to market, mill and factory and to bring home their needs."

"The Town of Osceola has some beautiful lakes, which are the Mecca for the tourist camper and fisherman during the summer months. The wooded hills and green slopes and valleys make a wonderful scenery. So with a cheer for our noble pioneers who made our beautiful town, we will say finis."
